Fourth Annual Hooten Hollar Set Saturday

The festivities get underway Saturday as the Sonora Jaycees start their fourth annual Goat Barbecue Burnin' and Hooten Hollar at the Sonora Sutton County Park.

This year's cookoff has been sanctioned by the TBAS helping winners accumulate points toward the world's championship.

Games are planned during the day including washer pitching, horseshoes and a jalapeno pepper eating contest.

Registration for the washer and horseshoe contest is \$4 a team and the field is limited to the first 16 teams to sign up. Trophies will be given for all contests.

The Arroyos will provide country music for the dance climaxing the day's activities from 9 pm until 1 am.

Check-in time for contestants in the barbecue is 7 am to 10 am. Trophies will be presented to first, second and third place winners along with a special showmanship trophy.

An entry fee of \$15 per team plus half a goat, wood and other essentials will be furnished by the competing teams. Judging will be held at 5 pm.

The three top teams will receive a share of the prize money provide by the entry fee.

Rules for the contest include:

1. All decisions of the judges are final.
2. All cook fires must be in an

approved container. No ground fires allowed.

3. Contestants must furnish their own cooking fuel.
4. Meat must be cooked on site.

5. Late registration will be accepted until 12 noon Saturday.

6. Cooking sites awarded on a first come, first served basis.
7. No person other than officials

allowed in the judging area.

8. One half goat to be donated to Jaycees after judging to be distributed at the benefit dinner Saturday evening.

This year in district, Allen won second and Lane took third at district. Lane had earlier won the ready writing title at the Big Lake Speech Meet.

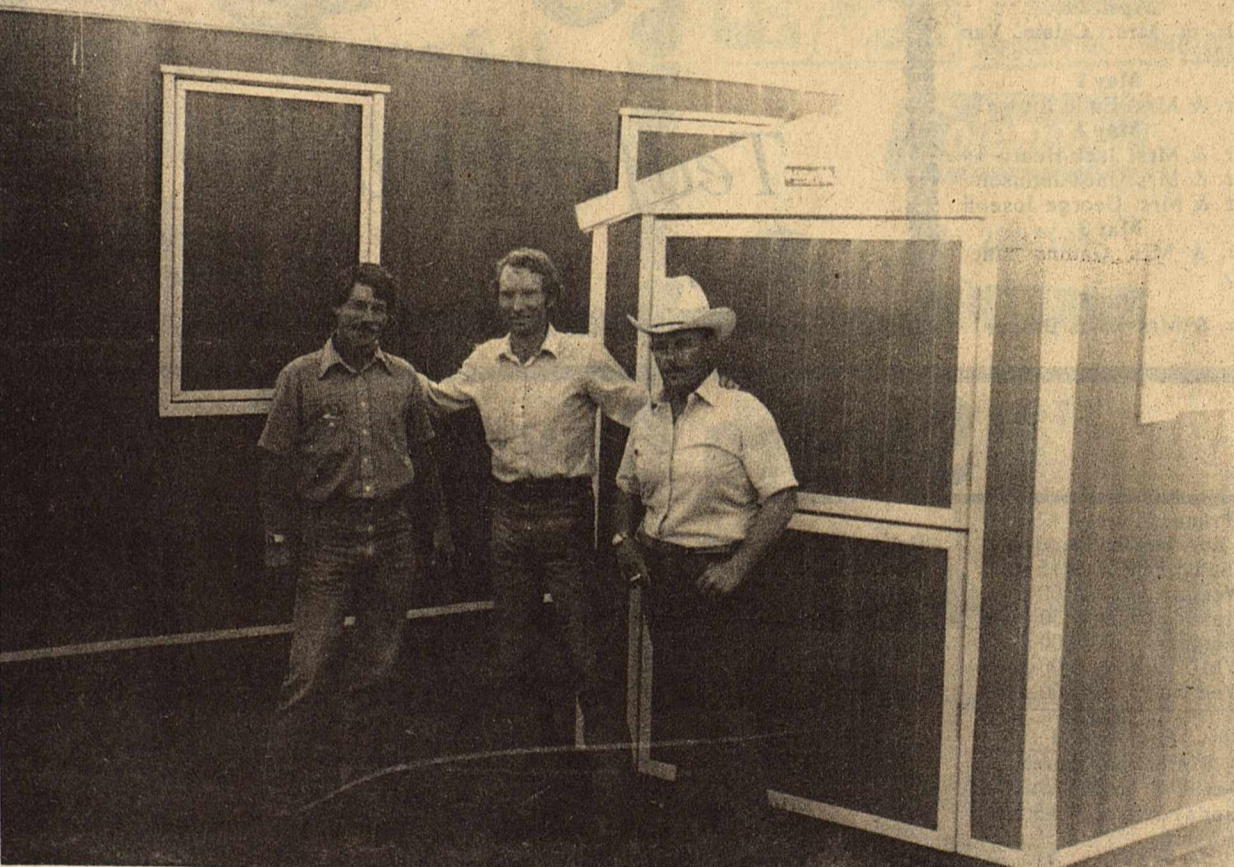
Sports Banquet Planned

If you have any questions concerning your child's eligibility status, or enrollment procedure, please call the Elementary School at 387-2414.

