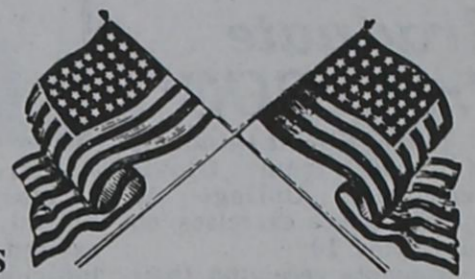


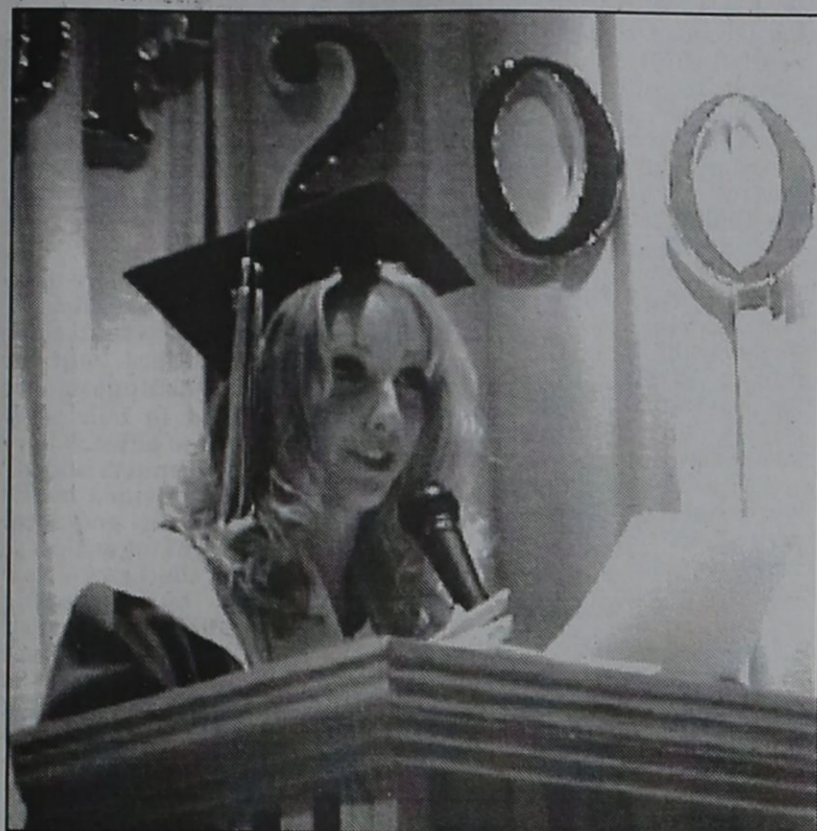

## Is Bovina Really a Foreign Country?

City Manager Ernest Terry and Police Chief Leon Saddler were discussing the possibility of starting up the commodity program again in Bovina.

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) administers the commodity program which provides items like cheese and butter in bulk to local families that need assistance. In the past the program was active in Bovina but had been discontinued.

Saddler and Terry sent an e-mail to the USDA office

in Austin. Their original e-mail read:

"I am the chief of police here and I have a question. My city manager and I were wondering how we could get the commodity program going

again here in Bovina. Several years ago the county did this and we would like to get it started again. Please let us know what we need to do to get this program."

It was signed off with the return e-mail address of bovinapd@amaonline.com.

The USDA office did respond to their request. Here is the reply received:

"Mr. Saddler, The commodity program I administer is limited to the state of Texas. I would suggest that you talk to the US Embassy for a contact at the United States Department of Agriculture. I do not know any one that works with the international side of commodities. I will check around some and if I can come up with a name or contact I will e-mail you."

Finally, here is Leon's reply: "Contrary to your education, Bovina is a small city in the Texas Panhandle, Parmer County to be exact. Sorry but I had to have a little fun with you. I hope this does clear up the confusion though."

Apparently the USDA office thought the inquiry was from Bolivia, instead of Bovina. The city has now received a proper reply from the USDA office.

