City Tax Rebate Shows 38% Increase In Sales

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said July 15 that city sales tax rebates to date for 1977 are running a healthy 20.3 percent ahead of last year.

Bullock said his office mailed rebate checks Friday totaling \$23.6 million to 868 Texas cities for their July share of the one percent city sales tax.

Included in this amount was a net payment of \$14,833.68 to the City of Sonora. Total payments of tax rebates to the City for 1977 are \$82,208.38 with a

381/2 increase over last year at this time. The July checks boost to \$190.7 million the total that has been rebated to Texas cities for the first seven months of this year. This compares to \$158.6 million for the same period last year.

"These rebates are just another sign of the strength of the Texas economy," Bullock said.

He also noted that state sales tax collections in Texas are registering a bigger percentage increase than any other state.

Temperatures that have ranged in the high 90's for more than a month reached the century mark Saturday and the county reached 102 both Sunday and Monday.

Grass fires that come with the dry winds and extremely hot weather have once again become a nightmare to ranchers and fire fighters alike. The

said Tuesday that water consumption in the city is up 60.3% for May and June with electricity useage up 28.6% in those months. He expects another 20% increase in useage of water and electricity with the August billing coming up.

In an article in the current issue of the magazine Petroleum Today, J.J. Simpson, senior petroleum economist, Citibank, New York, says the oil is not being produced because the government-imposed ceiling price on domestic crude makes it unprofitable to use costly enhanced recovery met-

The techniques referred to by Simpson are those used to produce oil that cannot be extracted by conventional means. They include waterflooding of wells, steam and inert gas injections, and the use of

chemicals. In his article in the American Petroleum Institute publication entitled,

Barrels," Simpson points out the use of enhanced recovery would require a \$2 to \$25 increase in the cost of a barrel of oil, depending upon the technique used.

He also cites a Federal Administration Energy study estimating that the use of enhanced recovery to retrieve 30.5 billion barrels of oil would require an additional investment of \$150 billion or \$4.92 per barrel.

Simpson says that raising this capital would be difficult because price controls have made other ventures appear more profitable and less risky. "Freeing oil and gas prices would provide some

TS&GRA Sponsors Lamb Evaluation Clinic

Sheep Producers, Lamb show judges and lamb packers all had an opportunity to compare notes during the recent lamb evaluation

and judging clinic at San Angelo.

The two-day affair, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Assn., offered each group an opportunity to discover just what the other groups wanted in a lamb. It was apparent that not everyone was riding the same rail, though the tracks do appear to be

converging.
TS&GRA executive secretary Bill Sims says such clinics can help promote and hurry that convergence. Exposing differences between show ring selection and packer preferences, he explains, 'can sober an old boy up real

Sims adds that since lamb grading standards became accepted less than a decade ago, show selections have tended to promote

the low number end of the yield grade scale and have little if any external body fat, the textbook example of a "lean" animal. These specifications would theo-

retically please the housewife, who has traditionally called for economical meat and a minimum of wasted fat. Unfortunately, leanness can be carried too far, and Sims says show judges have now begun to set their sights on a more balanced carcass.

Texas A&M meat specialist Gary Smith, speaking at the lamb clinic, told participants that a certain amount of external fat is necessary to meet lamb carcass marketing

"A lamb slaughtered in the San Angelo area," he said, "won't be eaten in the San Angelo area -- it will be eaten somewhere like Philadelphia, Boston or New York." Meanwhile, it will spend as much as a week to 10 days enroute or in

Under such circumstances. extremely lean carcass will end up discolored and dry, due to loss of moisture. Smith explained that a covering of fat functions as a shield to prevent such moisture loss and discoloration.

Sims say the inclusion of such information in the lamb clinic program indicates that, "Hopefully, judges are leaning toward a lamb with a desirable yield grade, not necessarily a low grade number.'

The popularity of carcass shows has also helped smooth the way for a meeting of the minds on desirable lamb qualities, he adds. Such shows, he feels have helped bring judging trends out of the "too poor" rut by demonstrating graphically how undesirable an extremely lean carcass can become in a very short time. "These carcasses are exhibited for a while after judging, and it hasn't taken some of the lean ones too long to turn blue, so you can imagine what they would have looked like by the time they hit the East Coast.'

John Kennedy. The Harry Truman library was built several years ago. The Lyndon Johnson library was completed a few years ago and is now crammed with millions of Presidential papers and other odds and ends. There's some random talk of building one for Richard

Stop and think about this. If every President has to have a library when he leaves office, and if this nation endures for 1,000 years, do you realize how many libraries that's going to be? One hundred and twenty-five, if we have a retiring President every eight

Actually it'd be more than that, counting one-termers, future resignations, possible impeachments, etc., plus the libraries already built. Ought to come to over 150 at least. That is a passell of libraries, and they're going to get crowded, especially if one city winds up furnishing say 10 or 15 Presidents. It might take a Constitutional amendment saying no two Presidents can come from the same town

and still have a library.

Therefore I have an idea. Let's head off this library crisis before it gets out of hand. The thing to do is to build one huge pyramid in about the center of the country and put all past and future Presidents' papers and stuff in it, down to the last inaugural hat, pipe, bottled ship, First Lady's dresses and secret agreements with foreign countries.

