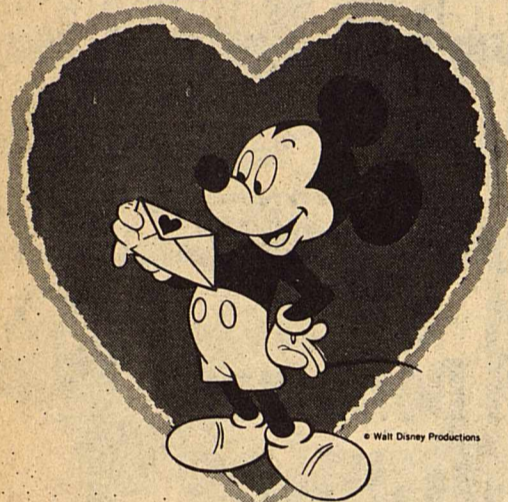

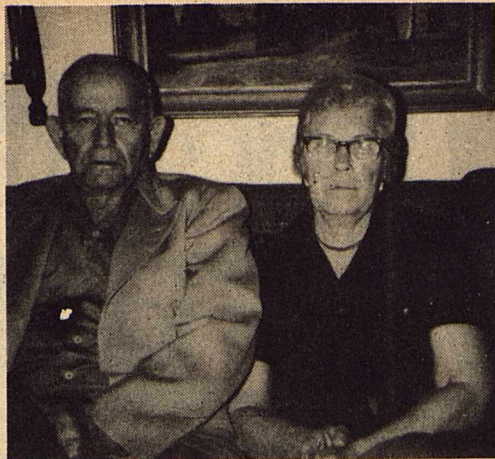

Wool and Mohair Report

Following the holidays wool and mohair market news is very limited. There is very little unsold wool and mohair left in the United States as we go into the new year.

Business is good, especially in the woolen trade. This is the business that utilizes the poorer types of wools—the off wools—and wools shorter than 2½ inches in length. Mostly these types of wools go to make up the bulkier fabrics which are commonly used in men's sport coats and women's wear. The long staple finer grades are used in the worsted traded such as the higher priced men's suits are made from. This phase of the wool business is not as flourishing as the woolen trade. This is why we have seen strong prices paid for the poorer types of wools and only moderate prices paid for the better types of wool.

Also the Australian Wool Corporation has been selling their poorer types which have been a little cheaper, for the past 18 months and accumu-

lating their choice wools. Now this accumulation of the best wools is something of a glut on the market.

This does not mean that this situation will exist from now on. In fact, there are indications that the better types are coming back into stronger demand. Reports from the A.W.C. tell us that their stockpile has almost been cut in half the past year. With this surplus wool out of the way, we should see a firm trend develop as we go into the spring season.

Mohair interest is keen, but no stocks of mohair are available to sell, so no reliable prices can be quoted. However, several buyers are willing to contract at prices around \$3.00 or slightly more for adult hair.

Lone Star Gas Asks For Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas Company's local manager J.T. Morgan, last week filed an application for a rate increase to provide the company an 8% rate of return.

Morgan said Lone Star's distribution system serving Sonora earned a 6.27% rate of return in 1975 and that \$8,095.00 is required to correct the utility's revenue deficiency. He explained that Lone Star has experienced increased costs of operation due to the current inflation, and unrecovered costs of purchased gas which substantially eroded utility earnings.

In June of 1975, the Railroad Commission authorized Lone Star to recover 85% of its increase in the average cost of gas (above a base of .72 cents) from residential and commercial

deliveries at the city gate. During the fourteen months ended August, 1976, Lone Star had unrecovered gas costs of \$14.2 million for gas delivered at the city gate for residential and commercial customers.

"These costs result from the rapidly rising gas prices during the last few years. For example, our average cost of gas climbed from 18c per thousand cubic feet in 1971 to \$1.03 in June of last year, a 472% increase. Utility earnings declined from \$23.2 million in 1971 to \$13.1 million in 1975, or 44%," Morgan said.

The company's application would raise the average residential customer's bill about 67c per month, based on 8 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) consumption.

Health Tips

Public health officials investigating the relationship between swine flu inoculation and a fairly rare disease face problems because no one knows much about the disease itself, the Texas Medical Association says.

