# **Texas Sees Growth**

metropolitan 'Major areas continue to attract the majority of new plants and factory expansions in Texas," points out Dr. Richard Floyd, economist in business development with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Recent reports show that only 17 per cent of 448 new and expanding plants located outside the state's major metropolitan areas in 1976. In contrast, 33 per cent of 700 new and expanding plants located outside the major metropolitan areas in 1973.

"Rural areas appear to be less competitive industrial developers," believes Floyd. "Rural business and community leaders need to reexamine industrial development efforts in light of their lessened competitive position."



# Sheep and Goat Raisers To Reward Members

The greatest recognition received by most of the people involved in the sheep and goat industry comes when an unexpectedly high-priced sale allows them to pay off their current pickup before the engine falls out. Not even the livestock seem to appreciate the man who carries them through a cold, hungry winter on a warm feed sack.

It could be this general lack of recognition that has prompted the industry to reward the achievements of some of its own members, as well as those who play supporting roles. At any rate, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association has for years acknowledged those whose efforts have aided wool and mohair producers.

Particular attention is given to youths, expecially those whose club work has demonstrated their interest in sheep or goats.

Youth awards include those for top 4-H wool and mohair judging, state level; top FFA performance related to sheep or goats, state level; superior achievement in 4-H clothing design and construction using wool or mohair, and exceptional sheep and wool, Angora goat and mohair projects, county

level. The state-level FFA award includes \$75 to help finance a trip to the national FFA convention. State-level 4-H winners receive a \$100 savings bond.

A special youth award is the Bryan Hunt Memorial Scholarship, established in 1975 by the family of the late Bryan Hunt, Sonora. It is intended to provide assistance to sheep and goat areas of Texas who would not be able to attend college without financial aid.

At least 50 per cent of the cattle owners who register must vote--and 3/3 must vote affirmatively--in order for the referendum to be valid. Those eligible include 4-H youths, FFA members, men and women who own livestock.

"There is no age limit or minimum requirement of numbers of cattle owned in order to qualify to vote. Any questions about bonafide ownership can be resolved by tax records, sales slips, registration papers or any other valid papers showing ownership of livestock," adds the county agent.

A partnership, cooperative, corporation or similar business is considered as only a single entity for the purpose of voting in the referendum. Where a husband and wife own cattle jointly, this will be considered a single entity and only one may vote. If each owns cattle separately and has documented proof of ownership, this is considered as two entities and each

In the event that a person owns cattle in a county other than where he lives, or if he cannot make it to the polls during the registration or voting period, it will be possible to write or telephone the county ASCS office for an absentee ballot, explains Langford.

If approved, the Beef Research and Information Program will allow establishment of projects for advertising, promotion, education, producer information and consumer information with respect to the use of cattle, beef and beef products.

### Kuykendall Reports Screwworm

James Kuykendall collected San Saba County's first known 1977 screwworm sample May 20 from the navel of a calf ten miles west of Cherokee.

This is the 20th known 1977 Texas screwworm case, according to Dr. M.E. (Cotton) Meadows, Jr., director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program. By May 24 of 1976 the state's screwworm case count totalled 1755.

The San Saba County case is 100 miles northwest of the two cases which were collected on a Guadalupe County ranch near Staples May 12 and 14. A screwworm case was treated in Kinney County May 9; two in Terrell County May 13 and 14.

# **Sutton County Livestock Producers Scheduled To Register**

All eligible livestock producers in Sutton County are reminded that they will need to register June 6-17 if they are to vote in the forthcoming producer referendum on the Beef Research and Information program July 5-15, says County Extension Agent Clint Langford.

County offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) will conduct the registration and referendum. The law requires that beef

producers register at least two weeks before the referendum in order to vote. Producers eligible to register and

vote are those who owned cattle during the past 12 months, prior to the referendum, including 4-H and FFA members, men and women.

If the vote is favorable, a Beef Board will be appointed. This board is to consist of not more than 68 members, selected from the beef producer ranks by the Secretary of Agriculture as nominated by their producer organizations. Representation on the board would be proportional to cattle production in each state or geographic area.

# Warning: Protect Livestock

There are persistent reports around the county that livestock are being exposed daily to the dreaded

Even though most Sutton County anchers know how important it to keep their livestock from getting open wounds this spring and summer, there apparently are some who just don't understand the current battle.

It is a state-wide fight to permanently destroy the dangerous screworm. And the fight crosses state lines and into Mexico, with millions of federal and state dollars dedicated to eradicating this

menace to livestock producers.

With all the publicity, talk and continuing demand by producers, it is just amazing that any Sutton County rancher could ignore the obvious need to stop all activity which invites a home for the

I am a real rank beginner and novice in the ranching business, but one thing I do know is importance of protecting our vital resources from the screwworm.

As ignorant as I am about the ranching business, I do know one thing, if we don't destroy the nasty creatures this year, we may lose this battle for generations to come.

There are a number of reasons for this opportunity...the first is that we had a good solid cold winter, which slowed the development of the screwworm...and we have had an all-out production of sterile flies imported in the major areas of screwworm growth in Mexico and South Texas.

The full cooperation of Mexican officials and the total effort of state and federal agriculture officials are major factors in the possible success of the battle this year.

