Top bullfighter due to appear

Rick Chatman, one of the top PRCA bullfighters, will be appearing in Sonora with the PRCA Rodeo scheduled for August 26-27.

Since the early 1920's when Bullriding became a standard rodeo event, the Clowns and Bullfighters have been an exciting and integral part of the show. Rick Chatman, redefines the meaning of excitement. We invite you to study the work of this young Texas as he protects the Bullriders. There is none better. Rick's ability to take an angry bull away from a cowboy on the ground has, in his short professional career, become legend. His athletic ability, his dedication to a rigid program of physical conditioning, his seemingly fearless attitude and his friendly, open personality have made Rick one of the most popular people in the world of rodeo.

Rick's bullfighting style has taken him to the top of his profession. At the close of 1979, his rookie year in the PRCA, he was voted Clown of the Year by the Bullriders in the Lone Star Circuit. When the time came for the top Bullriders in the nation to select the Bullfighters for the 1980 National Finals Rodeo, Rick had proven himself so capable that he was elected to fight bulls at "The World Series of Rodeo". Although this fulfilled one of Rick's personal goals, the magnitude of the achievement is intensified by the fact that Rick was the first Bullfighter ever to be chosen for the NFR in only his second year in the PRCA. 1981 saw Rick fighting bulls at such top notch rodeos as San Antonio, Texas; Phoenix, Arizona and Little Rock, Arkansas; and, for the fifth consecutive year, was the Bullfighter at The American Junior Rodeo Association Finals at Snyder, Texas.

Additionally, he was one of the ten top Bullfighters selected to complete in the Wrangler Bullfighting Championships and was one of the six finalists to compete for the World title at the Wrangler Championships in Oklahoma City. To make a good year even better, he was chosen to fight bulls at The 1981 National Finals Rodeo, the first Bullfighter to ever be elected by the Bullriders to go to back to back Finals.

Watch for a black and yellow blur in the arena during Bullriding at this year's rodeo. That will be Rick Chatman as he excites and entertains you with his quick, aggressive and distinctive style. We are sure that you will agree that Rick Chatman's reputation as "one of the best in the business" is richly deserved.

Board set rates, award bids

Lunch prices were set for the Sonora schools during the regular session of the ISD board of trustees Tuesday night, August 9.

Students grades kindergarten through fifth will pay 90 cents per day, grades six through 12 will pay 90 cents per day and adults will pay \$1.45 per day.

Elementary lunches will be up five cents and higher grades will be up 10 cents over last year's rates. The snack bar and reduced-price breakfasts and lunches will remain the same as last year.

Gandy's Dairies was awarded the bid to supply milk products to the district food services program for the 1983-84 school year with a unanimous vote Tuesday night and Holsum Bakery was awarded the bakery goods contract for the year, also unanimously.

A bid from Sam Price Pioneer Electronics in the amount of \$3,965 was accepted by the board for an audio system for the high school auditorium. James Bible, high school principal, told the board that the

speakers would be permanently installed in the wall, thus preventing a possible misuse or theft. He also stated that the sound quality would be improved.

None of the bids received on gasoline for the district's vehicle fleet, including school buses, were accepted and it was suggested that Pride Oil of Abilene be contacted for a bid.

Bids were received from Sonora-Ozona Oil Co., \$1.109 for regular and 1.059 for unleaded; Eddins-Walcher Co., \$1.102 for regular and 1.142 for unleaded; Griffin Oil Co., \$.994 for regular and 1.034 for unleaded; and Dono Oil Co., \$.97 for regular and 1.00 for unleaded.

However, because all contracts offered contained a clause stating that prices were subject to change. Therefore, the Board decided to contact Pride Oil of Abilene for a bid.

Following a discussion on the merits of spending local tax dollars locally versus saving all possible tax

dollars by purchasing out of the county, Dr. Johnny Fields moved to purchase each load of gasoline at the lowest bid and not to enter into a contract. The motion was seconded by Sam Perez and carried, with Carl Teaff voting against the motion.

First National Bank of Sonora was awarded the bid for the depository contract for 1983-85, biennium after bids from that bank and Sutton County National Bank were read aloud, item by item, by W.A. McAndrew, superintendent of SISD.

