Bond election set for October 27

Members of the Sonora Independent School District Board of Trustees voted last Tuesday night to adopt a resolution to set the bond election for a new high school September 27, when they meet again, for Thursday, October 27.

Dr. Johnny Fields made the motion, with Carl Teaff seconding it, to call the election for the \$6 million project that Thursday which will be 30 days following the setting date.

The estimate for building the high school is \$6.5 million, but school officials voted to finance the rest with extra tax revenues.

If any bonded indebtedness money is left over, it may be invested or put into the interest and sinking fund for a period of three years to reduce taxes, but must be spent before the three years is up.

Bob Davis, bond consultant for the school district, advised having the bonds sell for seven years for an improvement in ratings and an interest savings of \$200,000.

Davis added that it is best if it is paid off as soon as comfortably possible.

In other action, the board voted to pay bills in the amount of \$258,547.63 for last month.

Gossip and rumor have long been touted as a very healthy form of day to day conversation, enlightening the listener with various forms of news and information PROVIDING the gossip is accurate and no one is harmed. In the case of Hudspeth Memorial, gossip and rumors have been many - accurate facts have been few. Some of the rumors have been that the hospital would probably close; the county might take over the operation; that Shannon Hospital planned to incorporate the facility as an extension of their operation. The facts are simple - the hospital will remain open as a privately owned, non-profit organization. Shannon offered to come in, review procedures and offer recommendations, free of charge. Their findings were published in an open letter to Lea Roy Aldwell from Jim Fillpot, Administrator of Shannon, in the September 7 issue of the Devil's River News.

The hospital being a privately owned, non-profit organization is governed by a Board of Directors and members are as follows: Lea Roy Aldwell-President, Mable Vanderstucken-Vice-President, Mike Hale-Treasurer, John Tedford-Secretary, Al Elliot, Herbert Fields, Dr. G. C. Gremmel, Guila Vickers, James Smith, Wesley Sawyer, Bob Brockman, Ms. Polo Cervantes, Ms. Rose Mary Mathews and Dr. Fred Taylor.

