## Trustees Approve Reports, Resignations and Calendar

At the regular meeting of the board, held March 14, trustees heard reports on the water well at the football field, and authorized the superintendent to obtain information on irrigation systems for the field.

The pre-kindergarten program was approved to

begin March 16. Mrs. Jo Ella Graves will direct the program and will be assisted by Nilda Hernandez and Rosa Gutierrez. The program will be housed in the elementary school and will run until May 20.

The board approved the sale of two old school

buses and the purchase of a 65 passenger bus and a 71 passenger bus. Anyone interested in purchasing an old bus should contact the superintendent's office.

The calendar for 1977-78 was approved and student transfers into the district

were approved. The textbook committee's report was adopted, the tax roll contract was re-negotiated and it was decided to demolish the house on the Allison property.

Bob Snodgrass' request to be relieved of his coaching duties was granted and Debbie Strickland's

resignation to become effective at the end of this school year was accepted.

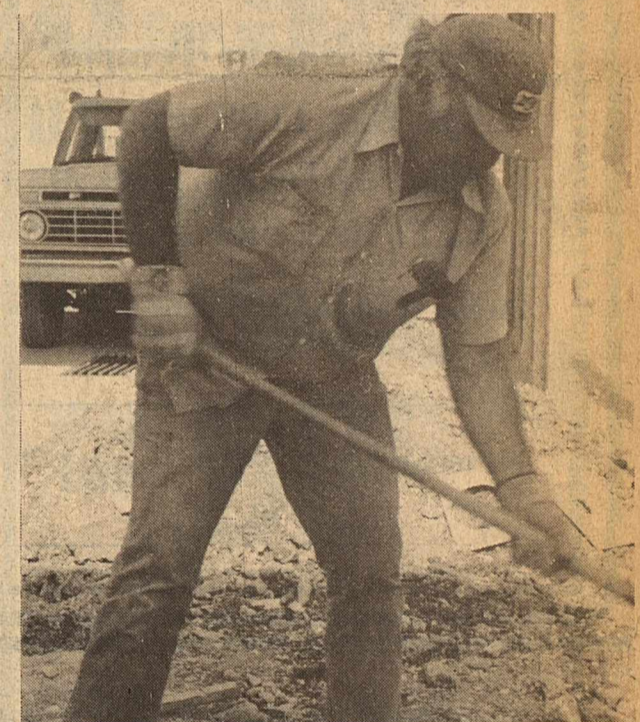

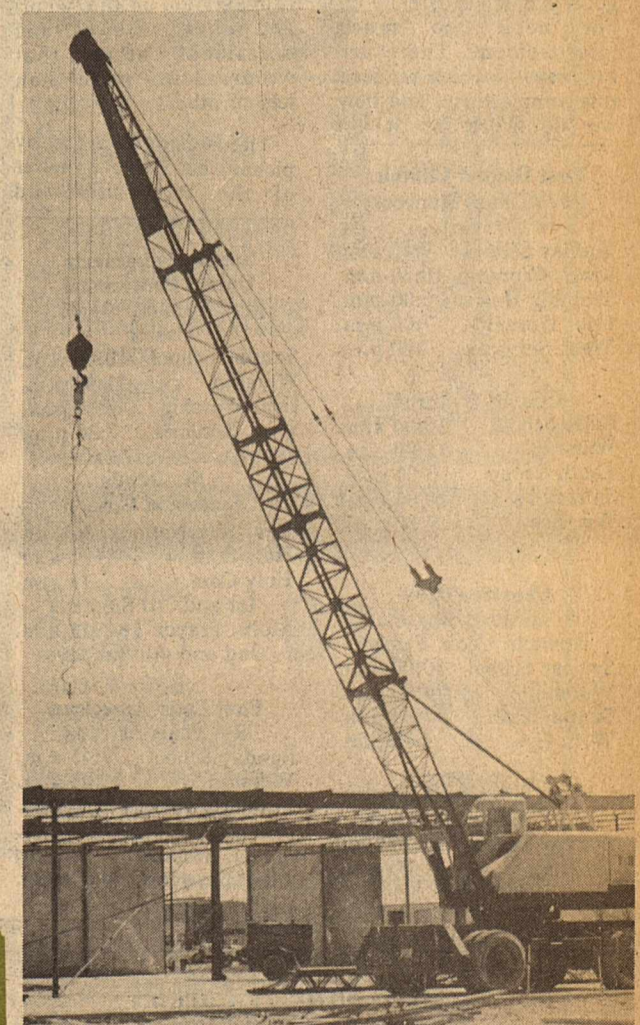
## New Businesses Under Construction

## Alert Motel Manager Leads Police To Arrest

The alertness of a local motel manager in the early morning March 5, led Sonora Police to the arrest of a 23-year-old fugitive, possibly wanted in Texas, Colorado and Tennessee.

John Albert Clark Whitehead, Jr., of Jackson, Tennessee was placed in Sutton County Jail charged with being a fugitive from justice from the state of Tennessee where he is charged with robbery of quick stop food store at gun point. The robbery occurred in Memphis, Tennessee June 30 of last year. In addition to that charge Sonora police are investigating the possibilities of Whitehead being involved in robberies and thefts in Jackson, Tennessee, Denver, Colorado and the Dallas area.

The arrest came about when Whitehead and his 17-year-old girlfriend, Elizabeth Buffalo, also of Jackson, registered at a local motel under what was later discovered to be an assumed name. The motel manager noticed that the license number

Whitehead entered on the motel register differed from that displayed on his car.

The manager alerted the police department of his suspicions and officer Brent Gesch responded to the call. In checking the license number through the National Crime Information Center computer, Gesch discovered that the vehicle was wanted by police in Denver.