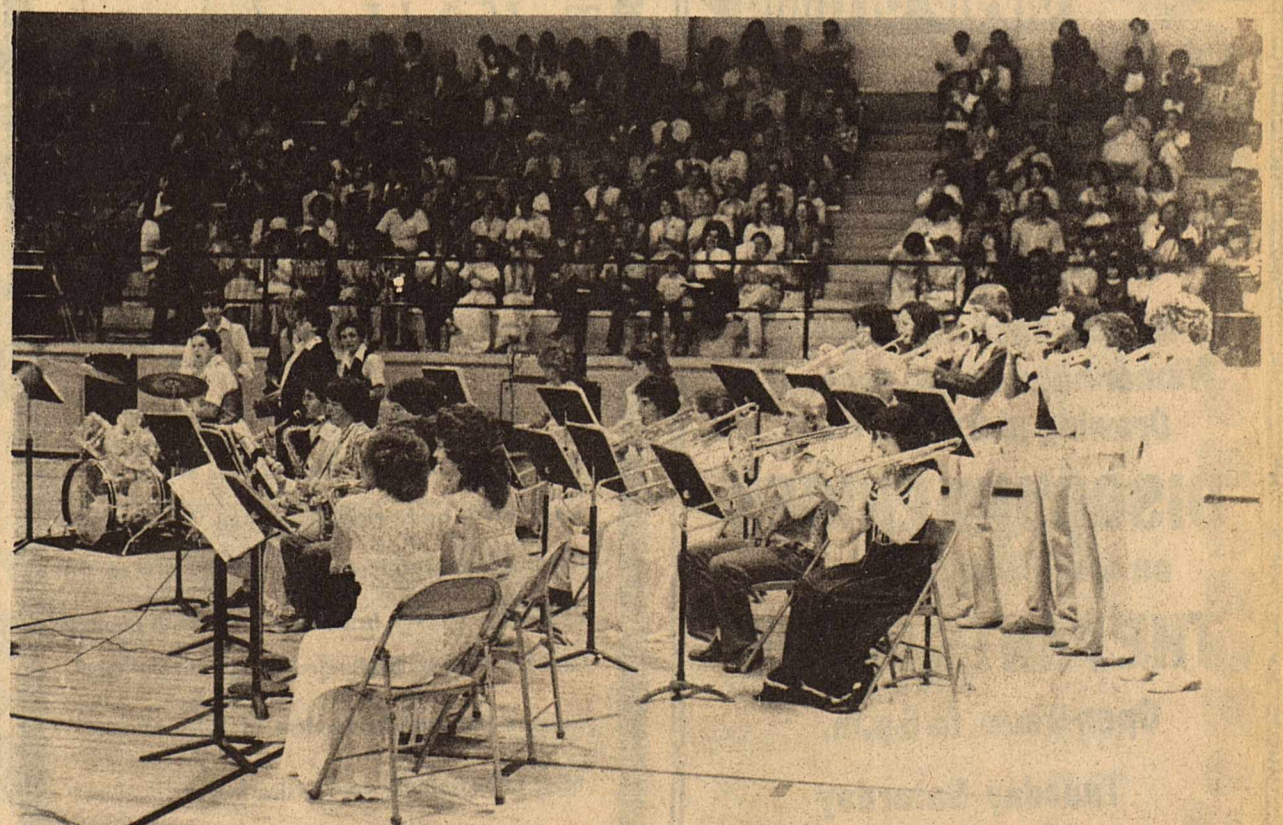

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:
 Critical shortages of food are evident throughout the developing world. The world Bank estimates that 600 million people are undernourished and the number is growing. Children are often the first victims of hunger, with an estimated 12 million dying yearly from starvation. Water is one of the earth's most precious resources and is essential to the preservation of life. Half of the world's people do not have ready access to a safe or adequate water supply. The World Health Organization estimates that 80 percent of all diseases are related to unsanitary water. I appeal to your readers to help us redress this injustice by considering the service in the Peace Corps. We have hundreds of assignments, beginning in the

spring and summer, in 60 developing nations. There is no upper age limit in the Peace Corps. Persons with experience in agriculture will help the Third World farmers increase their crop yields and will encourage animal production. All volunteers receive a living allowance. American citizens, who have backgrounds in the biological sciences and are willing to share two years of their lives with the Third World peoples, are urgently needed. The Peace Corps service is often frustrating, but also one of the most challenging activities in one's life. Initiative, flexibility, patience and a sense of humor are the trademarks of successful volunteers, whether they teach carpentry, mechanics, math or science. This is our 20th year. Please join us. 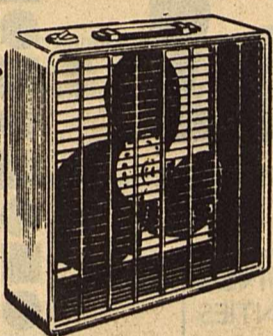

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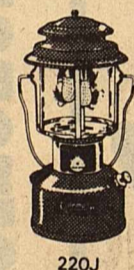

JV Boys Win District 8 AAA Track Title

The Sonora junior varsity boys literally ran away with the District 8-AAA track title as they piled up 207 to far out-distance second place Brady with 139 points.