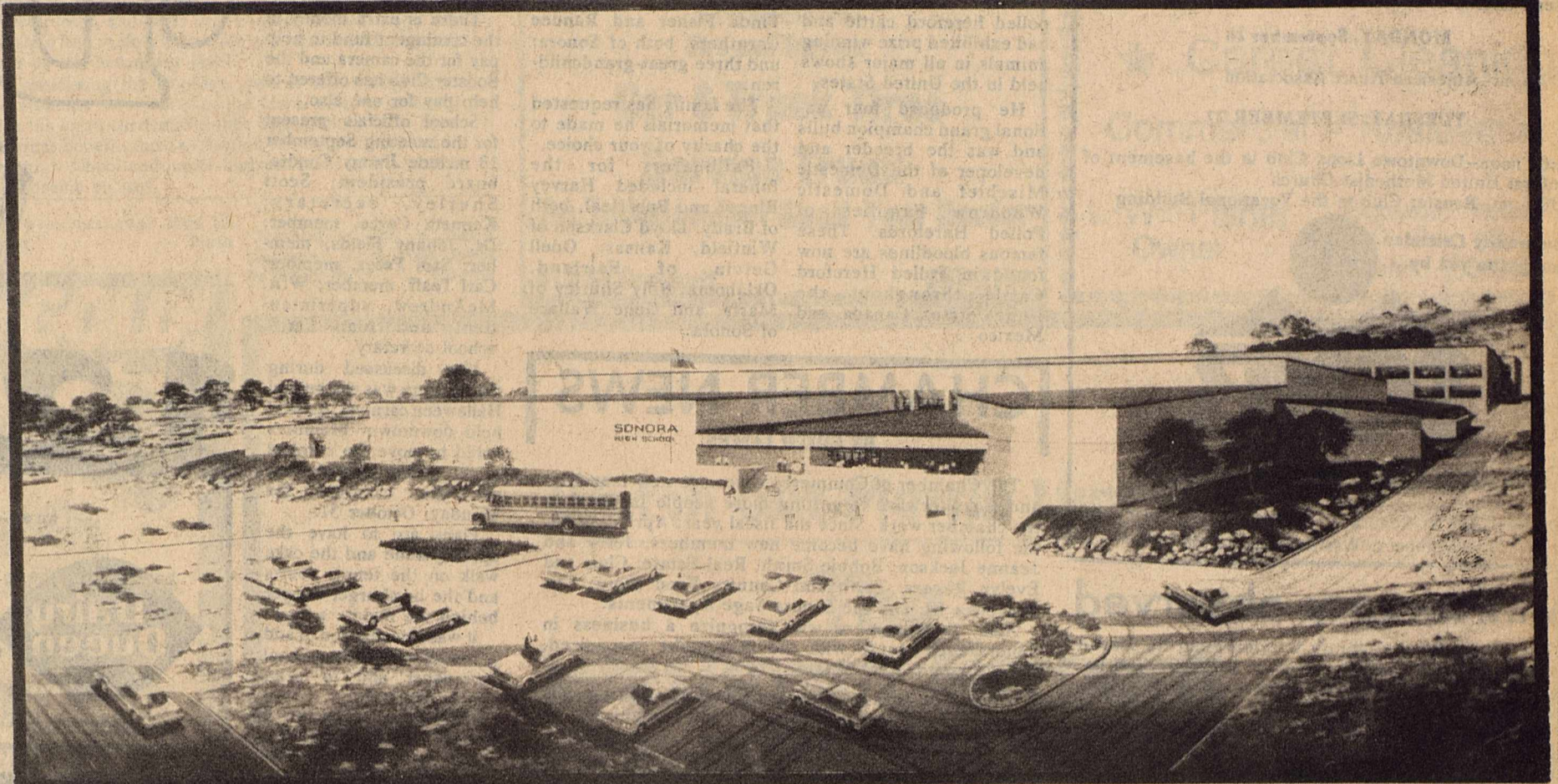
When asked the greatest need of the hospital, of those queried, the response was unanimous - community support and utilization. A hospital, just as any other business, needs "customers" in order to remain financially healthy. The hospital operates in the red, and as a matter of public record, has had to borrow money. "Our losses for this past year were less than those in previous years," states Mr. Aldwell, "and we are very hopeful that we will continue the upward trend. After the death of Dr. Brown, the community was in a state of limbo. We only had one doctor and many people started going out of the area for medical care. This is no longer the case, we have two very fine doctors and as a result, hope that more citizens will utilize the medical facilities here whenever possible."

The hospital is subsidized by the Hudspeth Ranch and in the case of indigent patients, by the county. Another method of adding revenue could come in the form of Hospital Districting. The bill has been passed by the legislature, however at this time, there are no immediate plans to act on the districting.

One item of major concern, to all involved, is the new Medicare program referred to as DRG-Diagnosis Related Groups. A simplification of DRG is that each illness will be averaged, across the nation, and a specific number of days will be assigned to the illness. Medicare will pay only for that number of days, regardless of extenuating circumstances. The larger medical facilities will begin DRG on October 1, 1983, the smaller ones, including Hudspeth Memorial, will begin the program on January 1, 1984. How this will affect Hudspeth Memorial is unknown.

While many people are aware of the financial

Broncos stomp Eagles 27 - 0

The Sonora Broncos beat the Eldorado Eagles 27-0 behind another super defensive effort by the entire team.

This is the second straight shutout for the Broncos. The defense led by the front wall of Ronnie Munns, Jerry Jimenez, Houston Powers, Rodney Jones, Ruben Garza and Mario Sotelo held the Eagle offense to two first downs and 49 total rushing yards.

Linebackers Jeff Brittain and Gilbert Martinez also played well. The secondary of Victor Lira, Tony Garza, John David Martinez, and Esau Ramirez held the Eagles to only 13 yards on 2 completions out of 16 attempts while Victor Lira and Jeff Brittain each had one interception.

The defensive team held Eldorado to a total of 62 yards on 39 offensive plays. The defense was projected to be one of the Bronco strong points and they seem, in the last two games, to be living up to their pre-season projection.

This week the offense finally got all the cogs and gears in motion all at the same time. The offense rushed for 330 yards on 54 plays. The offensive line play has gotten better each week.

This week Robert Mittel started at center for injured Ronnie Pollard and did an excellent job. The rest of the line composed of guards Ruben and Daniel Garza and tackles Rodney Jones and Ismael Sanchez with ends Jeff Brittain and Tony Garza and Barry Graevaes all blocking well and providing the backs with wide open lanes to the goal line.

