Bernardo Cervantes was nominated for student-of-the-week by teacher Jan Thieman, for his friendly, courteous, hardworking attitude.

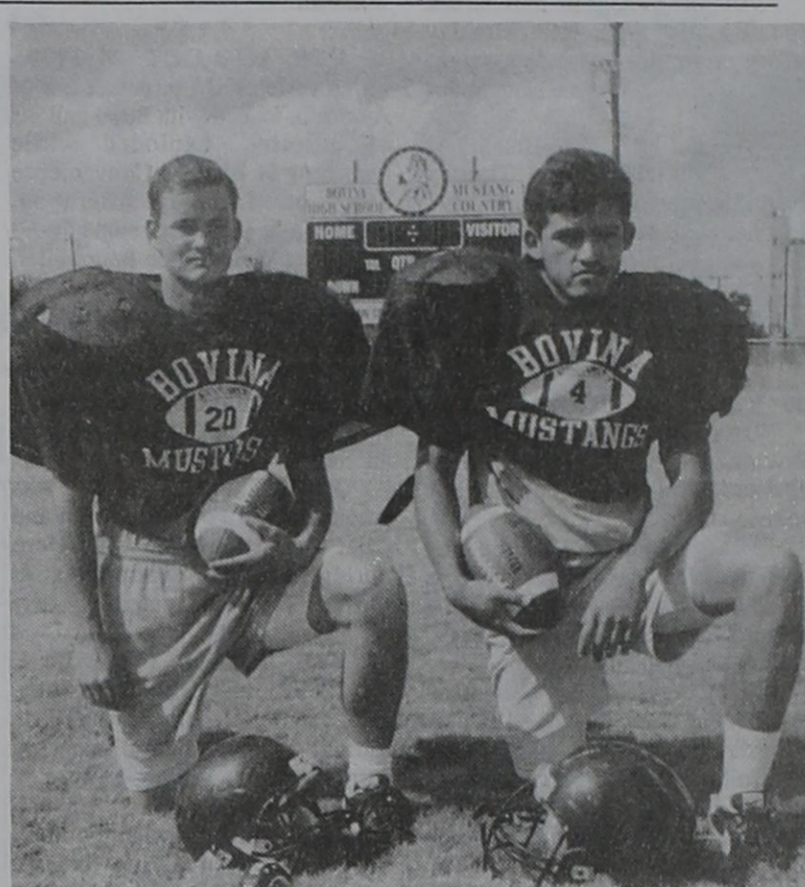
Cervantes is a senior at BHS, and a nose guard/tackle on the varsity Mustang squad.

He is the son of Bernardo and Ernestina Cervantes and has attended Bovina schools since the third grade.

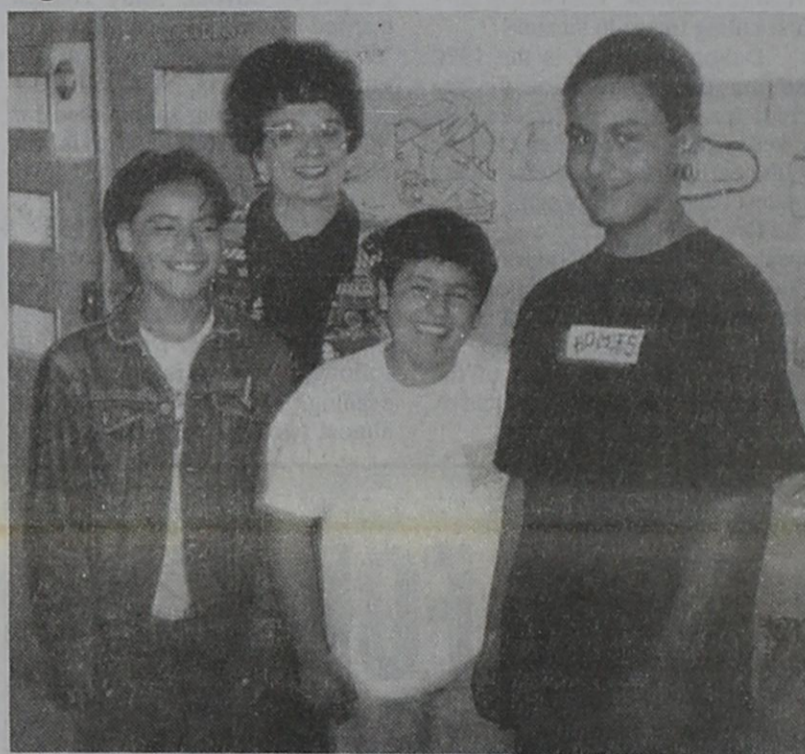
He participates in FFA, has a sister, Ernestina, in the 7th grade, and is undecided on attending college.