The Broncos nailed down six blue ribbons enroute to the league crown.

Jeff Brittain, laying out all year on the golf team, showed he still had his form as he won the pole vault at

11-0 with Tino Martinez taking third at 8-0.

Drew Wallace, also out with the golf team, won the 3,200-meter run at 12:12.53 followed by Troy Hulseley in third at 12:56.34 and Billy Laxton in fourth at 13:15.

Jimmy Gonzales added another victory in the 800 at 2:13.25, followed by Phillip Kemp in fourth at 2:18.49 and Martinez at 2:27.01. Arthur Adame won the

100 in 11.83, and Eugene Gonzales finished fifth at 12.5.

Espy Whitehead and Ronnie Pollard gave the team a 1-3 in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles at 43.53 and 45.69 respectively.

The other win came from Albert Chavez in the 400 at 53.84 with Mike Poloczek fourth at 55.92 and Billy Holland fifth at 57.10. Holland also added two

second place with 39-9 heave in the shot put and a 108-3/4 toss in the discus. Rodney Jones also took fifth in the discus at 99-10.

Poloczek was second in the long jump at 18-0 and Eugene Gonzales was fourth in the event at 16-10 while Brittain took third in the high jump at 5-4 to round out the field event points.

The 400-meter relay team of Gonzales, White-

head, Poloczek and Adame took third at 47.51 and the 1,600 squad of Brittain, Gonzales, Poloczek and Chavez finished at 16.62, Brittain third at 16.8 and Pollard fourth at 17.61.

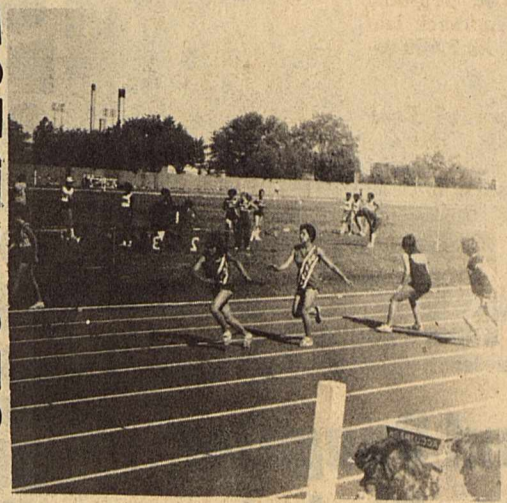

Gold, Hanna Edged by Kermit Duo at Regional

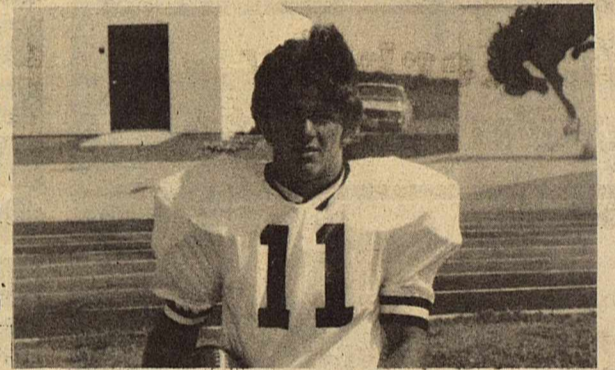

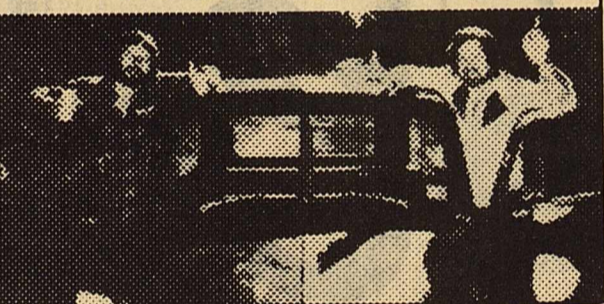

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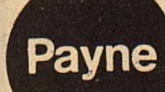

Garza Gets Only Win At District Meet

Tony Garza nabbed the only victory for Sonora at the District 8-AAA track meet last Thursday as he

convincingly captured the 3,200-meter run in 10:46.62, seven seconds ahead of his closest competitor.

Despite some strong times and distances, the Broncos had to settle for fourth place with 77 points

in the extremely tough field. Mark Doan also gained a regional berth with 12-0

second place effort in the pole vault.

David Chandler was the only other Bronco to qualify for the regional meet, taking second in the 1,600 at 4:47.59. Garza was third in the event at 5:00.97.

The only other field event points came from Allen Stewart, sixth in the long jump at 18-10 1/4, and Marney Sorenson, fourth in the high jump at 5-8.

