that has been proposed for the construction of a new high school. Some favor it; some oppose it; and others

It seems to me that before we approve any project,
muich less one of this proportion, several questions much less nowered: I. IS THERE ANEED FOR A NEW FACLITYY You,
obviously, feel that there is. I suggest that the need is obviously, feel that there is. I suggest that the need is
open to question. While SHWC, Inc. (the firm that the open to question. While SHWC, inc. (the firm that ane long range plan) was surprisingly accurate in their
January 1982 projections of future enrollment, they did overestimate. This year, enrollment as reported in the
eptember 21,1983 Devil's River News shows 4 per cent fewer students in grades $K-2$ than projected, 11
percent fewer in trades $3-5$ than projected, and 7 perpercent fewer in grades $3-5$ than projected, and 7 per-
cent fewer in grades $6-8$ The high school enrollment as predicted was right on the monee. The point is not that the projections were off, but that the trend is down.
With more and more lay-offs reported and a number of companies either moving out or closing up, how far down may the enrollment be next year? ...Three years
from now?...Or seven years from now? Are we absolutely sure that a new facility is needed?
2. CAN WE AFFORD A NEW FACLITY? The figures I have heard are an anticipated tax increase of 20
per $\$ 100$ of valuation for seven years. This translates to an extra $\$ 60$ per year on a $\$ 30$ thousand house, an extra $\$ 130$ per year for a $\$ 65$ thousand house, and so on.
Many of us would conclude that if the kids really need his, well then, we can "tighten the belt" and make it. Bot what about those who have been laid-off...or fear they might be? They probably can't handle the extra
tax. And what if the slump in the oil and gas business results in a continued loss of valuation? Those dollars will have to be made up with even higher taxes for the
rest of us. Remember that the ranching industry is in rest of us. Remember that the ranching industry is in
the middle of a drought...and you know what livestock prices are. Are we absolutely sure that we can afford a
new facility right now? THE BEST ANSWER TO THE SCHOOL'S PROBLEMS? In their January 1982 report, the shhoo's
own consultants, SHWC, Inc. offered a new high school wn consultants, SHWC, Inc. offered a new high school
as a poor second choice (labled Solution B). The report as a poorsecond choice lablied Solution B. The report
concludes, "..the solution does have some shortcomings at the intermediate level. All parent pickup
and dropoff traffic will still be congested at the central and dropoff traftic will still b be congested at the central
campus. The elementary children will still be faced with a severe shortage of available play space." The school's consultants ended the discussion by saying, "The needs of the high school are met very adequately
in Solution B, but the needs of the lower grades are only partially met."
To build a ne To build a new high school means that we are wal-
king away from two gymnasiums, a vocational building, science labs, and other specialized facilitities. Granted
that they may be used by the students remaining, but is that they may be used by the students remaining, but is
this the most efficient use of money? The cafeteria problem will not be significantly helped by removing the upper grades. They do not eat in the cafeteria in
large numbers. We will have to spend more money to large numbers. We will have to spend more money to Are we absolutely sure that we are proposing a high
school because that is what we really need, or because that is what we would like?
Finally, I would like to deal with some statements That I have heard concerning the proposed building proram. The first is that the bond issue should be voted
down because the school board (or certain members thereof) is not to be trusted. This is ridiculous! The
issue must be judged on its merits without concern for issue must bel judged on its merris without coar The second is that the bond issue should be approved
because the board has already purchased land that is well suited for a high school. This also is ridiciculoust $\mathrm{T}_{0}$ so argue is to say that the question should not be consi-
dered on merit, but that the voters are bound to legitmize a land purchase that may have been unwise.
The third is that a high school be built (even though it The third is that a high school be built (even though it
may not be the best solution) because some feel that the voters will approve nothing else. This reasoning sup-
poses that poplitical expediency is more important than sound decisions.
school was that all of this is false. If an elementary school was the best solution less than tho years anto, it
is difficult to imagine that circumstances have changed is difficult to imagine that circumstances have changed
so much in such a short time. I cannot accept any arguso much in such a short time. I cannot accept any argu-
ment that we must build something...anything...whe-
ther wise or not ther wise or not.
Ifurther submit that the failure of the previous bond
issue issue at the polls cannot be interpreted as a voter call
for a new high school. The issue failed for a variety of reasons, not the least of which was the inadequate way