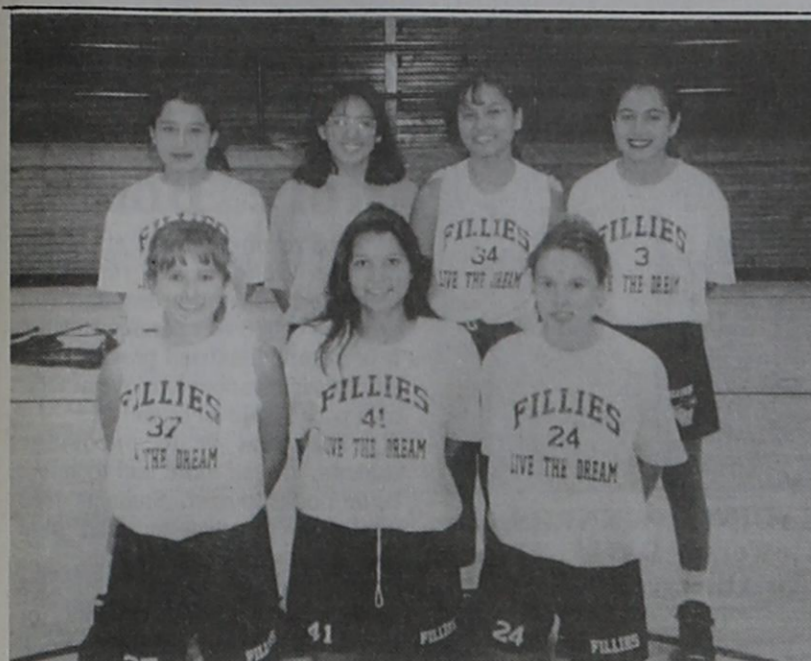
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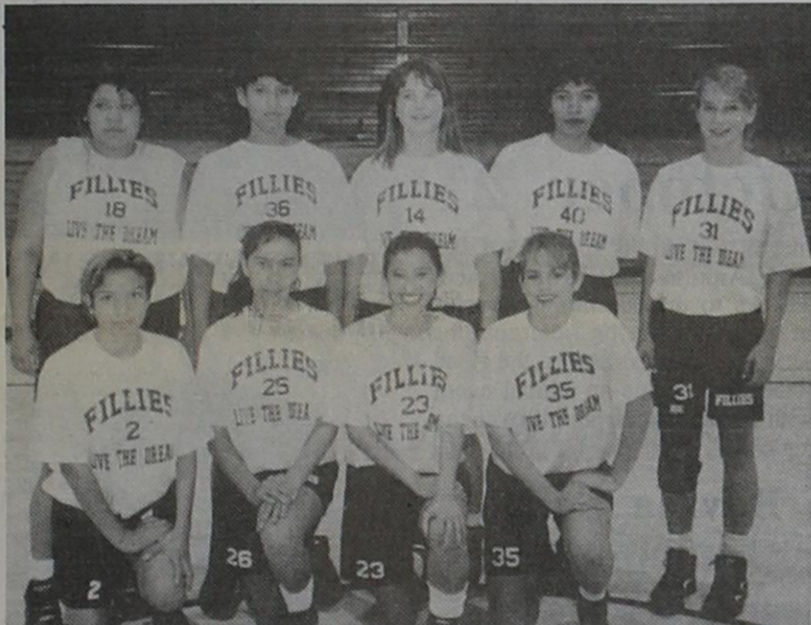

October 11 Is Deadline For Sorghum Board Seat

Texas producers who grow grain sorghum have until October 11 to place their name on the ballot to run for a seat on the Texas Grain Sorghum Board. Anyone who produces grain sorghum in Texas or who owns a farm in Texas on which sorghum is produced, is eligible to vote in the election or to serve as a director on the board.

The fifteen member board administers the checkoff funds which are collected on grain sorghum grown in the state. An

assessment of 20 cents per ton is collected and used to fund programs for research, insect and disease control, education and promotion of Texas grain sorghum.

