

SCS Conducts Watershed Survey

At President Carter's request, USDA's Soil Conservation Service is conducting a review of all small watershed projects in Texas under construction or approved for

Projects under review include those administered by the Soil Conservation Service with watershed areas of no more than 250,000

The multi-purpose projects call for land treatment to reduce soil erosion and siltation. They generally include such flood prevention structures as earthen dams and

Some projects also provide local people with domestic and industrial water supply, irrigation water, recreation, and fish and wildlife

Sutton County's Dry Devil's River Lowery Draw watershed project will not be affected, however, future projects in Texas of

similar benefit to other communities may be discontinued under the President's economy moves.

Campbell Urges Worm Protection

Fred Campbell, chairman of the Sutton County Screwworm Committee, urges all livestock producers to be alert to the screwworm threat and to use all possible measures to prevent reinfestation of local herds. To date, no cases have been indentified in Sutton County in

Producers are reminded to inspect their animals at least twice a week, since screwworm larvae reach maturity in less than seven days. Treat every wound found with an EPA-labeled effective insecticide. Spray animals when screwworms are known to be in the community, and following livestock surgery or shearing of goats and

sheep.
''Collect larvae or egg masses found in or near wounds, and send the samples to the Mission Laboratory for identification. Mailing kits for worm samples are available at several county locations, including the Sonora Wool & Mohair Co., local feed stores and

ASCS Reminds Ranchers to **File Payments**

Payments have been made on all timely filed applications for sales of shorn wool and unshorn lambs made during the 1976 marketing year. Crockett and Sutton wool producers had 1976 sales of shorn wool and unshorn lambs that earned them approximately \$169,778 under the program.

Please file your applications for the 1977 program as soon as sales are made. We wish to remind producers to be sure and report all unshorn lamb purchases.

Remember the reporting of your unshorn lamb purchases is not tied to a marketing-calendar-year; a producer must report the disposition of any unshorn lamb purchases in the current year AND any purchases made in the previous year, that have not been reported the County Extension Agents office," says Campbell.

Producers should avoid animal surgery during seasons of high screwworm activity. All branding, dehorning, castrating, and shearing should be completed before the screwworm season opens. Also, avoid unnecessary animal injuries by keeping corrals and gates free of protruding nails and sharp wire.

Oil Exec Attests To Natural Gas Shortage well for 200 years, and we must preserve it," he

"Gentlemen, let me assure you there is a natural gas shortage in this country," Henry J. Haas, executive vice president of HNG Petrochemicals, Inc., told the Sonora Downtown Lions Club yesterday.

Warning of a possible collapse of our free enterprise system, the veteran petroleum engineer told the Lions that legislators in Washington are leaning more and more to nationalizing of the oil industry.

'Many legislators have returned to Washington who have been hostile to the free enterprise syshe commented, "who are generally antagonistic toward any big business concept.....and who are outspoken advocates of breaking up our large energy companies."

"Just one year ago, 45 out of 100 U.S. Senators voted for some form of divestiture," Haas added. Haas pointed out that the people calling divestiture are accusing the oil companies of causing inflation and higher prices, although the facts do not show this to be true. Oil prices attributed only 9.5 per cent of the overall inflation since the oil embargo. Food price increases contributed 23 per cent and housing was 36.5 per cent.

Proclaiming that our energy companies are very competitive and far from monopolistic, Haas pointed out that there are more than 10,000 companies in the U.S. involved in production of petroleum.

"The point is, he continued, "The oil industry has shaped itself to efficently and competitively serve the energy consuming public."

The profit margin of energy companies has been in the middle range of all American businesses, he said, and added that oil companies are now investing more money in developement than they

are making in profit.

"There is only one way
to develope more energy,"
Haas emphasized, "and that's through better profits...it takes money and lots of it to develop these new fields."

Without profit incentives, new energy sources will not be developed. "I believe that the answer is private enterprise," he continued, 'motivated by profit, and

operating in a competitive

atmosphere. It's a good system; it has served us