John Ingram, a member of the district's auditing firm, asked several questions of both banks' officers, A.W. Bishop and Ray Smith of Sutton County National, and Lea Roy Aldwell and Michael Hale of the First National.

At the conclusion of the explanatory period, the board asked for Ingram's opinion of the two bids submitted and he replied that he felt that the bid submitted by the First National Bank was the most advantageous to the district.

The motion to award the bid to First National was made by Scott Shurley and seconded by Sam Perez. Voting for the motion were Scott Shurley, Sam Perez and Kenneth Cayce and abstaining were Jimmy Condra, Dr. Johnny Fields, and Carl Teaff. Sammie J. Stewart was absent from the meeting.

Other items covered in the meeting included: A letter of information and bid submitted by Westbrook Electric Company on improving the electric service entrance at the stadium. After a brief discussion, the Board decided that there was no real problem at this time and the matter was tabled.

The status of the city's offer of three lots in the area of the old railroad depot was reported to the board. The current offer, a five-year lease at \$1 per year, was discussed. Carl Teaff suggested that the superintendent contact city officials with the offer of either a 99-year lease or outright donation, with the stipulation that if the district at some future date has no use for the property, it will revert back to city ownership. The board agreed by consensus and the superintendent was directed to report on the matter at a later meeting.

Following a general discussion of future building plans, the board expressed the desire to begin concentrating on public relations in the area of a future bond issue for construction of a new high school complex, and to request oil company representatives to meet with the citizens' advisory committee to explain the tax base and to help prepare a financial packet for the committee's use.

Current bills in the amount of \$92,547.98 were authorized for payment on motion of Sam Perez, a second by Kenneth Cayce, and unanimous approval.

Motion was made by Dr. Johnny Fields to amend the 1982-83 budget as presented to the board. He then made a motion to amend the 1982-83 revenue budget as the staff suggested. Both motions were seconded by Scott Shurley, and both carried by unanimous vote.

Authorization to pour a cement slab on the north side of the Middle School between the building and the existing sidewalk was granted on motion of Kenneth Cayce, a second by Dr. Johnny Fields, and carried unanimously. This will allow more solid playground space and will make building maintenance more effective in wet weather.

The superintendent was granted permission to conduct a sale of surplus property at the bus barn. The board suggested a Saturday in September, and that the sale be conducted by auction.

Approval of the media contract with Education Service Center Region XV at the cost of \$1.50 per ADA for the 1983-84 school year was granted on motion of