Rene Porras also took sixth in the 3,200 behind Garza at 11:40, and Sorenson added fourth place points in the high hurdles at 16.45.

Mike Phillips added a third place finish in the 800 at 2:03.83, and Tom Schabel was fourth at 2:05.43.

Other running event points came from Doan, fourth in the 400 at 51.84, and Cades Pope, sixth in the 100 at 11.91.

The 1,600-meter relay unit of Schabel, Frankie Gonzales, George Sanchez and Doan took third at 3:32.34, and the sprint relay quartet of Charlie Carrol, Stewart, Phillips and Gonzales was fourth at 45.51.

Host Brady with 159 points edged second place Comanche at 140 points. Coleman took third with 92 points, while Ballinger rounded out the field in fifth place with 77 points.

Relay Heads Girls Track Team Efforts

The Sonora girls track team got its strongest showing at the regional track meet in Lubbock last weekend out of its 1,600-relay team.

The foursome of Rosa Noriega, Casey Criles, Paula Friess and Jessica Robledo took fourth in their best time of the year, 4:09.2.

The 800-meter squad of Norieg, Robledo, Friess and Tonya Evans turned the finals by one spot.

Although equalling their previous best of 51.3 the sprint relay unit also placed ninth in the prelims and failed to qualify for the finals.

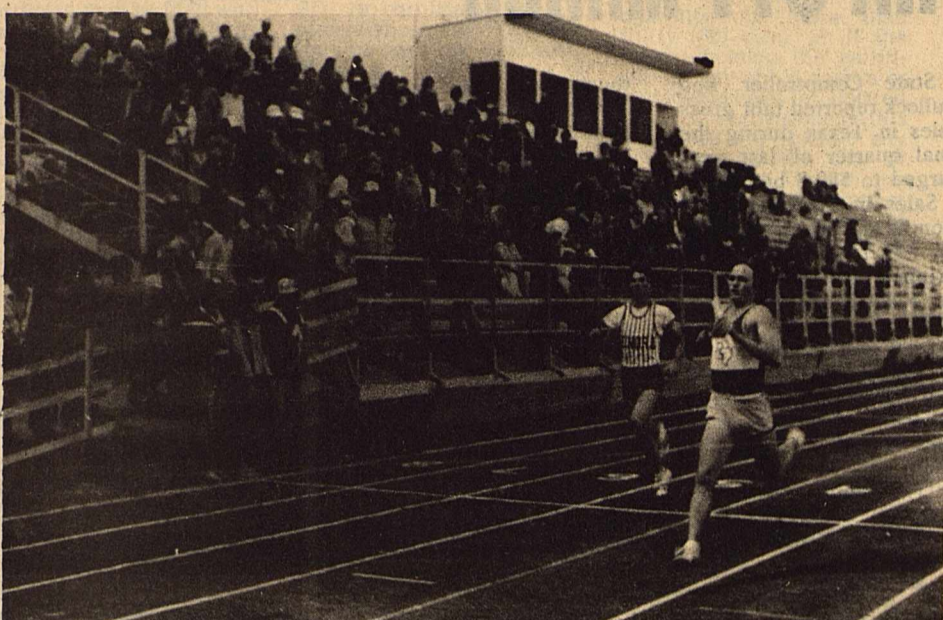
Friess got fifth place points in the triple jump with a 33-10 effort to round out the Bronco scoring.

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Public Notice

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING AND LICENSING TAXICAB AND TAXICAB DRIVERS AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SONORA:

SECTION 22-1: DEFINITIONS. The following words and phrases when used in this ordinance have the meanings as set out herein:
(a) CALL BOX STAND means a place alongside a street, or elsewhere where the Chief of Police has authorized a holder of a certificate of public convenience and necessity to install a telephone or call box for the taking of calls and the dispatching of taxicabs.
(b) CERTIFICATE means a certificate of public convenience and necessity issued by the City Council, authorizing the holder thereof to conduct a taxicab business in the City of Sonora.
(c) DRIVER'S LICENSE means the permission granted by the Chief of Police to a person to drive a taxicab upon the streets of the City of Sonora.
(d) FLAG FEE means a fee for responding to a call for a taxi which is payable regardless of whether or not the person calling uses the services of the responding taxi.
(e) HOLDER means a person to whom a certificate of public convenience and necessity has been issued.
(f) MANIFEST means a daily record prepared by a taxicab driver of all trips made by said driver showing time and place of origin, destination, number of passengers, and the amount of fare of each trip.
(g) OPEN STAND means a public place alongside the curb of a street or elsewhere, in the City of Sonora which has been designated by the Chief of Police as reserved exclusively for the use of taxicabs.
(h) RATE CARD means a card approved by the Chief of Police for display in each taxicab which contains the rates of fare then in force.
(i) TAXICAB means a motor vehicle regularly engaged in the business of carrying passengers for hire, and not operated on a fixed route.
(j) WAITING TIME means the time when a taxicab is not in motion from the time of acceptance of a passenger or passengers to the time of discharge, but does not include any time that the taxicab is not in motion if due to any cause other than the request, act or fault of a passenger or passengers.