The rushing attack was led by Seniors fullback Tino Martinez who carried 19 times for 108 yards. Mike Polocsek added another 71 yards on 14 attempts.

Sophomore wingback Esau Ramirez carried the ball 5 times for 68 yards. Joe Mike Noriega had another consistent game with 53 yards on 11 carries.

Victor Lira carried twice for 14 yards. Quarterback Drew Wallace had 12 yards on two carries and Abel Sanchez added 4 yards on 1 attempt.

In the passing department quarterback Wallace was two out of 7 for 56 yards and one touchdown.

Both receptions were made by Esau Ramirez with one being a 26 yard touchdown.

The Broncos did not score in the first quarter even though they had a chance following an Eagle turnover. The end result was a missed 23 yard field goal.

The Broncos scored on their next possession as they marched 73 yards in 13 plays to take a 6-0 lead on Drew Wallace's one-yard run.

The drive was aided on a Wallace to Ramirez pass combination of 30 yards. Scott Miller entered the game and kicked the extra point making it 7-0 in favor of the Broncos.

Policies told

It didn't take the Broncos long to score again as Mike Polocsek recovered an Eagle fumble on the kickoff return setting the Broncos up on the Eagle 26 yard line.

This time it took only one play as Wallace passed to Ramirez for the score. The catch by Ramirez was a super effort as he out-jumped and fought two Eagle defenders and came up with the ball.

The extra point back failed and the Broncos took a 13-0 lead to the locker room at halftime.

The second half started for Sonora in a big way as Jerry Jimenez recovered an Eagle fumble at the Eldorado 37 yard line.

This time it took the offense six plays to get to the end zone with Tino Martinez going the final four yards. Scott Miller's kick was true and the Broncos had 20-0 lead with 7 minutes left in the 3rd quarter.

The final score of the night came on a 5 yard run again by Tino Martinez and was the result of a 56 yard 8 yard drive. Scott Miller added the extra point for the final score of 27-0.

Elsewhere around district 6-AAA Crane crushed

Stanton 27-0 upping their record to 3-0

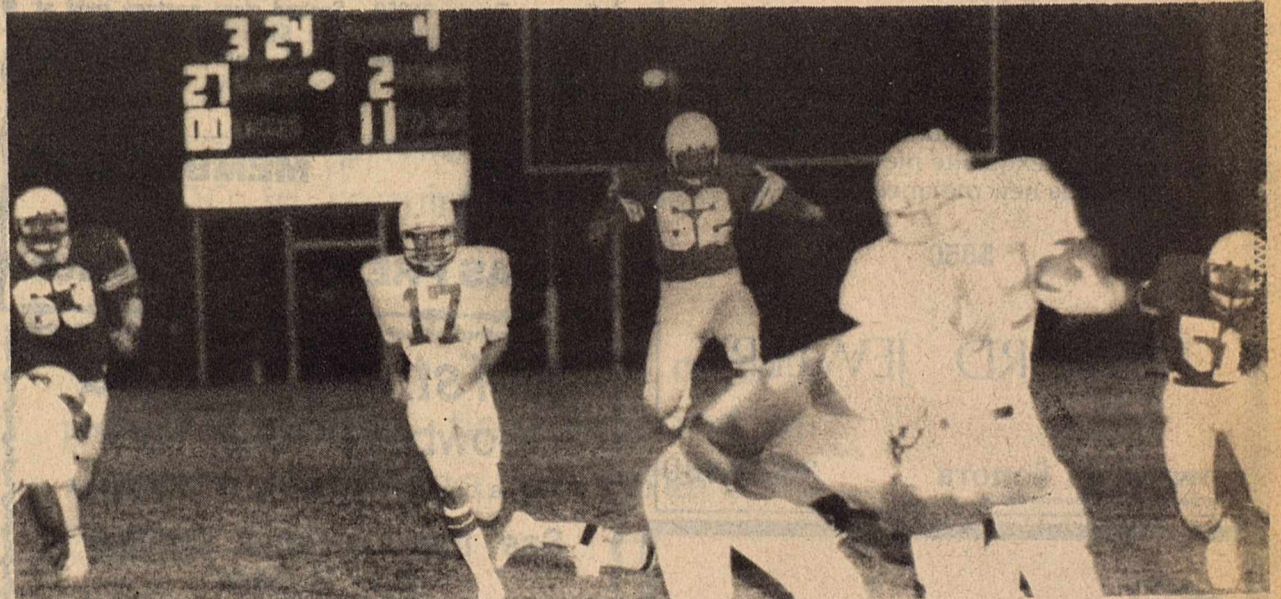

The Bulldogs run the Veer offense and employ a 4-3 defense. It will be a good game starting at 8 p.m. in Bronco Stadium.

