CEC meets with official of Tech

Members of the Continuing Education Committee (CEC) met Wednesday afternoon with Bill Askins, ED.D., professor and associate dean of the College of Education at Texas Tech University, regarding the possibility of Tech offering college courses in Sonora.

Smith Neal, vice chairman of the CEC; Carol Jones, secretary, and Gus Allen and W.A. McAndrew, members of the committee; visited with Askins as well as Ted Cotton, assistant superintendent of the Ozona schools; Jackie Pederson with Tech's computer program; and Texas Senator Bill Sims.

Askins explained that "extension courses" would yield college credit for as many as six hours of graduate level work but Askins could not give a definite "yes" or "no" about undergraduate level work. He will report back to the Sonora group after consulting Dr. Michael Mezack, director of Continuing Education at Tech.

Resident off-campus courses would, on the other hand, give college credit for all courses at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Either program would satisfy the teachers' requirement of six hours every five years.

The extension program would benefit individuals interested in self-improvement courses, not a baccalaureate degree at the undergraduate level.

The off-campus resident courses, however, would more benefit individuals seeking a degree.

Askins will also consult with Dr. Mezak about the possibility of Tech expanding the Junction campus program to include Sonora, Eldorado and Ozona, per request of W.A. McAndrew, superintendent of Sonora schools.

According to Askins, courses would cost approximately \$90 per student, based on a 15 student classroom, plus textbooks and materials. The fee would be adjusted for fewer students.

The Continuing Committee of Sonora was formed last summer by a group of people interested in improving the Educational opportunities of this area to help teachers and to make college-level courses available to citizens who might not be able to participate in "on campus" college courses.

Varsity "fems" on winning streak

The Sonora varsity girls basketball team seems to have gotten all the parts working together like a fine tuned machine and just at the most opportune time. The Sonora girls along with Crane sit a-top of district 6-AAA with perfect 3-0 record, 13-5 for the season, Ballinger is 2-1, Coahoma 1-2; while Colorado City and Ozona are both 0-3.

The Sonora girls opened the weeks play west down 1-10 at Ozona and they took a 66-41 decision from the Lions. The Broncos took a 9-5 first quarter lead and upped it to 29-12 as they exploded for 20 points in the second quarter. The Broncos didn't let up as they poured in 23 third period points to take a 53-36 lead. The Sonora girls committed 26 fouls to the Lions 34. In the free-throw department the Broncos were 26 of 46 while the Lions were 11 of 23.

Debbie Bible led the Broncos with 6 field goals and 8 of 13 from the foul line for a total of 20 points. Lorrie French added 11 points, Lea Whitehead and Kristi Hill put in 8 each, Della Heffernan got 6, Judy Merrill 5, Becca Powers 4, Carla Jungk and Bonnie Jackson 2 points each. Lorrie French and Judy Merrill both fouled-out for the Broncos while 4 Lions fouled out.

The Broncos then played at home on Friday against the Colorado City Wolves and took a 62-47 win to keep their district slate perfect. The first half was close and the Broncos had a 28-21 halftime lead. That blew the game wide open with 24 points in the 3rd quarter while C-City managed but 8.

Lorrie French led the Broncos with 16 points, Kristi Hill and Debbie Bible each scored 11. Judy Merrill got eight, Lea Whitehead six, Anita Balch four, Lora Lea Kordzik, Della Heffernan and Bonnie Jackson each put

in two points. The Broncos hit 12 of 25 free throws to C-City's 5 of 13. The Broncos had 17 fouls to C-City's 25. None of the Broncos fouled out while two of the Wolves did manage to get five fouls.

The Broncos will be hoping that their scoring maching stays in tip-top form as they host Ballinger and go to Crane this week to conclude the first half of district play.

The Sonora JV girls added 2 more wins to their ledger for a season record of 13-5. They beat Ozona 50-28 and Colorado City 55-35.