New financial service available

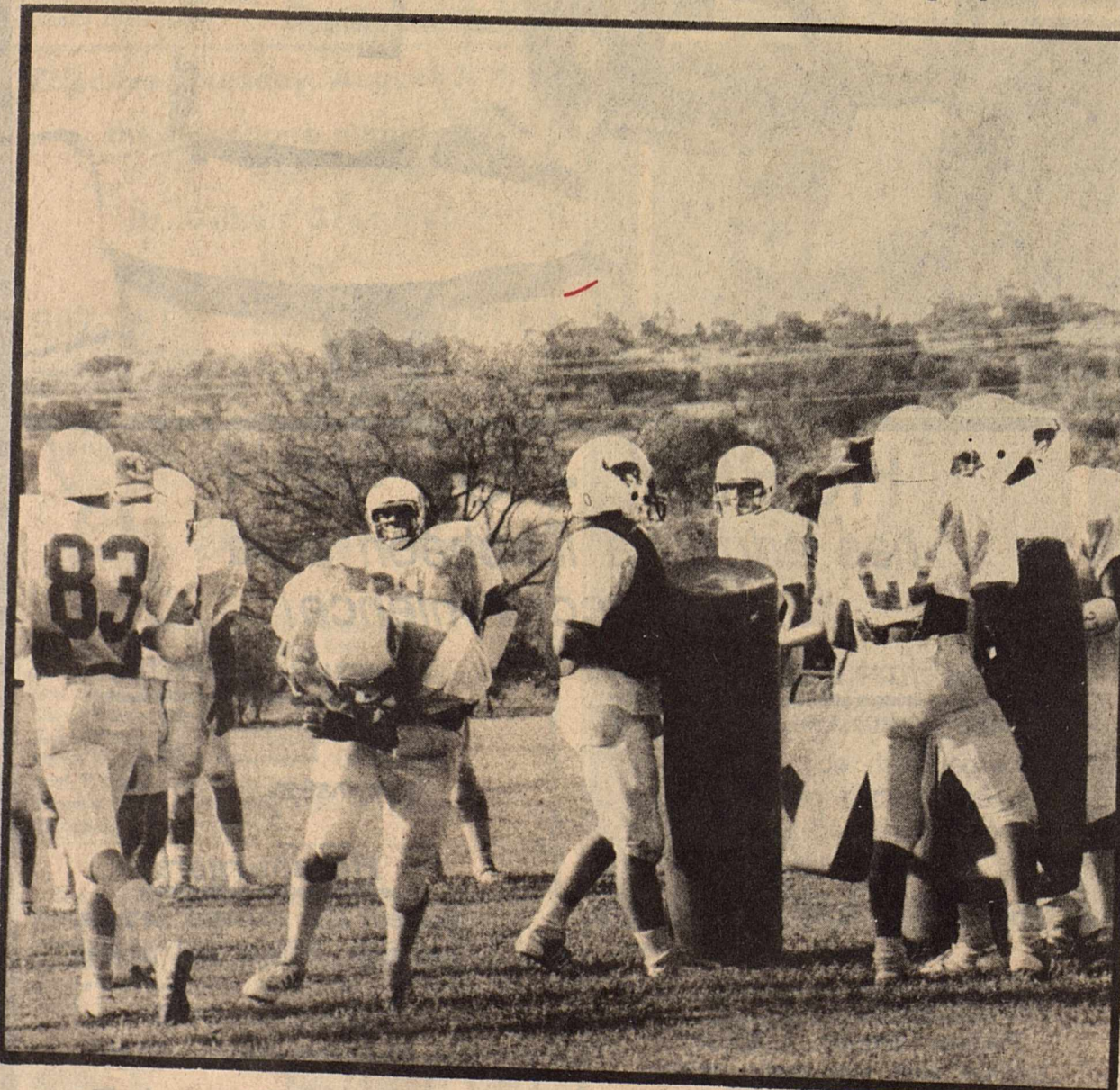
Lea Roy Aldwell, President of the First National Bank of Sonora, has announced a new financial service with the introduction of discount brokerage.

