## Girls defeat Eagles

The Sonora girls varsity team avenged their previous loss in their season opener with Eldorado. The game was close through the first and second quarters with the Broncos up 12-9 and 21-19 at halftime. The third quarter belonged completely to the Broncos as they outscored the Eagles 25-8 to take a commanding 46-27 lead. The final score was 57-40 in favor of the Broncos.

Lorri French made 8 field goals and 9 free throws to lead the Broncos with 25 points. Debbie Bible scored 9, Della Heffernan 7, Lea Whitehead 6, Anita Balch 4, Kristi Hill 3, Karla Jungk 2, and Debbie Shannon 1. The Broncos hit 21 of 28 from the foul line which is excellent.

In a rematch of Saturday's championship game in the J.V. Division of the Broncos tournament, the Sonora J.V. beat the Eldorado J.V. again by a score of 29-22. The Broncos got off to a 11-2 lead and upped it to 19-10 at halftime. At the end of the third quarter the Broncos had a 25-16 lead. The Broncos got good overall team play and scoring. Gina Heffernan had 8, Kate Matthews 7, Leigh French 5, Leah Evans 4, Carrie Sorenson 3, Traci Cascadden 2.

The Sonora 9th grade girls played Ozona and took a 33-23 win from the Lions. Kathy Richter, Dina Graves, and Michelle McCleery each had 8 points, Gay Ann Dobbs 7, and Alma Quiroz 2.

During the weekend the Sonora girls were in tournaments it seemed like everywhere. The Broncos combined their J.V. and 9th into two separate J.V. teams and played in tournaments at Junction with one team and Iraan with the other.

The team that went to Junction came back with the consolation trophy. They lost their opening game 24-26 to Ingram. The girls at one time had a lead but in the second half could not make the ball go in the basket as they went ice cold from the floor. Anita Balch lead the Broncos with 10 points, Debbie Shannon and Karla Jungk had 4 each, Sandy Blankenship 3, Leah Evans 2, and Alma Quiroz 1.

The Broncos came back strong as they rallied the next day to defeat Menard 27-23. Anita Balch again led the Broncos with 14 points, Karla Jungk 6, Debbie Shannon 5, and Sandy Blankenship 2. In the consolation championship game the Broncos demolished the team from Brady 49-19. Debbie Shannon 11 points, Anita Balch 10, Karla Jungk 8, Leah Evans and Alma Quiroz 5 each, Stacy Patton 4, Lauri Sotelo 3, Belinda Mendez 2, and Sandy Blankenship 1. It was an excellent tournament and a fun time for the girls.

The other J.V. team that went to Iraan also brought home a trophy. They captured the 3rd place trophy. They opened with a 38-23 win over the girls from McCamey. Leigh French and Carrie Sorenson each scored 8 points, Kate Matthews got 6, Traci Cascadden

4, Stacy Miller and Sidonna Ridgeway got 3 each, Kathy Richter, Dina Graves and Michelle McCleery got 2 points each. In their second game the Broncos took a disappointing 32-35 loss to a team from Reagan County. The game was close all the way. Leigh French led the Broncos with 10, Kate Matthews 7, Traci Cascadden and Kathy Richter 4 points each, Michelle McCleery 3, Carrie Sorenson and Gay Ann Dobbs 2 points each. In the 3rd place game it was the 4th meeting of the Sonora J.V. vs. the Eldorado J.V. and again the girls from Bronco land came out on top 29-24. Carrie Sorenson led the Broncos with 13 points, Leigh French and Michelle McCleery 6 points each and Kate Matthews got 4. It was a good week for all the J.V. as their season record is now 9-3.

The Sonora varsity girls also brought back a trophy, the runner-up trophy from the Iraan Braves Tournament. The Broncos opened with a 65-55 win over McCamey. The Broncos hit 25 field goals and 14 of 21 free throws and only fouled 13 times. The first quarter saw the Broncos take a 17-12 lead and up it to 35-29 at halftime. McCamey closed to 46-41 at the end of the third quarter but the Broncos outscored the Badgers 18-14 in the final stanza. Lorri French hit 7 field goals and 8 of 11 free throws to lead the Broncos with 22 points. Debbie Bible hit 7 field goals and 4 of 6 free throws for 18 points. Becca Powers and Kristi Hill each added 7 points. Lea Whitehead scored 6. Della Heffernan added 4 points.

