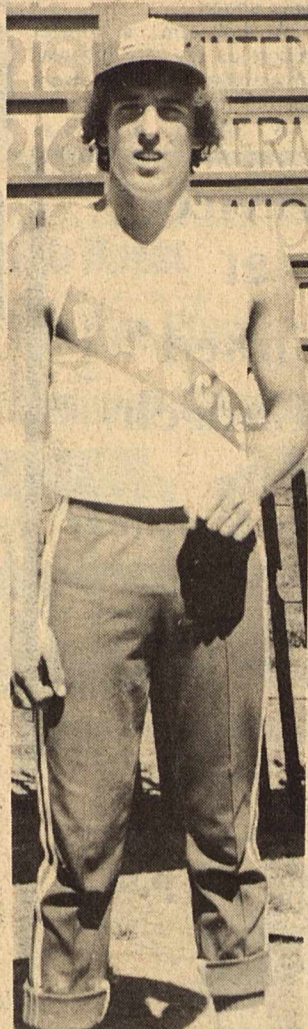

District Track Meet Here Saturday

A day of track is in store for fans, Saturday, when the district meet begins at 9 a.m. at Bronco stadium.

Preliminaries will begin the meet with the junior high school field events and high school running events from 9-11:30 a.m. Running events in the junior high prelims will be held from 12 noon until 3 p.m.

High school prelims in field events will also be held from 12-3:00 p.m.

Finals in all divisions will begin at 5 p.m. with the 440 relay teams making their bid first, followed by the 660, 880, and 440 races.

At 5:47 the junior high 70 yard hurdles will be run, followed by the 120 high hurdles by high school participants.

The 220 run is scheduled to begin at 6:05 followed by the 100, 80 yard hurdles, 330 and 440 races, and 880 relay. The 220 hurdles will be run at

7 p.m., followed by the 330 intermediate hurdles, the 100, 220, 1320, and the mile run.

The 1320 relay teams in the junior high division are set for 8:10 with the mile relay teams winding up the meet.

Presentation of team awards is scheduled for 8:40 p.m. There will be a meeting in the field house office following awards presentation for certification of regional qualifiers.

Well, Rain!

Ranch Roads Due Repair

Two Sutton County Ranch to Market roads will receive new asphalt seal coat surfaces under the 1977 Rehabilitation Program recently approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

This special program, aimed at repair of winter road damage, will cost \$60 million on a statewide basis. This use of scarce highway funds was necessitated by Texas' worst winter in many years.

Highway damage across the State has ranged from floods in south Texas, to freeze damage in the more northern areas.

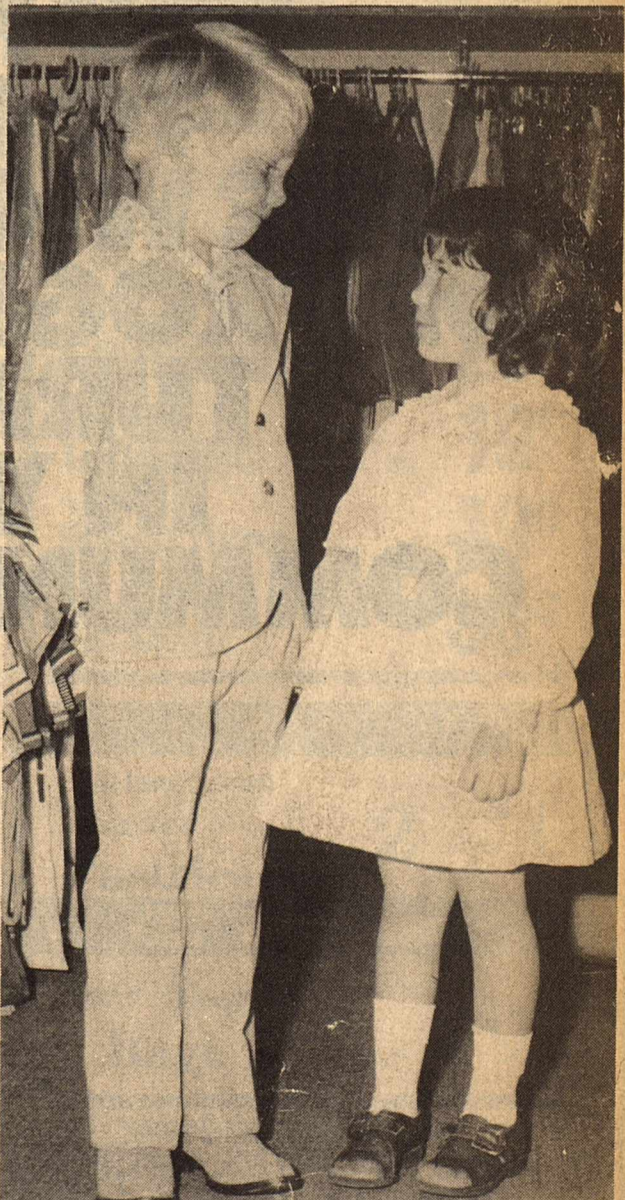
Contrary to what might be expected, Texas' winters may actually cause more damage than colder winters in northern states. This is caused by the rapid freeze-thaw cycle usually experienced in Texas. Moisture may penetrate the roadbed, freeze, thaw, and freeze again within a 24 hour period. Each of

