For Christmas, we were fortunate enough to receive a couple of nice, tapered dress shirts.

It was necessary to exhibit a little Christmas spirit and understanding, however, when someone at the gift opening session remarked, "It would be better, Dolph, if stomach and your shirts were tapered the same way, instead of opposite." There's one in every crowd, someone once figured out.

From the news letter of El Paso Valley Cotton Association comes this bit of information:

"A recent Gallup Poll revealed in a short quiz given 1634 adults these disturbing facts:

"57% did not know the name of their Congressman;

"41% did not know his Party."

Figures can, of course, sometimes be meaningless and those probably are. However, they do bring to mind that this is an election year.

Announcements from precinct and county officials who are seeking re-election are in this week's paper, for instance, and there will be more political activity across the area and state before the primaries in May.

As far as we know, the Republicans, except for Senator John Tower maybe, followed Presidential Candidate Barry Goldwater off the deep end and won't be heard from again! Surely it's not that bad, but there has been a sharp decline in GOP stock since the '64 national election.

Believe it or not, we wish the Republicans were stronger in Texas. We've had hopes for the past few years that they might be trying to become a strong, self-respecting party. It appears from here that the state is going to have two political factions. If the Republicans are not one of these, then the Democrats divide up and fight among themselves.

There are many, of course, who will disagree with that theory. But we'd rather have a united Demo party working against a Republican party which was strong enough to be reckoned with than a political family feud in our own organization.

Understand, we would want the Democrats this year, for instance, to be strong enough to replace the aforementioned Senator Tower with Democratic Congressman Jim Wright of Fort Worth.

Mention of politics, too, brings to mind the new farm program which is scheduled for 1966. Frankly, we're not informed enough about it to be writing about it here. However, we think that an increased amount of land in "layout" will be harmful to this community and to the entire area.

While it had little effect on this immediate area, the soil bank of the '50's, you'll remember, was disastrous from a population standpoint to many areas where a substantial portion of the farmland was put into the soil bank.

It was good for a short while, but after a year or so, too many of the people were gone. The land was idle and there was nothing for them to do.

We don't mean to compare the two programs here. They really aren't comparable. It's just that we think probably that farmers will be happier when they are farming and the area and landowners will be better off, too.

If you interpret this to mean that we're not in favor of the farm program, you're wrong. It's just that we like to see as much of this rich Parmer County farmland in production of in-demand crops, that's all.

Poll tax, remember, is still a requirement for voting in Texas.

Nevermind all the controversy about whether or not it's legal and right. If you're going to vote in this state, except for national offices, you have to have a poll tax receipt. It still costs \$1.75. January 31 is the deadline for getting one to make you eligible to vote this year... from February 1, 1966 to January 31, 1967.

Individual announcements of the six candidates appear in this issue of The Blade.