## Summer Food Program Kicks Off Here June 3

Bovina Independent School District will participate in a Summer Food Service Program through the Texas Department of Human Services in June.

The program will run concurrently with the Summer School Program from June 3 through June 28, 2002. Meals will be served from 11:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. at the Bovina School Cafeteria at 500 Halsell Street, Bovina.

The Summer Food Service Program provides free meals to all children age 1-18. Adults will be charged \$2.50. No proof of income, registration, or meal tickets are required.

People who are eligible to

participate in the program must not be discriminated against because of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, religion or political belief. Anyone who believes that they have been discriminated against should write immediately to: Director, Civil Rights Division, MC W-106, Texas Department of Human Services, P.O. Box 149030, Austin, Texas 78714-9030 or the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

# Dairy Construction Is On Schedule: H. DeWit

Harry DeWit, owner of High Plains Dairy, Parmer County's first modern dairy, said this week that construction on the new facility located about six miles east of Hub was very close to schedule.

"We're coming along well. We might be ready to milk some cows by the last of June," DeWit told the Friona Star/Bovina Blade Wednesday.

To begin with, DeWit will move 2200 milk cows from his plant near Stephenville in Central Texas. "I did buy some springers earlier this year," he added.

Phase one of the new dairy's operation will include facilities for some 2500 milk cows and 500 dry cows and replacement heifers.

High Plains Dairy is permitted for 10,600 head of cows.

Since High Plains Dairy

broke ground for their dairy, at least two other groups have applied for permits for operations to also be located in the Friona area.

The new dairy expects to buy a lot of their feed from local farmers. He had already bought some wheat hay, DeWit said. In addition the company has contracted for a number of acres of corn ensilage, one of the dairy's staple feeds.

When the new dairy begins operation, there will be about 18 employees. This number could go up to 24 by the fall, if all goes according to the company's plan. Four members of the staff in Stephenville will move to Parmer County.

DeWit says he will be putting up four double-wide trailer homes at the dairy's site, where some of the employees will live. The DeWits also plan to live on

site, he told us on Wednesday.

Between now and the end of June, DeWit will be getting the milking equipment. There are still cattle barns and hay barns to be built, as well as fencing for the property.

Harry and Margret DeWit, who are natives of Holland, have owned and operated dairies at Stephenville in Central Texas.

The DeWit children were finishing their schoolwork at Stephenville on Thursday, May 30. The DeWits have four children, ages eight, six, three and 10 months old.

One thing which can be said about the construction--there hasn't been any missed days due to wet weather. "It may have been a little dusty," DeWit joked.

## Lifestar Called To Accident

A four-wheeler accident Tuesday, May 28, caused serious injuries to M. H. Carson of Bovina. The accident happened around 5 p.m. on the Carson farm five miles north of Bovina on FM 1731.

Police Chief Leon Saddler and the Bovina EMS arrived at the scene and called for the Lifestar helicopter which was dispatched from Amarillo. Mr. Carson was flown to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo where he remained in serious condition at press time.

Officials were not sure what caused the accident but stated that the four-wheeler rolled over on top of him. He suffered from head and chest injuries.

## May Ending With Very Little Rain

The month of May is ending with just .47 inch of moisture. May is traditionally the wettest month of the year. Last year, for example, a total of 5.91 inches was measured at the Friona weather station.

In six of the last 14 years, the measurement was over 3.83 inches. Only two of those years were lower than 2002's measurement. In 1996 only .14 inch was registered, and in 1998 the total was nil.

At least in '96, the rain rebounded, with 1.78 inches logged in June, 4.75 in July and 3.48 inches in August.

In five years since 1988, the yearly rainfall total has topped the 20-inch mark. The

total for 2002 at the end of May (barring a deluge on Friday) is 3.79 inches.

**MEMORIAL DAY** was celebrated this past week: either on the newfangled "fourth Monday in May," or the time-honored date of May 30; maybe both, if you were lucky enough.