If we fail this year...we may never have all these ingredients together again...who knows when we will have another really cold winter? And who can guess at the whims of the federal beauracracy...

And so much rides on this fight...which could be lost by the

simple act of one rancher, cutting the tail off one sheep...which gets infected with screwworms and spreads the seeds of destruction all over the county.

Who could blame the federal overnment for ignoring our cries of help if we allow ourselves to 'keep doing business as usual", disregarding the seriousness of the

Yes, there will be sacrifices demanded of producers...you know you need to dehorn, or cut tails, or mark or castrate...all these are important to your business...but if the screwworm is to be eliminated, it must be deprived of any sanctuary...it must not be allowed to grow in the open wounds of our

And that is just where the screwworm lives...in the sores and wounds of your animals...sheep, goats and cattle. Before you cut your livestock for

any reason, stop just for a while and think about what it might mean in the long run. Sure, there will be situations

when you just have to do some work on your animals...take the time to pen the animal and watch it carefully until the sore is healed. This critical problem exists from

now until the first freeze...

Vaccinations **Urged For Horses** 

vaccinate their animals against equine encephalitis (horse sleeping sickness) which is often a serious problem as mosquito populations increase during warmer months.

Effective vaccines are available. However, these are effective for only one year, so revaccination is necessary each spring, points out Clint Langford, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Combined killed-virus vaccines are available for eastern and western equine encephalitis (EEE and WEE) and also for eastern, western and Venezuelan (VEE). EEE and WEE occur seasonally in many parts of the country. VEE has not

Research has shown that VEE has a complex natural history and many hosts, notes Langford. It isn't known which of these hosts may exist and harbor the virus in Mexico or the United States, or when the virus may reemerge to affect either country.

# Briscoe Calls for Deregulation

Dolph Briscoe recently testified before the U.S. House of Representatives Subcommittee on Energy , and Power of the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce.

His statements are important to Texas, Sutton County and the nation.

We will present the Governor's testimony in a special three part series beginning this week.

Mr. Chairman, I appreciate the opportunity to meet once again with this distinguished Committee of Congress.

The rapid rise in oil imports has endangered the independence of our foreign policy, distorted our balance of payments, and threatens the prosper-ity of our economy as a whole.

I agree with President Carter that in facing our energy crisis we face the moral equivalent of war.

I agree that the minimum targets for energy production are at least those set out in the proposed National Energy Plan.

I have attached those targets to this statement. But it should be pointed out that those minimum energy production requirements are one-third greater than the production achieved last year.

Those mimimum requirements must be met in face of the current overall decline in domestic energy production.

The pricing policy outlined in the National Energy Plan will not achieve its production target. It will provide, instead, for continued shortfalls of critical fuels which this country has the capability to produce.

I speak on this point as Governor of the State which has produced nearly one-third of all the energy this nation has ever produced, and which will bear heavy responsibility in the attempt to meet the high production targets called for in President Carter's proposal to Con-

As you know, natural gas reserves in the United States have been declining since 1967, Natural gas production has been declining since 1972 and the annual rate of decline is now running four to five percent a year.

The National Energy Plan calls for us to turn that falling curve upward and to achieve again by 1985 nearly the same level of natural gas production we now enjoy.

The pricing policy estab-lished for oil and gas in the National Energy Plan is simply not consistent with the amount of drilling required to achieve the production targets of the

In calculations we have made, we conclude that under the pricing policy of the National Energy Plan, the present rate of decline in gas production will slow somewhat but that the production level by 1985 will be short of the gas production target of the Plan by the equivalent of approximately two million barrels of oil per day.

The shortfall in oil production measured against oil production requirements of the Plan

will be even greater.
I do not believe in price regulation. History clearly proves that price regulation of any commodity has never worked for the long term benefit of the American consumer.

The natural gas shortages of this past winter in the interstate market dramatically illustrate the inevitable results of 23 years of federal regulation of the natural gas indus-

# **ERDA Funds Texas Survey**

The U.S. Energy Research and Development Administration will soon award a \$265,000 contract to the Bureau of Economic Geology at the University of Texas to conduct geologic studies in the Texas Panhandle.

ERDA said studies by the Texas Bureau of Economic Geology will determine whether there are areas in the Palo Duro and Dalhart salt basins that may have potential for development of deep geologic facilities where nuclear waste could be permanently stored.

If any areas proved to be promising, additional studies would be conducted to confirm suitabil-

The scientific studies to be performed by the Texas Bureau include such tasks as basin analysis, rock analysis, geohydrology, and identification of field confirmation study loca-

The contract will cover an initial period of five months ending September 30, 1977, and can be extended to cover studies for up to five years.

ERDA initiated the National Waste Terminal Storage Program in 1976. The program calls for deep

geologic disposal of solid nuclear waste generated from commercial nuclear power reactors which supply electricity.

Scientific studies are moving forward this year in other sections of the United States to determine the suitability of various geologic formations for potential development as repositories.

The studies are being conducted for ERDA by

the Office of Waste Isolation of the Union Carbide Corporation Nuclear Division, at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, Selection of the first two sites is expected in 1978 with the facilities operational in the

mid-1980's. Geologic project managers are expected to be named soon to conduct similar studies of salt domes, shales, and a wide variety of granite and
