### **City Sales Tax Up 18.5**

Comptroller Bob Bullock announced March 15 that city sales tax rebates for the first quarter of 1977 totaled a record \$89.5 million, up 18.5 percent from the same threemonth period last year.

Bullock said that the record rebates--which exceeded the previous quarterly high by more than \$5 million (second quarter, 1976)--were based on record sales during the 1976 Christmas season.

'We knew that Christmas sales were going to be up, but, frankly, this was more than we dared hope for,'' said Bullock. "This is a late but welcome Christmas gift for city treasuries across the state.

Bullock said his office has sent 867 Texas cities checks totaling \$59 million as their March share of city sales tax collections. This is an 11.7 percent increase over the same month last year. Net payment to the City of Sonora was \$25,453.51.

An average price of \$778.15 per head was paid for 38 certified Rambouillet rams at last week's 29th Annual Rambouillet Ram Performance Test Sale at Sonora's Texas A&M Research Station.

More than 300 people attended the Field Day program and sale, which saw the 38 rams sell for a total of \$29,570. The Sonora ram sale has been the top sale for registered Rambouillet rams in the

The top selling ram went to the Sonora Research Station at \$2,100 for a Pat Rose III ram in the fall group. Sid and Monty Harkins of Sanderson paid the second highest price of \$2,050 for the high scoring

ram in the spring group. Other top dollar ram buys went to James Hunt for a Toots Hutto ram at \$1,975; Pat Rose III for a Joe Freeman ram at \$1,925; Bill Karnes for a Joe Freeman ram at \$1,900; James Hunt for a Clinton Hodges ram at \$1,425 and Mayer and Rousselot for a Leo and Rod Richardson ram at \$1,325.

## **Highest Priced Rams Post Impressive Scores**

by Wes Burnett The statistics on the top selling rams at this year's Rambouillet Ram Performance Test Sale are

impressive to say the least.

The highest priced ram, pur-chased by the Sonora Research Station for \$2,100, had an index The Pat Rose III fall ram showed a daily gain of .950, a staple length of 4.69, spinning count in the 60's,

value of 122.1, with an index ratio of 125.0. grease fleece weight of 23.65, shrinkage of 42.7, clean fleece weight of 13.54, face cover score of 1.0 and skin fold of 1.2.

The other high selling fall ram was bought by James Hunt for \$1,975. The Toots Hutto ram indexed at 108.2 with a daily gain of .793, staple length of 4.65, spinning count, 64's, greese fleece weight of 23.9, shrinkage of 43.8, clean fleece weight of 13.44, face cover 1.5 and skin folds score 1.8. In the spring group a Leo and Rod Richardson ram sold for \$2,050 to Sid and Monty Harkins. This ram had the highest shearing weight of any ram ever tested in the 28 year-old ram performance test.

The ram indexed at 124.5, showed a daily gain of .679, an outstanding staple length of 6.49, spinning count 70's, greese fleece weight of 30.55, shrinkage of 43.6, clean fleece weight of 17.24, face cover 2.0 and skin fold 1.3.


Pat Rose III bought a Joe Freeman ram for \$1,925 which indexed at 111.9, with a weight gain of .929, staple length of 4.56, spinning count 62's, grease fleece weight of 21.85, shrinkage of 46.0, clean fleece weight of 11.80, face cover 1.5 and skin fold 1.2.

Another Joe Freeman ram sold for \$1,900 to Bill Karnes. The spring ram indexed at 109.7, posted a daily weight gain of .800, staple length of 4.95, spinning count 70's, grease fleece weight 20.31, shrinkage 38.1, clean fleece weight 12.57, face cover 1.2, skin folds 1.2.

With such fine rams selected this year and such consistency in high value scores, there is much anticipation for the third annual ram test sale next year. Who knows, we might even see a \$3,000 ram, wouldn't that be something?

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

other than checking for and reporting infestations, ranchers are being asked to do less than usual. That's a switch, huh? Actually, the less than usual applies to minor livestock surgery such as dehorning and castration. Any wounds, generally, that could be avoided or at least restricted to cool weather.

During a special screwworm meeting in Austin last month, ranchers were told to "Leave the knife in your pocket and the dehorner in the barn'". It was ranchers and Texas Animal Health Commisiion member T.A. Kincaid who urged this currently commendable laxity on fellow stockmen. Kincaid added that the feedlot people could handle such chores just as easily, in addition to the ability to watch their charges more carefully for infestation.

The Austin meeting, with its various football-half-time-type pep talks, was the kick off point for a public relations drive to insure ranchers cooperation during this turning point year in the screwworm eradication drive.

### **Fred Campbell's Wool and Mohair Report**


Prices continued to firm slightly in overseas wool auctions last week. Some of the increased demand is thought to be due to additional buying to cover needs during the Easter recess

In the U.S. very little activity is noted. Light trading is occurring at steady prices for the various types. There is no push to buy wools and most firms are operating with conservative buying limits. We believe the wool being offered by the Australian Wool Corporation in

Charleston, S.C. continues to depress our market and prevent its improvement. The mohair market is also very

quiet at the moment. The South Africans have postponed their third sale for one week hoping to generate renewed demand.

Selling in Texas has stopped as buyers and sellers are thinking different prices. The last reported sales of mohair in Texas have been in the range of 2.65-2.75 for adult, 3.30-3.60 for young goat and 4.25 to 4.35 for spring kid.

Sutton County producers are reminded that certain pesticides will be restricted and available for use legally only by or under the supervision of certified applicators. The classification of certain pesticides as restricted-use pesticides and the requirement for certification are each requirements of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodentcide Act (FIFRA), as amended, which is scheduled to be fully implemented on October 21, 1977. The law, administered by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), was to have been

The Texas Pesticide Control Act although not requiring certification of private applicators, authorizes the Commissioner of Agriculture to establish a program to certify private applicators, on a voluntary basis, who wish to use or supervise the use of restricted-use pesticides in compliance with federal law.

The term "private applicator" means a certified applicator who uses or supervises the use of any pesticide which is classified for restricted use for purposes of



The full implementation of the amended Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act is scheduled for October 1977. On this date, barring any changes in the law, producers of agricultural commodities must be certified applicators as a requisite to the use of restricted-use pesticides.