Members of the Texas Grain Sorghum Board represent every grain sorghum producing region in Texas. Under the assessment program, the state is divided into five districts, with each district having three representatives to the board. Directors are elected for terms of up to six years.

In this year's election, five directors will be elected to the board: one each from the West Texas district, the Central Texas district, the Panhandle district, the Coastal district and the Valley district.

To be listed on the ballot, a prospective director must submit a nomination form certifying that he or she resides in the district to be represented and will be willing to serve if elected. The nomination form must be signed by the nominee and ten other eligible voters who also reside in the district the person is seeking to represent. The forms may be obtained from the Texas Grain Sorghum Board office by calling (806) 298-4501. Deadline for returning the completed form is October 11.

Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters. Ballots can also be obtained from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service county offices and from local grain elevators. To be counted in the election, ballots must be mailed to the TGSB office, postmarked no later than midnight November 17.

Looking Up!

The first three verses of the Bible are powerful statements! Consider Genesis 1:1; "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." It is powerful because it is a simple faith statement. There is no attempt to prove God, but only a humble acceptance of his existence.

Every world view can ultimately be boiled down to a faith proposition. Everyone has faith. The important question is, "In whom (or what) have I put my faith?" A second question is, "Is whom (or what) I have placed my faith in, adequate to meet my needs for now, death, and eternity?"

Genesis 1:1 speaks of the eternity of God. "In the beginning, God....", or "When the beginning came about, God already existed!" God has always been. God simply is. "In the beginning (time), God created the heavens (space) and the earth (matter)."

Interestingly, in this statement of creation, the Hebrew noun for God (Elohim) is masculine and plural, while the verb for create is a masculine, singular form.

Perhaps the writer is hinting of the doctrine of the Trinity, i.e. that God is triune, yet one, in his being. Dr. Clyde T. Francisco, in *The Broadman Commentary*, states, "Out of this later doctrine of the Trinity will logically develop. Here are the roots, not the full grown concept."

"Bara", the verb meaning "create" in Genesis 1:1, is never applied in Scripture to anyone other than God. Only God can "bara." Man can make or rearrange out of pre-existing materials, but only God can create "ex nihilo," out of nothing.

As the writer of Hebrews so eloquently states, "By faith we understand that the universe was formed at God's command, so that

what is seen was not made out of what was visible." (NIV). God said....and it was so.

Have you ever noticed the strong parallel between the Genesis account of the Creation and the whole biblical concept of re-creation (salvation) in Christ Jesus? Apostle Paul picks up on this in 2 Corinthians 5:17, "If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation..."

For example, Genesis 1:2 is a good spiritual description of the sinner's heart before salvation. "Now the earth was formless and empty, and darkness was over the surface of the deep" (NIV). Is not a person without Christ lost in deep sin and spiritual darkness, and is not his/her life without purpose and meaning? Does that describe your soul?

Thankfully, as in the Creation story, God's Spirit is not far away, and he is already at work in the sinner's life to bring him/her to true salvation! "The spirit of God was hovering over the waters."

"Hovering" implies rapid motion. Thus, God's Spirit is the Prime Mover of the Universe, the Great Life-giving Agent of God, the Eternal Energizer of all Creation, and likewise of the human heart! The Holy Spirit is close at hand to convict the lost sinner of sin and of his/her need of Christ! (See John 16:8-11).

Note, now, Genesis 1:3, "And God said, 'Let there be light,' and there was light." Pretty awesome, huh? The Apostle Paul summarized this whole analogy between Creation and salvation in 2 Corinthians 4:6: "For God, who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness,' made his light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ."

Have you let God flip on your switch?

Combust Introduces His Own Farm Bill

Congressman Larry Combust told newsmen from his area this week that he has introduced his own farm program in the U.S. House of Representatives, and is lobbying fellow congressmen for their support.

Rep. Combust, in one of his "conference calls" to local newsmen in his district, said the bill he was sponsoring is modeled considerably like the farm program that will be expiring in 1996.

"We're spending less than half the tax money on agriculture today than we were in 1986. I think the present bill is just what the farmers need for the most part," he said, pointing to cotton as a good example of how the market demand has grown to where farmers get a fair price for their crops.

Combust said that the Sugar Alliance had come together and worked out agreements that would help their industry. "Our current sugar program returns several billion dollars to the government each year. It is a non-cost item," he told the newsmen.

