

# **Cade Selected Texas Tech Red Raider '77-'78**

The 1977-78 Red Raider for Texas Tech University will be Larry D. Cade of Sonora.

Cade is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clay Cade of Sonora. Fort Stockton native, he holds an associate degree from South Plains Junior College in Levelland.

The announcement was made last week by Dr. A. Max Lennon, chairman of the Red Raider Commit-

Cade is a calf roper and bull rider, high school honor student, champion horseman, former ranch hand, basketball player and now a senior majoring in geology at Texas Tech. He succeeds Jess Wall of Perryton.

He was chosen from 16 applicants to be the masked rider, with scarlet and black cape, who circles the stadium astride a black quarterhorse at football games and represents the university as its mascot throughout the

"I have a service to offer this university, my horsemanship ability,

Cade said, "and I want to give it freely for the spirit of this campus.' Cade has trained his

own roping and show horses and has shown them in competition for 10 vears. He won the Sonora Horse Show champion horsemanship award in 1966 and reserve champion award in 1967.

For four years he was member of the American Junior Rodeo Association (AJRA) and for three years a national finalist in the roping events.

He was among the top five ribbon roping for the world championships in the 1973 AJRA finals and among the top 15 in calf roping that year. He also was among the top 15 in ribbon roping for the world championships in

the 1971 AJRA finals. Cade was team mascot for the South Plains Junior College in 1975. In that college's rodeo team he was a bull rider.

"I have been an active rodeo contestant since the age of five," he said. That was when I entered my first rodeo." He worked as a ranch

hand for five years, and he has a safety record of having pulled a horse trailer for more than 30,000 miles without an

accident. Cade was graduated from Sonora High School with honors, and he was named to Who's Who among high school students in 1973. He was president of his freshman class, vice president of his senior class, a member of the National Honor Society and for three years a letterman on the varsity basketball squad.

This year he is an applicant for membership to Sigma Gamma Epsilon, national honor society for geologists.

Football fans have been cheering the sensational entrance into the stadium of the Red Raider followed by the Raider football team since 1954. On Jan. 1 of that year the Red Raider tradition began at Texas Tech's first Gator Bowl game.

The Red Raider rides a registered coal-black quarterhorse, Happy V, and he is in full charge of that mascot.

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#### Don't Mess with 'Seeing Eye' Dog

Editor's note: This story was brought to our by Jan attention by Jan VanderStucken, who just returned home with her second seeing eye dog, "Cindy". Our thanks to Jan for passing this story along to our readers.

Don't obey that impulse -- if it urges you to pet or interfer with a Seeing Eye dog. This is the plea of the Morristown, New Jersey school where the famous dog guides and their blind masters are taught.

Attempting to help a Seeing Eye graduate across the street or around obstacles is distracting to dog and man, according to the school, which con-siders that the greatest safety hazard encountered by its graduates is the interference of the kindlyintentioned public.

"The Seeing Eye dog is a safe and capable guide when properly handled," says Elliott Averett, presi-dent of the school. "While most people realize this, they sometimes, in a mistaken effort to be helpful, can create a dangerous situation.

Grabbing the arm of a blind man, taking hold of the dog's harness or

#### shouting words of warning, all have much the same effect as might occur if a passenger in a fast-moving car grabbed the steering wheel or yanked the arm of the driver.

"Petting a Seeing Eye dog is equally distract-Averett adds. ing, "Nothing could be more natural than the desire to pat these loyal and steadfast guides," he says, "but they cannot be expected to keep their attention on speeding traffic, if at the same time they are receiving the affectionate pats of passersby.

A deep, mutual under-standing between dog and master is essential at all times to safe and efficient branches. work," Averett states. "If at any time they

appear to be in doubt as to their whereabouts, a sighted person may simply inquire, 'May I be of service?' If the blind person desires help, he can then ask for it." Each dog learns its job through an intensive three months course at the school in Morristown, after which a qualified blind person spends a month at

the school, working with his new guide, learning to interpret the signals received through the dog's U-shaped harness and to direct the dog by means of spoken commands.

It is the dog's responsibility to take master where he wishes to go in spite of traffic, pedestrians, curbstones, manholes and other obstacles.

A national philanthropy, The Seeing Eye was founded in 1929. Its work is supported largely through endowment in-come and bequests. Located 30 miles west of New York, it has provided 6400 dogs in 45 years, is the oldest and largest organization of its kind in North America and has no

## **Predators Breed on Public Land**

So says Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' executive secretary Bill Sims. He added that there was a ray of hope for correcting the problem on lands administered by the State of Texas. A House Resolution introduced by Rep. Dan Kubial of Rockdale, requests that the "(Texas) Parks and Wildlife

Department initiate immediately a comprehensive program for predatory animal control on state lands to deal effectively and expediently with the predation problem."

Sims points out that public lands such as parks and wildlife preserves are beyond the scope of current control programs and provide a stronghold from which predators can reinfest productive areas. "It's depressing at best to work yourself half to death trying to keep the numbers down, while they're being manufactured wholesale just over the hill."

He added that controlling the free breeding zones to lower predator births would decrease the need for trapping later, a point that should please opponents of control measures.

Though the resolution would carry no force of law, Sims expects it to bring the problem to the attention of Parks and Wildlife officials.

Efforts are still underway in the Texas legislature to lighten the ad valorem tax burden on agricultural producers by tying land tax valuations to productive value, rather than speculative market values. House Bill 1434, introduced by Rep. Tom Massesy, San Angelo, would decrease the need for ad valorem taxes in the school finance program, thus further relieving pressure on agriculture.

#### Six Screwworm Cases **Reported** in Texas

Texas entered the fourth month of 1977 with only six confirmed screwworm cases recorded in the first quarter of the year, reports Dr.

