J.G. Crouch is truly rodeo's wild and crazy guy. His hilarious and unpredictable antics in the rodeo arena, which may include almost anything at anytime, are largely spontaneous, and accordingly leads him to be one of the most visible and popular of all rodeo athletes.

He is a superb athlete, with four years of varsity football competition at Texas Christian University to his credit, serving as team captain during his senior year. This athletic prowess serves him well in his duties as a barrel man clown.

J.G. serves as the ringleader for most of the comedy skits and routines which provide continuation between the various rodeo competitions. His well-timed interaction between the rodeo announcer and his fellow clowns provide a measure of relief to spectators during the dangerous bull riding competition, and, at the blink of an eye, he may be called upon to assist the

bull fighter clowns to help protect a cowboy from a dangerous bull.

J.G. was born and raised in Killeen, Texas, where he began rodeo clowning at the tender age of fourteen. He taught school for several years after college, working with young people, before joining the PRCA in 1977 to work full time in his clowning profession. He and his lovely wife Scotti live in Killeen.

His talent does not stop with his clowning, as he has developed skill as a reputable animal trainer. His specialty is in raising and training miniature mules, which he uses to pull two miniature chariots in a thrilling and dangerous Ben Hur type of chariot race; which is a feature of almost every rodeo where he performs.

Kicking off the Annual event will be a single steer roping Thursday, August 22nd, at 2:30 p.m. World Champions such as Roy Cooper, Arnold Felts, Phil Lyne, and Guy Allen are planning to participate.

On Friday, August 23rd at 5 p.m. there will be a parade starting downtown and ending at the Clint Langford Memorial 4-H Center with a bar-b-que at 6 p.m. Cowboys and Cowgirls are urged to participate in the Parade and the rodeo Grand Entry.

The Rodeo performance will begin each night at 8 p.m. at the Sutton County Park Arena, featuring some 350 professional cowboys and cowgirls from all over the U.S. and Canada, vying for some \$30,000 in prize money.

J.G. Crouch, Professional Rodeo Clown and Barrelman, will be on hand with his unpredictable and hilarious antics. Sharing the bull fighting honors will be two of the hottest young clowns in PRCA Rodeo, Mike "Smurf" Horton of Zolfo Springs, Florida and Chuck Kinney from Sulphur, Louisiana.

Saturday morning at 9 a.m. the Sutton County Days celebration will begin at the Sutton County Courthouse lawn. There will be something for everyone to enjoy with arts, crafts and food booths, music, crowning of Miss Sutton County, fiddlers contest, reunions, etc. Don't miss the fun and games.

At 10 a.m. Saturday there will be a Jackpot barrel race at the Sutton County Park Arena.

This year's rodeo will be produced by Bad Company Rodeo, Inc. of Sonora, which promises one of the fastest moving and colorful rodeos in the business. Bad Company is owned and operated by Mack Altizer, son of World Champion Roper, Jim Bob Altizer.

In conjunction with the rodeo there will be dance Friday night with music furnished by the "Kim Allen Band" and Saturday night everyone can dance to the music of "Bob Blandford and The Rodeo Men."

Make plans now to attend Pro rodeo at its best!! Advance tickets may be purchased from the Sutton County Queen contestants with adults being \$5 and children \$3.