"Decoration Day" was the first name ascribed to the event, which was begun as a means of honoring those who had fought and died in America's painful Civil War, by cleaning up, and decorating their graves.

Over 500,000 young men lost their lives in a war fought to settle the slavery argument once and for all. Most of those half million had no real interest in slavery--hardly any of the soldiers were slave-owners.

We pulled the following from our files. It is entitled:

**"JUST A SIMPLE SOLDIER"**  
He was getting old and paunchy, his hair was falling fast, And he sat around the Legion, telling stories of the past. Of a war that he had fought in, the deeds that he had done. In his exploits with his buddies; they were heroes, everyone.

And 'tho sometimes to his neighbors, his tales became a joke, All his buddies listened, for they knew whereof he spoke. But we'll hear his tales no longer, for ol' Bob has passed away, And the world's a little poorer, for a soldier died today.

He won't be mourned by many, just his children and his wife. For he lived an ordinary, very quiet sort of life. He held a job and raised a family, quietly going on his way; But the world won't note his passing, 'tho a soldier died today.

When politicians leave this earth, their bodies lie in state, While millions note their passing, proclaiming they were great. Papers tell of their life stories, from the time they were young, But the passing of a soldier goes unnoticed and unsung.

What's the greatest contribution, to the welfare of our land, Some jerk who breaks his promise, and cons his fellow man? Or the ordinary fellow, who in times of war and strife, Goes off to serve his country, and offers up his life?

The politician's stipend and the style in which he lives, Are sometimes disproportionate, to the service that he gives. While the ordinary soldier, who offered up his all, Is paid off with a medal, and perhaps a pension, small.

It's so easy to forget them, and it was so long ago, That our Bobs, Jims and Johns went to battle, but we know It was not the politicians, with their compromise and ploys Who won for us the freedom, that our country now enjoys.

Should you find yourself in danger, your enemies at hand, Would you really want a cop-out, with ever waffling stand? Or would you want a soldier, who has sworn to defend, His home, his kin and Country, and fight until the end?

### 45 Yrs Ago-May 28, 1957

Bovina people were scared, alarmed, and/or excited, depending on the individual, Friday morning shortly before noon when a tornado, and possibly more than one, was sighted south of town. Citizens were warned of the potential danger by the fire siren. There was, most observers felt, little doubt that the destructive winds would miss the city of Bovina. However, it was close enough to town—some two or three miles—to offer much potential danger.

J.W. Wright was elected president of Bovina Lions Club in a regular bi-monthly meeting Thursday night at the Bovina Restaurant. Wright has served as Tail Twister for the past year.

Saturday afternoon Boost Bovina Drawings are no more. Bovina Jaycees, who sponsored the drawings through the cooperation of local merchants, decided at the recent meeting to terminate the drawings because of lack of merchant participation.

### 40 Yrs Ago-May 31, 1962

Bovina and Parmer County voters will join those

in the rest of the state in a trip to Dallas Saturday for the second time in as many months. The election this week is the second Democratic primary.

T.O. Lesly, who farms near Hub and is a member of Bovina Roping Club, suffered a broken leg while practicing calf roping Sunday afternoon. The accident occurred at the club's arena west of Bovina.

Signing-up of property owners for Bovina's latest proposed paving project is nearing completion. Alderman Alvin Glasscock, who had been helping with sign-up work with several other volunteers, said this week that only 12 property owners are yet to be signed for the street improvements.

### 35 Yrs Ago-May 31, 1967

Bovina's city council, in an action-taking mood during a special meeting Monday night, voted to bring Bovina Cemetery under the city's jurisdiction. In the action of the cemetery, the council was answering a request by officers of Bovina Cemetery Association—for the city to assume control of the burial grounds.

Bovina placed American flags on the graves of men buried in Bovina Cemetery who served their country during time of war when the nation observed Memorial Day Tuesday.

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## Bovina Receives Vest Grant

The Bureau of Justice Assistance has awarded the City of Bovina a \$650 federal grant for new bullet-proof vests for its police officers, U.S. Senator Phil Gramm announced this week.

