Tickets for the banquet are available from Chamber of Commerce Directors. Tickets are \$8.50.

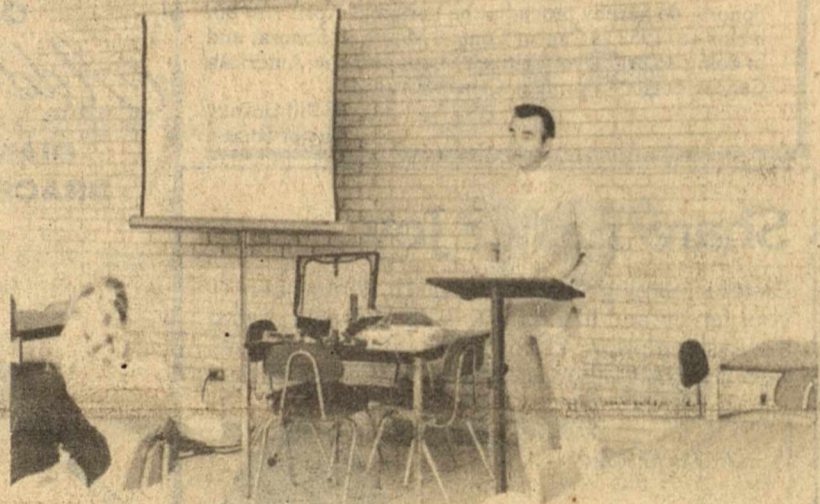

Sheriff Webster Holds Drug Abuse Program

"I feel sure that most kids in Sonora know how to go about getting drugs. IF they want to know," Sheriff Bill Webster said to a group of about forty in a drug abuse program Thursday night.

"We don't hear as much about the drug scene in the schools as we used to, but we most definitely have drugs in the community," Webster added.

Sheriff Webster stressed some of the ways a parent could tell if their child was using drugs and showed various paraphernalia.

"For example, if the child has been an A student, and suddenly

the grades start to drop, this could be a sign that the child might be using drugs," Webster said.

"An example of amphetamine use is that the child is nervous and jittery if not normally this way, eating habits change and the person is always on the go with very little rest," Webster added.

Sheriff Webster also showed the group drugs that had been seized in Sonora. The display included drugs in each of the groups of amphetamines, barbituates, hallucinogenics and marijuana.

"I mainly try to stress to parents of junior high and high school

students that knowing the kids friends and knowing where they are are very important in the battle against drugs," Webster said.

Webster said that the drugs have reduced in the schools in the past few years, but there is still a problem in the community.

"Four or five years ago, we dealt mostly with marijuana use in Sonora. Now we see marijuana and amphetamines in the general public.

Webster also showed the film "Facts Everyone Needs To Know" which dealt with the health hazards of drug use.

Blood is a vital medicine- a life giving substance which can only come from healthy human beings.

