

Driver of this butane/propane truck, Juvencio Ibarra of Eagle Pass, was killed instantly when his truck was in collision with a pickup, driven by a Sonora man. The accident occurred May 7 at 8:55 a.m., during a heavy rain that had begun earlier in the morning. The truck, belonging to Eagle Oil Company of Eagle Pass, was traveling north on U.S. Highway 277 South, 8.3 miles south of Sonora on what is known as the 9 mile bridge, when a pickup driven by Federico Guadarrama of Sonora, traveling south went out of control striking the truck. On impact the truck blew a tire causing the driver to lose control and strike the side of the bridge. The bridge railings are believed to have punctured the tank, causing it to explode and burn, killing the driver instantly. The explosion blew the tractor loose from the trailer, sending flames over approximately two acres of wet grassland. Walter Walicek, Department of Public Safety patrolman, was in charge of the investigation.

Rabies Scare Subsiding

No more positive cases of rabies have been confirmed as of news time Tuesday although officials of the Sonora Animal Hospital state that both the head of a fox and that of a dog have been sent off to be examined.

Approximately 60 animals have been picked up by city officials and brought to the pound since a rabid dog in the city limits sent the scare of another rabies outbreak throughout the county.

These sixty animals were only the ones that were picked up and not claimed. A number of others have been redeemed from the pound and a few pet owners have paid fines for letting their animals run loose.

Veterinarians at the local hospital for animals state that while the rabies outbreak looks hopeful, we are still not completely safe and that pet owners should still observe the same precautions as in the

Two persons underwent rabies innoculations resulting from contact with the rabid animal found in the city earlier in the month. In addition to contact with these two persons, at least 13 dogs were destroyed after being bitten by the animal.



On August 15, 1975, a 14 year old Mexican-American girl was admitted to the Los Angeles County- University of Southern California Medical Center with mental confusion. The most prominent sign was hydrophobia; she gagged and choked when sipping water from a glass, but could drink with a straw. Besides gagging at the sight of water, she seemed to be afraid to wash her

hands. When examined, she was oriented, talkative, and had a fever of 38.8 degrees C. The only abnormal physical findings were abdominal pain in the left lower quadrant and tenderness in the left costovertebral angle. Neurologic examination was normal. A white blood cell

count showed 15,500 cells per ml, with 88 percent polymorphonuclear leukocytes, 10 percent lymphocytes, and 2 percent monocytes. Urinalysis showed 5-10 white blood cells, many red blood cells, 3+ protein and 4+ bacteria.

'75 Human Rabies Disclosed

For the 2 weeks prior to admission she had had lower back pain and dysuria, and for 5 days she had had fever and difficulty swallowing. Two days before admission she had complained of a burning sensation of the sole of her left foot, and the day before she was hospitalized, she had had auditory hallucination.

On August 16, the patient became confused, and deep tendon reflexes were noted to be absent. Over the next 24 hours, the patient's condition worsened, and loss of sensation to pin prick, hypoventilation, and flaccid paralysis developed in rapid succession. She underwent endotrachael intubation and was put on a respirator. An electroencephalogram showed diffuse slow waves with no focal lesions.

On August 19, 4 days after admission, a corneal touch preparation was negative for rabies antigen by the flourescent antibody. (FRA) test. However, a skin biopsy from the posterior nuchal region was reported positive for rabies antigen in parafollicular neurons by FRA (test performed by Dr. Donald Blenden, University of Missouri). A serum specimen obtained on August 25 was positive by indirect flourescent antibody test. Hypotension associated with vasomotor and autonomic instability developed, and isoproterenol infusion was required. The patient died on August 31

arrest in 24 hours. Mice inoculated intracerebrally with saliva obtained on August 19 died or exhibited paralysis

by September 8, when they were killed; brain material was positive for rabies by FRA. The' patient's brain was also FRA-positive on postmortem examination.

Although the girl and her parents were questioned repeatedly, they did not give a history of the patient's having been bitten or scratched. The family had lived in Mexico until December 1974 and had had 5 pet dogs. They reported that of the dogs, a puppy, seemed especially vicious in the late summer of 1974 and bit several relatives; it ran away in September. In November, the puppy's dam was inactive for 2 days, refusing food and water; then she died.

This is the second case of human rabies reported in the United States in 1975. The first case was in a 60-year-old farmer and part-time trapper from northwestern Minnesota who had been bitten by a stray cat. The case in the girl represents the rare occurrence of disease without a history of known exposure. The average incubation period for rabies is 20-60 days. However, in fewer than 1 percent of reported rabies cases in humans has the incubation periods been 1 year or more. In these cases the possibility of a more recent exposure could be ruled out.



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


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