Chief Jerry Kemp and Officer Dick Jones assisted Gesch in the arrest of Whitehead and Miss Buffalo at the motel. At the time a .357 Magnum revolver and a bank bag containing \$575.85 in cash and change, was seized. The money is believed to have been taken from a motion picture theatre in Denver.

By afternoon on the day of the arrest various law enforcement agencies had contacted the Sonora Police Department to place holds on Whitehead. He was released to the Dallas County Sheriff's office to meet felony theft charges.

## Band Students To UIL Contest

The Sonora Bronco Band will participate in UIL concert and sight reading contests in Coleman Friday. Contests will be held at Coleman High School, with performances by Sonora scheduled at 2:35 p.m.

The Sonora band won a UIL number 1 rating in November at the Brady contest and a number one rating in both concert and sight reading in Friday's contest will give them a sweepstakes rating.

## Dr. Browne Awarded

Dr. Charles F. Browne was recently awarded the Physician's Recognition Award for his continuing medical education from the American Medical Association.

Dr. Browne and other physicians have accepted participation in continuing medical education as a basic responsibility of the profession of medicine and have met that responsibility.

The award is based on a three year qualifying period and is valid for three years so that the credit hours needed for the next award may be earned.

Dr. and Mrs. Browne received a letter of congratulations from Congressman Bob Krueger for these outstanding achievements.

## Couple Charged

### With Grande Theft

A couple charged with the theft of a Sonora residence were extradited from Santa Cruz, California last week by Police Chief Jerry Kemp and Sheriff Bill Webster.

The couple had been arrested by Santa Cruz Sheriff's Department after a warrant for felony theft had been issued.

Marvin W. Gerren, alias Cowboy Gerren, and Judy Gerren, alias Judy Ebarb, alias Judy Meade, are in Crockett County Jail under

\$10,000 bond each. The couple has been confined in the Ozona jail due to the fact Sutton County's jail does not have the facilities to house a female prisoner nor any felon for any length of time.

Gerren is also wanted in Angleton for felony theft where he was surprised by a ten year old girl, whom he assaulted.

The Gerren couple are being held here for the theft of \$650 in articles taken from a Martin Street residence February 21.

