## Tax rate set

Trustees of the Sonora Independent School District lowered the school tax rate in Sutton County by almost three cents when they approved the 1983-84 budget recently.

The district's budget of \$4, 793, 895 is five per cent more than last year's and the tax rate of 46 cents per \$100 valuation is one of the lowest rates in this part of the state. The tax rate for the 1982-83 fiscal year was 48.888 cents. All tax revenue will be used for local maintenance. No tax rate for bond retirement will be levied.

This tax rate compares favorably with that of several surrounding school districts. The tax rate for Eldorado is .65 cents, for Ozona .7772 cents and for Junction .7628 cents. The Sutton County School tax rate has been lowered every year since 1977.

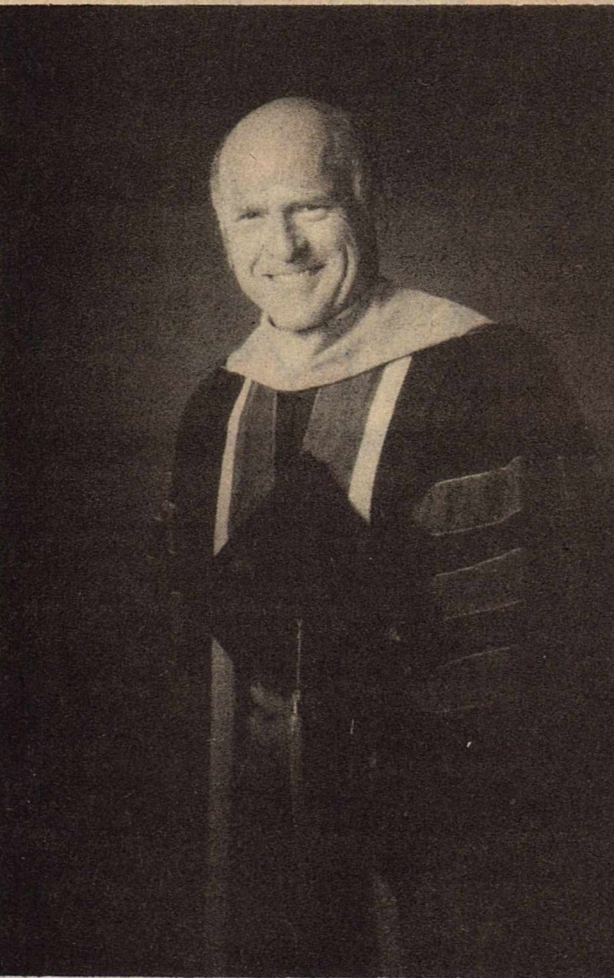

# Broncos shut-out Yellowjackets

The Sonora Broncos "raided" the Menard Yellowjackets in a controlled scrimmage this past week. The final outcome was two scores to none.

An optimistic bright spot for the Broncos was John David Martinez, a sophomore running back who displayed much needed talent and ability, as he turned in several exciting long runs against the Yellowjack defense.

The offense is still a question mark, but it is showing steady improvement daily. This year's quarterback, senior Drew Wallace, is greatly improved and shows to be very capable and ready to lead the Broncos on their 1983 season.

The strong point for the Broncos is the experience in the offensive line. The middle of the line is controlled by all-district center Ronnie Pollard, a senior who is a returning starter.

The Garza brothers, Daniel and Ruben, both Juniors, are the left and right guards respectively.

The right tackle is all-district returnee Rodney Jones. This is Jones' third year to start at tackle and this should be a big plus area for the Broncos.

The left tackle is held down by senior Ronnie Munns. The tight-end is three year starter and all-district player from last year, Jeff Brittain.

The split reciever is another senior and letterman, Tony Garza.

In the back field the only returning starter is all-district fullback Tino Martinez, a senior third year starter.

The other two positions (running backs) are currently being hotly contested for by a good group of capable players. Currently sharing time at these positions are Senior, Mike Polocck; Juniors, Victor Lira and Joe Mike Noriega; and Sophomores Esau Ramirez and John David Martinez.

