

The Aggie Muster dates back to 1903 and has been held annually since. More than 350 Centennial Musters will be held around the world this year, Beresky said, "wherever Texas A&M former students live or work." During wars, the Aggies muster in foxholes, on the

battlefield, aboard ships, in airplanes and in medical hospitals. In World War II, a Muster was held on Corregidor shortly before the Japanese captured the island. Every Muster ceremony is the same, Beresky reported.

We are building a new home and are going to rent our present house. We plan to leave the stove and retrigerator in the "rent" house to better our chances of renting. How can we insure these appliances?

The rent property, itself, should be covered by a standard Fire Policy specifically insuring the building.