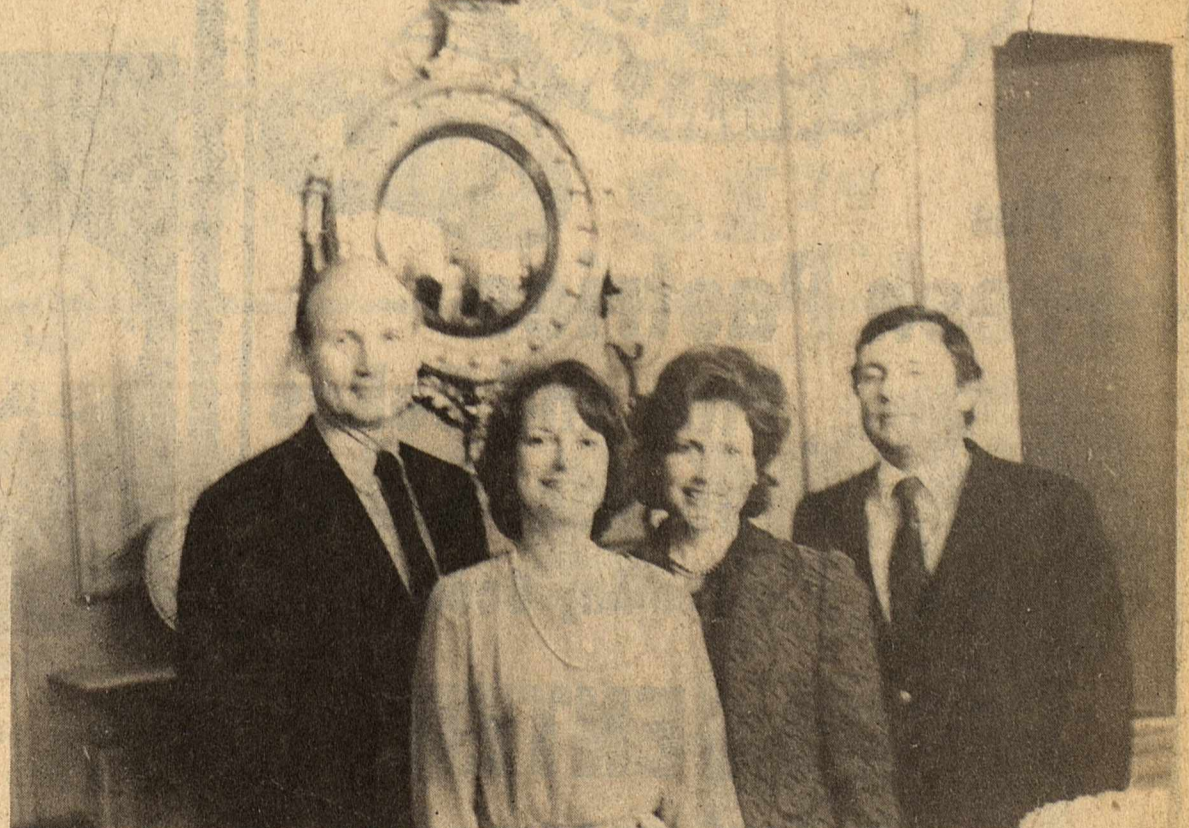

RRC Approves Water Project In East Texas

The Railroad Commission approved a cooperative waterflood project in the East Texas Field on Monday. Participating companies hope to recover an estimated 423,000 barrels of oil as a result of the project.

Hunt Oil Company and Placid Oil Company will inject a mixture of fresh water and a polymer into the Woodbine Formation from Leases they hold in

Rusk County. The project will include four Hunt Oil Company leases and one Placid Oil Company lease.

In theory, the addition of a polymer to the water used in conventional waterflooding techniques increases the amount of oil recovered from a reservoir.

Operators must have the approval of the Railroad Commission to conduct waterflood recovery projects in Texas.

Export Trading Companies

Tens of thousands of small and medium-sized companies in this country currently produce goods and services which are competitive overseas. But these companies have not entered the foreign markets in large part due to their unfamiliarity with foreign customs, language, and laws, and the tremendous costs and risk involved in developing overseas markets.

Legislation is currently being considered in the Congress to increase U.S. exports through the formation of export trading companies which would serve as export intermediaries for U.S. companies.

I believe this legislation projects a concept whose time has come. Export trading companies can tap this potential export resource by providing the full range of export services and functions to these companies. By diversifying trade risks and achieving economies of scale in export trade services, export trading companies can link sellers with buyers overseas.

Proposed legislation would allow bank participation in and ownership of export trading companies under strictly regulated conditions. Allowing banks to play a role in export trading companies will provide the financial resources and expertise that will be essential ingredients to the success of export trading companies.

In addition, the pending proposals direct the Export-Import Bank to provide loan guarantees to export trading companies, when the private credit market is inadequate, and requires the Secretary of Commerce to promote the formation and operation of export trading companies.

This legislative thrust is the first in over a decade aimed at giving American business major new tools to penetrate and expand export markets abroad. We are all aware of the great influence and success, for example, of Japan and other foreign countries which market their goods in this country. In addition to helping seasoned exporters to do even better, we expect export trading companies to encourage many small and medium-sized companies to enter the export market for the first time.

Already, we are seeing the early stages of this adventurous new thinking in the 21st Congressional District. I have been working with San Antonio officials to have the city designated a Foreign Trade Zone. That move will ultimately benefit the economy of the region as well as provide an outlet for local development.

If they become a reality, export trading companies will combine the products, skills and resources of several U.S. companies to enhance their own capabilities and those of their clients. The legislation is designed to attract producers of goods and services, banks, export management companies, freight forwarders and other export service businesses into an effective joint effort to develop foreign markets.

The Japanese offer a good example how export trading companies can be highly successful. Two-thirds of Japan's exports are handled by trading companies. And Japan is not alone among our industrialized trading partners in making use of specialized export entities. West Germany, France and Hong Kong do likewise.

The major share of U.S. exports come from large firms. Consider this: Only one percent of U.S. firms account for 80 percent of U.S. exports. We need a mechanism to stimulate and train our smaller firms in the export skills their foreign competitors have learned. In the long run, seeking ways to sell more of our products abroad will benefit all Americans as we revitalize our economy, restore confidence in our ingenuity, and develop a new prosperity for the decade of the 1980s.