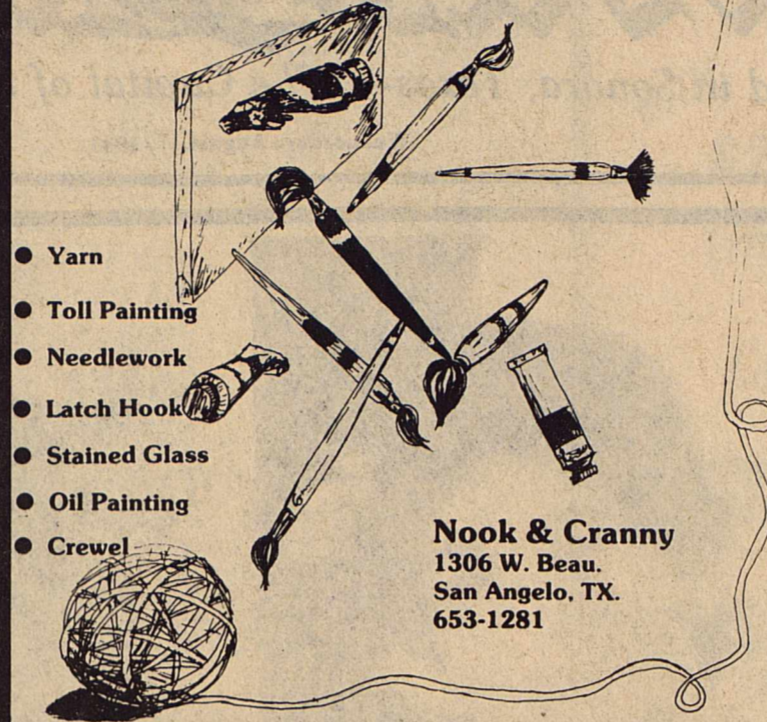

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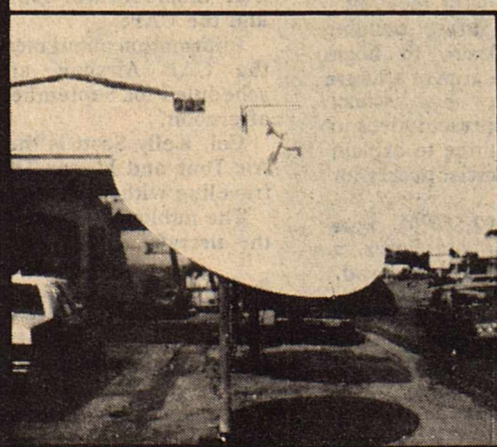

Think ahead . . . Inventory saves headaches

"An inventory is better than memory should you have a loss due to theft or damage from fire or flood," says Beverly Rhoades, consumer information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Without an up-to-date inventory, it's difficult to remember items, much less prove you owned them.

To prepare an inventory, list major items in each room with the serial numbers, purchase price, pre-

sent value and date of purchase, suggests Rhoades. Photograph each wall of each room with closet or cabinet doors open and label belongings

for a more complete inventory. Store your inventory and pictures in a safe place away from home and update as needed. Should a

loss occur, the inventory will assist you in settling insurance claims and verifying losses for income tax deductions, says the specialist.

Craig Hopper, a student at Sonora High School, is one of two members of the first place novice debate team during the West Texas State University Speech and Theatre Camp.



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Microwaves not always energy efficient

Microwave ovens have the advantage of speed, but are not always the most effective means of saving energy, says home economist Bonnie Piernot.

Microwave ovens are about 40 percent efficient in converting electrical energy into heat in food, while wasting little of that energy in heating the air around the food. Standard electric ovens are 14 percent efficient and gas ovens are 7 percent efficient in this same task.

"Since the microwave absorption of foods depends on their water and salt content, microwave cooking is not equally energy saving for all foods," states Piernot, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

According to the specialist, research shows the greatest energy savings when cooking small to medium quantities of concentrated foods such as meats, potatoes, desserts and TV dinners.

Foods such as corn, broccoli and similar vegetables require more energy to cook with microwave than with conventional electric surface units.

"For any normal sauce pan operation, the cooktop of an electrical range is as energy efficient, or more so, than the microwave oven," she adds.

Since the biggest advantage the microwave holds over conventional cooking is time, the choice of which appliance to use may be largely a matter of whether energy or time is more valuable to the consumer, Piernot says.

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Local regulations told

By Rodney Knight

The dove season in Sutton County will be divided into two main zones by IH-10. North of the interstate will be in the Central Zone. The season will be Sept. 1-Oct. 30, 1983, and Jan. 7-16, 1984. South of the interstate will be in the Rio Grande Zone. The season will be Sept. 17-Nov. 5, 1983, and Jan. 7-22, 1984.

The daily bag limit in both zones will be 12 doves, not to include more than two white-winged doves. Shooting hours will be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

During the special four-day white-winged dove season in the Rio Grande Zone, hunting for both mourning and white-winged doves will be allowed Sept. 3-4 and 10-11. West of Hwy. 277, the daily bag limit will be 10 whitewings and 12 mourning doves. East of Hwy 277, the daily bag limit will be 12 mourning doves and two whitewings for a total daily bag limit of 14 birds.

Shooting hours during the four-day whitewing season will be noon to sunset.

In the Rio Grande Zone, one fully-feathered wing must remain attached to the carcass of every dove taken by a hunter.

Statewide, any person taking or hunting whitewings is required to have a whitewing dove stamp in their possession in addition to a valid hunting license. Persons hunting doves in their county of residence are not required to have a hunting license.

Possession limits are twice the daily bag limits. If you have any questions, call 387-3068 or 387-5159.

Mare-Foal Clinic set

Stallions Unlimited at Brenham was the site of the 1983 South Central Texas Mare-Foal Clinic August 5th.