At Ozona Carrie Sorenson led the Broncos with 12 points, Leigh French got 8, Michelle McClery 7, Stacy Miller and Traci Cascadden each, Belinda Mendez got 5, Kate Mathews, Kathy Richter and Sandy Blankenship each scored 2 points. The Broncos hit 10 of 26 freethrows and Mathews, Cascadden and Ridgeway all fouled-out.

In the Colorado City game Gina Heffernan sparked the Broncos with 12 points, Michelle McClery added 11 points, Leigh French 9, Traci Cascadden 8, Kate Mathews and Gayann Dobbs 4 each, Carrie Sorenson, Kathy Richter and Sidonna Ridgeway all scored 2 points each. Belinda Mendez added 1 point. The Broncos hit 9 of 24 freethrows and no-one fouled-out.

It was a good week and the Broncos hope they keep things going as they will be in the Eldorado EJV Tournament this weekend. The JV boys also beat Colorado-City and will play in the tournament.

The Sonora Varsity Boys lost their district opener 70-53 to Colorado-City. Elsewhere around District 6AAA Crane beat Ballinger 68-64 and Coahoma beat Ozona 70-51.

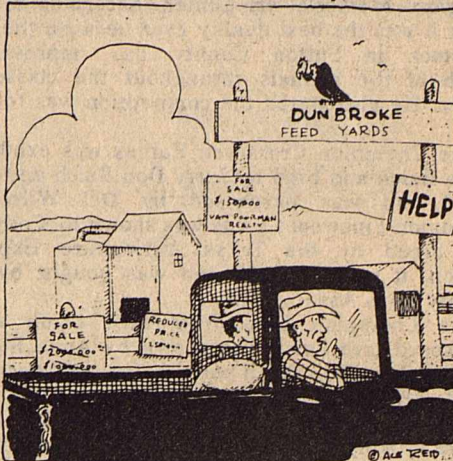
For 1983 there was \$1042.91 turned in and all of the children did an excellent job. The top 10

\$200 donation made

In the Sutton County Commissioners meeting January 9 it was announced the Sutton County Game Dinner Association has made a \$200 donation to the park. This money will be used for park improvement. The county auditor informed the County Commissioners the county could no longer fund the firemen's utility bills according to the Attorney General. The County Attorney or the Attorney General would have to approve that the county could do so. This matter will be looked into further and the County Attorney will be asked to approve the funding. The court costs will be more expensive this year than last. This includes all uniform traffic laws except weight and scale.

A special meeting was tentatively set to meet with the architect on January 23 at 9 a.m.

Virgil Poloczek reported he had inspected the dams in this area and found sites 6 and 10 are in bad shape in Eldorado. Site 13 has had the fence cut in one place by young motorcycle riders. The mesquite, prickly pear and brush will be removed from the sites where needed and repairs will be made so vegetation can start growing again. Letters will be written to the people allowing their livestock to graze on these areas.

Library fees were raised from \$5 to \$10 as many areas around Sonora have already done.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In proceedings pending before the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), local exchange telephone companies are requesting authority to charge AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc., for use of their facilities. These proposed charges are higher than AT&T Communications can pay at current Texas long distance rate levels. To position itself to be able to implement rates that are sufficient to produce revenues that will recover the costs facing the company, AT&T Communications must now file for rate relief to be able to implement rates that reflect the costs of access that are ultimately imposed on the company.

While AT&T Communications does not want to increase its Texas rates, an increase would be required to recover the increased access charges AT&T Communications will have to pay to the local exchange telephone companies under several proposals pending before the Commission. These access charges at the proposed increased levels represent more than 80 percent of AT&T Communications' operating expense in Texas.

Accordingly, AT&T Communications, in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the rules of the PUC, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of rates for long distance calls within Texas. The proposed rates will be effective January 28, 1984, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. All customers and classes of customers would be affected by AT&T Communications' proposed rates.

