

# Hudspeth and St. John's unite

*Hands joined to provide state-of-the-art health care*

We are proud to announce the linking of Sonora to San Angelo by affiliation to the Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital to St. John's Hospital. The Board of Trustees of both Hudspeth and St. John's hospitals, along with the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word, joined hands through the signing of a management contract between Hudspeth Hospital and St. John's Hospital, August 12, at 12 noon in the auditorium of St. John's Hospital. A celebration luncheon followed.

In this relationship, the Board of Trustees of Hudspeth Hospital will continue to maintain their responsibilities and oversee the expertise of management throughout their facility while under the auspices of St. John's Hospital.

Although Hudspeth Hospital will remain an independent operation, Administrator Mr. Terry McNutt

and Assistant Administrator Mrs. Kathy Knight will become employees of St. John's.

The decision to accept the offer of a management contract was unanimous by all involved, and was based on philosophical reasons. Hudspeth Hospital was impressed with the philosophy of St. John's Hospital, their dedication to providing state-of-the-art health care, continuing education programs for their staff and the public, and a strong commitment to serving the needs of their community. And, in keeping with the theme of Hudspeth, St. John's recognized the importance of providing health care to people as near their home as possible resulting in the reduction of hospital costs, less time away from home and a higher state of emotional well-being. Also, a stronger community effort will remain intact as Hudspeth Hospital continues to support their local economy. Overall, it is the aim of St. John's to enable Hudspeth to continue

to maintain high quality care to patients in both their hospital and nursing home.

St. John's Hospital, a non-profit organization, was the third to present a contract possibility. Hudspeth Hospital had been offered a long term, 40 year lease from a profit corporation intending to remove all management power from their local Board of Trustees and with no offer of a positive philosophy. Another corporation wanted to reduce the hospital to an ambulatory care unit referring patients outside Sonora.

St. John's will develop a management plan for Hudspeth Hospital to include capital improvements to their physical plant. They will assist in physician recruitment, provide accessibility for Hudspeth physicians to physicians on St. John's medical staff, and improve and expand the educational programs currently available to Hudspeth Hospital employees. St. John's will be instrumental in implementing admini-

strative and managerial support, and in developing and/or providing a program of trustee orientation and education. Additionally, St. John's will assist in the formulation of an annual capital and operational budget.

St. John's is part of a multi-hospital system called Incarnate Word Health System of San Antonio. There are a total of nine hospitals in the system, two of which are smaller hospitals obtained in the last twelve months. One of the two, which originally had a management agreement with St. Anthony's in Amarillo, is now a satellite of St. Anthony's.

St. John's Hospital is celebrating its Diamond Jubilee this year; providing quality physical, spiritual and mental health care to patients for 75 years. Adding Hudspeth Hospital to its team will definitely enhance the celebration year for both Sonora and San Angelo.

Juniors - Monday August 19th - 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.  
Sophomores - Tuesday August 20th - 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

Freshmen Tuesday August 20th 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.  
Most students have already decided which courses they are to take. These students will only need to arrange their class schedule. Students that did not pre-register in the spring will need to select courses as well as arrange their schedule.