The area legislator said he had already received backing for his farm bill from several representatives from across the South and Midwest. "I'll try to do

the absolute best I can for my farmers for the next seven-year period. He explained that the Republicans had set a seven-year goal for solving the nation's money problems.

On welfare reform, Combust said the Republicans are pushing for "Medicare Plus," which will offer senior citizens more assistance than they are currently receiving.

"We're going to provide more options to Seniors than they have under the present Medicare. We're also greatly concerned about rural hospitals, who have been hurt by the old program. We want our program to work with the rural hospitals better than before," he stated.

The congressman added that the GOP party would introduce a "Medisave Program," which will allow senior citizens to buy a highly deductible "savings policy." They would contribute to such a policy, and when their savings account reaches 60% of the policy amount, they can take the rest of the money out and use it for whatever purpose they wish to," he explained. "It would be a tax-deductible medical savings program," he concluded.

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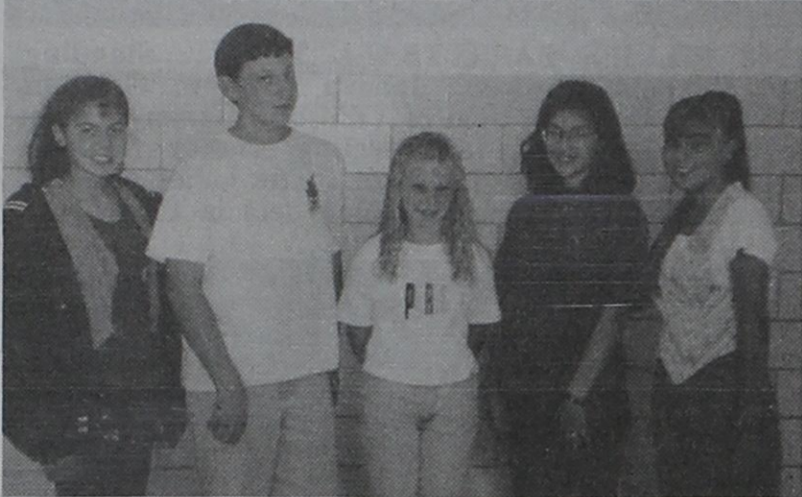

Bovina Kids Reading More Books

The reading classes at Bovina Middle School are using a computerized reading management program called Accelerated Reader. It is an individualized program that allows each student to move at their own pace and level of ability.

The goal is to encourage students to read more and to select better books to read. Students need motivation to select and read good books that stretch their minds.

Accelerated Reader provides motivation to read in a variety of ways. The student chooses a book from the school library book list. Each book is identified as to reading level and level of difficulty, and has a point value based on these two factors.

After reading a book, the student takes a test on a computer. The test measures the student's comprehension of the book. Points are earned based on the point value of the book and their score on the test.

Points earned by students can then be traded in for such items as pencils, folders, gift certificates, cameras, or cassette players.

Middle School Principal Brenda Wilson says, "What we want to do is get them reading, even if for only 2-8 minutes per day. Once a child gets 'hooked' on reading, the rest of the program is easier".

As a result of the new Accelerated Reading Program, there is a whole lot of reading going on at Bovina Middle School.

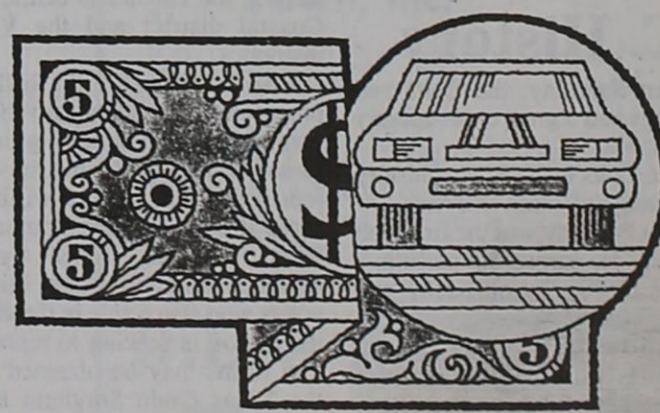

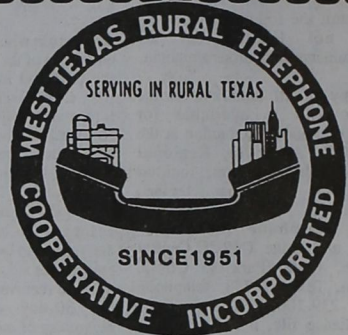