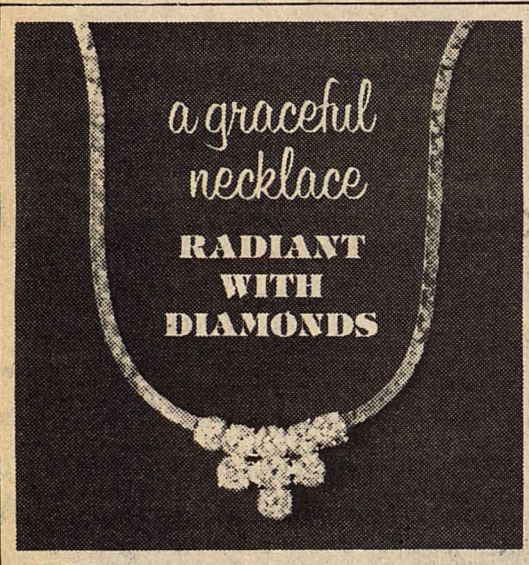
Anniversary observed

Funeral services for Robert A. Halbert, 92, of Sonora were held at 11 a.m. Tuesday, September 21 in the First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Paul Terry of Eden and the Rev. David Griffin of Sonora jointly officiating.

Interment was in the Sonora Cemetery under the direction of Kerbow Funeral Home.

Halbert was born June 11, 1891 in Fort McKavett and was married to Battie Huggins in Brownwood July 5, 1912.

The Halberts recently celebrated their 71st wedding anniversary.

Halbert was widely known as a successful breeder of registered polled hereford cattle and had exhibited prize winning animals in all major shows held in the United States.

He produced four national grand champion bulls and was the breeder and developer of the Domestic Mischief and Domestic Woodrow Families of Polled Herefords. These famous bloodlines are now found in Polled Hereford Cattle throughout the United States, Canada, and Mexico.

Halbert was active in community affairs, serving on boards of the Methodist Church, Farm Loan Association, school board, Hudspeth Hospital Board, and others.

He was a lifetime director of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, a 50 year member of Masonic Lodge and 32nd degree Mason and a member of the Sonora Downtown Lions Club for 52 years.

Survivors include his wife: two daughters, Mrs. Vestel Askew and Mrs. Lee Fawcett, both of Sonora; four grandchildren, Robert Michael McBride of Stephenville, Joel Patrick McBride of Sacramento, Linda Fisher and Randeae Caruthers, both of Sonora; and three great-grandchildren.

The family has requested that memorials be made to the charity of your choice.

In the superintendent's report Wendall McAndrew reported a remaining \$40,000 to be collected in taxes for the 1982-83 year.

Principals gave enrollment reports during Tuesday night's meeting. Clay Cade, elementary principal, reported 356 students; Mike Ramos reported 317 for the middle school; Smith Neal reported 331 for the junior high and James Bible reported 329 in the high school.

In other action the board voted to buy a new camera for filming the football games. The present camera has failed to get good film-strips at any of the games this year and it is a requirement that schools change films.

There is extra money in the contingent fund to help pay for the camera and the Booster Club has offered to help pay for one also.

School officials present for the meeting September 13 include Jimmy Condra, board president; Scott Shurley, secretary; Kenneth Cayce, member; Dr. Johnny Fields, member; Sam Perez, member; Carl Teaff, member; W.A. McAndrew, superintendent; and Joan Latta, school secretary.

Also discussed during the meeting was the annual Halloween carnival, usually held downtown. Members voted to move the carnival to the school grounds and set the carnival for Monday, October 31.

Plans are to have the spook parade and the cake walk on the tennis courts and the hamburger supper behind the middle school.