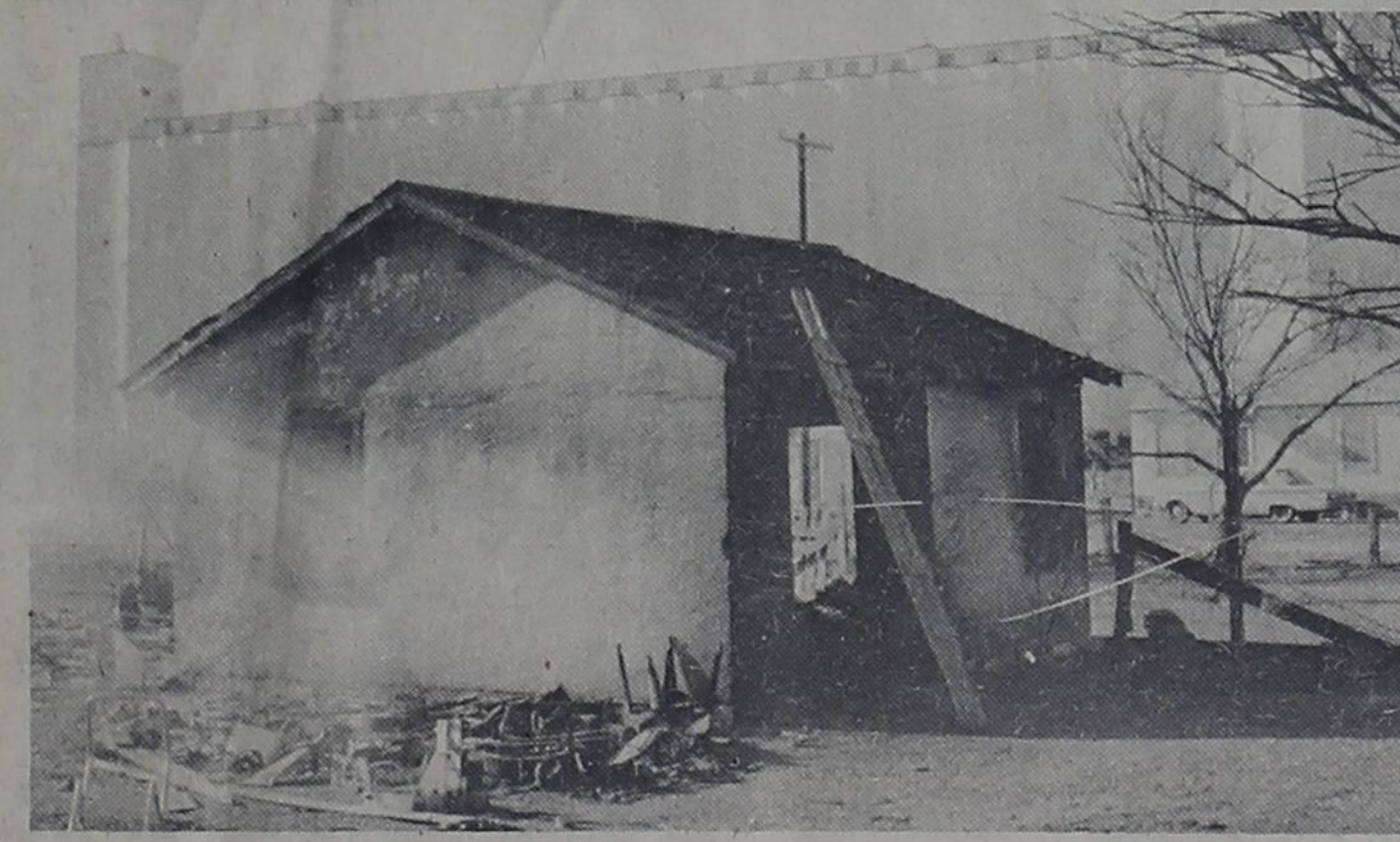
Church Slates Revival

Absentee Voting For Bond Election Starts

Absentee votes may now be cast at the city hall for Bovina's \$100,000 bond election

which is scheduled for Saturday, January 15. The election, if it carries,

will provide funds for water system improvements, a street paving program, and \$20,000 to be used for long term financing for the new city fire station and warehouse and major city equipment.

The water system improvement bonds are to be paid from water and sewer revenue. The other two issues will be paid from taxes. Natural growth of the town is expected to be sufficient, however, to take care of the obligation if the voters approve them, making a tax increase unnecessary, according to city officials.