In the second game the Broncos handed the Eldorado Eagles another loss in the same week to the tune of 46-33. The Eagles got off to an 11-8 lead only to see the girls in red go on a 2nd quarter scoring blitz and lead at halftime 27-17 over the Eagles. The Eagles won the 3rd quarter 6 to 4 but the Broncos outscored them 15-10 in the fourth quarter. Lorri French made 9 field goals and 2 of 5 free throws for 20 points. Debbie Bible added 12. Della Heffernan 4 points. Becca Powers 3. Lea Whitehead, Kristi Hill, and Gina Heffernan made 2 points each while Judy Merrill added 1 point.

In the championship game the Broncos were matched against the hometown Iraan Braves. The Broncos got off to a 12-8 first quarter lead and managed to hang on to a 20-19 lead at halftime. The Braves outscored the Broncos 6-4 in the 3rd period to take a one-point lead into the final stanza and they made it good as they hung on and beat the Broncos 34-33. Free throws in that final stanza were very critical as Sonora made only 1 of 5 while Iraan hit 5 of 10. Lorri French led the Broncos with 18 points, Debbie Bible put in 7, Lea Whitehead added 4 while Becca Powers and Lea Whitehead scored 2 points each. It was a good tournament and an excellent week for the Broncos as they won three of four and upped their record to 7-2 for the season.

## Coastal Plains awarded bid

The SISD board of trustees met December 13 at 7 p.m. in the Board Room of the school administration building. Among the topics discussed were the district's health and hospitalization insurance for employees. Superintendent McAndrew noted that aside from the existing carrier, Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Texas, only one company, Dependable Life Insurance Company of Jacksonville, Florida has submitted a bid due to the 190 percent rate of usage during 1982-83. The board elected to continue on a month-to-month basis with Blue Cross/Blue Shield for health insurance coverage.

Bids on resurfacing the four oldest tennis courts at the athletic club were accepted. Coastal Plains of San Antonio bid \$6,314.25 and Texas Sports and Windscreens bid \$9,800.00. With the stipulation that the warranty for the work be checked on, the board unanimously accepted the low bid from Coastal Plains.

John Ingram, of the CPA firm, Eckert, Ingram, Tinker and Oliphant of San Angelo, addressed the

board on the findings of the FYE August 31, 1983 district audit. Ingram noted the financial accounting manual for school districts mandated a more detailed audit and tighter internal controls than had been required in the past. He added that the district's books were in good shape with the exception of the fixed assets.

Assistant Superintendent Mario Sotelo then told the board that the fixed assets have been thoroughly re-inventoried and were the process of being entered into a computer accounting system at the Education Service Center. The audit was unanimously approved.

Turner, Collie and Braden, Inc. was awarded a contract for engineering-water and waste-water service main design for the high school building site at an estimated cost of \$12,800.

Board President Condra asked Dr. Fields, Carl Teaff and Scott Shurley to investigate the electric service available to the building site.

Approval was given for the engineering contract with Raba-Kistner Consultants, Inc., for soil and foundation study and the high school building site.

Sealed bids for clearing the high school building site were opened by the Board President. Reese Construction bid \$7,720 to leave the debris on the site and \$12,475 to remove the debris, Charles Howard bid \$10,800 to leave the debris and \$11,800 to remove it. Location Builders bid \$10,500 to remove the debris, Carl J. Cahill, Inc. bid \$9,400 to remove the debris and Morriss Brothers bid \$6,500.

The job was awarded to the lowest bidder, Morriss Brothers, with the stipulation that they would adhere to their five day timeline, would begin immediately, and would remove all brush, debris, etc. for the site.

