Sonora Lad Bitten By Stray Cat

There were two relieved and elated parents in Sonora Monday afternoon after reports came back from the Sonora Animal Hospital that a sick, stray cat that had bitten their six-year-old son five days earlier, was not rabid.

Duane Jones was playing in a neighbor's yard July 21 when a half-grown kitten wandered into the yard. The six-year-old, like most youngsters, picked the kitten up and was bitten.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Jones, of 902 Tayloe were advised by the neighbor that the incident had occurred and police were summonded to apprehend the animal. It was then taken to the local vet clinic where the head was sent to Austin for observation.

POLICIES Our government was designed to operate with a series of checks and balances. The balances were to come from the stability resulting from powers shared among the executive, legislative and judicial branches. The balancing procedures provided for by the Constitution must also find some means of expression through good legislation, which needs to find an equilibrium between opposing and often contentious forces.

Washington now has countless groups that urge their special viewpoint on legislation. It is not surprising that these groups should exist, since the demands on legislators are so varied that they cannot possibly keep up with, for example, all of the 18,000 bills that have been introduced in the 94th Congress. Nonetheless, some of these groups would be more persuasive if they would try harder to understand the views of others.

When I was at the Democratic National Convention last week, a young man came up to me and asked me to support legislation to protect against the inhumane treatment of baby seals. I assured him that I favored such legislation and would indeed support it. He then proceeded through several other instances of inhumane treatment toward animals and of proposed legislative solutions, and came to the question of the killing of coyotes. 



investing in drilling ventures. One area which some former fraudulent Schedule "D" offerors are reportedly moving into is the "private offering" of investment opportunity, since a "private offering" does not have to be registered with either the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission or the State Securities Board

A legitimate private offering must meet certain criteria: there must be no public solicitation of investors; there must be no more than 35 investors; there must be some "relationship of trust" between the investors and the offeror (for example, all might be relatives or friends of the offeror); and generally the investors must be relatively sophisticated about investment matters.

Our office is studying reports that some former Schedule "D" operators are misusing the "private offering" exemption in much the same way Schedule

"D" was being misused. Another method by which some unscrupulous former Schedule "D" operators are reported to be continuing their efforts to obtain money from investors is the federal oil and gas lease lottery business, or the worthless for drilling.







At 6:15 p.m., on that day police broke up a fight between two youths. Both were released. The affray occurred at Chestnut and



The power mower has become a part of the Texas family scene, but it can be as dangerous as a coiled rattlesnake.

There's no refuting the labor-saving qualities of mowers, but they should be handled as carefully as you would a rattler, says Dudley J. Johnson, chief of the Consumer Health Bureau of the Texas Department of Health Resources.

Cuts, bruises, and puncture wounds are typical of the injuries which the machines can inflict. The gasoline used to power these mowers causes fire which have killed people and burned down the home of others, says

More than 50,000 adults and children are treated each year in hospital emergency rooms for injuries associated with power lawn mowers, says the U S Consumer Product Safety Commission. These are the more serious injuries requiring medical treatment. There is no clear picture on the number of minor injuries treated at home.

Accidents can happen in many ways. *Nancy was mowing long, wet grass when it became clogged in the discharge opening. When she tried to dislodge it, the whirling blades struck her fingers. One finger was amputated.

*Jim's father was mowing grass in a hickory tree grove. A nut struck by the blade ricocheted off the house and hit Jim, blinding the right eye.

*A man using a riding mower on a steep backyard terrace started a sideways turn. The machine rolled over. His left leg was so severely cut it had to be amputated.

*Mr. Smith was mowing a lot with a garden tractor when he backed up. striking his son who had been playing behind the tractor. The boy's left foot was amputated.

Do any of these accidents sound familiar?

There are accident patterns which are repeated time after time. These patterns are:

1. Contact with the rotating blade. This often occurs when the victim is clearing the discharge chute; when the victim adjusts the machine without turning it off and waiting for the blade to stop; or when the machine hits an obstacle such as a rock and the victim's

foot slips under the housing.

2. Propelled objects -- Wire, rocks and twigs can be shot out either through the discharge chute or from under the housing. Many victims in these cases are bystanders.

3. Overturning -- Riding mowers used on steep slopes are involved in this type of accident most often.

4. Mower running over the victim --This often occurs when a riding mower or garden tractor is being driven in reverse. Push type mowers are dangerous when the operator pulls the mower backward over the foot, or slips going uphill, allowing the mower to roll backward.

Experts at the Texas Department of Health Resources say that reel lawn mowers are safer than rotary lawn mowers, primarily because their blades move more slowly than those of rotary mowers. A common accident pattern with reel lawn mowers, however, is attempting to release the reel when it is jammed by a twig or other object without first shutting off the engine.

Since reel lawn mowers cannot cut tall grass efficiently, most consumers prefer rotary mowers. Almost 90 percent of all power lawn mowers manufactured each are rotary mowers. Their blades can reach speeds of 200 miles per hour and can hurl objects 50 feet or more, unless the mowers are equipped with chute deflectors. If your mower has such a deflector, don't take it off and thereby invite an accident to

Gasoline should be kept in a well-ventilated area (away from your living quarters) and in tightly capped safety cans. Don't refuel a mower while it is running or while the engine is hot. And, never refuel a mower indoors because the unseen vapors may be ignited by a spark. Also, cigarettes and gasoline don't mix.

One other caution -- never start your motor or work on it with the motor running in an enclosed area where carbon monoxide can collect.

Delegates at the second annual state convention of the Independent Cattlemen's Association have ranked relief from rising property taxes and defeat of state and federal land use legislation high on the Association's agenda for the coming year.

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
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
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


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