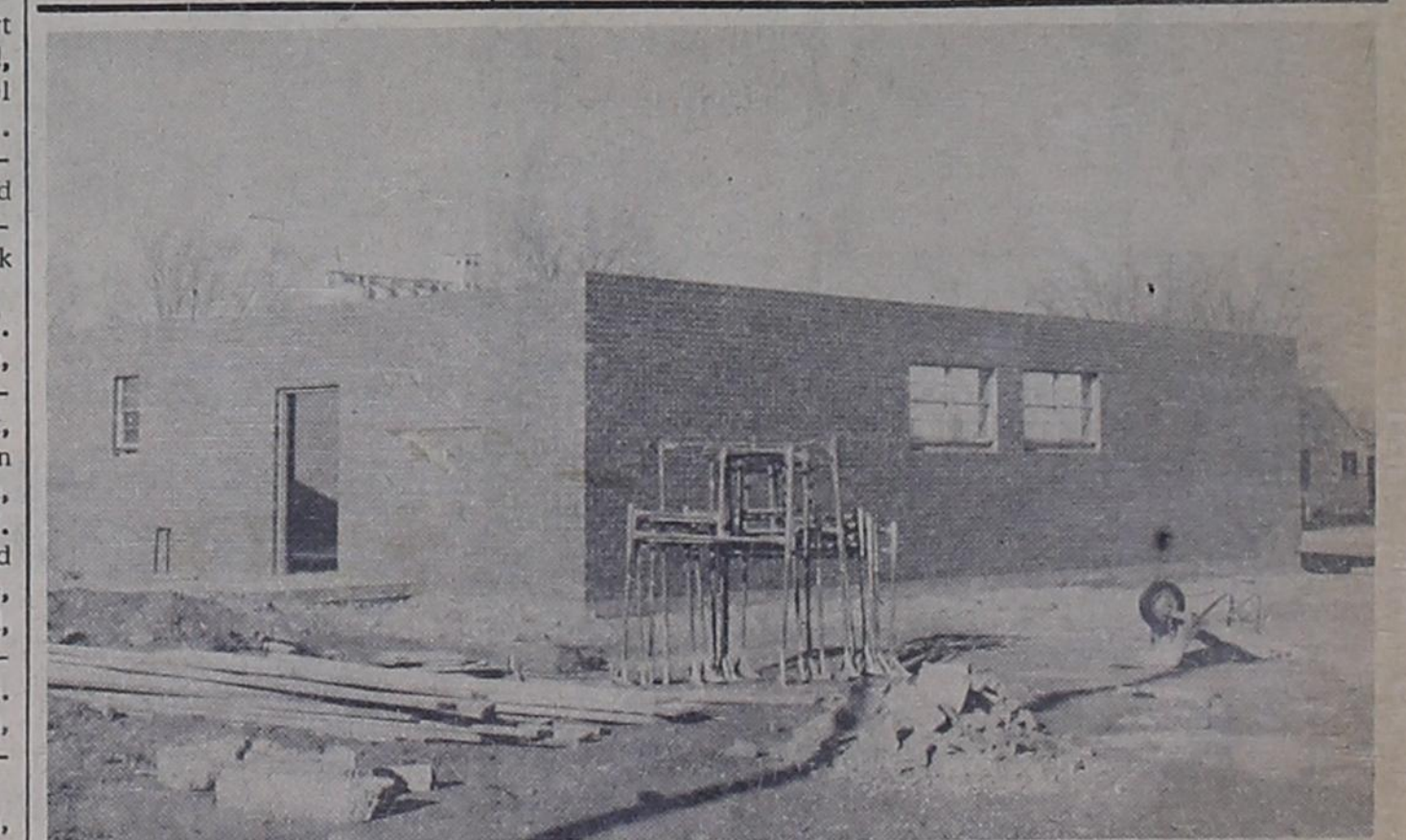
No increase in taxes is anticipated by members of the city council to retire the bonds if they are voted.

Absentee ballots may be marked by voters at the city hall through Wednesday of next week -- three days prior to the election, according to City Secretary Mary Ruth Martin.

Ralph Douglas of Muleshoe is the city's engineer who will be in charge of the improvements if they are voted to be made.

The bonds will be handled by Bob Estes, president of First State Bank of Bovina.

To be eligible to vote, residents of the city must be taxpayers and have a last year's poll tax.

RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR CITY BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF PARMER
CITY OF BOVINA

ON THIS, the 28th day of December, 1965, the City Council of the City of Bovina, Texas, convened in special session at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall with the following members present and in attendance:
BOYD L. GILREATH MAYOR
EDWARD ISAAC
TOM BONDS
CHARLES E. CORN
LLOYD GOBER ALDERMEN
CHARLES E. TRIMBLE

constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had were the following:
Mayor Gilreath introduced a resolution and order. Alderman Isaac moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Bonds. The motion,

carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:
AYES: Aldermen Isaac, Bonds, Corn, Gober and Trimble.
NOES: None.
The RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Bovina, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned; and therefore,
BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BOVINA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 15th day of January, 1966, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Bovina, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$60,000), maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, for the purpose of improving and extending the City's Waterworks System, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Article 1111, et seq., V.A.T.C.S., each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, and secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Bovina, Texas, be authorized to issue TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$20,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing street improvements in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate of not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal and interest on said bonds by levying

a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 3
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Bovina, Texas, be authorized to issue TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$20,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing and equipping a fire station building in and for said City, and the acquisition of a site therefor; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the AMERICAN LEGION HALL in the CITY OF BOVINA, TEXAS, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election:

L. M. GRISSOM - Presiding Judge
A. B. Wilkinson - Alternate Presiding Judge

If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least two (2) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than two (2) additional Clerks, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the City Secretary's Office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1
"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$60,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$60,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2
"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$20,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$20,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 3
"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$20,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION FIRE STATION BONDS"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$20,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION FIRE STATION BONDS"

AS TO EACH OF THE FOREGOING PROPOSITIONS, the voter shall mark out the statement FOR the proposition or the statement AGAINST the proposition, so that the statements remaining shall indicate the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 6: That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS," shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Bovina, Texas, and published in said City of Bovina, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

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On The Farm In Parmer County

As we start the new year out, I want to remind you that it is time to start figuring your 1965 income tax return.

The 1966 edition of the "Farmer's Tax Guide," prepared especially for farmers to use in working up their 1965 income tax reports, is available at your local County Extension office in Farwell or from offices of the Internal Revenue Service.

It would be hard to place a value on this publication. It is written and illustrated for farmers use and is just about a must for tax filing purposes.

One of its most useful sections is the example tax return. On this sample tax return, Schedules B, D, and F are used. Also the major form of all, Schedule 1040, is shown with the completed return and computed tax. Each step in preparing the return is illustrated and explained.

Every tax payer who received two-thirds of his gross income from farming is due to file his return and pay the tax by February 15, 1966, unless he files an estimate and pays this amount by January 17, 1966.

PROTEIN SUPPLEMENTS
Now that winter is here and we are due to have much more cold weather, cattlemen need to plan ahead for protein supplement requirements. One local protein source is often overlooked today--cottonseed. Cottonseed is a 20 per cent crude protein feed. Four pounds of cottonseed furnishes as much

protein and more than twice as much energy as two pounds of 41 per cent protein and energy cost, one may feed cottonseed when the price of 100 pounds of cottonseed does not exceed the cost of 40 pounds of cottonseed meal and 60 pounds of grain sorghum. Not more than 4 to 5 pounds of cottonseed should be fed daily per head to mature cattle.

FERTILIZER, IRRIGATION AND MANAGEMENT

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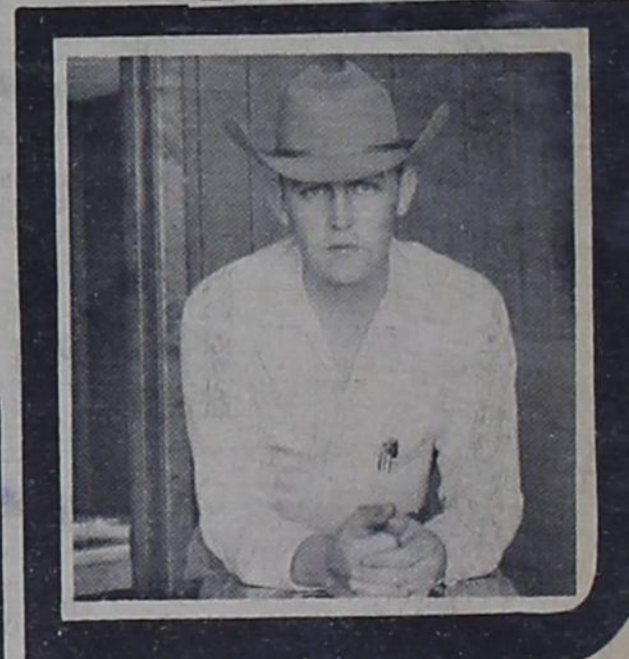

Dear Fellow Texan:

I will devote this report to a summary of the laws affecting veterans passed during the first session of the 89th Congress. These laws are important because we have in this country 22 million veterans, of which 1,100,000 are in our home State of Texas.

