Preston Coomer, a representative of EMCO was here to demonstrate the equipment and assist city employees in a survey of the city and to help determine where containers should be located in order to best serve the customer.

Purchase price of the 30-yard capacity truck is

\$24,000. The three yard container is \$172; 11/2 yard container, \$130, and the 50 gallon container \$62.

Total cost is estimated at \$119,000 and will be amortized over a four year period.

The council feels this approach to the garbage collection problem will best serve the customer and that labor saving alone will help to offset the cost. It is estimated that the

new system will be ready
