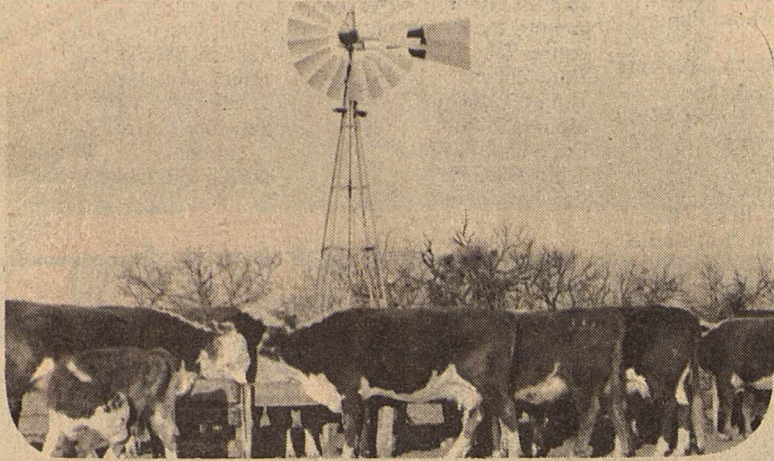

## City Aldermen Approve Obligation Certificates To Purchase Old Bank Building

City Alderman met Monday in regular session to approve the purchase of certificates of obligation in the amount of \$125,000. The certificates will be used for the purchase of land, building and partial parking area of that property known as the old bank building, to house the city hall.

City officials stated that they hoped to begin the move around April 1. Offices located on the top floor of the bank building will remain as they are and the city will be paid rent revenue.

Several interested citizens having residence in Castle Hill Addition were at the meeting in regard to the replating of Castle Hill Annex. The Planning and Zoning Commission approved the request of Sonny Anderson at a meeting last week to have the area replated but denied his request for a proposed subdivision.

The council upheld the commission's approval. They were also in agreement with the commis-

sion's rejection to rezone Taylor Street property for commercial use. In other action of the council, they approved the firemen's annual report, the financial report from the Sonora Golf Club and appointed election judge and clerks for the upcoming election.

The petition for annexation of Bloodworth property to house the new theatre was approved and a request from City Manager Bob Nevill for a new pickup to replace a dump truck, was okayed by the council. Bids will be advertised at a later date.

The Rev. Jim Miles, representing the local Heart Association, appeared before the council asking that March 12 be declared Heart Sunday. The request was approved.

Those persons serving on the planning and zoning commission, and those serving on the housing authority were re-appointed to their posts. Mrs. Celeste Prugel and Walter Pope were re-appointed to

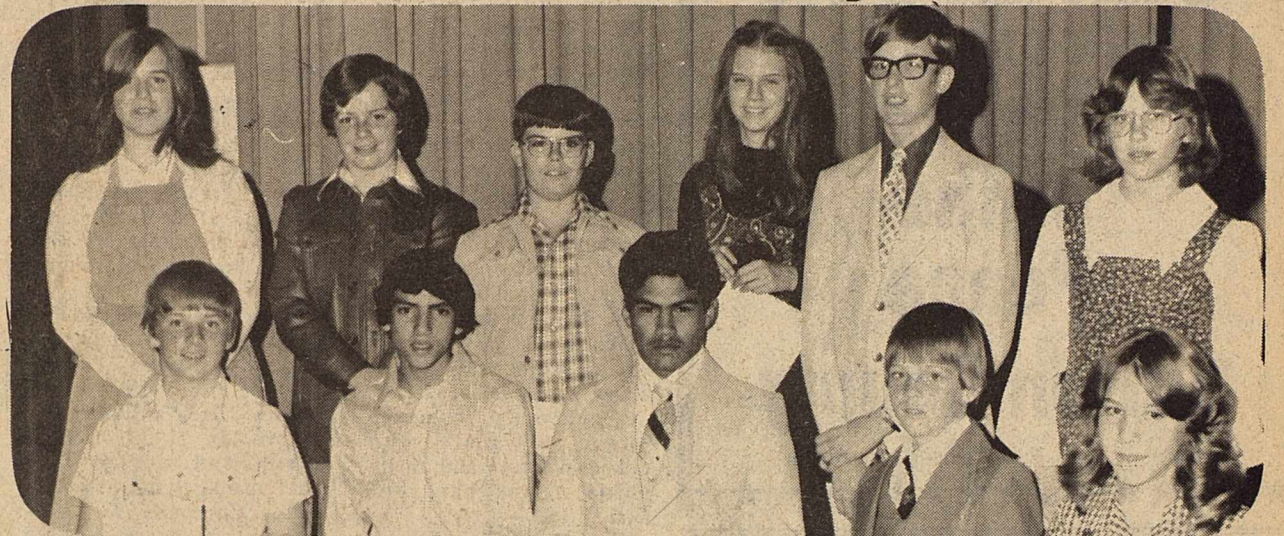
the planning and zoning commission, and Joe David Ross, Warren Hemphill, and Pedro Galindo, Jr., were re-appointed to the housing authority.