The biggest mystery is the cause of Guillain-Barre syndrome, a paralytic disease. This syndrome, which seldom is fatal, has occurred after people have had colds, flu, measles and about 40 other diseases, one report shows. Yet the same 1966 study says about one third of the cases analyzed had not been sick before they got the syndrome. Ever since scientists first described the disease more than 115 years ago, people

have been trying to pinpoint the cause. Fairly popular ideas blame viruses or certain allergies but these are just a few of the theories. The disease strikes all ages and both sexes indiscriminately and may be increasing, a 1963 Ohio study shows.

Symptoms vary but generally there is a tingling in the hands or feet, or both. There may be weakness, muscle pain, paralysis of some body parts, breathing problems, difficulty in swallowing and other symptoms. Hospitalization often is needed during the worst part of the disease but most victims recover. Doctors can give supportive treatment but there is no known cure for the disease itself. Recovery generally ranges from three weeks to two months. A small number die (2-5 percent) or never fully recover (about 10 percent).

Final Tax Payment Due IRS

Many people who do not have enough taxes withheld are required to pay their final installment of 1976 estimated Federal

income tax no later than Monday, January 17. Also due the same day are amended estimates from those whose 1976 income changed substantially during the last quarter.

Many taxpayers first met the requirements for filing a tax declaration during the last three months of 1976, according to the Internal Revenue

Service. Taxpayers are generally required to file an estimate if they owe the IRS more than \$100 not covered by withholding. The estimates in this case are due January 17.

There is one exception to this rule, the IRS said, and that's when taxpayers file their returns and pay all taxes due by January

31. In that case the final 1976 installment is not required, the amended declaration is not required nor is an original January 17 declaration required. IRS Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provides additional information and may be obtained free from local IRS offices.

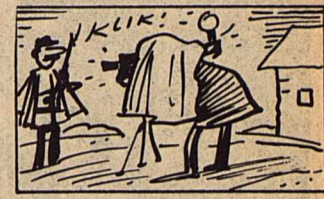
Plans were announced for the observance of the Day of Prayer and Self Denial and of the World Day of Prayer.