A Letter to the Patients of Charles F. Browne, M.D.:

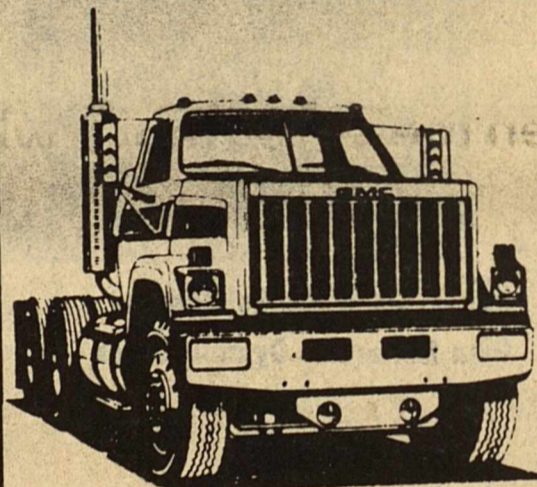

Public Notice

Homeowners who are 65 years of age or older and failed to receive their school district homestead exemptions in 1979 have until April 30th of this year to do so. In this way, elderly homeowners will be able to take advantage of the tax freeze associated with the \$10,000 homestead exemption, said Don Wootan, chief appraiser for the Sutton County Appraisal District.

According to a law passed by the Special Session of the 67th Legislature, over-65 homeowners who qualified for the school homestead "tax freeze" in 1979, but did not apply for the limitation, may file an application with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which the home is located. Application must be made with Don Wootan before April 30, 1982.

To qualify for the tax limitation, on January 1, 1979 a homeowner must have satisfied these requirements:

- Be 65 years or older
- Own his home
- Use that home as his principal residence

The chief appraiser will consider all applications and notify each applicant before May 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the chief appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district's 1982 appraisal records. This entry will indicate the amount of tax the over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he been granted the \$5,000 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000 over-65 homestead exemption. No refunds of taxes paid will be given for 1979, 1980, or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayer's amount of homestead taxes paid may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain in effect as long as the homestead remains the same.

Gardening Tips

by Ruth Taylor

Plant your summer garden favorites as early as possible, when danger of frost is past. Early planting will reduce summer insect problems, and if you get caught by a late frost, there will still be plenty of growing season left to plant again. Vegetables such as beets, lettuce, radishes, carrots and spinach should already be in the ground. These are seldom hurt by late frost.

Set out tomatoes and bell peppers only when you are certain warm weather has arrived. In about two weeks transplant egg plant and plant okra seeds. Soak okra

seeds overnight in water to hasten germination. If you didn't divide and replant iris and chrysanthemums last fall, do it now to get in as much growth as possible before hot weather.

It is still a little early to plant caladium bulbs, but they can be started now in pots and transplanted in a month or two.

Now is the time for grafting of pecan trees and transplanting fig trees and others.

The earlier you plant onions, the larger the plants will be at the onset of bulb formation. Big plants make big bulbs. When

choosing onion sets, choose the smaller sets because you will get more onion plants per bunch. Larger sets tend to bolt.

Looking over notes from last year, I see that the most productive, disease free, and easiest to grow vegetable in this writer garden was Parsnips. For those of you who like them, by all means plant them! Parsnip seeds are slow to germinate so plant a few radishes in the same row so you won't forget they are there. You can leave them in the ground all winter and dig them as you need them.

projects, motor development activities. In addition, the school age children will have cooking and sewing classes, croquet, etc.

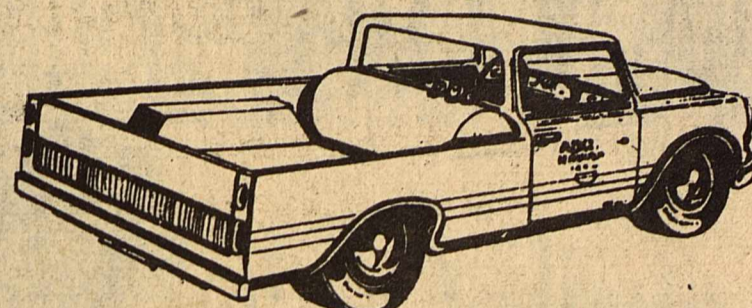

A membership drive was held in February at which time 6 memberships were added to the rolls.