Council held much discussion regarding the new water tower which was originally to have been completed before the high water consumption months begin this summer.

Council was advised by William Fox, San Angelo based engineer, that it would now probably be in the Fall before the storage tower would be ready for use. City Attorney Charles Sherrill was asked to contact Fox and request information on why the completion date had been extended.

Council also approved a proposal regarding delinquent accounts. Utilities will be terminated on all accounts not paid within 45 days of the billing date. It was also approved to charge a \$5 fee on checks returned to the City for insufficient funds.

Sponsored by the Jaycees and Jaycettes, the special goat barbecue will begin with check-in from 7 to 10 a.m., and features prize money and trophies to winners.

A dance has been scheduled by the Sonora/Sutton County Park Association, to be held at the park on the dance slab, following the barbecue.

Trophies will be presented to

first, second and third place and a special Showmanship Trophy will also be awarded. Entry fee of \$10 per team plus a goat, wood and other essentials will be furnished by the competing teams. Judging will be held at 5 p.m.

First three place winners will also share in prize money provided be the entry fee.

Rules for the barbecue contest include:

1. Decision of the judges is final.
2. All cook fires must be in approved cooking containers. No ground fires allowed.

3. Contestants must furnish their own cooking fuel.

4. Meat must be cooked on site.

5. Late registration accepted until 12 noon Saturday.

6. Cooking sites on first come, first served basis.

7. No person other than officials allowed in judging area.

8. 1/2 goat to be donated to Jaycees after judging to be distributed at the benefit dinner Saturday evening.

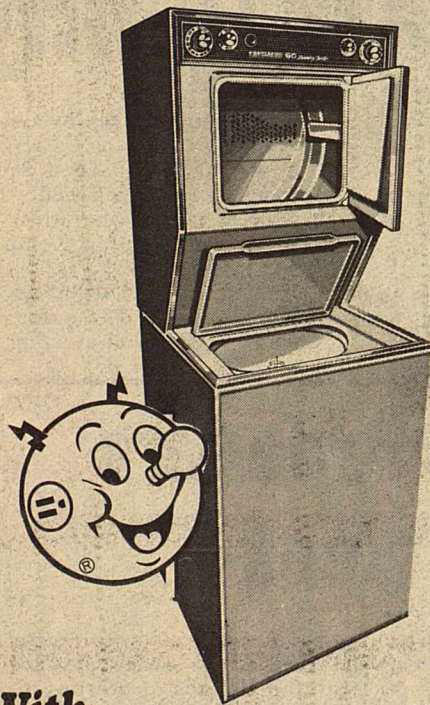

### Reflections

Dr. William Barclay, world famous Bible scholar and author of THE DAILY STUDY BIBLE, among other works, died in Glasgow, Scotland, on January 23. Thousands of Christians will always be indebted to him for his knowledge and his ability to communicate the truths of Scripture. One of the most perceptive minds in Biblical studies, he also had a remarkable ability to speak and write in layman's terms. I would like to share some of Dr. Barclay's thoughts on the Lord's prayer with you. He encouraged us to use it as a pattern, writing: "In the Lord's prayer Jesus says to us: when you pray, remember that God is your Father and your King, and that, therefore, you go to One in whom Love and Power are equally combined. When you pray, do not hesitate to tell God about your daily needs. When you pray, do not shrink from telling God about your mistakes. When you pray, never forget to place the unknown future and all its perils in the hands of God." For those who say the Lord's Prayer almost mechanically each week, Dr. Barclay's words are a challenge to hear them anew, so that they become alive and vibrant, instead of simple chanted jargon. And for those who do not pray, perhaps his words can become a jumping off place for the Word. Amen

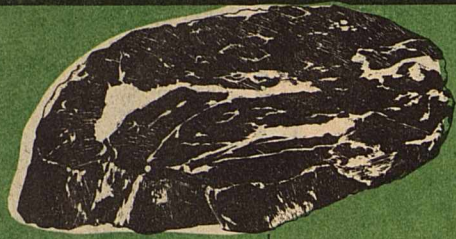

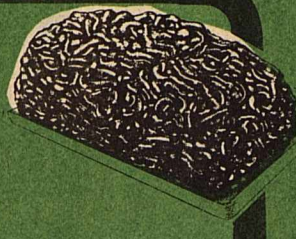

Hostesses for the meeting were Darla Fincher, Mitzi Matthews and Cheri Karnes.