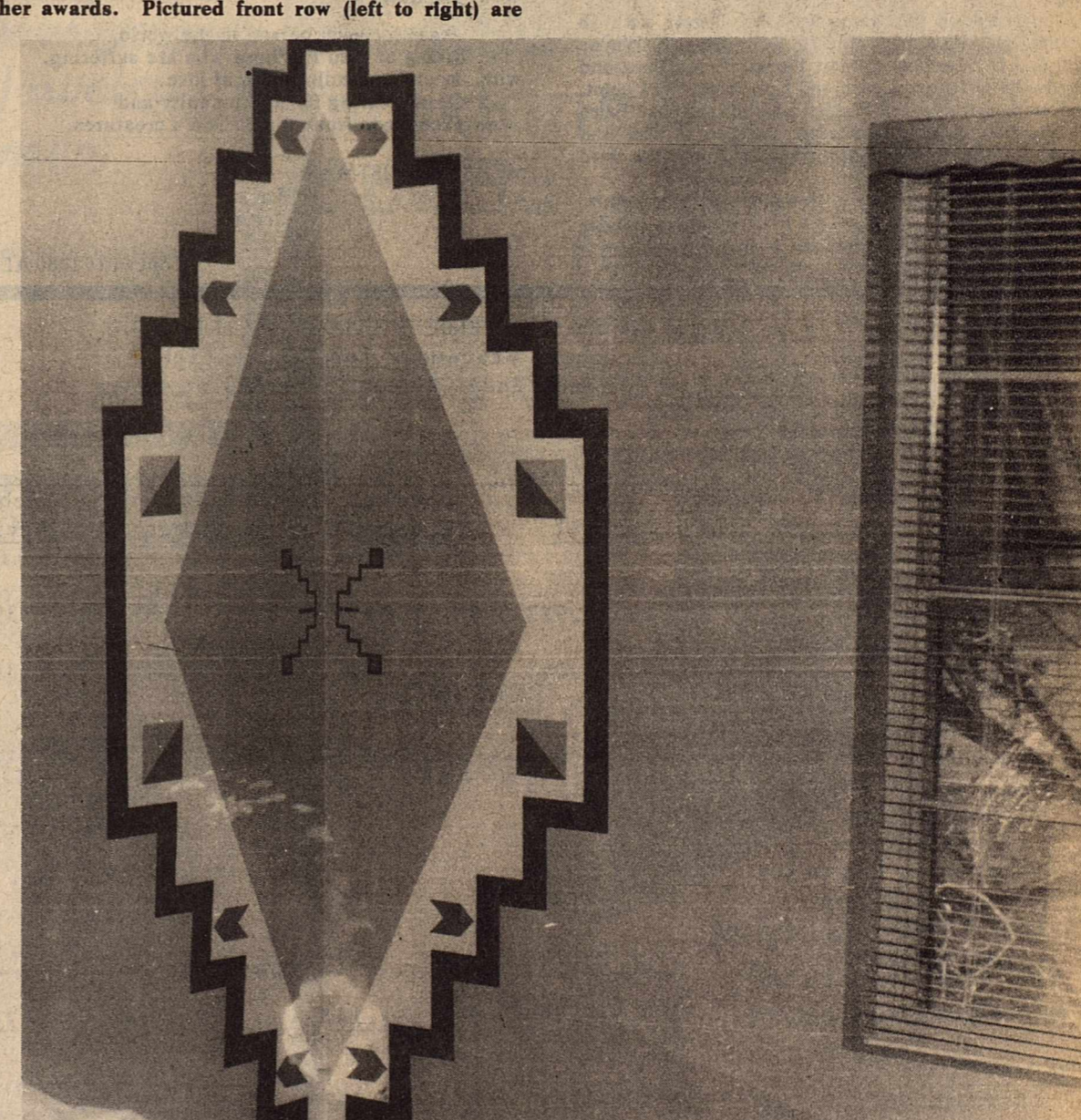
Bids to replace the washer and dryer for the gym were accepted. King Refrigerator bid \$475 for the washer, \$399 for the dryer, West Texas Utilities bid \$532 for the washer and \$418 for the dryer, Sears bid \$299 for the washer and \$249 for the dryer. The board accepted the bid from Sears.

## Hospital holds open house

The Hudspeth Memorial Hospital held its open house from 2 to 4 p.m., Sunday December 11. Hospital volunteers have redecorated patient rooms and the emergency room.

In the lab they have installed a new CBC machine which can do a blood count in one - one and one half minutes where it formerly took about 30 minutes.

They have also installed a new blood chemistry machine for ACA 12, heart, kidney and liver. This machine can run over 60 tests.

All of the renovation funds have been from individual donations. These donors include Sutton County National Bank and the Downtown Lions Club. All other donations were made by private individuals.

Dennis Robertson told reporters that they (the hospital personnel) were trying to get rid of the sterile hospital room feeling and to make people more comfortable.