SECTION 22-2: CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY REQUIRED. No person shall operate or permit a taxicab owned or controlled by him to be operated as a vehicle for hire upon the streets of the City of Sonora without having first obtained a certificate of public convenience and necessity from the City Council.

SECTION 22-3: APPLICATION FOR CERTIFICATE. An application for a certificate shall be filed with the Chief of Police upon forms provided by the City of Sonora; and said application shall be verified under oath and shall furnish the following information:
(a) The name and address of the applicant.
(b) The financial status of the applicant, including the amounts of all unpaid judgments against the applicant and the nature of the transaction or acts giving rise to said judgments.
(c) The experience of the applicant, including the amounts of passengers.
(d) Any facts which the applicant believes tend to prove that public convenience and necessity require the granting of a certificate.
(e) The number of vehicles to be operated or controlled by the applicant and the location of proposed depots and terminals.
(f) The color scheme or insignia to be used to designate the vehicle or vehicles of the applicant.
(g) Such additional information as the Chief of Police of the City of Sonora may require.

SECTION 22-4: PUBLIC HEARING. Upon the filing of an application, the Chief of Police shall fix a time and place for public hearing before the City Council thereon. Notice of such hearing shall be given to the applicant and to all persons to whom certificates of public convenience and necessity have been theretofore issued. Due notice shall also be given the general public by posting a notice of such hearing in the Devil's River News. Any interested person may file with the Chief of Police a memorandum in support of or opposition to the issuance of a certificate.

SECTION 22-5: ISSUANCE OF CERTIFICATE. If the City Council finds that further taxicab service in the City of Sonora is required by the public convenience and necessity and that the applicant is fit, willing, and able to perform such public transportation and to conform to the provisions of this ordinance and the rules promulgated by the City Council, then the City Council shall issue a certificate stating the name and address of the applicant, the number of vehicles authorized under said certificate and the date of issuance; otherwise, the application shall be denied.

In making the above finding, the City Council shall take into consideration the number of taxicabs already in operation, whether existing transportation is adequate to meet the public need, the probable effect of increased service on local traffic condition, and the character, experience, and responsibility of the applicant.

SECTION 22-6: LIABILITY INSURANCE REQUIRED. No certificate of public convenience and necessity shall be issued or continued in operation unless there is in full force and effect a liability insurance policy issued by an insurance company authorized to do business in the State of Texas providing liability insurance for each vehicle in the amount of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for bodily injury to any person; and the amount of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) for injuries to more than one person which are sustained in the same accident and one Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for property damage resulting from any one accident; each vehicle shall also be covered by an insurance policy providing uninsured motorists protection in the amount of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for bodily injury to any one person, in the amount of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for injuries to more than one person which is sustained in the same accident and Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for property damage resulting from any one accident. Proof of the foregoing liability insurance shall accompany the application for a Certificate for Public Convenience and Necessity.

SECTION 22-7: LICENSE FEES. No certificate shall be issued or continued in operation unless the holder thereof has paid an annual license fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for the right to engage in the taxicab business and Twenty Five Dollars (\$25.00) for each additional vehicle operated under a certificate of public convenience and necessity. Said license fees shall be for the calendar year and shall be in addition to any other license fees or charges established by proper authority and applicable to said holder of the vehicle or vehicles under its operation and control. In addition to the foregoing license fees, the holder of each certificate shall pay to the City of Sonora a fee of equivalent to Two percent (2 percent) of the holder's gross income from the operating of the taxicab business, which sum shall be payable quarterly, on January 15th, April 15th, July 15th and September 15th of each year.

SECTION 22-8: TRANSFER OF CERTIFICATES. No certificate of public convenience and necessity may be sold, assigned, mortgaged or otherwise transferred without the consent of the City Council.

SECTION 22-9: SUSPENSION AND REVOCATION OF CERTIFICATES. A certificate issued under the provisions of this ordinance may be revoked or suspended by the Chief of Police if the person holding the certificate has discontinued operation for more than thirty (30) days, or if the person holding the certificate or any of his agents or employees have (a) violated any of the provisions of this ordinance; (b) violated any ordinances of the City of Sonora, or the laws of the United States or the State of Texas, the violations of which reflect unfavorably on the fitness of the holder to operate public transportation.
 Prior to suspension or revocation, the holder shall be given notice of the proposed action to be taken and shall have an opportunity to be heard before the City Council.