M.E. (Cotton) Meadows, Jr. The director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication program says this ranks the first quarter of 1977 second only to 1970 in the 16-year history of the program. That year's first case was collected in April.

Meadows observes that one of this year's six recorded cases was actually collected in 1976 but arrived at the laboratory in January. It therefore was tallied on 1977 records.

One of the five maggot samples collected and identified in March came from a calf navel in Bee County, another from a damaged horn on a bull in Uvalde County, three from sheep in Hidalgo County. Intensive search in the area of these cases has turned up three other suspected and treated cases (but no samples collected and mailed) in Bee County, and none in the other areas.

The opinion of Screwworm Eradication Program scientists is that some screwworms survived the winter in South Texas. The "Mission 77: Stamp Out Screwworms'' campaign is on course, says Meadows. "Now, if all involved with Texas livestock keep their guard up, observe animals at least twice weekly, treat all cases, and submit samples of maggots from wounds religiously, we can hope to eliminate screwworms in Texas the last time. The screwworm fighter emphasizes that sterile flies from the Mission plant are now augmented by production of the Mexico-U.S. plant in southern Mexico. Flies produced in Mexico are being used to reduce wild screwworm fly populations south of the Texas border. A meeting has been called by the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation (SWAHRF) for April 28 at the Vista Assembly Hall in San Antonio. SWAHRF president T.A. Kincaid says the meeting will focus on ways Texas livestock producers can continue working together to eradicate the parasite from Texas ranges.

# **Ranchers Attend Training Sessions**

Dr. J.W. Stewart conducted two private applicator pesticide training programs for 141 people at the Sutton County 4-H Center last week.

Dr. Stewart, Area Extension Entomologist from Uvalde, conducted the special training meetings with assistance from Andy Field, Inspector for the Texas Department of Agriculture from San Angelo.

Private applicator certifications were submitted to the State Department of Agriculture for the 141 participants.

If implemented, the Carter Administration's 1977 farm bill proposals could have a long-term impact on costs and feeding practices of livestock producers, contends an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension

service. "The proposals would keep the wheat price support at the current \$2.25 per bushel level and raise the corn price support to \$2," points out Dr. Ron Knutson. "Sorghum supports have not yet been announced. The proposals would also create a 300-million-bushel wheat reserve to be held by farmers under a three-year contract.

The low target and support price for wheat, relative to corn, would tend to encourage wheat feeding, believes Knutson. Wheat may be fed either in the form of grass or as a part of a grain ration.

In fact, the intent of the proposal was to encourage feeding when wheat surpluses developed. However, in the long term, the

suffers.

One of the major stumbling blocks to be faced in expanding sheep and goat production in Texas is the problem of attitude. 
## **Carter's Farm Bill Has** Long Range Impact

proposals will tend to encourage expanded corn and sorghum production relative to wheat. "In the short run, the acquisition of the 300-million-bushel wheat

reserve will tend to keep wheat prices from falling. However, once acquired, reserves tend to have a price depressing and stabilizing effect," explains the economist.

"Producers may be separated into two groups regarding the effects of the new proposals. Producers feeding livestock can expect to feed a larger amount of wheat while those raising calves and lambs may have increased options for grazing wheat where target prices are considered to be below the cost of production.

Increased feed price stability can be anticipated for livestock producers if the proposals are implemented. However, the 300million-bushel reserve is not large enough to withstand the price enhancing impact of a major production shortfall," contends Knutson.



speakers at the state planning meeting for the Texas "Blueprint for Expansion" took a few steps in that direction last week at San Angelo.

Producers who came resigned to suffer through a pep rally were pleasantly surprised. No one waved pom-poms or led rousing cheers; they talked sheep and goats instead, and approached the subject enthusiastically, though realistic-

ally. Dwight Holaway, national Blueprint coordinator, named Texas the expansion leader by necessity. With 20 percent of U.S. sheep numbers, he said, Texas must be the state to supply replacement animals for the rest of the nation.

As for flooding the market, Holaway assured producers that demand would exceed supply even "if we kept every ewe lamb born in the next 10 years." Present low numbers were actually depressing demand, he contended. Plans by one national restaurant chain to feature shish kabob and by a major processor to introduce lamb TV dinners were scrapped because of

poor and unsteady supply. Tom Bauer, head buyer for Armour & Co.'s San Angelo lamb plant, even hinted that low numbers were actually depressing prices. Fixed overhead faced by killing plants means that per head processing costs rise as slaughter numbers decrease, he explained.

supply. In other words, killing capacity is more than double that needed to handle the supply. Producers who fear that sheep number increases will swamp the demand would do well to remember that our remaining slaughter plants could accommodate a 100 percent increase in lambs, and that, in Holaway's estimation, we could save and breed every ewe lamb born in the next decade without exceeding consumption levels present over three decades ago --1945.

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

In the case of saccharine, there are some very important reasons why its use should be continued. There are some 10 million diabetics in America which depend on saccharine's continued availability.

Others who are overweight and risk cardiovascular disease (the number one killer of Americans) also depend on the product.

Large numbers of dentists have also indicated their belief that the dental health of great numbers of Americans could be en-dangered if this sugar substitute were eliminated.


The legislation which I am offering to deal with this problem requires that the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare balance the various health factors involved in making any determination concerning the safety and desirability of a product.



In other words, the Secretary would need to consider not only the risks involved in the use of any given product, but also the

benefits. This is the manner in which the government needs to approach making the decisions which affect the lives of millions of Americans.

A common sense approach to finding solutions to our problems usually offers the best hope for the American people, and it is the approach I hope our government will see fit to take with regard to the proposed ban on saccharine.