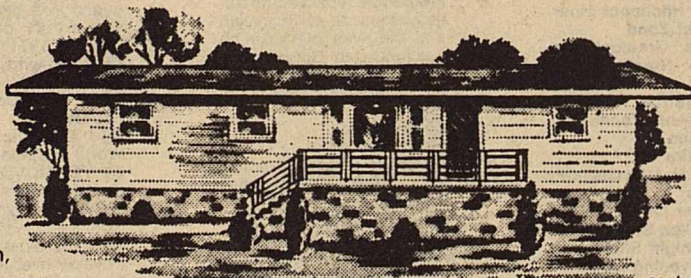

Dr. Johnny Fields, a second by Sam Perez, and unanimous approval.

Reports on the assessor-collector, the budgets, receipts, and a statement of funds were submitted to the board for their information.

Clay Cade, elementary principal, requested that the board permit the district to pay for coffee for teachers on all four campuses from the DeCoty Coffee Company. On motion of Sam Perez and a second by Carl Teaff, authorization to pay for coffee and supplies from DeCoty Coffee for teachers in the district was granted, with comment that since neither the local supplement nor the state base was increased this year, this small gesture would serve as a morale booster. The motion carried unanimously.

A resolution authorizing the Sutton County Appraisal District to divide the money received for the issuance of tax certificates among the taxing entities in the same proportion that the collections are financed by the entities, and depositing same at least once each year, was unanimously passed on motion of Scott Shurley and a second by Sam Perez.

The board requested that the superintendent make arrangements with the owners of property adjacent to the Bond Road 13-acre site to meet and discuss the possibility of further negotiations for purchase of their property.

The board recognized Joe David Ross, who explained to them several items in the recently approved Tax Appraisal District Budget. He stressed the need for more and better communication between the appraisal district and the taxing entities which it serves.

Board president Condra appointed Scott Shurley and James Bible to be responsible for forming a committee of interested citizens to investigate the feasibility of having an FFA-Vocational Agriculture program in the school curriculum sometime in the future.

The board reconvened following executive session with a motion by Dr. Johnny Fields to allow a \$200 extra-curricular increment to any teacher in high school or junior high who is appointed by the principal to sponsor a University Interscholastic League literary event. The motion was seconded by Carl Teaff and passed unanimously.

Charles Adams was appointed to coordinate the drivers' education program after hours and during the

summer months, and was allowed a \$200 supplement for the extra duty. He or any drivers' education teacher is to be reimbursed at the rate of \$10 per hour for classroom teaching and for driving time. The motion, carried unanimously, was made by Sam Perez and seconded by Scott Shurley.

Marlene Higgins was appointed special education teacher at the appropriate foundation pay grade and step on motion of Carl Teaff, a second by Kenneth Cayce, and unanimously approved.

Oil discoveries increase

Railroad Commission records show that oil discoveries have increased by more than 35 percent during the first half of this year as compared to the same period last year, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace.

Discoveries are wells that are successfully completed in reservoirs that were previously untapped. The latest figures available show that oil discoveries totaled 430 through June of 1983. During the first six months of 1982, there were 317.

Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace has announced that 60 refineries in Texas processed 127,136,560 barrels of crude oil and hydrocarbon blends during April. Through the first four months of 1983, Texas refineries ran 483,564,756 barrels.

The April volume compares to 125,509,426 barrels in March and 123,850,765 barrels in April 1982.

Texas refineries ran 97,170,204 barrels of crude oil in April compared to 98,403,393 barrels in March and 93,816,467 barrels in April 1982.

April manufacture of motor gasoline totaled 54,219,249 barrels, compared to 50,689,741 barrels in March and 51,725,932 barrels in April of 1982.

Texas refineries manufactured 8,105,883 barrels of home heating oil in April—a decrease of 33,492 barrels from the March volume. April 1982 output was 9,326,307 barrels.

However, gas discoveries have decreased by just over eight percent during the same period. There have

been 669 gas discoveries reported so far this year, as compared to 730 through June of 1982.