This has been a most productive session of Congress in the field of veterans' legislation. Progress in this important area has been due in part to the active work of the Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs, which I have been Chairman of for seven years. Work has also been done in the House of Representatives and by our fine veterans' organizations, and has been supported by our President of the United States, our fellow Texan, Lyndon B. Johnson.

Foremost among our progress for the 22 million veterans in the Nation was the approval by the Senate of the United States of the Cold War GI Bill (S-9) in the Senate by an overwhelming vote of more than 4 - 1. This affects the more than 5 million veterans of the Cold War. Every major national veterans' organization in the United States now supports this needed GI Bill and I am hopeful that it will be written into the law of the land early in the next session which convenes in January.

After working on this GI Bill for over six years and accomplishing the passage of the bill twice in the Senate of the United States, it is encouraging to me to have such important men in veterans' affairs as Congressman Olin Teague of Texas, Chairman of the House Veterans' Affairs Committee, pledge their genuine efforts next year to get a GI Bill passed. Congressman Teague is just back from Vietnam and he has pledged that when the Congress meets in January this matter will be taken up by the House Veterans' Affairs Committee and he will work to get a GI Bill passed.

This is the most needed legislation in the field of veterans' rights. This is long overdue. It should be passed now. These 5 million Cold War veterans, a quarter of a million who live in Texas, have been denied an opportunity to go to school because we do not have a Cold War GI Bill.

This year we also provided a needed increase in the monthly student allowances under the War Orphans Educational Assistance Act, that will provide a long overdue boost in the school allowance for more than 63,000 war orphans. The war orphans are left because their fathers laid down their lives upon the altar of liberty for their country. The government pays them allowances to educate these war orphans. This increase was badly needed to give these war orphans an adequate chance to go to school.

The Congress this year also acted to provide a realistic cost of living increase in the rates of allowances paid to the disabled veterans who are pursuing vocational rehabilitation. We have also voted a 10% across the board increase in the disability compensation payments to the more than 2 million war-time and peace-time veterans who suffer from service-connected disabilities. There are more than 122,000 in Texas. Because of the increased cost of living, these veterans, who were receiving an insufficient allowance, were having a very difficult time.

Another important advance for veterans in Texas is this year's authorization of a new Veterans' Administration Hospital for South Texas near San Antonio. We have more than 1,100,000 veterans in this state and they can be proud of the legislative record of the first session of the 89th Congress in veterans' affairs.

I assure you, that I will continue to work in this matter.

Meeting Monday --

Salary Raises Court Subject

A proposed 10 per cent increase in salaries for all county officials and custodial personnel will be discussed at a public hearing with County Commissioners Court Monday at 2 p.m.

Residents of the county are invited to attend the open meeting, according to Loyde A. Brewer, county judge.

The proposed salary increases for the officials and other personnel was set up in the county budget which was approved in the fall.

Salary increases as proposed are: Tax assessor, \$5,300 to \$5,830; Deputies in the tax office, \$9,700 to \$10,670, to be divided among the three deputies; County clerk, \$5,000 to \$5,500; Deputies in the county clerk's office, \$6,400 to \$7,040 to be divided between two deputies; District clerk, \$4,500 to \$4,950; Sheriff, \$6,000 to \$6,600; Deputies and office assistant in the sheriff department, \$18,400 to \$20,240,

to be divided among five persons; County judge, \$4,000 to \$4,400 (the judge receives an additional \$2,600 from the state as ex-officio school superintendent); Stenographer in the judge's office, \$3,000 to \$3,300 (of this amount \$2,600 is paid by the state).