The rooms have been decorated in off-white, pale yellow, light blue, rust and greyish blue. The walls have designs on them and the bedspreads match the color of the rooms.

Cookies and punch were served to those attending the open house.

Plans are to renovate the rest of the hospital as soon as possible. These areas include the nursery, labor room and the semi-private rooms.

Over 50 people showed up for the open house and now all of the rooms have been paid for.

## Public Notice / Aviso al Publico

In order to comply with the Federal Communication Commission's (FCC) Computer Inquiry II (CI-II) order and subsequent FCC Orders or rulings, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWB) has filed with the Public Utility Commission (PUC) an Application for transfer of certain assets to American Telephone and Telegraph Company (AT&T), and/or its subsidiaries.

This Application affects the provision of customer premise equipment (CPE) throughout SWB's service area in the state of Texas. Effective with the implementation of this transfer of facilities, which is expected to be on January 1, 1984, CPE equipment previously provided by SWB, under tariff, will be detariffed and as of that date will be offered to customers by AT&T and/or its subsidiaries in accordance with the order in FCC Docket No. 81-893.

The FCC's order also provides that this embedded CPE shall be offered to in-place customers on a sale or lease basis for 24 month transition period. The order further outlines the rates and conditions under which these sale or lease plans may be carried out.

For the purposes of this Application, SWB has filed proposed tariffs with the PUC, anticipated to be effective January 1, 1984, withdrawing its offerings of such customer premise equipment.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. ## McCallum to receive spending money

Ms. Deborah R. McCallum of Eldorado is one among over 3,000 Texas taxpayers who may have some extra spending money to pay this year's Christmas bills. Of the more than 2 million refund checks we mailed out this year, the post office has been unable to deliver 3,047, according to Glenn Cagle, IRS District Director for the northernmost 143 counties of Texas. "The checks have been returned to the IRS and we are holding the refunds in the taxpayer's accounts until claimed. The refunds total \$1,348,634.82 with the average check being \$442.61. Amounts range from \$1 to \$14,550.

Cagle said that the most usual reason for a refund check's failure to reach a taxpayer is that the taxpayer has moved and neglected to notify the IRS and the post office. "Even moving to a different apartment at the same street address can be the cause of the problem," he explained.