If higher access charges are ordered, AT&T Communications has no recourse but to pay these charges and recover the costs from its customers as a cost of providing long distance service within Texas. AT&T Communications has filed rates which would mean a maximum overall increase in adjusted test period revenues of \$301.4 million, or 27.85 percent. This amount would help recover cost increases due to the proposed level of access charges now pending before the PUC.

A complete copy of all tariffs and rate schedules is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with every municipality in Texas.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. 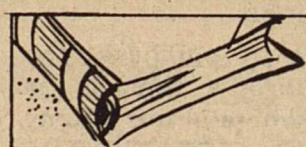

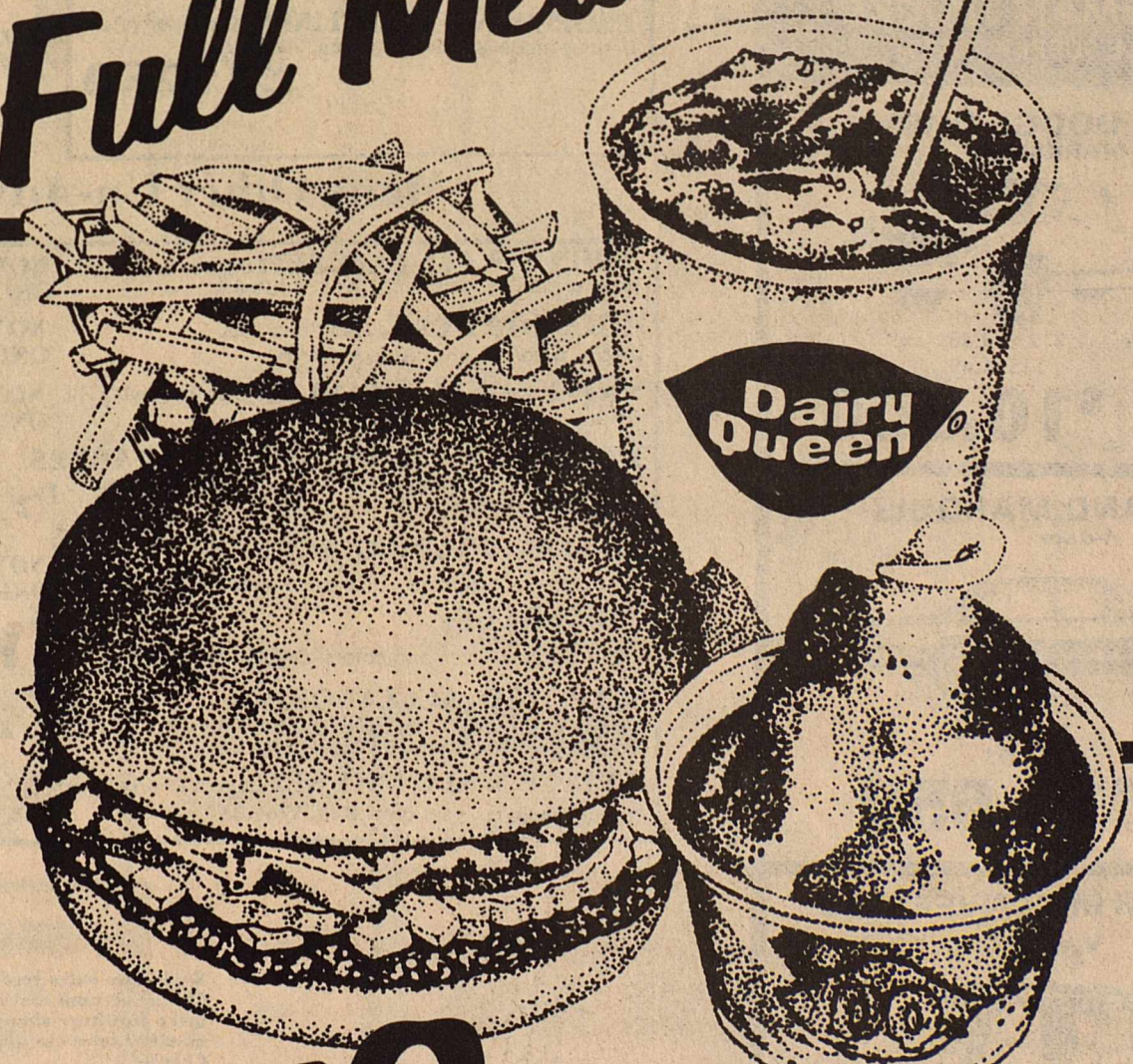

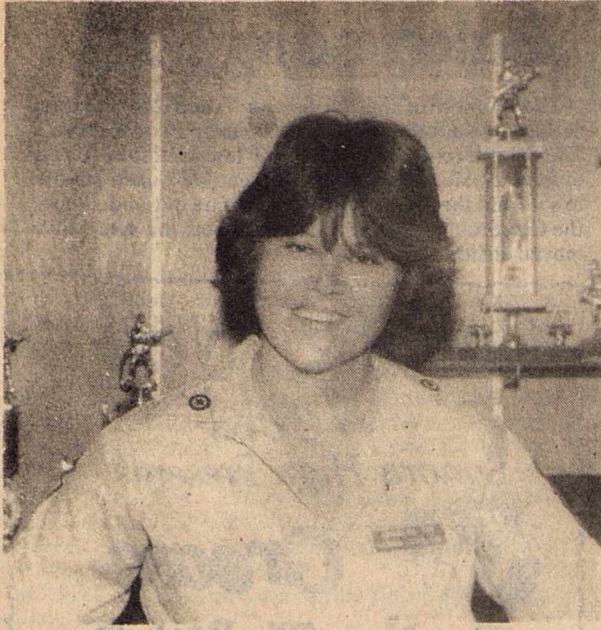

W.T.U. gets rate increase

New rates for West Texas Utilities Co.'s retail customers have received final approval of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are now in effect.

The rates are designed to provide an annual revenue increase of \$11.97 million. The company, in its rate request filed last June 10, had asked for \$26.5 million.

Although the change means a 5.2 per cent increase in total retail rates, the current effect will be a decrease for customers who have been paying temporary rates the past 2 1/2 months. WTU had started collecting interim rates, as allowed by law, on Oct. 22 from all customers except those in 30 towns whose cases had been appealed to the PUC.