## Commissioners Sign Contract, Hear Reports

County Commissioners met Monday morning to sign contracts and hear various reports.

A contract was signed to begin work of air conditioning the courtroom. Attending the meeting were County Judge Web Elliott and Commissioners, Preston Love, Elba Adams, Bill Wade and Phillip Jacoby.

Commissioners also reviewed a petition sent to them regarding a traffic light at St. Ann's Avenue and Highway 277. The petition was sent to the local highway department and to the district highway engineer in San Angelo asking them to take appropriate action.

The reports of both the Justice of the Peace and the Jailor were approved as was a request from Lion's President Lonnie Pollard to place the

community sign on the courthouse lawn. A place will be designated by the commissioners.

The court also was notified that a representative from the Texas Commission on Jail Standards will make a tour of the jail on March 16.

A revenue sharing hearing will be held March 23 in the judge's office in the courthouse. Anyone interested in how the county's revenue sharing monies should be spent is encouraged to attend.

## Juveniles Under Investigation

Several juveniles are being investigated for the break-in and vandalism of a residence at 114 Plum Street.

The incident was reported March 6 when a Fort Worth couple who also maintain a home in Sonora, called police to report that their home had been broken into.

Entry was apparently gained by breaking a bathroom window, according to investigating officer Brent Gesch.

Several drawers of clothing were ransacked and some damage done to light fixtures as well as cuts in screen doors at the residence. Police also found a partially empty bottle of wine in the bathroom floor. Fingerprints were taken from the bottle as well as entryways.

Missing were a gold pocket watch valued at \$125 to \$150 and a woman's necklace valued at \$150. Approximately \$60 worth of damage was done to the residence.

Mrs. J.F. (Mary Louise) Howell was buried in Sonora Cemetery March 11 following services at the local First United Methodist Church. The Rev. Paul Terry officiated.

Mrs. Howell died March 9 in a San Angelo hospital after a short illness.

Born Mary Louise Watts September 3, 1901 to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Van Buren Watts in Kil-michael, Mississippi, she married J.F. Howell April

12, 1925 there. The couple moved to Sonora in 1934 to begin many years of service to the community and to the sick. Dr. Howell preceded her in death in 1971.

She was a life long member of the Methodist Church, a member of the Tom Green County and Texas Medical Auxiliary, was chairman of the American Heart Association, past president of the United Methodist Women's Association, past president of the PTA, past president of the Hospital Auxiliary, the Federated Woman's Club and the American Legion Auxiliary, and was a member of Eastern Star.

She is survived by two sons, Dr. J.F. Howell, Jr., of Amarillo and Charlie Watts Howell of Perryton; one daughter, Mrs. Jack M. (Marguerite) Allen of Perryton, and ten grandchildren.

## Elementary School News

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## Sonora Minister Speaks

One of the most deadly dangers to the Christian life is complacency, or a feeling that we are pretty good people, and really do not need too much improvement. There are two ways in which we feed this complacency, and how we do work at it on

occasions! The first is by emphasizing what we have done (and we are not always just a bit of exaggeration on this point) and telling ourselves, and occasionally others, that we are doing more than lots of others.

The second way is by picking out some member of the fellowship and

noting how much more faithful we are than he is. Of course we have to choose rather carefully, but most of us can find someone who is not doing as much as we are. Did you ever notice how carefully we choose our comparisons? We seldom choose one of the saints of the Church (and there are such in every Church), but we pick on old Joe Blow,

who still thinks of missionary work in terms of sending a clothing barrel to the "heathen".

There is only one cure for complacency. That is to become so overwhelmed by what God has done for us through Christ that nothing short of complete consecration to His ways will satisfy us. With Easter approaching, when we once more remember the death of our Saviour on the cross, this might be a good time for each of us to examine our own life in the light of His life, to see whether the sin of complacency has gotten hold of us.