these freeze-thaw cycles causes expansion and contraction, which, coupled with pounding traffic, can cause base material failure and extensive surface damage.

The 1977 Rehabilitation Program exceeds normal maintenance, but does not include any projects that require additional right-of-way.

The Sutton County projects are found on RM 1989 and RM 1691. The project on RM 1989 begins at its intersection with RM 1312, and continues southward 9.7 miles. The asphalt seal coat will be 20 feet wide, to match the existing pavement, and will cost an estimated \$44,100.

The project on RM 1691 will begin at its intersection with U.S. 290 (Business) south of Sonora, and proceed southward 12.7 miles. The seal coat will be 20 to 40 feet wide, to match the existing surface, and will cost an estimated \$60,100.

Sutton County Ranch News

Spray and Drench During Shearing Operations

by Wes Burnett

External and internal parasites are the target of sheep producers these days, and Sutton County ranchers are using the shearing pen to control the pests.

Shearing time appears to be an excellent opportunity for spraying and drenching, particularly since external parasites do the most damage during winter and spring.

There are several species of sucking and biting lice which attack sheep and goats...blue lice, red lice and yellow louse.

Sheep infested with lice rub, bite, and pull the infested areas,

which results in damaged wool or mohair.

Spraying out of shearing pens provides the most effective relief.

The internal parasites are primarily stomach worms, and a drenching gun is the most common method of treating these pests.

Worms affecting our sheep and goats are the Common Stomach Worm, Medium Stomach Worm, Hair or Bankrupt Worm, Thread-Necked Strongyle, Nodular Worm, Hookworm, Lungworms, Large Tapeworm and Fringed Tapeworm.