Because the final rates approved by the PUC are lower than the temporary rates, WTU will refund the difference plus interest. This will be done by crediting customers bills and should be accomplished during February and March.

Cash refunds will be mailed to customers who have moved off WTU lines or transferred to towns where the interim rates were not in effect. These checks will be sent to the customer's last known address.

If these customers have not received refunds by April 1, they should contact their former local WTU office.

Amount of refunds will vary according to the size of the customer bills. For example, for a customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours of electricity a month, the difference would be \$4.34. At this rate, his refund for the entire period would amount to about \$12.

Refunds will be made to all customers served by WTU during the period from Oct. 22 to Jan. 6, except those who live in the city limits of the following towns:

Alpine, Aspermont, Balmorhea, Bronte, Clyde, Cross Plains, Dodson, Estelline, Hawley, Iraan, Jayton, Junction, Lawn, Lueders, Marfa, Memphis, Menard, Merkel, Miles, Presidio, Putnam, Quitaque, Rankin, Santa Anna, Shamrock, Sonora, Sterling City, Turkey, Tuscola and Valentine.

None of the rate changes apply in the City of Vernon. Where WTU's rates are kept the same as those of the city's municipal system and already are higher than those in the remainder of the system.

These patient services as well as education materials of all types are just a few of the ways we can help."