In the scrimmage the Broncos showed signs of great promise as they unveiled a rather new "Bronco Look". Coach Jerry Hopkins has added some new things to what people and opponents have grown to expect from a Sonora Bronco team.

It is a known fact for all that play the Broncos that in order to beat the Broncos an opponent must stop the "Sonora Sweep"!

So in order to make things more difficult for opposing players and coaches, the Broncos will run from the "T" formation, the pro-set (two wide receivers) as well as their standard Wing "T" formation.

The Broncos have added the sprint-out pass to their offensive play book in order to use the abilities and skills of quarterback Wallace.

All of these additions should cause some problems

when opposing teams get ready to play the Broncos.

On the other side of the line of scrimmage the Broncos look even better. The defense has a super strong group of returning starters from last year that were leaders in the good defensive efforts last year.

The first thing most opposing coaches will note about the Broncos will be two very experienced all-district third year starting linebackers in Jeff Brittain and Tino Martinez.

They will also get help from two all-district returnees in tackle Rodney Jones and nose guard Ronnie Munns, also both Seniors.

The other defensive tackle is held down by senior letterman Houston Powers. The end positions are filled by Ronnie Pollard and Ruben Garza.

The secondary is lead by all-district junior cornerback Victor Lira.

The other cornerback spot is returning starter Eddie Castro.

The safety positions are controlled by senior letterman Tony Garza and Junior Joe Mike Noriega.

In the scrimmage the Broncos allowed the Yellowjackets but one first down in 40 offensive plays. The defense should be the long suit for the Broncos again this year.

All in all the scrimmage at Menard was a good learning experience especially for the offense. The Broncos scored on their second offensive set with halfback Victor Lira scoring from seven yards out and fullback Abel Sanchez scoring from 24 yards out.

Things are very optimistic in the Bronco camp as they prepare for their opening game this Friday against a very good Wall Hawk team at Wall.

The Hawks from District AA are the pre-season favorites to take the district title. They were in the play-offs last year and they return five offensive and five defensive starters from last years team. They have impressed the Bronco coaches with their over all uniform size and quickness.

They are a veer team that possesses several players with outstanding speed and are capable of breaking for a long play each and every time they touch the ball.

Their wide open style of play should constitute a very formidable foe for the Broncos as they try to return the favor of a 10-0 loss they suffered at the hands of Wall in

The Hawks have scrimmaged twice against Coahoma and Winters and seem to have improved according to the scouting reports.

This should be a very good test for the Broncos and should be a very exciting contest to watch for all the Bronco fans that plan to travel to Wall.

So be there and support the Broncos as the "Red Hosses" get rolling on their '83 season at 8 p.m. Friday night in Wall.

**Students score high**

Third, fifth and ninth graders at Sonora ISD scored extremely well on the basic skills test mandated by the Texas Education Agency. Students in the three grades were tested in three skill areas--Math, Reading, and Writing--in the spring of 1983.

The Sonora School Board, administration and staff are very proud of the students' achievements. W.A. McAndrew, superintendent, stated that the staff members have accepted the challenge of TABS and have become extremely familiar with TABS and its objectives. McAndrew added "Some of our teachers are so involved with TABS that they have provided inservice training for other teachers in the basic skills objectives tested by TABS".

In Grade 3, All Students achieved an 80.2 percent mastery in Math, 84.5 percent mastery in Reading, and 73.6 percent mastery of the Writing section of the TABS test. Eight out of ten math objectives were mastered by 76 percent of the students, six out of eight objectives were mastered by 82 percent of the students, and 3 out of 5 writing objectives were mastered by 85 percent of the students.

99 percent of the third graders tested had acceptable handwriting and 92 percent of the students had minimum comp. writing skills.

The fifth graders demonstrated, as a group, 83.9 percent mastery of the Math section with 12 out of 12 objectives mastered by 70 percent of the students. On the Reading section, All Students demonstrated an 84.9

percent mastery and 9 out of 11 objectives were mastered by 78 percent of the students.