In my efforts to answer your letter, I hope I can brin In my efforts to answer your letter, I hope I can bring school is sorely needed. I realize that there are pros an cons. We have considered all of this heavily and we
think our proposal is the only answer to the solution of the majority of our problems.
The existing facility was built at the beginning of the
Great Depression, in 1931. In the 52 years since that Great Depression, in 1031 . In the 52 yeers singe tha
time, we have had several wars, we have entered bot the atomic and the computer ages, and we hav conquered polio, only one of the results of the vas
strides made in the field of science. None of this would have been possible without human brainpower, th
very basis of our civilization. And that, Albert, is what very basis of our civilization. And that, Albert, is wha
this bond issue is all about--whether or not to improv his bond issue is all about--whether or not to improvi
our facilities for training young minds so that we wil continue to advance.

Now to answer your questions in the order in whic 1. IS THERE A NEED FOR A NEW FACIITTY Definitely! Not only is the plant old and crowded
(every available classroom on campus is being full (every available classroom on campus is being full
utilized, plus two junior high classrooms are used b utilized, plus two junior high classrooms are used by
the high school while those junior high students are having physical education in the gym), the science la
facilities are ridiculously outdated. There is no doubt i any educator's mind that the Governor's Committee o any edicator Education will recommend immediate state-wid expansion of the science and math departments as well
as a longer school year. The academic space available for this mandated expansion at the present campu stands at absolute zero. The old homemaking cottage
has been converted into two classrooms to make room for been conderted into tro classsooms to make roo
for and needed resource room. While it is true that the enrollment in grades $\mathbf{K}$
through eight is down slightly down from this time last through eight is down slightly down from this time la year, the enrollment at the high school level is up
dramatically. The Board feels that the slump in the oi

community P 11 use your estimated tax increase of 20 cents per $\$ 100$ evaluation, which is as close as anyone
could come until the bonds are actually sold could come until the bonds are actually sold. Our tax
rate is now set at 46 cents and is one of the lowest in rate is now set at 46 cents and is one of the lowest in
this part of the state. Even with a 20 cent increase to
pay for the new high school, our tax rate would still pay for the new high school, our tax rate would still
compare favorably with areas surrounding us. compare favorably with areas surrounding us.
Eldorado's tax rate for $1833-84$ is 65 cents and Ozona's, 63 and one-halal cents. With the projected increase, our
rate would still be only 66 cents for the seven year rate would still be only 66 cents for the seven year
period of the bond issue. As you pointed out, this period of the bond issue. As you pointed out, this
translates to an increase of $\$ 60$ per year on a home
valued at $\$ 30,000$ on the tax rolls, or little more than $\$ 1$
each week. Incidentally, all bond monies will be used
for site ppreparation and construction costs, as the
almost foutren-acre building site on Bond Road is
already paid for. 3. WOULD A NEW HIGH SCHOOL BE THE BEST ANSWER TO THE SCHOOL'S PROBLEMS? The
Board spent many, many hours working with schoo Board spent many, many hours working with school
administrators and staff and with the citizens coministrators and staff and with the citizens
committee made up of a cross-section of the committee made up of a cross-section of the
school complex woll involved agreed that a new high school complex would solve more of the district'
problems than any other single project we mig problems than any other single
undertake, for a variety of reasons.
One of the sorest spots on the existing campus is the
much-maligned cafeteria. It has been a suurc for several years, in that it was buen a source of worr 350 students, and has for years been serving between eight and nine hundred daily. This problem has been
addressed pointedly in planning the new high school