It was also decided to add a newsletter to the school newspaper and to print

EDITOR'S NOTE: Sonora Chief of Police Brent Gesch was approached by the Devil's River News editorial staff last week with a request for his comments on possible safety hazards at the Sonora Independent School District complex. Chief Gesch wrote the following article which we feel is of interest to every citizen who drives or has a child in the school system.
In reply to your request, several Safety Hazards come to mind each year as our schools began to get into full swing. Our biggest concern here at the Police

Department, however, is the hazards that the unsafe drivers pose to the school aged child.

The average driver that operates a motor vehicle on a daily basis, in a School Zone, has developed certain driving habits which may seem correct to that particular individual, but could also place a child in a very hazardous and life threatening situation.

It is doubtful that the driver who has left his or her vehicle parked in a traffic lane with the engine running,

According to neighboring district tax rates, out of 17 districts Sonora ranks 17th with a 1982-83 rate of .488 per \$100 assessed value. San Angelo leads the list with a 1.40 percent tax rate according to a report from the steering committee.

If the bond election should pass, the tax rate for the Sonora Independent School District would be levied at approximately \$1.977 per \$100 value. According to the schedule provided by the school office, a property assessed at \$35,000 would be levied at \$69.20 if the tax was levied at \$1.977.

The school also provided a list of the top 10 tax payers in the school district. These tax payers include HNG Oil Co., AMOCO Production, El Paso Natural Gas Co., Mitchell Energy Corp., Windsor Gas Corp., Lively Exploration Co., Intratex Gas Co., ARCO Oil and Gas Co., ENSERCH Exploration Inc., and Valero Hydrocarbon Co.

Eighty three percent of the taxes paid in Sutton County comes from the petroleum related businesses according to school officials who added that four years ago Sutton County's oilfield was expected to have a life of 12-15 more years.

Another concern of the public is apparently the use of the remaining facilities. Information provided by the steering committee includes the following:

By removing the high school from the present congested area, Kindergarten through third grade students would have their own cafeteria.

They would also have gym space; an elementary library; a media center for special teaching; and an audio visual room.

Another benefit would be more centralized areas for special programs such as special education, speech therapy, and other programs that are sure to come in the future such as a computer center.

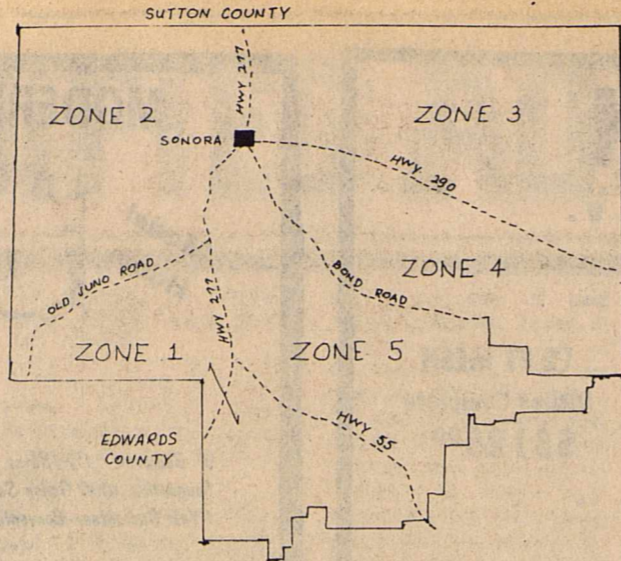
By placing grades four, five, and six in the present high school complex, and leaving grades seven and eight in the junior high building, grades four through eight would have room for expansion in the future.

They would also have two gyms; more room for fine arts activities; and their own dining facilities with the conversion of part of the vocational building into a serving cafeteria.

The snack bar would remain "as is" for these grades and be available for use by the public.

Finally, the traffic problem around the campus would be reduced with the removal of all high school activities from the area.

The \$6 million bond issue would cover the cost of the proposed high school only, and any improvements made to pre-existing buildings would be funded from the Sonora Independent School District's regular budget.



Election scheduled

An election for a director to serve in Zone 5 on the Edwards Plateau Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 3, 1983 in/at the Clint Langford Memorial 4-H Center announced Albert Ward, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 9:30 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Current members of the board of directors of the Edwards Plateau SWCD are Bob Brockman, Bob Caruthers, Armer Earwood and Glen Fisher all of Sonora.