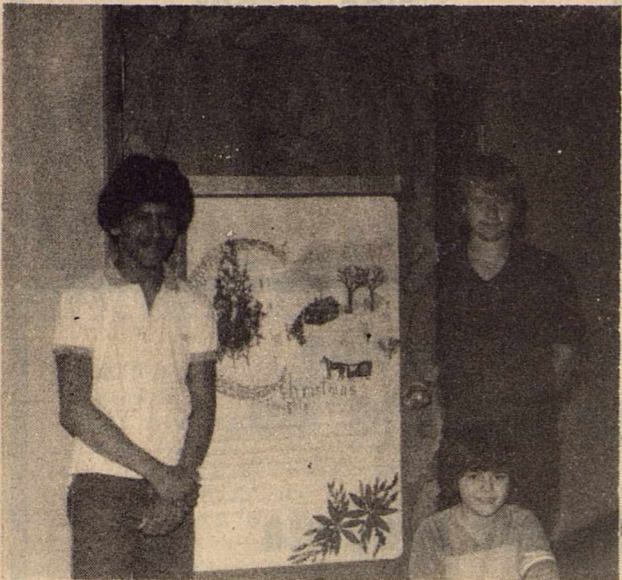

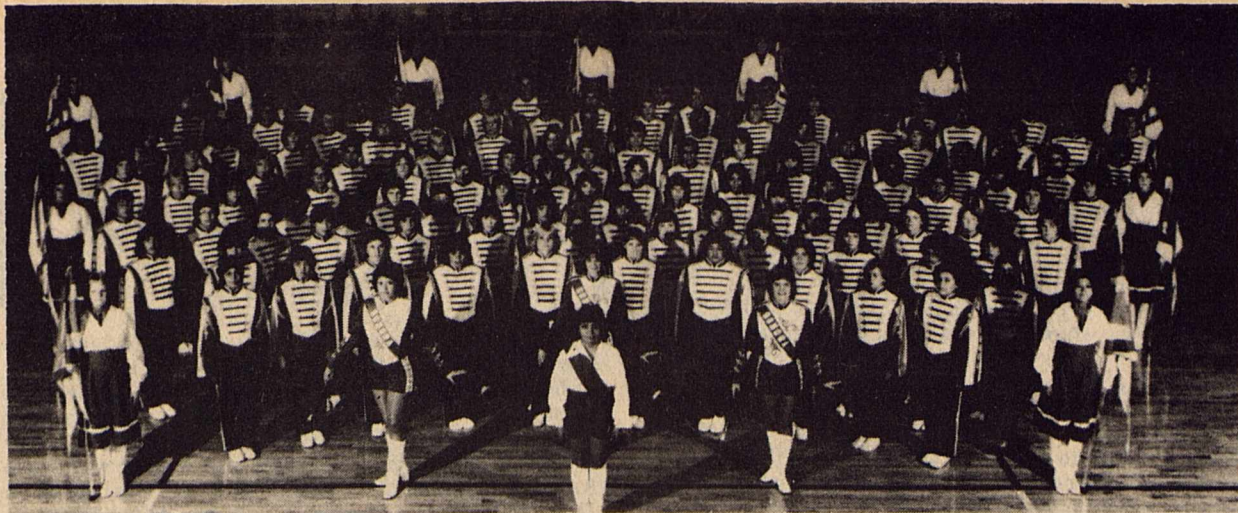

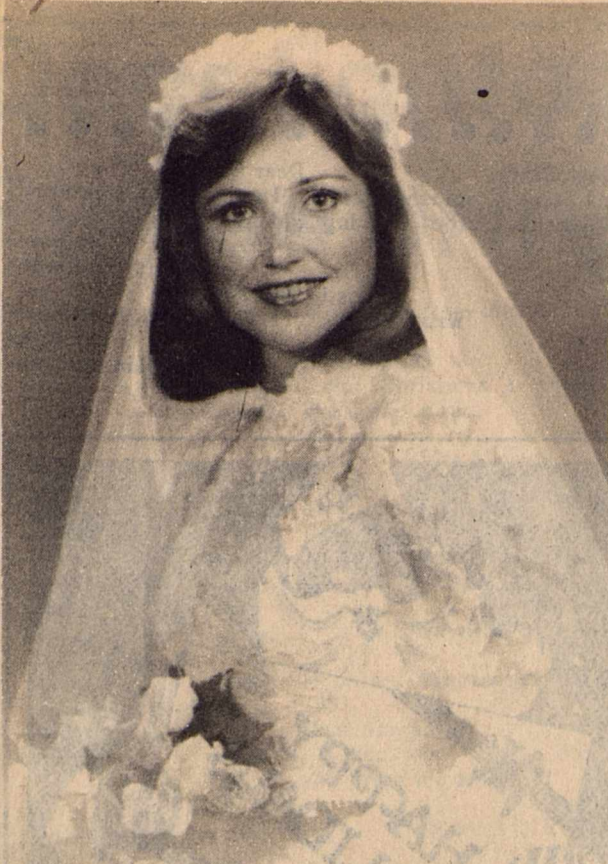

Both mothers wore white cymbidium orchid corsages.

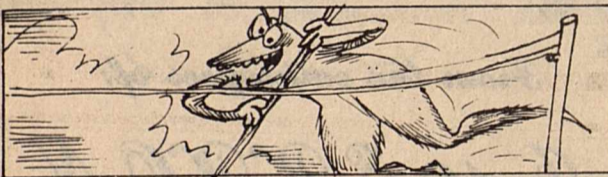

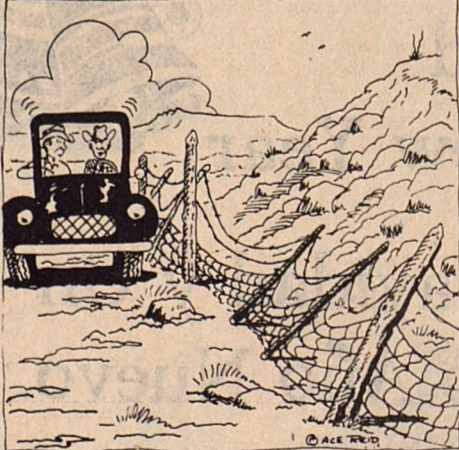

the board progress on formulation of a new five-year plan for accreditation. Various sub-committees are working to establish goals and a plan which will be submitted to the board in rough draft during the month of January. The final approved plan must be submitted to the Texas Education Agency by March 1, 1984.