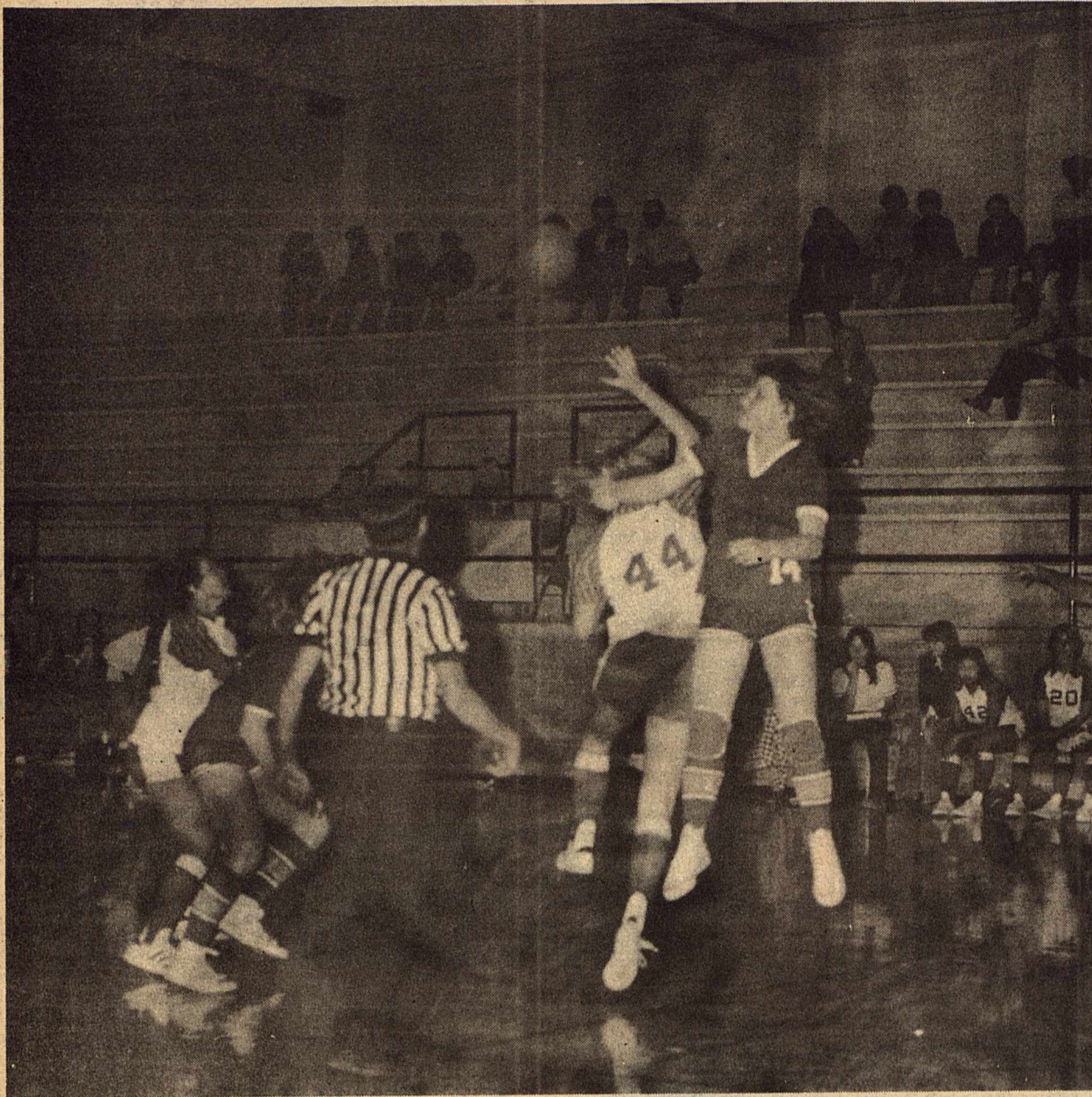

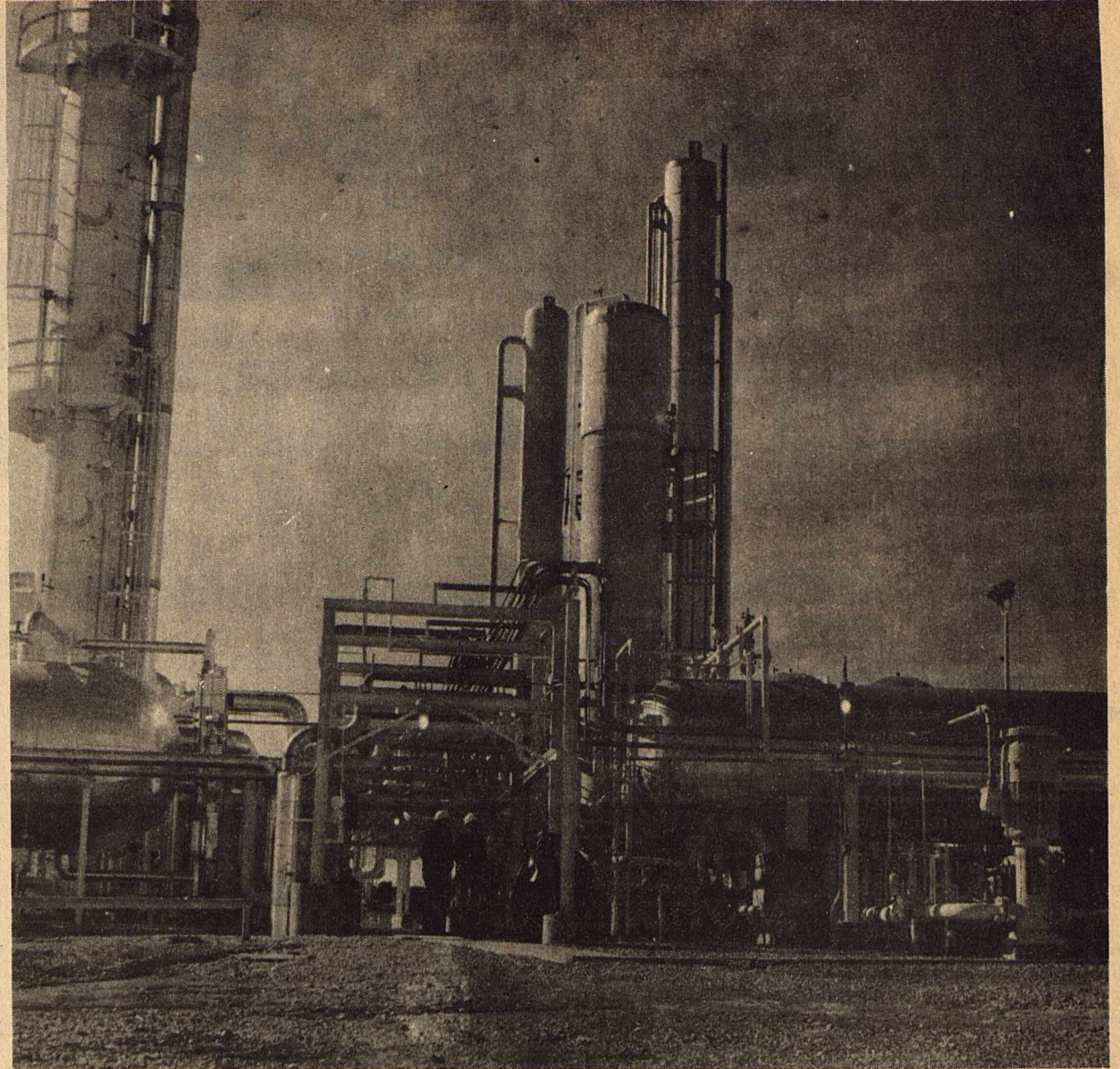

Enserch Exploration

Opens New Liquid Gas Plant

Enserch Exploration, Inc. announced this week the operational status of

its new Sonora gas liquids extraction plant.

Enserch Exploration owns 50 percent interest and Amoco Production Company owns the remaining 50 percent interest in the plant.

"The plant is designed to process 90 million cubic feet per day of gas," Hal Roberts, plant superintendent explains. "This is a rapidly developing area for gas wells, and we will recover a mixed product stream composed of ethane and heavier hydrocarbons of up to 300,000 gallons per day," Roberts continued.

The new \$8 million facility is located approximately six miles south of Sonora on Hwy 277 and about 10 miles west of the Fawcett Ranch.

Amoco Production Co. gas wells feed into the extraction plant from pipelines from a vast area in the Sonora field.

"We process the gas

and send it on through special pipelines for customer use," Roberts adds.

The plant operates 24 hours per day, seven days a week. It is manned by eleven personnel:

