Gardening Tips

The average garden vegetables or flower can manage to grow without regular feeding or cultivation, and even survive several insect attacks, but let it go dry for even a short time, and growth is severely stunted, or the plant dies.

Water applied to only the top inch of soil is practically wasted because it evaporates before the plants can use it. The best way to conserve soil moisture is mulching. A two inch mulch of grass clippings, straw or dry leaves can cut water loss due to evaporation by as much as fifty percent. Mulching will insulate the soil against hot sun and drying winds. It also eliminates rain compacted soil that keeps oxygen from penetrating the root zone.

Mulches not only prevent water loss, they can actually cause moisture to be added to the soil. Moisture in the warm air enters the porous mulch and condenses when the air comes in contact with the cooler soil surface. Research shows that when air is 100 degrees, a three inch mulch can keep the soil underneath 25 degrees cooler. You can save on weeding by using a mulch. If you are not using a mulch, the weeds will keep you very busy in the hot summer. Weeds always rob valuable plants of the water and nutrients necessary for them to live.

Slugs will really love your garden if you use a mulch. They can hide during the day in the mulch so they have less distance to travel to feast on your plants at night. These creatures are relatives of the snail, only they do not have a hard shell. These slimy creatures range in size from 1/2 to 8 inches long. They are brown and tan and have

two antennae sticking out of their front end. They are hearty eaters on all cole plants, such as cabbage and kale. They love any very young plant, beans, cucumbers, or squash.

There are various ways to control slugs, all of which are very easy. The one I write about most, and works for me is to trap them in any container filled with beer and drown them!

Many of the vegetable plants planted over four to six weeks should be fertilized now. If using a mulch, use a water soluble fertilizer. If not, use either a water soluble or granular fertilizer. Sprinkle granular fertilizer in a row along the row of plants, or around individual plants, such as tomatoes or peppers. Always water granular fertilizer immediately.

If you like cucumbers, but can't afford the garden space for them, try growing these ramblers on a fence. A simple wooded frame built with 2 x 4's anchored in the ground with chicken wire stretched across it will do. Plant a double row of cucumber seed below the fence and watch them grow. Cucumbers love hot weather and more water than most vegetables. Keep well watered and pick the fruit when young.

Plant your sweet potatoes between the tomato row. During the long hot summer you can have a living mulch for your tomato patch and produce just as many sweet potatoes to harvest just before frost. Lettuce also thrives in the shade of tomatoes during hot weather. Intensive planting in a well fertilized plot requires less watering and produces more vegetables since less soil is exposed to the high temperatures of the long hot summer.

Ranchers Most Likely To Survive Will Be Those With Best Management

Ranchers who will most likely survive the next 10 years will probably be those with the best ranch management and organization, a rancher and former superintendent of the Southern Great Plains Field Station said here recently.

E. H. "Pat" McIlvain of Woodward, Ok., discussed ranching in the '80's at the Texas Animal Agriculture Conference at Texas A&M University.

"Ranches that have the best chance to survive will be those that have little or no need for large capital expenditures, a high equity in land and cattle, useful income from minerals or off-ranch work, and a highly skilled management team that can adapt to changing needs," McIlvain said.

He also emphasized that marketing expertise will become more important

and market faster and more efficiently, he said.

Beef producers need a more uniform product in a shorter time to be able to compete," McIlvain said. "There is nothing wrong with a 700 pound calf at weaning time," he said, "and it can be done."

Operating efficiency is a real key to survival in ranching. Ranchers need to face the fact that people are turning away from beef because the poultry and pork industries produce

The second important criterion for range management is a keen appreciation and economical concept of the value of gain per head.

"Basically, this boils down to the fact that each animal must show a profit," the rancher said.

Proposed Federal Rule Would Destroy Cooperation Herd Owners

Proposed federal rule changes relating to brucellosis "will destroy cooperation of Texas herd owners," Commissioners of the Texas Animal Health Commission have warned U.S. Department of Agricultural officials.