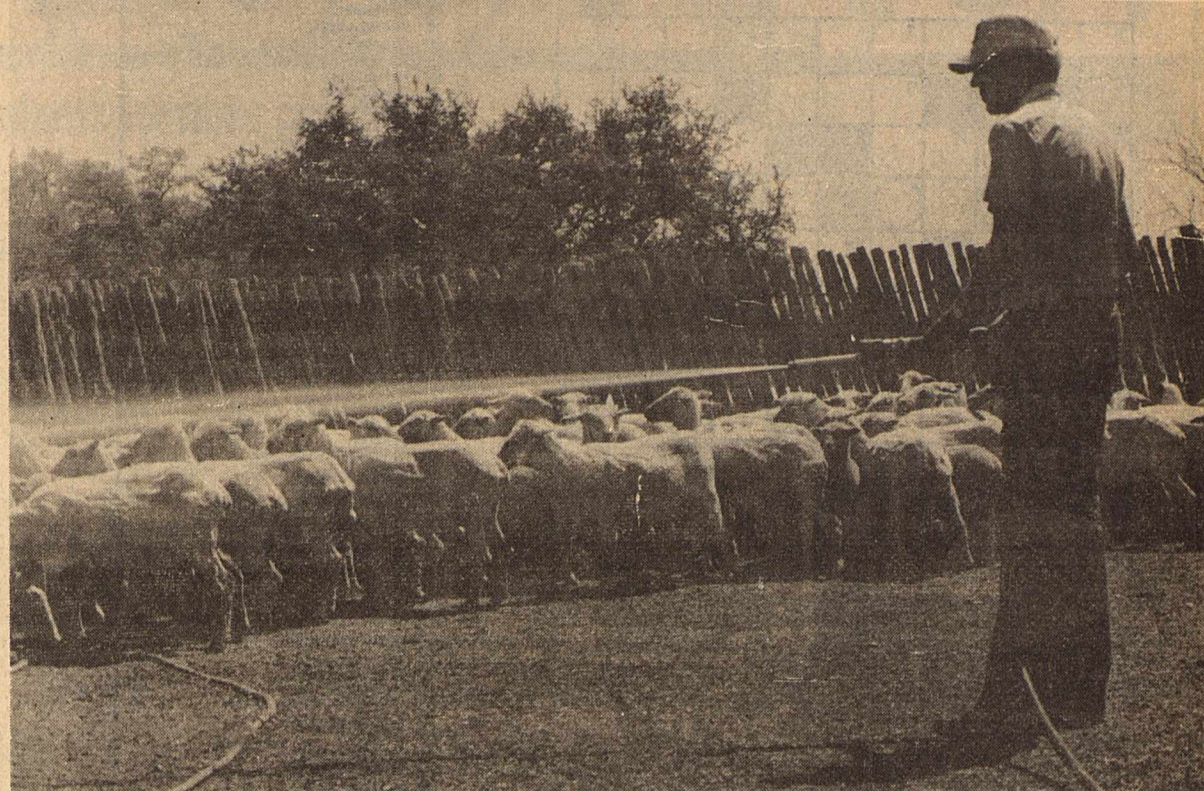
All of these parasites drain

valuable growth from the animal and spread through droppings and into grasses where the animals re-cycle through their systems.

The drenching gun technique appears to be the most effective method of dealing with the parasite and uses a variety of chemicals.

Ranchers use tramisol, thibenzole, loxon or phenothiazine applied in liquid form into the animal's mouth.

These control procedures take a little more time, but the successful producer understands the value of the investment.

Land Tax Law May Pass

The current session of the Texas Legislature shows tentative signs of dealing favorably with the state's agricultural producers.

A land tax law is in the works and a welcome measure of estate tax reform is also threading its way through the lawmaking machinery. On the other hand, the previous session dealt with versions of these issues, too -- unsuccessfully.

Those with a pessimistic leaning can add that at least a couple of

embryonic land use bills may be seen floating around in both houses, and that a measure proposing excessive farm labor union power has also been introduced. Optimists will dismiss the labor union threat by noting that it has been referred to the House committee on agriculture and livestock, where it may possibly wither away.

The land tax change would allow taxing valuations to be determined according to the productive capability of taxed land rather than speculative market value. This change would greatly benefit producers whose range and farmland is currently assessed on the same scale as that of vacation or subdivision acreage nearby, as well as producers far from developed areas. Land market values generally exceed production values everywhere.

The tax change hangs in limbo between the House and Senate, who have both passed relatively similar bills. The major difference is a corporate exclusion amendment okayed by the House and absent from the Senate version.

Intended originally to prevent the extremely rich from passing on dynasties, estate tax laws have been neglected so long now that even the extremely average are prevented from leaving much to their heirs. A long-overdue update recently voted through by the House would raise the basic exemption from the present \$25,000, in effect for over half a century, to \$200,000 per individual estate. Under Texas' community property law, this would mean a tax-free estate of \$400,000 for a Texas couple.

Both these reforms are under fire to varying degrees, and the final cards have not yet been played.

Beef Task Force Schedules County Research Meeting

A county-wide meeting about the proposed Beef Research and Information Act has been called for 7:00 p.m., April 25, 1977 in the Sutton County 4-H Center in Sonora by Jerry Don Balch, Chairman of the Sutton County Beef Development Task Force.

Details about the upcoming beef referendum will be explained, the chairman has announced.

The educational program, which is designed for all beef and dairy cattle owners of the county, will include two slide presentations about the Beef Research and Information Act -- one prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service -- and the second by the

Beef Development Task Force. There will be a period for questions and comments from producers.

Additionally, the BDT chairman, County Extension Agent Clint Langford, and Extension Area Economist, Glen Fisher, will provide more detailed information about the forthcoming beef referendum.

