Council Agrees To Lease Garbage Collection Vehicle

At a second called session Monday, the City Council entered into agreement with EMCO Corporation to negotiate a lease purchase plan for new garbage collection equipment.

The equipment is a one man operated side loader

truck. Containers are available in three sizes; three yard, 1 1/2 yard and 50 gallon size.

Preston Coomer, a representative of EMCO was here to demonstrate the equipment and assist city employees in a survey of the city and to help determine where containers should be located in order to best serve the customer.

Purchase price of the 30-yard capacity truck is \$24,000. The three yard container is \$172; 1 1/2 yard container, \$130, and the 50 gallon container \$62.

Total cost is estimated at \$119,000 and will be amortized over a four year period.

The council feels this approach to the garbage collection problem will best serve the customer and that labor saving alone will help to offset the cost.

It is estimated that the new system will be ready

for use by July 1, 1976. Present at the meeting were Norman Rousselot, Lemuel Lopez, Jack Kerbow, Hershel Davenport, Doyle Morgan, Bob Nevill and Mrs. Pat Robbins.

Jr. Hi Track Teams Break District Records

Compiling 132 points in the Junction Junior High Track Meet held April 10, the eighth grade Sonora Colts placed first over other competitors in the district.

Rickey Sanchez placed first in the 660 yard dash with a time of 132.1, setting a new record. Sammy Sanchez, who runs the 330 yard dash, placed first in that event with a new record time of 39.8.

Also setting a new record was the 1320 relay team who placed first, running the relay in 2:42.6. Members of the team are Jessie Gamez, R. Sanchez, S. Sanchez and Eddie Favila. This same

group of boys make up the 440 yard relay team who placed second in that event.

Joey Kirby took a first place in the 70 yard intermediate hurdles; fourth in the 205 low hurdles; third in the shotput; sixth in high jump, and third in pole vault.

John Paul Bautista placed first in the discus throw.

Others placing in the meet were 660 dash, Bruce Bartz, fourth; 70 IH, Kent Cagel, third; 330 dash, Mike Sherrod, sixth; 100 yard dash, Eddie Favila, second; 220 yard dash, Jessie Gamez, fifth;

1320 run, Peter Gomez, second and Rickey Wright, third; discus, Sherrod, third.

The seventh grade team held 120 points in the meet and came in second place. The 440 yard relay team, consisting of Ervery Valles, Ponciano Castillo, David Creek and Steven Chandler, set a new record with a time of 50.6. Chandler also placed first in the 330 dash, setting a new record time of 39.9.

Robert Noriega also broke the record in the 1320 run with his time of 349.7. Stanley Anderson was another record breaker with a time of 10.9 in the 70 yard inter-

mediate hurdles. Timmy Waters placed fifth in that event.

Juan Mendoza placed second in the 66 yard dash with Tommy Burch placing fifth. The 1320 relay team of Valles, Castillo, Mendoza and Chandler, came in second with Castillo taking a first in the 220 yard dash. Creek came in sixth place.

Others placing were Valles, second, 100 yard dash; Waters, sixth, 205 low hurdles; and Johnny Doan, sixth, high jump; Mendoza, fifth, broad jump; Hector Samaniego, second, and Rex Surber, fifth, shot; Surber, fourth and Samaniego, fifth, discus.

Junior Girls Place First, Set Six District Records

Six district records were broken when the girls' junior high track team competed in district competition in McCamey April 10. Local girls compiled a total of 162 points with Reagan County being their closest contender with a total of 105 points.

Robin Owen, Sabrina Allison, Linda Smith and Paula Friess came in first

in the 440 yard relay team competition, setting a record time of 53.2. Friess also broke the district record in the 330 yard dash. She had a time of 43.9. Jessie Robledo placed third in that event with Annabel Gonzales placing fourth.

Rosa Noriega set a new record in the 660 dash with a time of 1:52.5. Beth Bartz was third. Paige Pollard also broke a district record in the 80