"Law enforcement officers across Texas are called upon every day to protect you and me," Gramm said, in making the announcement. "They put their lives on the line to protect our lives, our livelihood and our property. These funds will give cities and counties the tools they need to protect those officers."

"I am pleased that some of the tax dollars sent by Texans to Washington are being returned to help save lives among law officers here in Texas," the senator added.

The funds provided in the grant allow states and local law enforcement agencies to better protect the lives of law enforcement by equipping them with bullet-proof vests. The federal funds will cover up to half of the total cost of the vests. The Bulletproof Vest Partnership Program was first established by the Bulletproof Vest Grant Partnership Act of 1998.

In addition to the local grants, the State of Texas was granted \$59,989 for new vests.

# Out Here

## "We're Fixin' To Commence!"



Strive, challenge, attain, never give up, have courage, push hard!

These are not aerobic exercise chants. They are variations of the admonitions given to graduates during commencing ceremonies.

The dictionary definition of commencement is short and to the point: "an act, instance or time of commencing."

Over the last few weeks, a lot of people, mostly younger ones, have commenced. Several haven't even realized they have commenced already and the rest don't know exactly what it is they have commenced.

I can remember in my high school days wondering why they called a graduation ceremony a commencement. When I got out of high school, I wasn't in any mood to commence anything else. I was just glad to be out on parole.

But I suppose the common thinking in America is that after high school you either commence paying your own way, or commence the goal of another four years or so of school, at which time you can commence all over again.

A word to this year's graduates: Don't panic. Once you have commenced, you don't have to keep it up forever. You can stop commencing and just sit down and do nothing anytime you want. Look at most of us adults. We got past commencing and are now pretty much just idling.

Commencement speakers come in all shapes, sizes, ideologies, and opinions. Mostly opinions about what you should do with your life to commence being a successful American person.

This year of course, many commencement addresses were tinged with how life is after September 11 and the special challenges it brings. "Nothing will ever be normal again" was a familiar theme, not the kind of stuff you want to hear when you are commencing to commence with your life after school.

Here are a few snippets of commencement philosophy. Maybe, like the graduates, you can remember them for an hour or so.

Presidential counselor Karen Hughes told Texas A&M grads: "The most important thing you will do in life is choose your loves and order them carefully." I hope she went on to explain that because I don't get it.

Actress Kathy Bates spoke at SMU: "I see your faces and your eyes and I feel your amazing energy and your optimism and I believe your generation will make a difference in the world." (Has there ever been a generation that has been told they are too dumb to make a difference in the world?)

Henry Winkler, the "Fonz" of TVs Happy Days, told Austin College in Sherman grads, "The energy we put out is the energy we get back as individuals, as leaders, you have to be a light...reach down deep...yadda, yadda,

yadda." Thanks Fonzie, we feel better now!

Edwin Dorn, undersecretary of defense from 1993 to 1997, spoke to UT graduates..."Right now you are confronting a profoundly important choice: whether to build walls of fear or to build bridges of faith."

That probably came as a big surprise to several UT graduates who were no doubt thinking of some simpler choices to commence with.

And then there was Bill Cosby. He spoke to the graduates of Rice University and delivered a message that every graduate can understand. Here are some excerpts from Bill's talk:

"If you are waiting for me to tell you to follow your dreams, I'm not going to have anything to do with that. It sounds dumb to me. Follow your dream. Dreams are weird things. I've never been able to control my dreams. I've seen a lot of beautiful women in my dreams and they went off with somebody else."

Cosby continued, "I'm not here to tell you that this is a journey. You've heard that ever since you came out of elementary school, so we'll stop the journey stuff."

"Some of you have no job. And therein is the rub. Because there are people with no diploma, no sheepskin, a third grade education and they have jobs. And they're sitting here watching you .....you've spent all that money to come here and you have no job. Now, you've got a lot of explaining."