Assistant superintendent Gene Davis, senior clerk Clay Cade, supervisor trainee David Evans, operators Robert Hocutt, Randy Surber, Ronnie Hawkins, and Pat Brown, maintenance James Scott, Matt Mallory, all from Sonora, and Jerry Richards from Eldorado.

The plant processes natural gas to recover a mixed liquid product stream which contains ethane, propane, butane and natural gasoline. After further processing, these products are used as fuel and as petrochemical and refinery feedstocks.

The recovery of liquids results from the low temperatures achieved in the turbo expander, which reduces incoming gas to minus 170 degrees Fahrenheit.

In addition to the new Sonora plant, Enserch Exploration owns and operates 12 liquids extraction plants in Texas, Oklahoma and Mississippi, with partial interest in six others.

Three of these are cryogenic turbo-expander plants similar to Sonora located at Gordon, Springtown and Trinidad.

Enserch Exploration, Inc. is the exploration, production and gas processing affiliate of ENSEARCH Corporation.

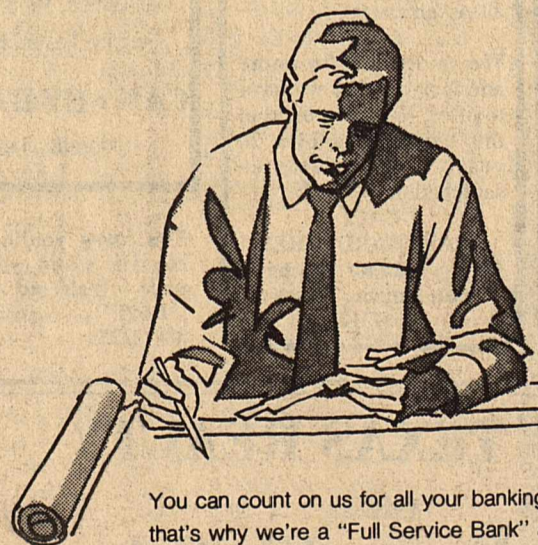