SECTION 22-10: TAXICAB DRIVER'S LICENSE. No person shall operate a taxicab for hire upon the streets of the City of Sonora, and no person who owns or controls a taxicab shall permit it to be so driven, and no taxicab licensed by the City of Sonora shall be so driven at any time for hire, unless the driver of said taxicab shall have first obtained and shall have then in force a taxicab driver's license issued under the provisions of this ordinance.
SECTION 22-11: APPLICATION FOR DRIVER'S LICENSE. An application for a taxicab driver's license shall be filed with the Chief of Police on forms provided by the City of Sonora; and such application shall be verified under oath and shall contain the following information:
(a) The names and addresses of four (4) residents of the State of Texas who have known applicant for a period of three (3) years and who will vouch for the applicant's sobriety, honesty and general good character of the applicant.
(b) The experience of the applicant in the transportation of passengers.
(c) The educational background of the applicant.
(d) A concise history of the applicant's employment.
 Each application shall be accompanied by a certificate from a reputable physician of the City of Sonora certifying that, in his opinion, the applicant is not afflicted with any disease or infirmity which might make him an unsafe or unsatisfactory driver. At the time the application is filed the applicant shall pay to the Chief of Police the sum of Five Dollars (\$5.00).
SECTION 22-12: EXAMINATION OF APPLICANT-CURRENT STATE MOTOR VEHICLE OPERATOR'S PERMIT REQUIRED. Before any application is finally passed upon by the Chief of Police the applicant shall be required to pass a satisfactory examination as to his knowledge of the City and to show that he has a current chauffeur's license issued by the State of Texas.
SECTION 22-13: POLICE INVESTIGATION OF APPLICANT - TRAFFIC AND POLICE RECORD. The Police Department shall conduct an investigation of each applicant for a taxicab driver's license and a report of such investigation and copy of the traffic and police record of the applicant, if any, shall be attached to the application for consideration of the Chief of Police.
SECTION 22-14: CONSIDERATION OF APPLICATION. The Chief of Police, upon consideration of the application and the reports and certificate required to be attached hereto, shall approve or reject the application. If the applicant is selected, the applicant may request a personal appearance before the Chief of Police to offer evidence why his application should be reconsidered.
SECTION 22-15: ISSUANCE OF LICENSE-DURATION-ANNUAL FEE. Upon approval of an application for a taxicab driver's license the Chief of Police shall issue a license to the applicant which shall bear the name, address, race, age, signature and photograph of the applicant.
 Such license shall be in effect for the remainder of the calendar year. A license for every calendar year thereafter shall issue upon the payment of Five Dollars (\$5.00) unless the license for the preceding year has been revoked.
SECTION 22-16: DISPLAY OF LICENSE. Every driver licensed under this ordinance shall post his driver's license in such a place as to be in full view of all passengers while such driver is operating a taxicab.
SECTION 22-17: SUSPENSION AND REVOCATION OF LICENSE. The Chief of Police is hereby given the authority to suspend any driver's license issued under this ordinance for a driver's failing or refusing to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, such suspension to last for a period of not more than thirty (30) days. The Chief