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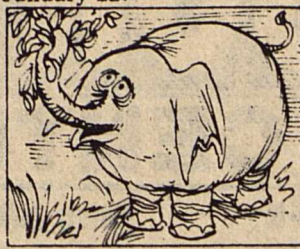
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First Baptist Church PTA meeting held to host film

Ballinger Ag. teacher presents program

A meeting was held January 12 in the Sonora Vocational Building to inform the public about Vocational Agriculture. Rodney Flannagan, Vocational Agriculture Teacher in Ballinger, Texas, presented slides on the Vocational Ag. program in Ballinger. Flannagan explained what Vocational Ag. is for, and what the students learn in Ag. He explained it is informative for all students whether they plan to make a career of it or not.

The Vocational Ag. program is a four year program. He feels the first year is the most important because it gets into the basics of all the different areas, such as, breeding and raising livestock and all the responsibilities involved, such as the keeping of records that go along with it.

Each year of Ag. then gets more and more involved into these basics of Ag. I.

The most important topic Flannagan stressed is the parliamenture proceedings the students learn. Every student in Ag. I class studies and practices the process and then a team is chosen from the class to go to district competition. He stated it teaches the students self-assurance and how to talk in front of people.

School Board votes to increase mechanic's salary at meeting

Following the executive session of the Sonora Independent School District Board of Trustees Tuesday night, it was unanimously decided to raise the salary of Maintenance Mechanic Alan Hill's salary by \$100 per month.

In other action Tuesday, Pete Lopez asked the board for an estimate of the cost of additions to the new high school and was told that an addition such as the 300 square feet added to the resource classroom station would cost approximately 70 percent of the basic \$50 per square or about \$9000 more than the original estimated building cost.

The board amended the 1983-84 budget by adding \$325,000 to the Facilities Acquisition Capital Outlay fund set aside for the fees of architects and consultants, bringing the total budget to \$5,111,391.

During the course of the financial reports, Superintendent of Sonora Schools W.A. McAndrew informed the board that the purchasers of the high school bond issue, RepublicBank of Dallas, anticipated making full payment for the issue Friday, January 13 and that \$5,937,004.51 (\$6,000,000 less \$120,000 good faith deposit plus \$57,004.51 accrued interest from December 1, 1983) would be deposited in the First National Bank of Sonora at that time for the immediate and unconditional credit of the district.

McAndrew also informed the board that the expense of long distance calls to the district was too low to warrant further investigation of the use of a Watts line. He also reported briefly on general maintenance in the district, adding that during the recent rains few leaks have been noticed, and that those would be repaired shortly.

The board was also informed that of the approximately 1,400 yards of fill dirt remaining on the high school building site, about 1,100 yards belong to Charles Howard Construction, with the remainder being the property of Frank Adkins.

Howard has offered his fill to the district for \$3 per yard if needed. The board agreed by consensus that this was a fair price and instructed the superintendent

to offer the same amount to Adkins for his share. The board will take action on purchase of the fill at its January 24 meeting pending agreement by the present owners to the \$3 per yard sale price.

In conclusion of the superintendent's report, McAndrew requested permission to allow Keith Jones, presently serving with the United States Air Force in Oklahoma, to do his student teaching in the vocational field in Sonora for three weeks and permission was granted.

Principals from the four schools reported a total of 1318 students enrolled in the district. In elementary, 341; middle school, 323; junior high school, 324; and high school, 330.