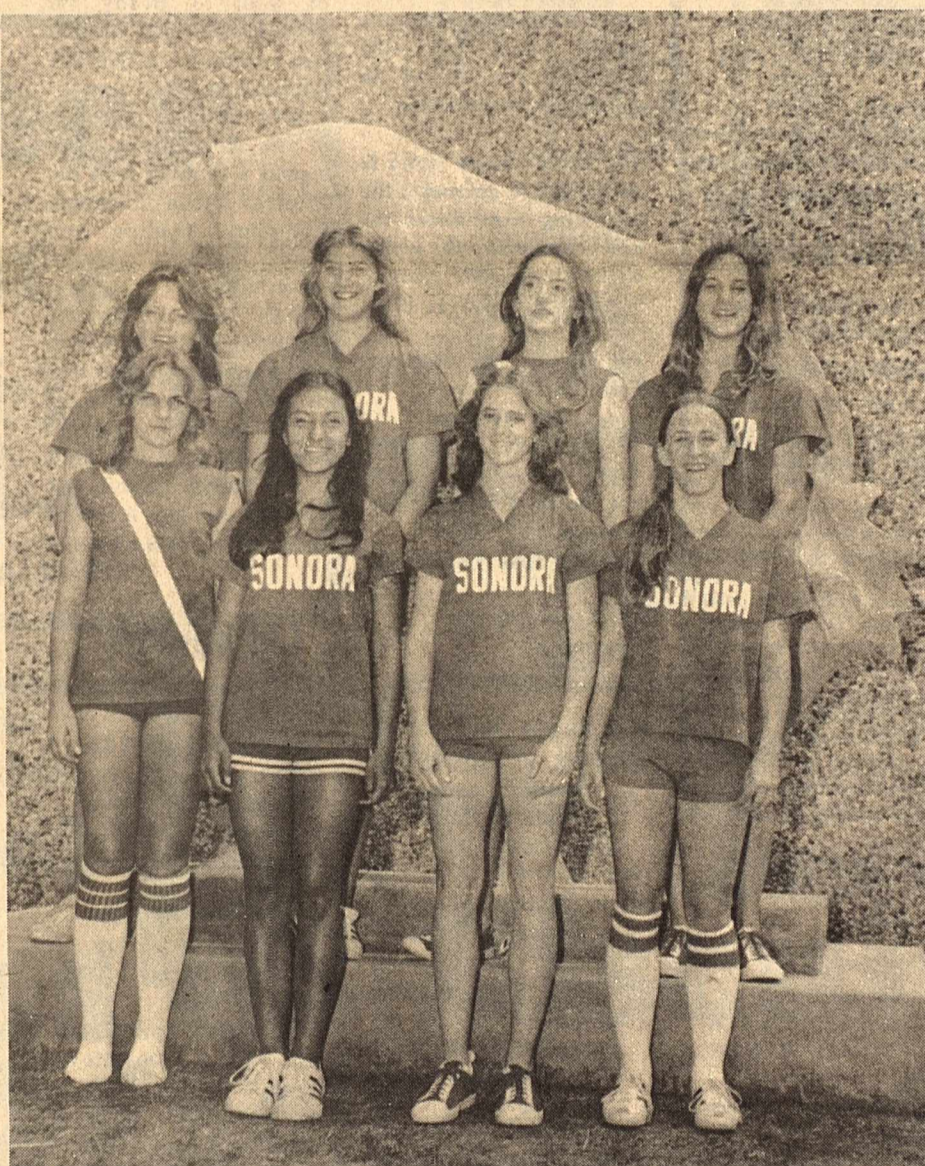
yard hurdles. Her time was 12.8. Jamie Condra placed fourth in the hurdles.

The 1320 relay team placed first with another record time of 3:07.8. Members of the team are Jessica Robledo, Annabel Gonzales, Marche Lane and Paula Friess.

Friess jumped 31'3" in the triple jump to set another Sonora record. Marche Lane placed second in the triple jump

with 31'2". Friess was second in the broad jump.

Placing second in the 100 yard dash and the 60 yard dash was Robin Owen. Jamie Condra was fifth in that event. Beth Bartz placed fifth in the 220 dash and the 880 yard relay team placed third. Members of that relay team are Robledo, Gonzales, Bartz and Allison.

Wool Incentive Announced

An incentive payment rate of 61.1 percent on 1975 marketings of shorn wool was announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). The announced payment rate is based on the difference between the National average price of 44.7 cents a pound received by producers during 1975 and the previously announced incentive price of 72 cents a pound. Incentive payments to wool growers are required under the National Wool Act of 1954, as amended.

A payment rate of \$1.09 per hundredweight on unshorn lambs sold or slaughtered in 1975 was also announced by USDA. This payment is designed to compensate growers for the wool they market on live lambs rather than as

shorn wool. The payment is based on the shorn wool payment rate, average weight of wool per hundredweight of lambs, and value of lamb's wool relative to the National average value of shorn wool.

Deductions of 1 1/2 cents a pound from 1975 shorn wool payments and 7 1/2 cents per hundred pounds of liveweight from 1975 unshorn lamb payments will be made to finance advertising, sales promotion and related market development activities.

Sutton County wool producers received \$424,129 on the sales of 965,456 pounds of shorn wool and 34,240 hundredweight of unshorn lambs. The county average of wool sold was 68 cents.