The Beef Research and Information Act serves as enabling legislation and authorized the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a referendum among beef producers to determine whether they want a beef development plan, developed by an industry-wide committee.

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Research Financing Plans Outlined

Financing plans for the proposed Beef Research and Information Program have been tentatively outlined, announces Clint Langford. The Act is Public Law 94-294, and is enabling legislation similar to that for wheat, potatoes, cotton and eggs.

"Funds would come from assessments on producers' receipts from sales of cattle," he explained.

The law sets a maximum check-off assessment rate of one-half of one percent (0.5 percent) of the live animal value, but for the first three years, the rate has been set at 3/10 of one percent. The funds would be collected according to a "value-added concept", which would assess all sellers in the marketing chain. The concept is similar to that of "pencil shrink".

However, emphasized the Extension agent, sales of breeding cattle may be exempt until the animals are sold for slaughter.

The initial purchaser in the marketing chain would deduct the amount of assessment from his payment to the original owner.

Wool and Mohair Report

Overseas markets continue to quote steady prices. In Australia the auctions were closed last week for the Easter recess and due to re-open about April 20.

Reports continue to mention cheaper wools being offered from South America. The South African wools are reported to be a little cheaper.

In the U.S. the major market development outside of Texas was

at the Belle Fourche, South Dakota sale on April 6. Prices showed some evidence of firmness. Sales in Texas the past few weeks have been sluggish with grease prices ranging from the mid 80's to the mid 90's. Based on clean values, these prices are hardly as high as 12 months ago. During this same period, prices of foreign wool has advanced 5-10 percent.

Mohair prices declined slightly in South Africa last Tuesday at their sale. Adult mohair was down about 5 percent, young goat and kids were down 2 1/2 percent. Current prices in Texas are about \$2.40 for adult, \$3.15-\$3.25 for young goat mohair, and \$4.10-\$4.15 for kids. The majority of the fine hair is now sold but there remains quite a bit of unsold adult in Texas warehouses.

Research Goals Cited

What are the goals and purposes of the proposed beef research and information program?

If eligible livestock producers vote in favor of the beef checkoff program this spring, it is designed to allow the establishment of projects for advertising, promotion, education, producer and consumer information with respect to use of cattle, beef and beef products, says Clint Langford, County Extension Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Similarly, the program would allow for the establishment and conducting of research, market development projects and studies with respect to production, growing, sale, processing and distribution, marketing or utilization of cattle, beef and beef products, the Extension agent adds.

The program also would include development and expansion of foreign markets.

The checkoff is designed as a self-help program, where the producer would be contributing

3/10 of one percent of the sales of his cattle. For example, for a producer to contribute \$100 to the program, sales from his cattle would need to be \$33,333 annually.

The Red Sox will meet the Eldorado team again Sunday.

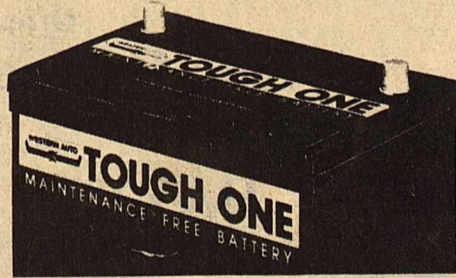

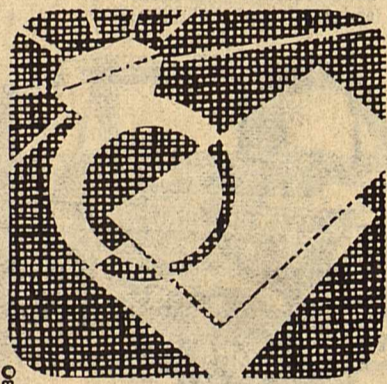

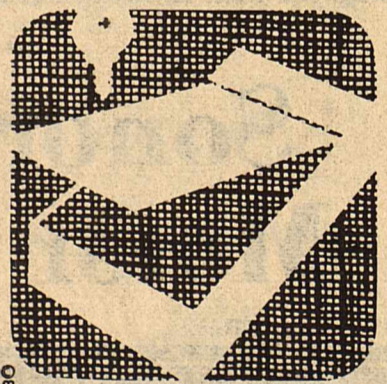