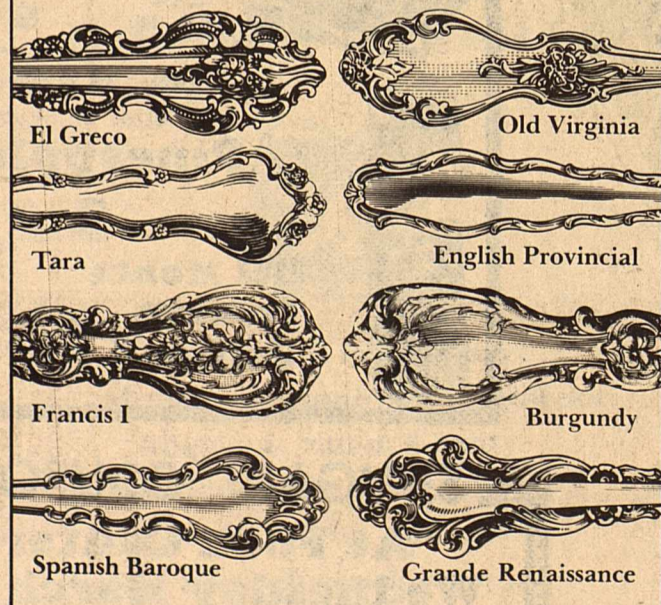

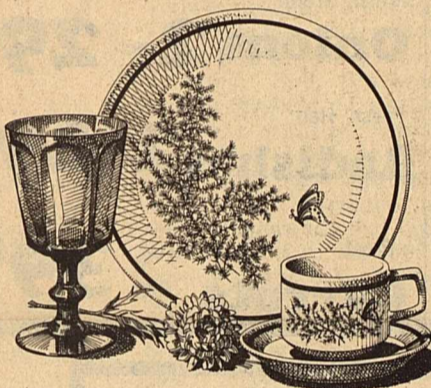

## TSGRA Supports National Wool Act

The U. S. House of Representatives is currently considering extension of the Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973, and Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association President Bill Pfluger recently addressed the House Agriculture Committee in favor of renewal of the National Wool Act.

Pfluger asked that the Wool Act be extended, not as it is at present, but as it was in 1965, when "Congress wisely amended it to include a formula which would allow the incentive price to fluctuate with the costs of production."

## Livestock Producers Fight Pest

Livestock producers throughout Texas are intensifying their efforts to overcome a troublesome livestock pest, the costly screwworm.

More than 1,600 livestock and other agribusiness leaders took part February 24 in the Governor's Conference on "Mission '77: Stamp Out Screwworms," says Clint Langford, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Heading the "Stamp Out Screwworm" effort in Sutton County is Fred Campbell, Chairman and Manager of the Sonora Wool & Mohair Co. He has been active in supporting the screwworm program by encouraging all livestock producers to follow screwworm control practices for years through his daily contacts.

Serving with the chairman on the Sutton County "Stamp Out Screwworm" committee are Albert Ward Vice-Chairman, Norm Rousselot, Vestel Askew, James Hunt, Armer Earwood, Bob Brockman and Stanley Mayfield, of the county. Each committee member has worked previously to benefit the county's livestock and agricultural industries. Committee members will be contacting other ranchers in Sutton County to ask their help in making Texas a Screwworm free state in 1977.

Chairman Campbell says the committee will develop plans for mass media and educational activities in the county in support of the Mission '77 statewide program. Members will also arrange for additional supplies of the screwworm sample mailing kits, which will be available at the following locations in the county: Sonora Wool & Mohair Co., H & H Feed & Trucking, B & G Feed Co. and the County Extension Agents Office.

the eyes of Texas sheep producers who currently face declining numbers, a problem which has already begun to be felt in the loss of sheep-oriented services. Pfluger contended that the present incentive level "has not been a factor in stopping the decline in sheep numbers."

Wool incentive payments were begun during the Eisenhower administration as an alternative to raising wool and wool product import tariffs. At that time, the incentive level was 110 per cent of parity; today's level is roughly 53 per cent.