Now nobody knows for sure how the Great Pyramids were built, but somebody in the military-industrial

complex, if given a costplus contract, ought to be able to get the hang of it. Egypt, where they are, would be a great place for junketing Congressmen to visit to study the things. They could come back by way of Paris.

If this country doesn't want to be over-run with Presidential libraries, we'd better get that U.S. pyramid started. It's more serious than you may think. There're plans afoot now to build libraries for ex-Congressmen. Will state Legislators and Justices of the Peace be Yours faithfully,

Latest Count **Shows 35** S' worms

The 1977 Texas screwworm case count reached 35 today with lab identification of four samples collected by Kinney County rancher M.M. Nelson of Brackettville, reports a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) official.

Dr. M.E. (Cotton) Meadows, Jr., director of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) Screwworm Eradication Program, says these are the first screwworms identified since July 6. On that day maggots Walker Epperson took from a Edwards County goat near Rocksprings were proved to be screwworms.

By July 20 of 1970, best previous year in history of the APHIS program, the Texas case count was 62.A year ago it was 5,554.

Nelson collected the current samples on his Rafter L Cattle Co. ranch 22 miles northeast of Brackettville. On July 15 he took maggots from the head of one sheep and the flank of another; the next day he found worms in the shoulder of a cow; and on July 17 the fourth sample came from an infested brand injury in a bovine.

Beef Referendum Fails in Voting

O.J. Barron, Jr., chairman of the national Beef Development Taskforce (BDT), issued a statement today conceding that the Beef Referendum fell short of the necessary two-thirds affirmative

A preliminary count from county ASCS offices indicates that over 100,000 producers, or about 55% of of those voting, supported the



DrillingPermitsIncreaseAgain

Applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests in Texas totaled 12,364 for the first six and a half months of 1977, up from 10,349 for the same period in 1976.

Year-to-date applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells totaled 14,484 against 12,270 a year ago, the Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division reported in its semimonthly drilling report.

The report showed 16 oil discoveries and 30 gas strikes were completed in Texas during the July 1-15, 1977 period.

Oil discoveries included six in Southeast Texas, two each in the San

Antonio and Panhandle areas, three in Deep South Texas, and one each in the Refugio, West Central Texas and Lubbock areas.

Gas discoveries included 10 in Deep South Texas, six in Southeast Texas, four each in the San Antonio and Refugio areas, two in the San Angelo area, and one each in the East Central, East Texas, Midland and Panhandle areas.

The Oil and Gas Division listed 7,112 oil, gas or service well completions for the year to date, up from 6,477 a year

Of the 4,401 oil completions so far in 1977, 344 were discovery wells. A year earlier there were 3,965 oil completions with 302 listed as oil discover-

Gas well completions this year total 2,335 of which 439 are discovery wells. For the same 1976 period. Texas had 2.245 gas well completions including 482 discoveries.

The report shows 913

drilling applications for the latest two-week period and logs 459 oil, gas and service well completions.

There were some 306 oil and 137 gas well completions since the last semimonthly drilling report. In the July 1-15 period, 141 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes.

gressmen Attack Fed Rules

Special hearings will be called to study Congressional charges that overzealous federal regulations have endangered construc-tion of a "crucial" offshore oil port in the Gulf of Texas, two congressmen announced

today. The hearings will be called by Congressman Jack Murphy, (D-N.Y.), Chairman of the House Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries, Texas Congressmen Bob Gammage and Bob Krueger announced in a joint statement.

Krueger and Gammage, after visits during the past week to the coastal area near which the port is scheduled to be built, urged Murphy to call the hearing before the Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee.

Their allegations that federal regulations governing operations of the port--Seadock, Inc.--are too stringent are expected to receive strong backing from Texas residents and corporations involved in plans for the superport.

"There is no port in the United States that can accommodate a supertanker, and Seadock, Inc. stands to create 150,000 jobs nationwide. It is unreasonable that

the Department of Transportation and the Department of Justice have initiated such stringent regulations that the very companies willing to invest this most crucial endeavor have had to withdraw," Gammage and

The two Texas congressmen said they have urged Murphy's specially called hearings to center on what they called "unreasonable and unjustifiable" regulations pertaining to restrictions set forth in the license for Seadock, issued by the Department of Transportation, as well as corporate liabilities demanded by the Justice Department in connection with antitrust law.

We fully understand the Justice Department's

general concern over joint corporate ventures of this size," Krueger and Gammage said, "but requiring corporate liability of the companies involved is an overzealous attempt to punish companies which, in this instance, are willing to invest major capital in a project that will do major good, not

Damoclean Sword

The nation's oilmen have long been aware of the energy crisis that has been hanging over the U.S. like a Damoclean

Sword. They not only have been warning the nation of the impending crisis for years, they also have been setting a good example by substantially reducing consumption of energy in

their own operations. For example, in refineries, which use about 70 per cent of the energy expended by the industry, better maintenance, operational efficiency, and more than \$1 billion in capital improvements have resulted in a 13 per cent decrease in energy consumption since 1972.

To cite some instances highlighted in the current issue of Petroleum Today: -- At Suntech's Applied Physics Laboratory in Newton Square, Pa., a 20-year-old building has been made more energyefficient through redesignair and lighting systems. Old metallic awnings have been replaced with solar panels which contribute to space and water heating and provide the lab a test-bed for solar energy experiments. Re-