of Police is also given authority to revoke any driver's license for failure to comply with the provisions of this ordinance. However, a license may not be revoked unless the driver has received notice and has had an opportunity to present evidence in his behalf.
SECTION 22-18: FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH CITY, STATE AND FEDERAL LAWS. Every driver licensed under this ordinance shall comply with all City, State, and Federal laws. Failure to do so will justify the Chief of Police in suspending or revoking a license.
SECTION 22-19: VEHICLES-EQUIPMENT AND MAINTENANCE.
(a) Vehicles Must Be Licensed. Prior to the use and operation of any vehicle under the provisions of this ordinance said vehicle shall be thoroughly examined and inspected by the police Department or such person as the Chief of Police shall designate and found to comply with such reasonable rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the Chief of Police. These rules and regulations shall be promulgated to provide safe transportation and shall specify such safety equipment and regulatory devices as the Chief of Police shall deem necessary therefor.
 When the Police Department finds that a vehicle has met the standards established by the Chief of Police, the Department shall issue a license to that effect, which shall also state the authorized seating capacity of said vehicle.
(b) Periodic Inspections. Every vehicle operating under this ordinance shall be periodically inspected by the Police Department, or such person as may be designated by the Chief of Police at such intervals as shall be established by the Chief of Police to insure the continued maintenance of safe operating conditions.
(c) Vehicles Must Be Kept in a Clean and Sanitary Condition. Every vehicle operating under this ordinance shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition according to rules and regulations promulgated by the Chief of Police.
SECTION 22-20: DESIGNATION OF TAXICABS. Each taxicab shall bear on each side, in painted letters not less than four (4) inches nor more than five (5) inches in height, the name of the owner; and in addition, may bear an identifying design approved by the Chief of Police. No vehicle covered by the terms of this ordinance shall be licensed whose color scheme, identifying design, monogram, or insignia to be used thereon shall, in the opinion of the Chief of Police, conflict with or imitate any color scheme, identifying design, monogram, or insignia used on a vehicle or vehicles already operating under the ordinance, in such a manner as to be misleading or tend to deceive the public; and provided further, that if, after a license has been issued for a taxicab hereunder, the color scheme, identifying design, monogram, or insignia thereof is changed so as to be, in the opinion of the Chief of Police, in conflict with or imitate any color scheme, identifying design, monogram, or insignia used by any other person, owner or operator, in such a manner as to be misleading or tend to deceive the public, the license of or certificate covering such taxicab or taxicabs shall be suspended or revoked.
SECTION 22-21: RATES OF FARE-RATE CARD REQUIRED. No owner or driver of a taxicab shall charge a greater sum for the use of a taxicab than in accordance with the following rates:
(a) Flag Fee: One Dollar and fifty Cents (\$1.50).
(b) Mileage Rates: seven and Five-tenths Cents (\$.075) per one-tenth of a mile.
(c) Waiting Time: Twenty Cents (\$.20) per minute of waiting time.
 Every taxicab operated under this ordinance shall have a rate card setting forth the authorized rates of fare displayed in such a place as to be in view of all passengers.
SECTION 22-22: RECEIPTS. The driver of any taxicab shall upon demand by the passenger render to such passenger a receipt for the amount charged, either by a mechanically printed receipt or by a specially prepared receipt on which shall be the name of the owner, license number or motor number, amount of meter reading or charges and date of transaction.
SECTION 22-23: SOLICITATION, ACCEPTANCE AND DISCHARGE OF PASSENGERS.
(a) Solicitation of Passengers by Driver. No driver shall solicit passengers for a taxicab except when sitting in the driver's compartment of such taxicab or while standing immediately adjacent to the curb side thereof. The driver of any taxicab shall remain in the driver's compartment or immediately adjacent to such taxicab not more than ten (10) consecutive minutes, and provided further that nothing herein contained shall be held to prohibit any driver from alighting to the street or sidewalk for the purpose of assisting passengers into or out of such vehicle.
(b) Prohibited Solicitation. No driver shall solicit patronage in a loud or annoying tone of voice or by sign or in any manner annoy any person or obstruct the movement of any persons, or follow any person for the purpose of soliciting patronage.
(c) Receipt and Discharge of Passengers on Sidewalk Only. Drivers of taxicabs shall not receive or discharge passengers on the roadway but shall pull up to the right-hand sidewalk as nearly as possible, or, in the absence of a sidewalk, to the extreme right-hand side of the road and there receive or discharge passengers, except upon one-way streets, where passengers may be discharged at either the right or left-hand sidewalk, or side of the roadway in the absence of a sidewalk.
(d) Additional Passengers. No driver shall permit any other person to occupy or ride in said taxicab, unless the person or persons first employing the taxicab shall consent to the acceptance of additional passenger or passengers. No charge shall be made for an additional passenger except when the additional passenger rides beyond the previous passenger's destination and then only for the additional distance so travelled. In the event an additional passenger rides beyond a previous passenger's destination, no additional flag fee may be charged.
(e) Restriction on Number of Passengers. No driver shall permit more persons to be carried in a taxicab as passengers than the rated seating capacity of his taxicab as stated in the license for said vehicle issued by the Police Department. A child in arms shall not be counted as a passenger.
(f) Refusal to Carry Orderly Passengers Prohibited. No driver shall refuse or neglect to convey any orderly person or persons, upon request, unless previously engaged or unable or forbidden by the provisions of this ordinance to do so. Nothing contained herein shall require any driver to convey any disorderly person or persons.
(g) Prohibitions of Drivers. It shall be a violation of this ordinance for any driver of a taxicab to solicit business for any hotel or motel or to divert patrons from one hotel or motel to another. Neither shall such driver engage in selling intoxicating liquors or solicit business for any prostitute or use his vehicle for any purpose other than the transporting of passengers and their baggage or the delivery of packages.
(h) Prohibition of Passengers. It shall be unlawful for the driver of any taxicab to permit any person or persons to ride on the exterior of such vehicle while the same is in motion, and it shall be unlawful for any person to ride on the exterior of such vehicle when the same is in motion.
SECTION 22-24: OPEN STANDS-ESTABLISHMENT - USE.
(a) Establishment. The City Council of the City of Sonora is hereby authorized to establish open stands in such place or places upon the streets of the City of Sonora as it deems necessary for the use of taxicabs operated in the City. The City Council shall not create an open stand without taking into consideration the need for such stand by the taxicab companies and the convenience to the general public. The City Council shall prescribe the number of taxicabs that shall occupy such open stands. The City Council shall not create an open stand in front of any place of business where the abutting property owners object to the same or where such stand would tend to create a traffic hazard.
(b) Use. Open stands shall be used by the different drivers on a first come, first served basis. The driver shall pull up to the open stand from the rear and shall advance forward as the taxicab ahead pull off. Drivers shall stay within five feet of their taxicabs; they shall not solicit passengers or engage in loud or boisterous talk while at an open stand. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as preventing a passenger from boarding the taxicab of his choice that is parked at an open stand.
SECTION 22-25: CALL BOX STANDS - ESTABLISHMENT - USE.
(a) Establishment. The Chief of Police is hereby authorized and empowered to establish call box stands upon the streets of Sonora, Texas, in such places as in its discretion he deems proper. A holder desiring to establish a call box stand shall make written application to the Chief of Police. The applicant must attach to the application the written approval of the abutting property owners of said stand consenting to the creating of such stand. Upon filing of the application, the Police Department shall make an investigation of the traffic conditions at