USDA proposals, TAHC Commissioners believe, would create undue hardships on this state's cattle producers in their efforts to control brucellosis. "The proposed rules will destroy cooperation of Texas herd

owners because of their rigid and overly regulatory tone," John B. Armstrong, Kingsville, Chairman, TAHC, noted in a letter to USDA.

The federal proposals, if adopted, would significantly alter basic tenets of the Texas brucellosis program in these areas: vaccination, individual herd plans, the role of the epidemiologist in dealing with individual producers, and use of the card test as a screening tool only in locating infection. Commissioners also said it would appear "unthinkable" for the proposed federal regulation not to provide for an administrative review of an individual's situation.

taken despite the administration's budget message to increase vaccination and in complete disregard of the recommendations of the National Brucellosis Technical Commission," the letter stated.

Regarding individual herd plans, the Commissioners noted in the letter: "The Texas program is based on individual herd plans designed under supervision of trained epidemiologists to meet scientific criteria but be flexible and reasonable according to a cowman's operating conditions. The rigid language in the proposed CFR (code of federal regulations) would severely limit this flexibility."

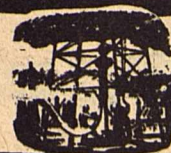

Permits Granted For Texas Pipelines

Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that 25 permits to operate new pipelines in Texas were granted by the RRC in April 1982. Through the first four months of this year, the

Commission has granted 51 permits to operate new lines. For the same period last year, 44 permits were approved.

Seventeen of the permits in April were for gathering pipelines, four were for

trunk transmission lines, and four were for multi-purpose lines or lines moving other materials.

Gathering lines bring oil and gas from production leases, while a trunk transmission line is a larger

diameter line into which smaller lines connect.

Twenty-two of the newly-permitted lines will transport gas, while two will move salt water and another will transport crude oil.

Gas utility pipelines accounted for 12 of the permits last month. Eleven were for private lines and two were for common carrier lines.

In April, ten permits

were granted for lines in Southeast Texas, six for deep South Texas, four for East Texas, two for the San Angelo area, and one each for West Central Texas, East Central Texas and the San Antonio area.

Gathering lines approved: Wellhead Ventures Corp., Kingswood, gas, Grimes County (two lines); Tejas Gas Corp., Corpus Christi, gas, Duval County; Seagull Pipeline Corp., Houston,

gas, Webb County; Stanley H. Rosenthal, Bay City, crude, Matagorda County (three lines-one each for crude, gas, and salt water); W. C. Gas And Oil Discoveries Up This Year

Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that Texas operators reported 126 gas and 57 oil discoveries in April 1982.

One year ago, 117 gas and 37 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in the fourth month of the year included 40 in deep South Texas, 35 in the Refugio area, 15 in Southeast Texas, 13 in West Central Texas, nine in East Central Texas, five in East Texas, three in San Angelo area,

two each in North Texas and the Panhandle, and one each in the San Antonio and Midland areas.

Oil discoveries included 12 in deep South Texas, 10

in Southeast Texas, nine in North Texas, five each in Refugio, San Angelo, and East Texas, four in the Midland area, three in the Panhandle, and two each in

the San Antonio and Lubbock areas.

Through the first four months of this year, there have been 511 gas and 186 oil discoveries throughout the state. For the same

period last year, there were 404 gas and 221 oil discoveries.

In April, operators reported 367 exploratory and field tests would end up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas test totaled 2,402 in April compared with 3,359 in the same period of 1981.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back, and for service wells in April amounted to 2,767 against 3,585 a year earlier.

Operators filed 898 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 811 amended requests.

New Procedure Approved

A new procedure for calculating allowables for one-well prorated gas fields approved by the Railroad Commission will save oil and gas operators and the Commission significant time and money. The new method will go into effect June 1.

The form G-7, a forecast of production and disposition of gas well gas, will no longer be required for one-well prorated gas fields. Roland Childress, assistant director of production allocation for the Commission's Oil and Gas Division, estimates an annual savings of \$97,704 to the industry and \$29,064 to the Commission

as a result of the elimination of 4,071 forms filed each month by operators statewide. The new fully automated method will also save the Commission time during a critical period each month when gas allowables must be calculated.