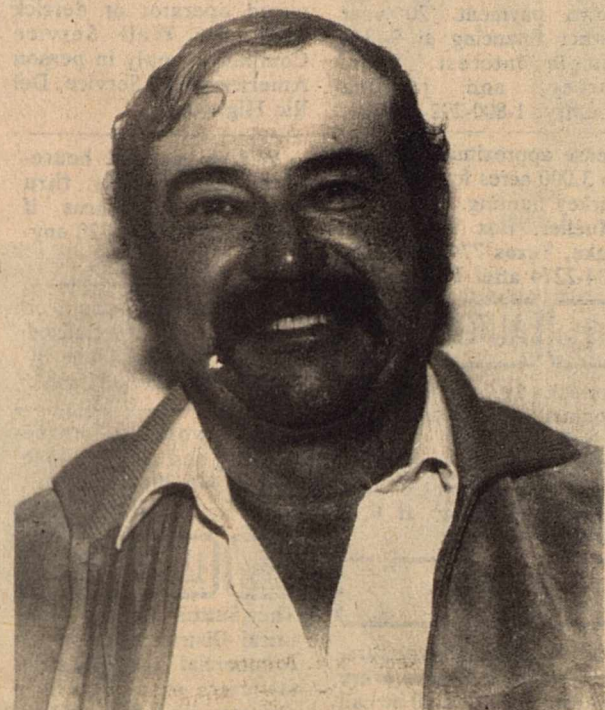
In other action, the board granted permission to assistant superintendent Mario Sotelo to plan a trip to take the students in the Gifted and Talented Program on an educational tour of McDonald's Observatory, Sul Ross State University, the Prude Ranch, Fort Davis, Fort Stockton, and Fort Lancaster during the month of March.

Under the heading of unfinished business, the board approved the plans and specifications for lighting the tennis courts and authorized advertising for bids. The board also expressed its general approval of the alternative plan for improving the condition of the football field as submitted by the superintendent and the maintenance supervisor. The board suggested that the quality of the sand from Junction at \$12.50 per yard be investigated before proceeding with the program.

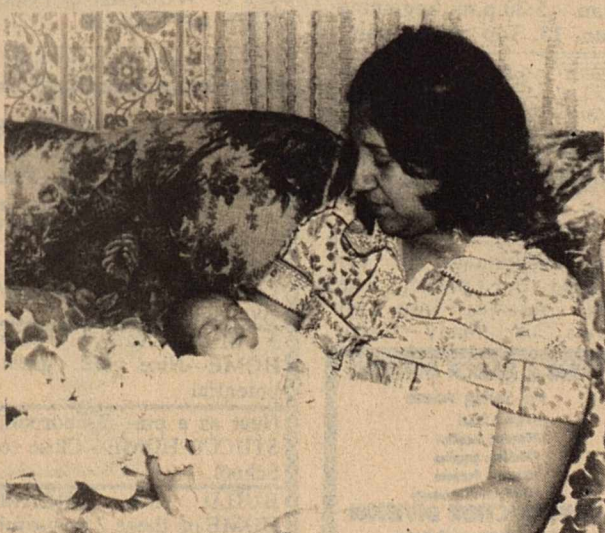
In new business, the board voted to lease two drivers' Education cars at a cost of \$150 per month each. One vehicle will be leased from Sonora Ford and one from Chaparral Motors.

In board member comments, Kenneth Cayce suggested that more than one method of heating and air conditioning at the new high school be investigated before finalization of construction plans.

He also suggested that the district have some facts and figures published which would show the district's status and standing in the educational process.

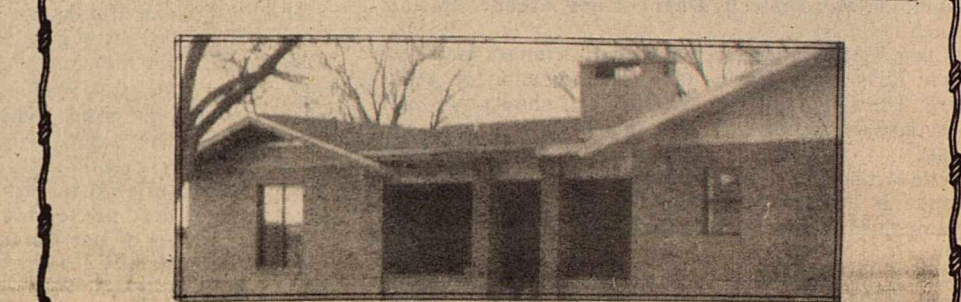