An 86.8 percent mastery of Writing was achieved by All Students and six out of six objectives were mastered by 72 percent of the students.

100 percent of the students demonstrated acceptable handwriting and minimum comp. writing skills.

Among the ninth graders tested, a 79 percent mastery of the Math section was achieved with 9 out of 11 objectives mastered by 75 percent of the students. All Students showed a 77 percent mastery of the reading skills with 9 out of 11 objectives being mastered by 75 percent of the students.

A score of 93 percent was demonstrated on the writing section of the TABS test for All Students and 6 out of 6 objectives were mastered by 75 percent of the students.

These high scores reflect well upon the SISD staff as well as on parents of the students and the students themselves.

The Sutton County ASCS Office will be closed the afternoon of August 31 and all day September 1.

The office will also be closed September 5 in observance of Labor Day.

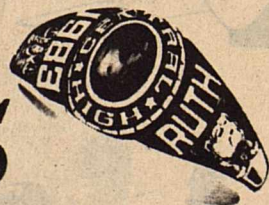

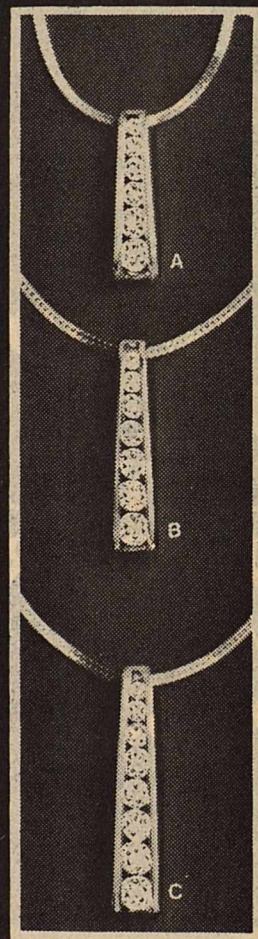

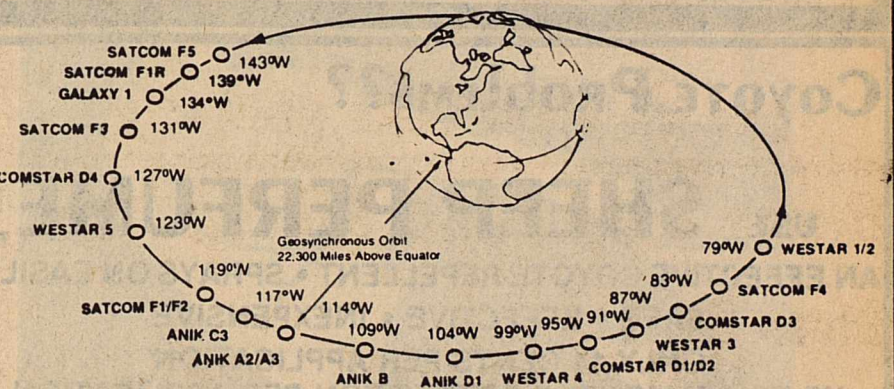

Dear Editor:

Many of us in the legislature are aware of the excessive burden caused by ever increasing local property taxes and are attempting to provide relief to residential homeowners through reform legislation. We have proposed a significant relief measure called Proposition Zero.

Unlike other proposals to enhance education funding, Proposition Zero seeks to greatly reduce the school tax burden on homeowners and generate millions of additional dollars for Texas school children.

Specifically, our proposal will exempt personal automobiles and the first \$100,000 of value of residences from school operation and maintenance taxes, and replace the revenue with a 1-cent state sales tax.

Recognizing the local tax base funding problem, other states, such as Missouri, Vermont, and Nevada, have provided significant relief to their homeowners through the sales tax.

Proposition Zero will be introduced in the next Texas legislative session. We are currently refining the proposal and quantifying the effects that Proposition Zero will have on specific school districts to ensure equity to every district and its taxpayers.

We invite all citizens to write or call our legislative offices with their comments and inquiries on Proposition Zero.