Allowables for the one-well gas fields will be equal to the volume of deliverability is the volume of gas produced by a well in a 24 hour test period. Allowables for fields which are overproducing or underproducing will be adjusted according to a formula developed as part of the new procedure.

The Commission now assigns allowables in the affected fields based on a comparison of the nominations or purchases filed by gatherers and the forecasts filed by producers on the form G-7. The complicated formula requires manual auditing, keying, and processing of forms and a series of automated calculations.

According to Childress, in addition to saving time and money, the new method will continue to insure operators an ample allowable, while meeting market demand.

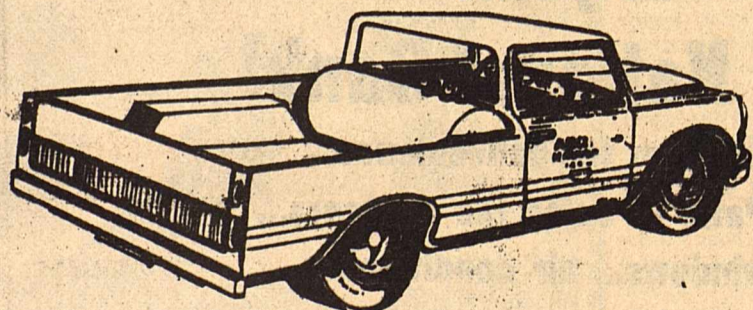

Railroad Commission Changes Procedures

The Railroad Commission has changed, on an

emergency basis, its procedures for approving motor carrier rate applications based on changes in fuel costs.

A periodic survey of fuel prices, covering a representative number of locations across the state, is being conducted by the Commission. The survey will include diesel and gasoline prices at both bulk and pump prices.

Fuel adjustment charges will not be set on fuel prices higher than those in the most current fuel price survey unless the applicant can show that lower prices are not available.

Another provision of the amendment will allow the Commission to reduce fuel adjustment charges over which it has continuing jurisdiction to the price levels in the most current survey, if necessary. Normal notice and hearing procedures would be followed before any final action would be taken.

The emergency changes also state that fuel adjustment charges may not be increased based only on fuel price levels reflected in any price survey conducted by the Commission.

A hearing to determine if existing fuel adjustment charges should be changed to reflect recent decreases in fuel prices has been set by the Commission for 1:30 p.m. on Monday, May 24, in Rm. 107 of the Railroad Commission building at 1124 S. IH 35 in Austin.

Since the beginning of our country, over 200 years ago, people have viewed the United States as a country very rich in natural resources-in fact, almost unlimited. This may have been true 100 years ago, but today, the United States has discovered that some of its natural resources have been dangerously depleted. We do have limits, and it seems that we have reached them. Two of the most serious problems facing our country are the diminishing supplies of unpolluted water and soil.

Water pollution occurs when man dumps wastes into rivers, lakes, oceans, or other bodies of water. These wastes, including human and animal wastes, chemicals, metals, and oil, upset the natural processes in water and it becomes polluted. Such water may look dirty, smell bad, and contain germs or chemicals that can cause disease. This water is unfit for use by plants, animals, or human beings, who need it to live. All life processes-from taking in food to getting rid of wastes-require water. Water is also used in homes, for irrigation, industry, power, transportation, and recreation. Without water which is clean and unpolluted, there is no life.

Soil also plays an important role in our lives. It covers most of the land surface of the earth and is made up of rock and minerals, mixed with living things and their remains. It is one of the most important natural resources of any country, in that when the soil becomes unable to grow good crops, not enough food can be produced to feed the people. As a result, the strength of the nation declines. Our soil is being eroded every day by wind and rain water, because of the increased amount of open soil. Not only that, our soil is being polluted by too many fertilizers and pesticides. If this keeps up, the soil will soon be unfit for farming, which would greatly weaken our country.

Although some conservation measures have been taken, they aren't nearly enough to solve the problems. The American population needs to give widespread support of soil and water conservation mea-