The problem began in 1971, when former President Nixon froze the wool incentive price at 72 cents. Wages and other prices were feeling the chill at the time, too, but most of them recovered, while the wool incentive price remained frozen.

When the Wool Act came up for extension in 1973, the incentive price freeze stayed, and today's level is still where it was six years ago. The price of gasoline is not, nor is the price of almost anything else required in raising sheep.

As a result, Pfluger told the Agriculture Committee, "foreign wool and lamb are filling the void left by Americans who have quit the sheep business." Forced reliance on foreign wools in the face of increased domestic wool consumption, Pfluger contended, will increase our balance of payments deficit.

In his closing comments, Pfluger pointed out that commodities such as cotton, feed grains and wheat have been allowed to use a pricing plan based on production costs, adding, "We feel the sheep and goat industry is just as important and deserves equal treatment."

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## Fred Campbell's Wool and Mohair Report

Prices of wool in overseas auctions have tended to firm up a bit. The slide which began in mid-January seems to have levelled off after dropping a total of 3-5 percent on the finer wools from season highs. The courser wools have dropped some 10 percent on the same basis. Firming trends are evident both in auctions and in the Sydney grease wool futures market.

At the Belle Fourche, South Dakota sale on Thursday last week 700,000 pounds sold out of an offering of 1,000,000 pounds. Prices were about the same as 12 months ago. High price of the sale was on 12 months fine wool at \$1.866 on a clean basis delivered. This would amount to about 90 cents in the grease to the warehouse.

Sanderson has a sale scheduled for Tuesday, March 15. Results of this sale will be reported next week. The mohair sale in Uvalde last Friday was weaker as was expected. It was generally thought that the bidding was in the 2.75 to 2.90 range for adult. Two lots of young goat mohair sold for 3.307 and 3.637. One lot of choice spring kids sold for 4.426. At the time of this report about 40,000 pounds had sold out of the 156,000 pounds offered.

The second sale of the South African season will be held on Tuesday, March 15.

will be more concerned with consumer, international, producer and environmental problems than the previous administration. "One appointment which clearly has a producer orientation is John

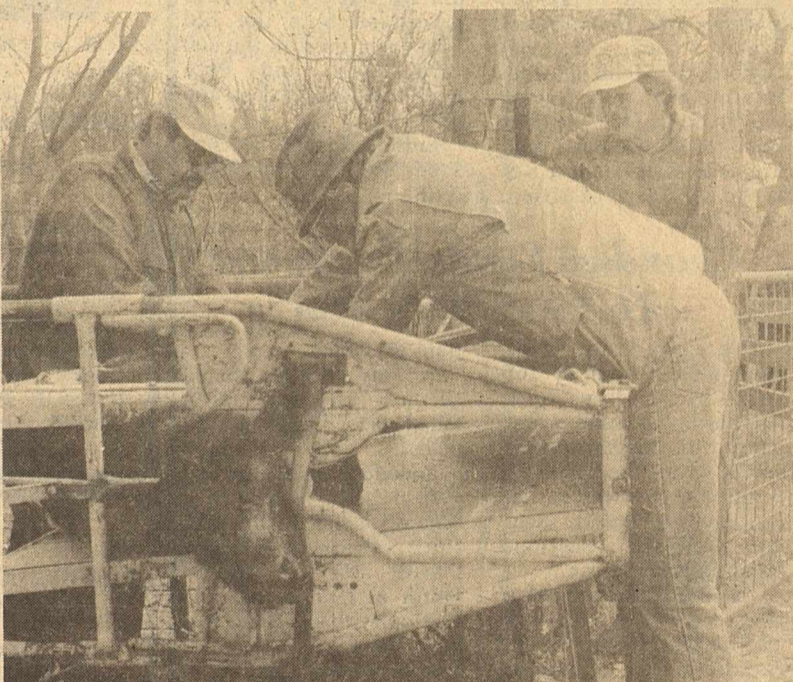
C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, who is designated to be second man in USDA.