Kenneth Cayce made several suggestions to the board concerning communication within the district. Dr. Fields made the suggestion that as part of the five-year plan a vehicle be considered by which a more direct line of communication be opened between the staff and the board, such as contact from employee to building representative to board. It was also suggested that after thorough study, such a policy might become incorporated into the local policy manual.

The four building principals reported enrollment as follows: Elementary 340, Middle School 322, Junior High 330 and High School 332 for a district total of 1324.

Mario Sotelo told the board that he met with staff and administration at Angelo State University in an effort to establish a basic computer course in Sonora for district personnel and/or the general public. He commented that while the University teaching personnel were very

enthusiastic about the idea, the administrators present were not encouraging. Mr. Sotelo concluded by saying that Texas Tech had contacted him for more information, and were very interested in establishing a computer course in Sonora. He will report this at a later board meeting.

The board authorized installation of a telephone extension in the library to be installed from the existing line to the Speech and Drama departments.

Superintendent McAndrew told the board that Maintenance Supervisor, Max Hardegree, had located a used pick at Sonora Ford Sales which would be a great asset to the maintenance department in that it would provide badly needed transportation for the maintenance mechanic. It is a 1980 model Chevrolet six-cylinder, one-half ton. Purchase of the vehicle was unanimously authorized.

Mr. McAndrew reported to the Board that Carol Gotcher was in the process of adjusting the heating and cooling system at the junior high school at a total cost of \$820 at this time. He further informed them that the adjustment should result in full utilization of the chiller, which would reduce the consumption of electricity and lower the utility bill substantially.

Scott Shurley addressed the meeting on the possibility of re-conducting the survey concerning the establishment of a Vocational Agriculture program at the high school level. He expressed the opinion that the recently-completed survey of students in the seventh, eighth and ninth grades was slanted toward opposing the program.

James Bible, principal of Sonora High School, explained to the board that the survey had been worded by a counselor and that it was necessary to find out how much conflict with the established curriculum and with extra-curricular activities such as band and athletics would result by the addition of the program.

The board suggested that the program director in Ballinger be contacted to come to a board meeting and give his excellent slide presentation which effectively explains the vocational agriculture and its benefits to the school and to the community.

The board has an addendum to the agenda for the December meeting. The consideration of an action on a letter of resignation from board member Sammie J. Stewart, also, the appointment of a board member to fill place 5 on the Board of Trustees vacated by resignation. The term will expire April 7, 1984.

# How to be aware of a prosecutor's role

The following article is a public service by the Devil's River News through the cooperation of Bill Mason, District Attorney of the 112th Judicial District. Its purpose is to make you aware of a prosecutor's role, of your responsibility as a resident of Sutton County and how we can work together to alleviate some of society's problems.

## AMERICAN JUSTICE (Part III) The Workings of the System

Here is the last part of a short quiz to test your knowledge of the operation and effect of the American Justice system.

- The right to remain silent and to have a lawyer is a fact which a policeman must tell a person before the policeman:
  - arrests the person.
  - asks the person for identification.
  - questions the person as a criminal suspect.
  - The purpose here is to insure a person of his constitutional right against self-incrimination.
- A defendant can plead guilty at any time:
  - before the beginning of the trial.
  - before the jury leaves to deliberate.
  - before the verdict is in.
  - This system encourages the defendant's plea at any point prior to his conviction or acquittal.
- The job of a grand jury is to:
  - weigh the defendant's guilt or innocence.
  - determine whether inmates get parole.
  - decide whether there is sufficient evidence for a trial.
  - If there is sufficient evidence to sustain the charges, the grand jury delivers an indictment formally charging the defendant. Whether there is enough evidence to sustain a conviction is up to the trial jury.
- The standard used by juries to decide a criminal case is:
  - the preponderance of the evidence.
  - guilt beyond a reasonable doubt.
  - the reasonable-man standard.
  - Our system seeks at all costs to avoid condemning an innocent person. Juries should be very sure of a defendant's guilt before they convict. By comparison, the standard in a civil case is the preponderance of the evidence. Here the jury simply determines which side--plaintiff or defendant--has the weight of the evidence behind him. Imagine a balance scale, with the evidence for one party on one side and for the other party on the opposite side. In a civil case the scale need only tip slightly in the direction of either side to decide the case for that party. However, in a criminal case, the state's side of the scale must be fully weighed down

  - The Court is actually able to review in detail only about 200 cases per year.
- About how many civil suits are brought annually to the U.S.?
  - 2.5 million
  - 37 million
  - 12 million
  - Only 10 percent of these will actually be tried.

