# County Buys Property For New Detention Center

Property across the street from the jail's present location has been obtained by the county for a new Law Enforcement and Detention

Center. The building will front Oak Street with offices for the Sheriff, Department of Public Safety, Game Warden, Justice of the Peace, and Driver's License Officer.

The building will extend back with an entrance from Mulberry Street for a parking area and detention facilities. The property is 100' wide x 200' deep.

Architect Jack McDermott stated that with the new property purchase he would have to begin anew with blueprints and present them to the Committee on Jail Standard in Austin before final

plans can be made. In February of 1977 members of the Committee on Jail Standards inspected our present jail facilities and found 113 violations. At that time the county was given three facilities or build new ones.

# GTE Sees **Big Jump**

The Sonora exchange of General Telephone Company of the Southwest had a 12.7 percent gain in total telephones and a 12.2 percent increase in main stations for 1977.

This growth surpassed the company's record growth, which was 8.4 percent in total telephones and 6.6 percent in main stations, according to Mike Sydiskis, San Angelo division manager.

'Sonora gained 376 new telephones of which 193 were main stations. Main stations can be equated to customers," Sydiskis

"At year end Sonora had a total of 3,327 telephones and 1,761 main


stations," Sydiskis added.

General Telephone Company of the Southwest recorded the best year ever in 1977 with a gain of 105,967 new telephones, which included 49,687 main stations.

He will accept duties here March 27 unless he is released from

Midland at an earlier date. Hopkins was coach for Sonora High School for ten years (1960-1970). He left here in 1970 after leading the Broncos to their third state championship. At that time he accepted the job of coach and athletic director at the Seguin

Schools and later went to Midland. While in Sonora Hopkins, along with his coaching staff, accomplished a phenomonal football record. On October 20, 1970 after defeating Menard in football play, the Bronco's win record was 100 games with only 23 losses and two

He lead the team to state finals three times, winning the championship two of those times. The Broncos went on to tie for the state championship in 1971 under the coaching of Bill Scoggins who replaced Hopkins and stayed one year before going to a coaching job at Baylor University in Waco.

Two Sonora coaches, Dennie Hays and Grosse Mohler, left here with Hopkins and are still on his staff in Midland.

Hopkins told Andrews Monday that at this time he was not free to comment on what coaching staff he would be bringing with him from Midland.

## Reflections

by Rev. Jim Miles Habits are interesting things. So often bad habits are easy to form, but difficult to break. Good habits, on the other hand, may tend to be more

difficult to form, but far

easier to break. Participation in any group activity is a case in point. If one belongs to an organization, he or she may be quite some time in establishing a good attendance or participation record, and even then, if for some reason or another circumstances prevent participation for a time, there seems to be a tendency to remain inactive. Reasons for non participation deteriorate into mere excuses, and the longer the period of inactivity exists, the more flimsy the excuse becomes. As a result, quite subconsciously, what was once at the top of ones priority list slowly

slides toward the bottom. Church attendance is no exception. We may quite honestly tell ourselves that we are not going to church on a particular morning because the weather is simply to cold, while we have forgotten that the week before we happily stood for three hours in freezing rain watching our ball team play. We may tell ourselves that we really need the weekends to "rest up" when in truth, Saturday night is the most tiring part of our

Christ told us that he came that we might have life, and that we might have it abundantly. That certainly, in this theologian's opinion, includes the clean social amusements we all enjoy. But, this does not negate our responsibility as Christians to be part of the gathered community in worship on Sunday morning, giving thanks to the one who has given us love, liberty and life itself.







## **Cunningham Critisizes Nation's Trade Policies**

T.A. Cunningham, president of the Independent Cattlemen's Association, told members of the House Committee on Agriculture last week that the farm problem is a national problem brought on by government policies which have not allowed agriculture producers a fair return on their investments.

The committee is holding hearing in Washington, D.C. on the general condition of the agriculture in-

Cunningham criticised this nation's trade policies saying untold millions of dollars have been lost in trade due to the "ridiculously low prices placed on our agricultural



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and

committee to do everything in its power to change America's and the government's apparent lack of

understanding to the farm crisis. 'The people in agriculture are asking that the policies of the government be changed from a cheap food policy to a fair foor ' said Cunningham. "In curbing inflation, government pol-icies have sacrificed the agricultural sector of the nation. Prices received by the farmer have been held down while at the same time the farmers' costs have risen at an alarming

He added that, "It is sad that these people (ranchers and farmers) have been pressed to the point that they must come here to demand what is rightfully theirs -- a fair return on their investment. It is even sadder that the government has let the finest agriculture in the

he represents, Cunningham requested that the committee members use their "expertise to influence" congressional colleagues to rewrite the 1964 Meat Import Act, allowing less imports into the United States when domestic beef production is high.

"In the past, the agriculture producers have been mislead and often manipulated by government forecasts and crop reports. Not too many years ago, the American farmer was told that in order to head off vast world wide food shortages, it would be necessary to increase herd size, to maximize production because it would be impossible to supply the country with the beef necessary in 1980. These forecasts were nothing more than a myth."

Cattlemen refer to the 1964 law

domestic production increases and the set quotas do not include all processed meat and live cattle.

The ICA is supporting legislation by Sen. Henry Bellmon of Oklahoma (S.2484) and by Rep. Jake Pickle of Texas (H.R. 10894) which would limit beef imports at a time when domestic production is high, Cunningham told the com-

The association is also backing legislation which would require tougher inspection and labelling of foreign meat products.

"We feel the consumer has a right to know what he or she is purchasing," said Cunningham.

Cunningham gave each member of the committee an American Produced Beef window decal. Association members are disonly domestic beef.

Dr. O'Gara is one of the few nationally recognized authorities on golden eagles, and is capable of determining whether or not an individual animal was killed by an

The importance of documenting eagle predation cannot be stressed to heavily. As long as no form of

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tectionists can and will maintain that predation is either minor or imaginary.

The recent revival of interest and controversy is graphic proof of that--after finally being forced to admit that eagles do kill lambs, the protectionists have dug in and held tight to the claim that such kills are