County Attorney, \$4,000 to \$4,400; Justice of Peace (three in county) \$1,500 to \$1,650 each; treasurer, \$4,500 to \$4,950; Commissioners, \$3,000 to \$3,300 each; Janitor at the courthouse, \$4,200 to \$4,620; county health officer, \$525 to \$577.50; County Agent, \$2,200 to \$2,420; and HD Agent, \$2,200 to \$2,420. The County Agent and the HD Agent each receive additional salaries from the state and federal governments. Not included in the proposed raise in salary is the travel expense for the County Agent and the HD Agent which will remain at \$500. In addition, the county also furnishes the County Agent with a pickup for use in his work.

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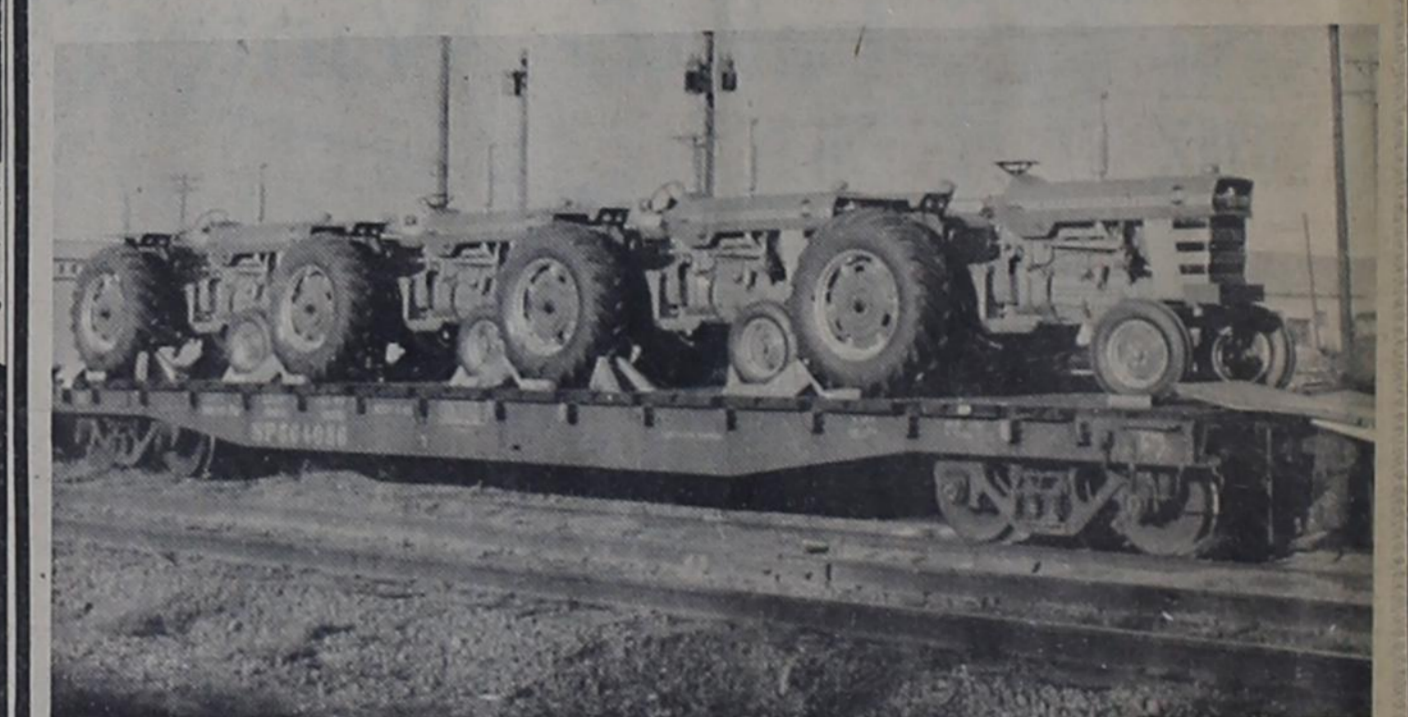