- Which side wins most often when a civil suit is tried?
    - The plaintiff (the person suing) wins 80 percent of the time.
    - The defendant wins about 70 percent of the time.
    - Each side wins about half the time.
    - When you think about it, this is as it should be. It indicates a balance in the way parties perceive the value of their cases, the way jurors and judges decide them, and the way the courts administer them.
- Each citizen bears a responsibility to the system of justice in America. Only through information, awareness, and concern can the system be improved.

## Christmas trees produce a wheeze toward asthma

Can Christmas trees produce a wheeze! They can according to the American Lung Association of Texas. For the two million children under 17 who have asthma, the Christmas season harbors a number of triggers that can bring on an asthma episode.

dander; stuffed toy animals, too, can be a problem. They retain dust and can become a home for the house dust mite.

The Lung Association warns that all clothing should be washed or dry cleaned before it is put on for the first time may remove the finishing materials used by the manufacturer to which many children with asthma are allergic.

Even colognes, perfumes, scented soap and other such products can produce an allergic reaction in the asthmatic child.

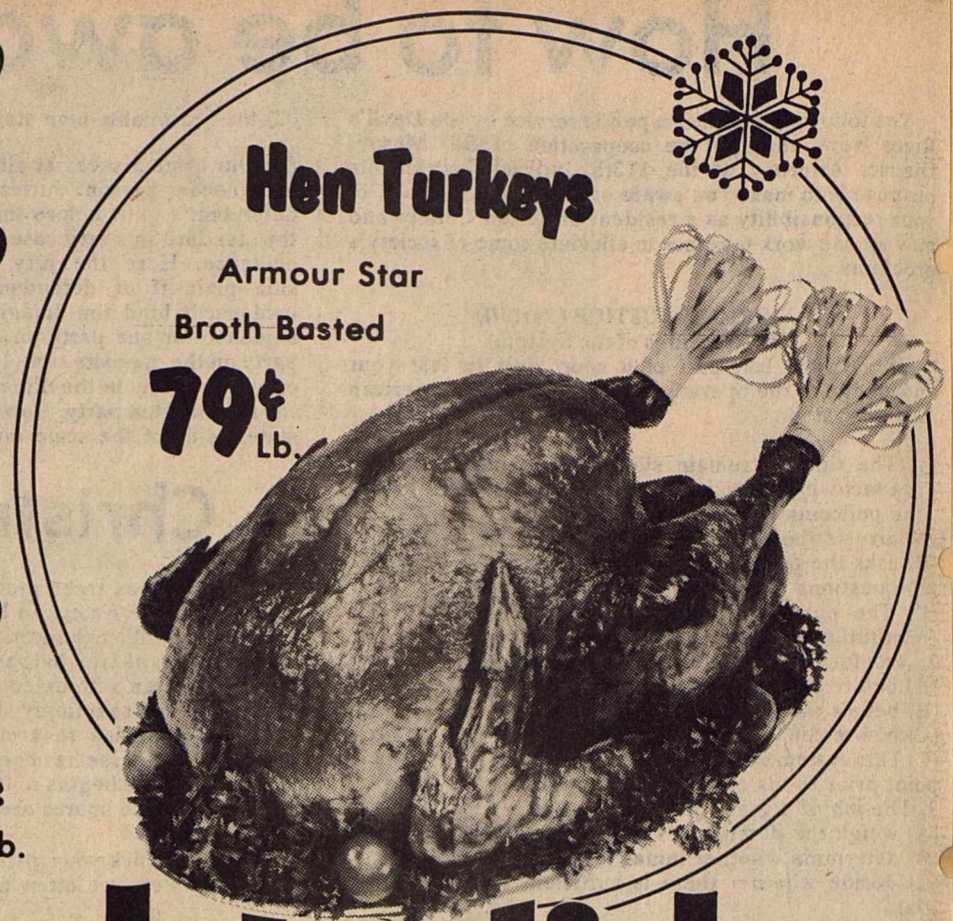