arrangements, memoranda, or other writings relating to the furnishing of taxicab service to any hotel, theater, hall, public resort, railway station or other place of public gathering, whether such arrangement is made with the holder or any corporation, firm or association with which the holder may be interested or connected. Failure to file such copies within seven (7) days shall be sufficient cause for the revocation of a certificate of any offending holder or the cancellation of any taxicab stand privileges.
SECTION 22-30: ADVERTISING. Subject to the rules and regulations prescribed by the Chief of Police, it shall be lawful for any person owning or operating a taxicab or motor vehicle for hire to permit advertising matter to be affixed to or installed in or on such taxicab or motor vehicles for hire; provided, however, no such advertising matter shall interfere with the driver's vision or project from the vehicle in such a manner as to be unsafe.
SECTION 22-31: POLICE DEPARTMENT - DUTY TO ENFORCE ORDINANCE. The Police Department of the City of Sonora is hereby given the authority and is instructed to watch and observe the conduct of holders and drivers operating under this ordinance. Upon discovering a violation of the Provisions of this ordinance, the Police Department shall report the same to the Chief of Police, which will order or take appropriate action.
SECTION 22-32: PENALTY. Any person who intentionally, knowingly, recklessly or with criminal negligence violates any provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).
SECTION 22-23; SEVERABILITY. Each of the provisions of this ordinance are severable, and if any provision shall be declared to be invalid, the remaining provisions shall not be affected but shall remain in full force and effect.
SECTION 22-34: REPEALING PROVISION. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Construction of a new tower and transmitter facility, scheduled to begin in May, will virtually double the coverage area of KCTV channel 8 of San Angelo.

When operational in September, the \$1.5 million facility will improve the station's signal in its current five-county area while expanding coverage into all or parts of 12 other counties.

"This facility has been in the planning stage several years," said Gil Schneider, KCTV General Manager. "We are proud that before long we will be able to provide the finest in viewing and service to a much greater part of Central West Texas."

Schneider explained that the facility will consist of a 1,400-foot tower located 24 miles southeast of San Angelo. A 95-foot antenna will be located on top of the tower with the transmitter housed at the base of the

Effective radiated power of the proposed installation will be 316,000 watts, seven times the current power. KCTV presently telecasts from 446-foot tower located at its studio site at 2800 Armstrong.

"Viewers in all directions from San Angelo will be able to receive significantly stronger signals," Schneider said.

Besides providing clearer viewing in Coke, Concho,

Runnels, Sterling and Tom Green Counties, the new facility will expand KCTV's coverage to include Brown, Coleman, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard and Sutton Counties. In addition, PORTIONS OF Crockett, Nolan, San Saba, Schleicher and Taylor Counties will be receiving the new signal.

"Along with transmitting a clear signal in areas formerly in KCTV's fringe," said Schneider, "the station will also expand its news programs to provide

local coverage to viewers in our new service area." An added feature of the new transmitter will be the VIR, or Vertical Interval Reference signal, which automatically controls the color on those sets equipped with VIR circuitry.

According to KCTV Chief Engineer Eddy Smith, VIR was introduced a few years ago as a means for broadcast stations to maintain correct color and tint levels from the control room to the receiving set.

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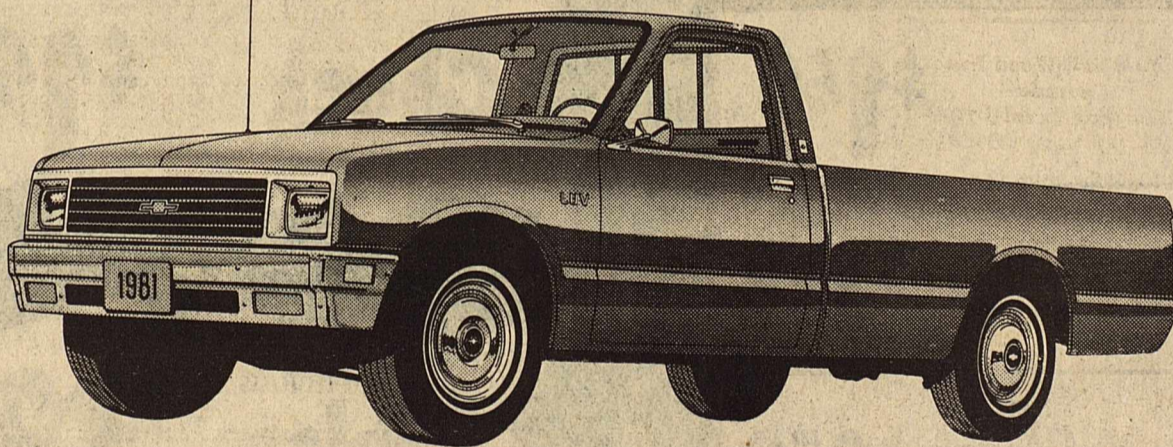
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