He related an anecdote about asking his grandmother, who had only a third grade education, whether a glass is half-empty or half-full. She replied, "Well, it depends on whether you're pouring or drinking."

Most commencement words are forgotten by now. But we are a nation of ceremony and "rah-rah"

You ponder all this philosophy. I'm fixin' to commence on next week's column. rh--say yes!

true to ourselves and remember that the challenge of learning something new keeps us evolving.

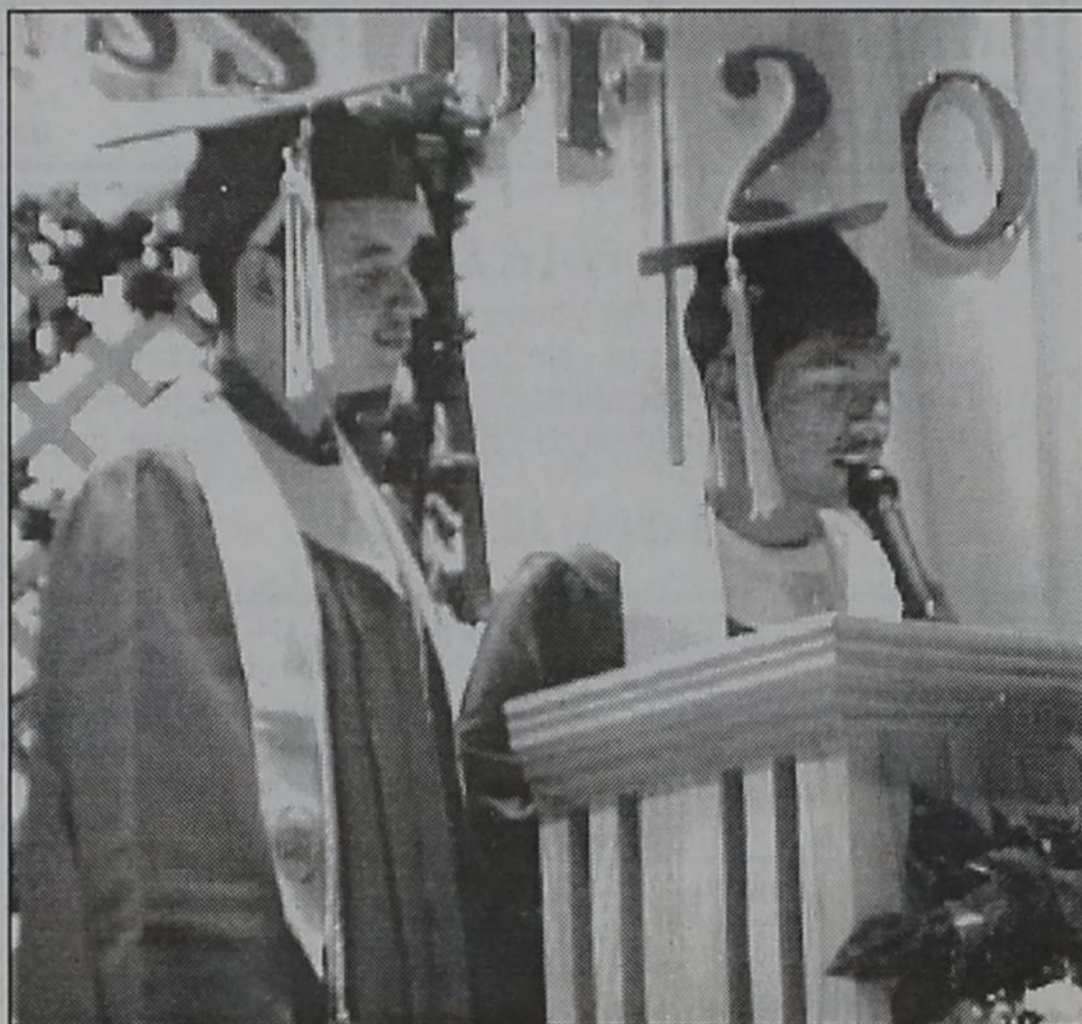