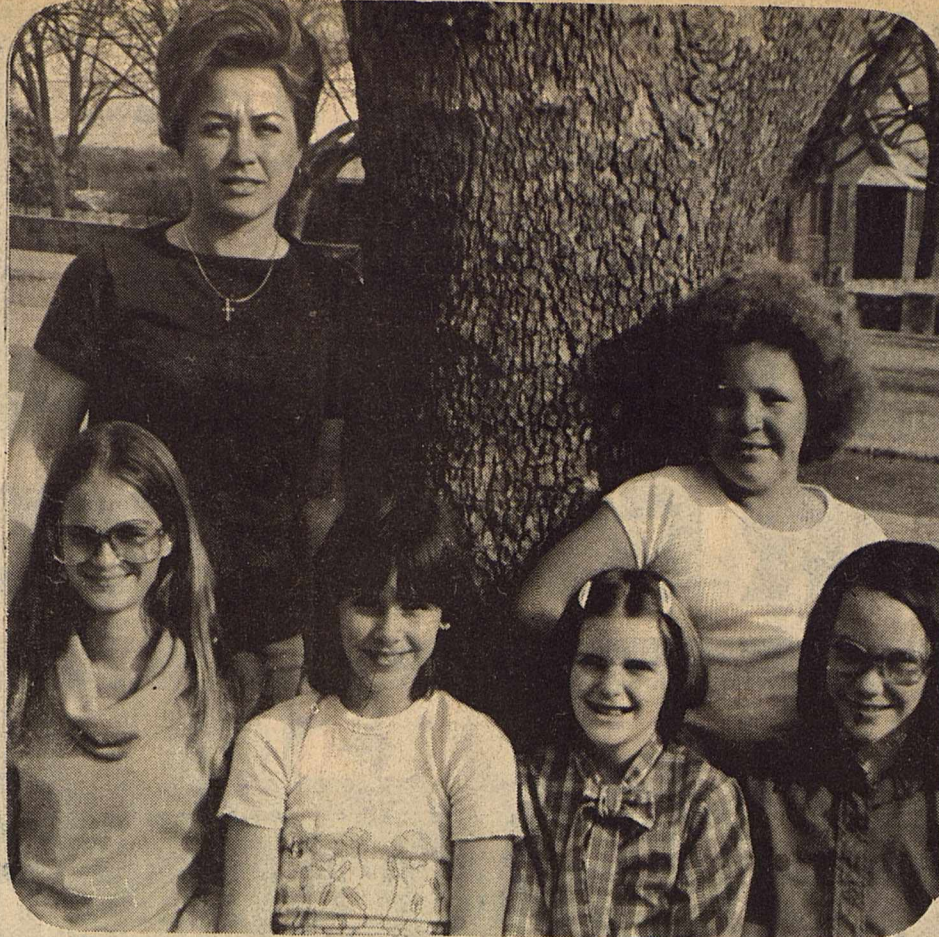
### Firemen's News

## ICA Lodges Complaint Against Secretary

Leaders of the Independent Cattlemen's Association have lodged a complaint with Secretary of State Cyrus Vance, charging that a recent spokesman for the State Department showed an "appalling" lack of knowledge of the cattle industry.

The spokesman, Stephen Bosworth, deputy assistant secretary for International Resources and Food Policy, told the Senate Finance Committee meeting in Washington this week that beef imports have not hurt the domestic cattle industry, according to another witness who testified before the committee, T.A. Cunningham of Goliad.

Cunningham, who is president of the Independent Cattlemen's Association, said at the conclusion of the hearing that Bosworth's statements suggest that, "The State Department is sacrificing the cattle industry for foreign interests."

Cunningham said that statistics from the Census Bureau on the number of live cattle shipped into the United States from Mexico and Canada give further support to his statements concerning the State Department.

According to those statistics, Mexico shipped 595,020 live cattle into the U.S. in December, 1977,

alone. The total number of cattle imported from Mexico in 1977 was 1,025,250. From Canada, the total was 528,806 giving a grand total from both countries as 1,554,056.