The purpose of the Edwards Plateau SWCD, with headquarters in Sonora City Hall is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

the door opened, and is blocking traffic for two city blocks while he or she goes to their child's room to pick up from the teacher, has ever stopped to think about what type of Safety Hazard they have created.

How will this driver feel when he or she receives a traffic citation for such violations? They are usually very angry with the Policeman because he doesn't understand "But Officer I was only gone for a minute. I had to pick up my child at his room."

On the other hand however, how would this same driver feel if the vehicle had accidentally slipped into gear, as some vehicles have been known to do, and pinned a child to a properly parked vehicle. Or if their vehicle ran over and killed a child walking across the street in a cross-walk, which is a protected area for pedestrians according to State Law. Or perhaps their vehicle rolled backwards striking the vehicle just behind it with enough force to cause bodily injury to the occupants.

How will the driver feel now? Will he or she realize that this also can happen in just one minute?

What about the driver who is making the improper left turn and during the entire turning movement a child sitting in the front seat beside the driver is saying, "Mommy, you are not supposed to turn left here." "It's against the Law." "Can't you see that sign?"

This driver is not only placing herself and her child in an unsafe situation, but is also teaching the child that Laws do not need to be obeyed all of the time and it's okay to make left turns if there are no Policemen watching. This type of example will never be forgotten by the child.

How about the parent that finds a parking space in the middle of the block? Instead of getting out of the vehicle and walking down to the nearest corner where there is a cross-walk the parent remains in the vehicle. The parent's child gets out of class and walks to the curb opposite where the parent has parked. The parent calls for the child to hurry.

How about the parent that finds a parking space in the middle of the block? Instead of getting out of the vehicle and walking down to the nearest corner where there is a cross-walk the parent remains in the vehicle. The parent's child gets out of class and walks to the curb opposite where the parent has parked. The parent calls for the child to hurry.

The child obeying the parent steps off of the curb, into the path of an oncoming vehicle strikes the child. That child was placed in an unsafe situation by the parent. Any adult parent should know what cross-walks are and should teach their children to use them. A parent that teaches a child that it's okay to jaywalk as long as you don't get caught by the Police or you don't get hit by a car is a Safety Hazard.

How about the driver of the School Bus that was in such a hurry a couple of years ago. He had to get the Band members back to the School grounds before lunch and was driving 35 miles per hour in posted 20 miles per hour School Zone. His excuse to the Officer was "I was in a hurry to get these kids back to School so that

they wouldn't be late for lunch." Did that bus driver consider the increase in distance needed to stop the bus traveling at the increased speed? Did he consider himself a Safety Hazard? NO! NO! NO! This driver said "Officer, I just wasn't thinking." when asked all of the questions at the time he was stopped.

Then there are the school aged drivers. They think they have to drive to school even if they live two blocks away. They think that they have to be the very first one to the field house in the afternoon. They think that they have to be the first one at the Dairy Queen or Sonic at lunch time. They think whatever?

I doubt very seriously if any of them have ever thought about coping with the fact of losing control of their motor vehicle just as they spin their tires around the corner of the School grounds. I doubt they thought about hitting the curb and their vehicle flipping end over end two or three times.

Or, they thought about their vehicle coming to rest on its top in the middle of the School playground, which was full of fourth grade children at the time. Or even thought about walking away from the vehicle without a scratch. And, have they thought about stopping to look back at their once fine looking, fast running set of wheels--HAVE THEY THOUGHT ABOUT--coping with the small, blood covered hand, that is exposed from underneath the overturned vehicle?

Was it that important to be the first one there? There is no way to describe the sickening, disgusted feeling that a Policemen experiences when he is called to the scene of a fatal accident. Most especially when the fatal victim is a child or young person.

Safety is learned and you are the teachers.

Hazards are created and you are the creators. You, the driver, are the biggest Safety Hazard of all and until you realize it you will continue to experience accidents.

A motor vehicle is a dangerous machine when it's driver is thinking about anything except driving the machine.

A motor vehicle parked on the roadway is an accident waiting to happen.

Common sense will promote Safety. Drive friendly, safely, and courteously, but above all else WATCH THAT CHILD.