Total completions, which include discoveries, wells in existing fields and service wells, have also decreased. Through June, the Commission's Austin headquarters office has processed 10,698 completion reports as compared to 12,410 for the first six months of the year.

RRC approves new contracts

The Railroad Commission has approved on an interim basis contract amendments between Delhi Gas Pipeline Corp. and Houston Pipeline Co. and Intratex Gas Co. that may result in slightly lower gas costs for utilities serving Texas consumers.

Although no evidence to support the changes has yet been filed with the Commission, the RRC approved the new contract rates on an interim basis to allow Houston Pipeline and Intratex to pass the reduced gas charges on to their city gas customers. The city gate is the point at which gas distribution systems receive gas from their suppliers.

The changes involve one contract between Delhi and Intratex and four contracts between Delhi and Houston Pipeline. The new rates are \$3.80 per MMBtu (million British thermal units) of gas. The old contract rates ranged from \$3.88 per MMBtu to \$5.71 per MMBtu.

A Btu is a measure of the energy content in a particular volume of gas. Although this value varies with the quality of the gas, a thousand cubic feet of gas contains approximately one million Btu's of energy on the average.

Maintenance due on lp-gas tanks

If you are one of the one million Texans who depend on lp-gas for heating, air conditioning or cooking, long summer days are a good time to think about routine maintenance of your lp-gas tank.

"Few people realize that an lp-gas container needs proper care to last," said Hugh Keepers, director of the Liquefied Petroleum Gas Division of the Railroad Commission. "They are very costly and a few simple maintenance steps can save customers the cost of replacing their tanks."

Start your summer maintenance by giving your tank a coat of good quality, white metal paint. Aluminum tanks don't have to be painted. The reflective surface helps reduce the temperature in the tank, keeping pressure from building up. Painting also protects the container from rust and corrosion.

Make sure your container is mounted correctly. LP-gas tanks should always be level, above ground and mounted on a masonry foundation. Never allow weeds or sand to collect in the area between the tank and the ground. Proper ventilation keeps moisture from collecting and helps avoid corrosion.

Never place a tank inside or next to a building. State law requires that tanks be placed a minimum of 10 feet away from a building. A licensed lp-gas dealer can't fill a container that doesn't meet this requirement.

The manufacturer's nameplate on an lp-gas container is very important. It assures the consumer that the container was designed to meet safety rules. A licensed dealer can't fill a container that doesn't have this nameplate, and the information on it, visible.

To protect it from rust and corrosion, put a heavy coat of grease or a clear, acrylic sealant over the plate.

These simple steps will insure the safe operation of your lp-gas tank and add years to its life.

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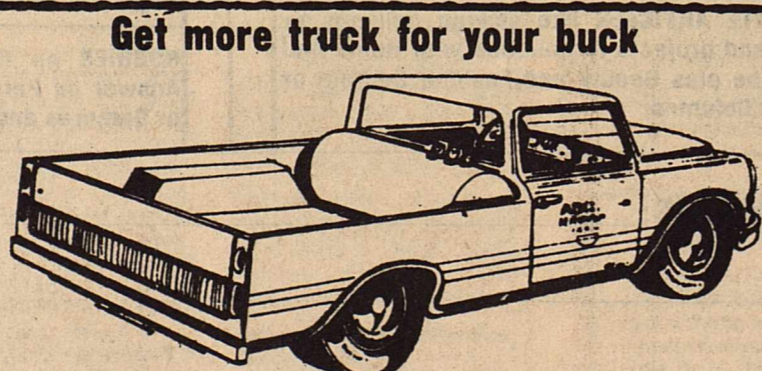