"The 1964 Meat Import Act cost the livestock producers an estimated \$1.6 billion in 1975, and \$1.8 billion in 1976 and 1977 losses will be even higher," Cunningham told committee members in Washington.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas chaired the committee and called the hearings to discuss proposed amendments to the Meat Import Act. Bentsen said, "In my state,

many cattlemen, the backbone of an industry which puts billions of beef on American tables each year, have been hurt so seriously that they have had to bail out of the industry. Only by selling part of the family farm, having income from farm operations other than cattle, and in some cases by skimming on needed family purchases and going deeply into debt has a terribly painful human and economic problem been prevented from turning into an unmitigated disaster."

Bentsen told his colleagues, "We must put a stop to the current situation which allows imports to increase at the same time domestic producers are liquidating their cow herds."

Several bills dealing with beef imports, including those introduced by Bentsen and Sen. Henry Bellmon of Oklahoma, are pending before the Finance Committee. The bills would close loopholes in the present law.

The only governor from a livestock producing state to testify was Thomas L. Judge of Montana.

A number of other congressmen testified in person and submitted written testimony in favor of changing the 1964 law.

"Of great concern is that Montana and North Dakota share the brunt of the Canadian imports," said Judge. "Both of these countries have imposed certain restrictions on U.S. feeder cattle and breeder stock, limiting our ability to sell to markets in these countries."

Cunningham testified that imported meat is inedible unless co-mingled with fat trimmings and is not labelled, leaving the consumer in the dark as to the product he or she is purchasing.

"The majority of the consumers I've talked to would much rather buy meat that is produced here in the United States rather than spend their money on foreign goods," he said.

## Natural Fibers Are "In"

The mostly synthetic clothing of the early 1970's has pretty well gone the way of non-returnable bottles, striped toothpaste and press-top Coors cans. Natural fibers are coming back.

That's not to say that synthetics don't have their place, but the American public seems to have another look at "the real thing"—clothes that look and feel like clothes are supposed to look and feel. It may be that we simply take a perverse pleasure in owning

clothing that will last several times as long as the particular fashion style it's cut and sewn into.

At any rate, natural fibers are "in" again, and that's a trend the consuming public can feel justifiably proud of following.

Phil Farrell, chairman of the board of the National Wool Growers Association, describes wool production as "an environmentally compatible process." Wool, he explains, "is a renewable, recyclable fiber, and with energy concerns today, consumers are rediscovering its superior warmth quality."

Farrell was not just touting his admittable toutable product. He was announcing the upcoming Natural Fibers Textile Conference, scheduled for Sept. 26-28, at the Colony Square Hotel, Atlanta, Ga.

The conference, first of its kind and scope, will feature current natural fiber technology with application toward improving textile and apparel industry operations.

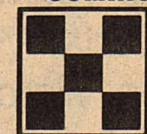

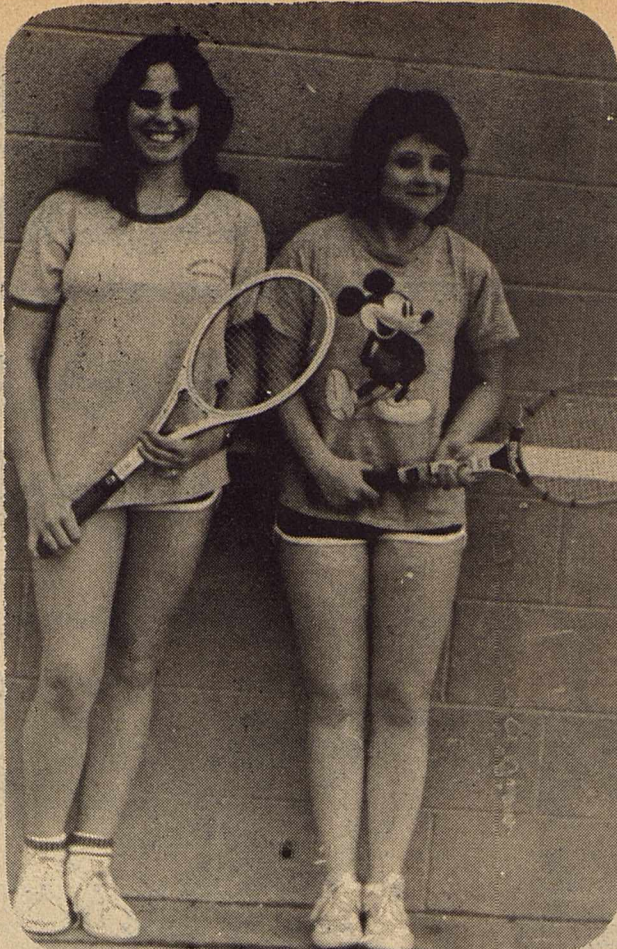
Becky Cavaness was named all-district forward in girl's 7AA basketball play. Named all district guard was Pam Powers.