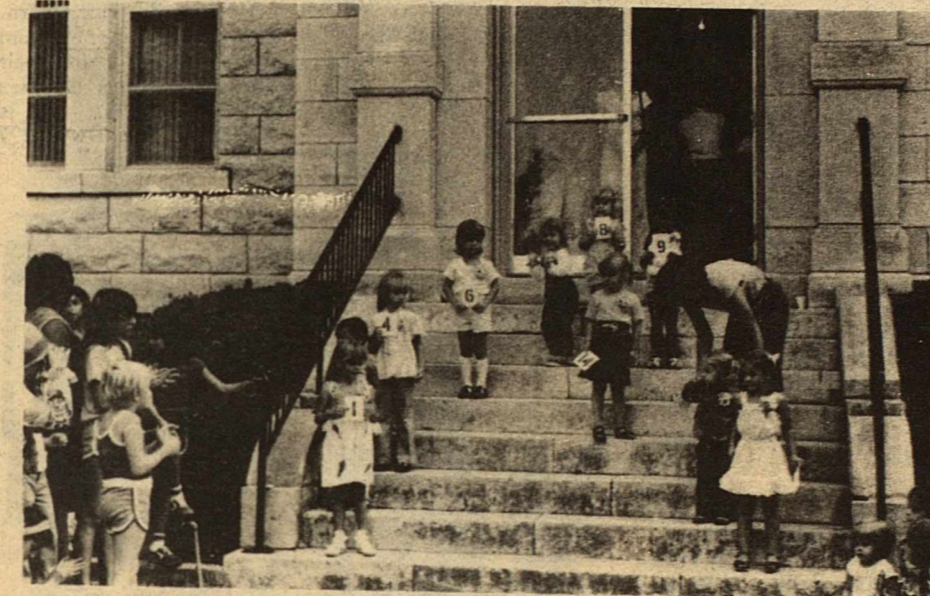
All in all, the 1981-82 year was a busy one for the Chamber of Commerce.

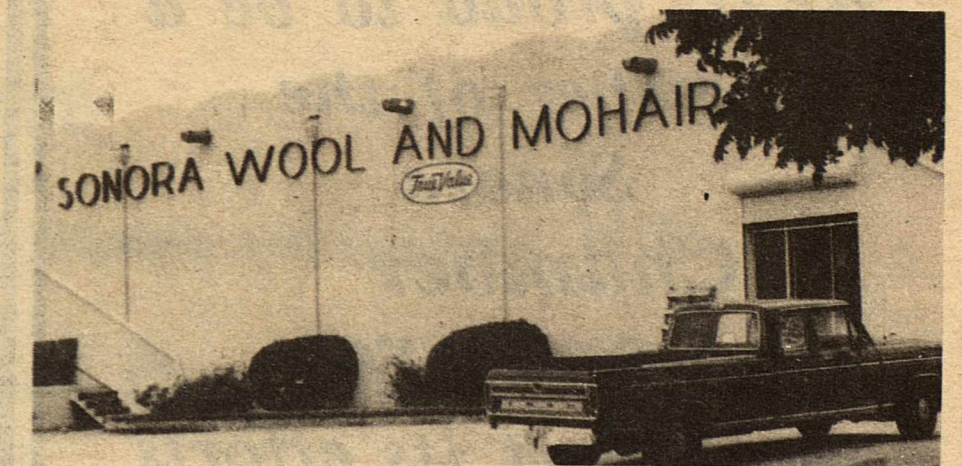

conditions of service.

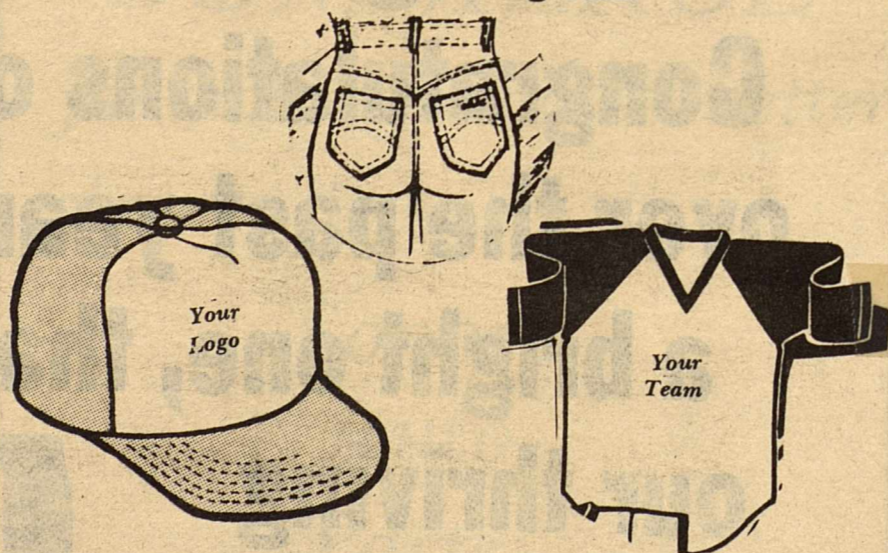