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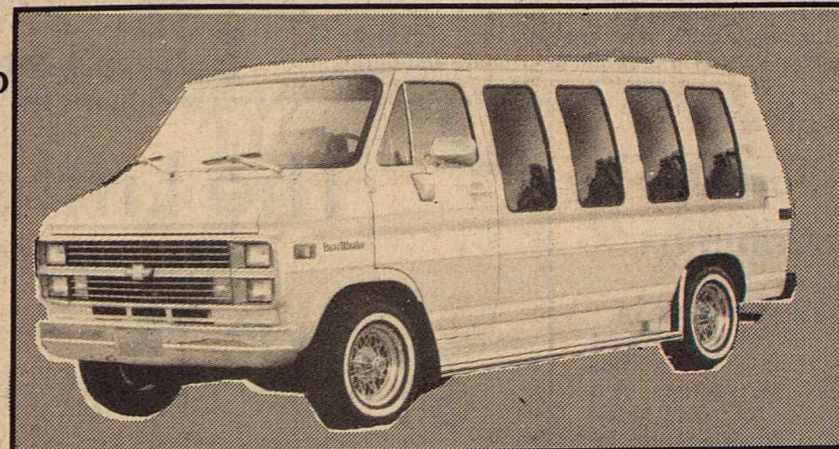

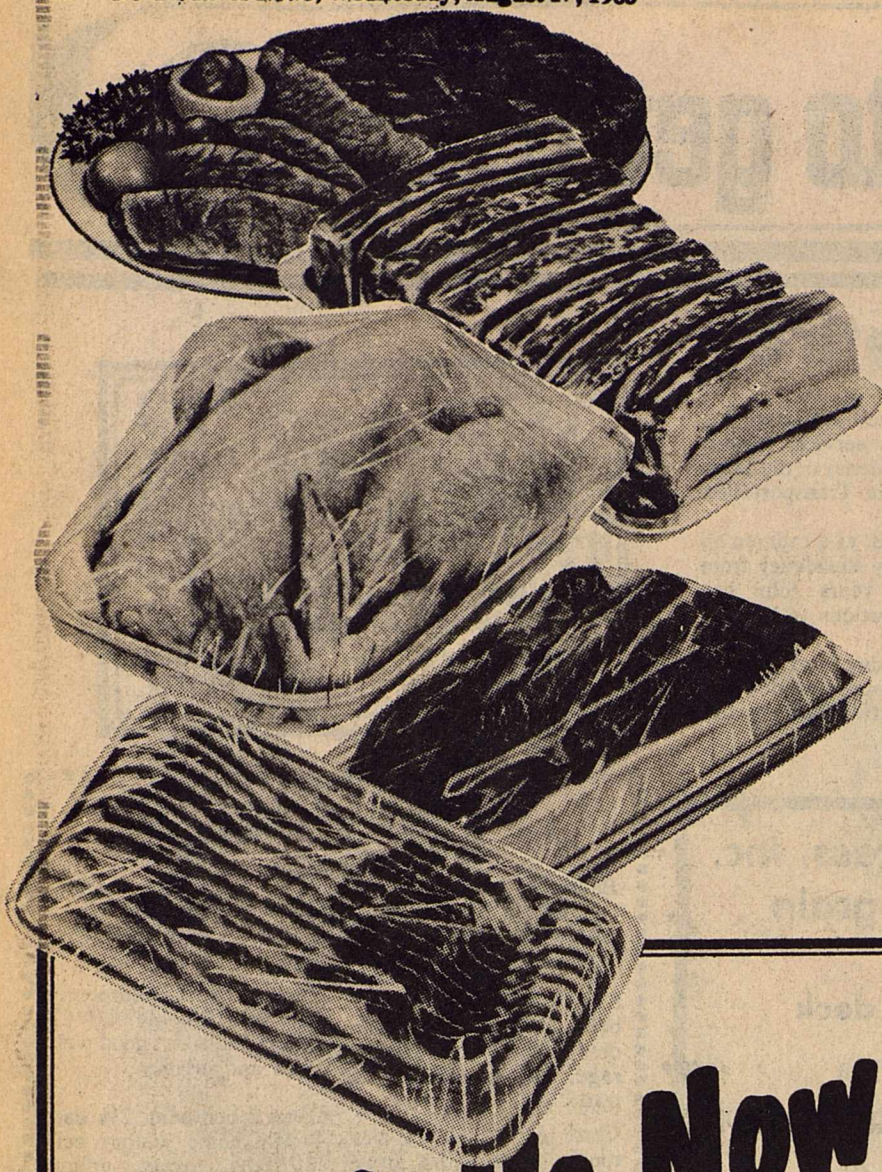