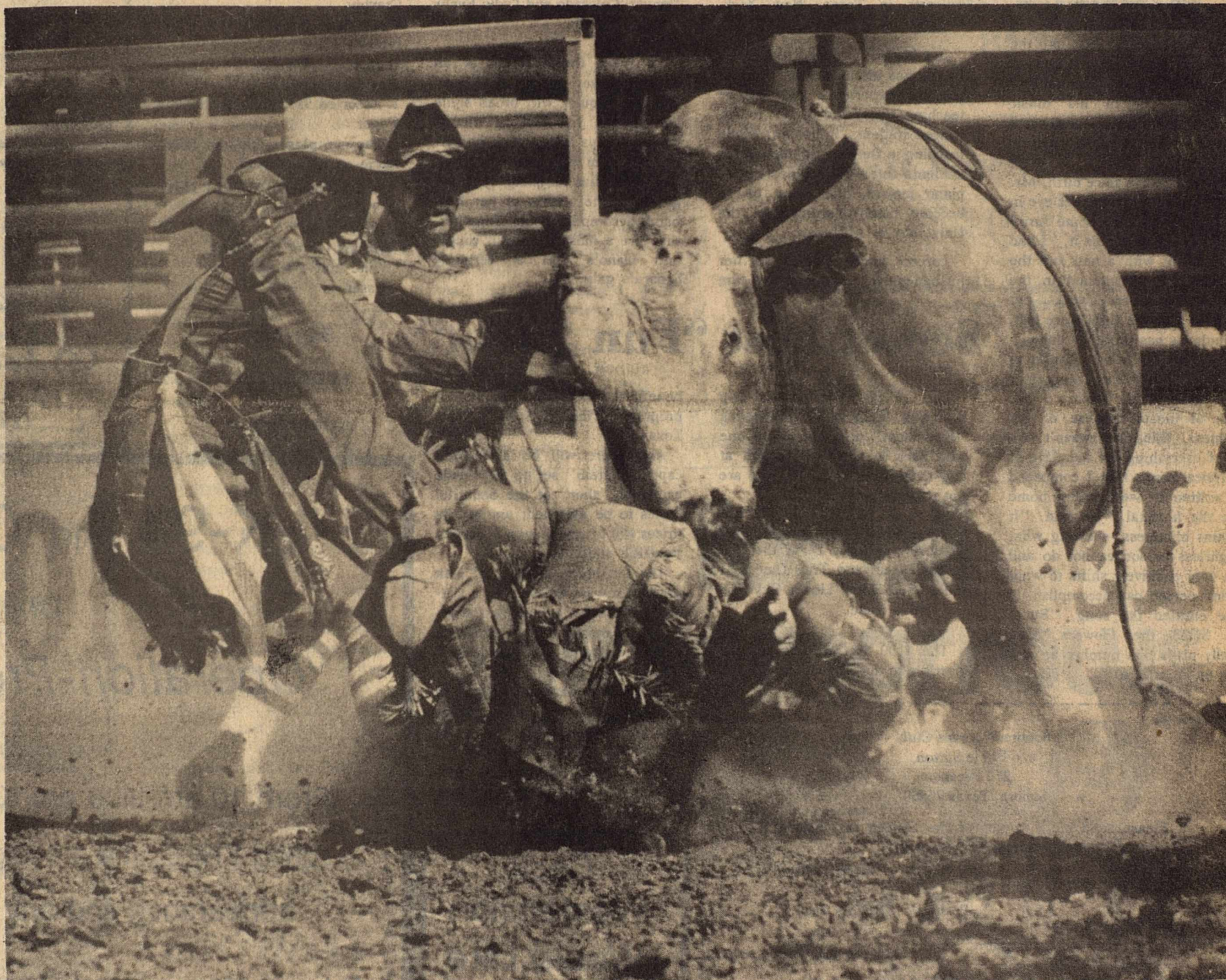

DON LARDIE

The pair appear to be an average middle-age couple taking care of business in downtown Sonora but several things set them apart. First, they are newcomers having moved here from Llano. Second, he is a concert pianist and he is blind. All this by way of introduction to Don and Loretta Lardie.

Mr. Lardie was born in 1928 in Detroit, Michigan. He is the youngest of eight children born to the Lardie's both professional musicians and began his music studies at age four. He performed for the first time in public when he was seven.

Blind in one eye since birth, Mr. Lardie lost sight in his other eye in 1980, while repairing some furniture. As he so aptly puts it, "I had an argument with a nail and the nail won." He remained in the hospital for several weeks but efforts to save his sight were lost.

Blindness has probably enhanced the character of Mr. Lardie as he says, "I now have a greater appreciation for the feeling of the depth of music because of my blindness. Blindness wasn't the end of everything for me. One of the lyrical songs that I composed was written the week I came home from the hospital," he said, "It explains blindness, showing what a sightless person cannot do and then very positively shifts to what a blind person can accomplish."

He entitled the song, "But I Can Smell the Flowers." He usually plays this number at concerts as an encore.

Mr. Lardie has studied in association with St. Mary's Academy of Music, Trinity University and is a graduate of Gilead Missionary College in New York. He has also directed numerous orchestras in the 1950's and has given piano concerts in Texas, New York, Michigan and Europe.

In addition to concert tours, Mr. Lardie has attained forty years of teaching experience and will be teaching piano and organ, to advanced students, in Sonora. While teaching in Detroit, eighteen of his students entered the University as piano majors, one going on to become piano instructor at the University of Michigan.

Loretta Lardie serves as her husband's eyes, accompanying him

as he makes his daily rounds." Fortunately, she is musically gifted and this is helpful" says Mr. Lardie.

The Lardie's have been married for 30 years and have two grown daughters, Elizabeth Winn of Denver, Colorado and Lydia Evans of Marble Falls.

To meet the Lardie's is an experience you won't soon forget. Don has a quick wit, broad smile and though you feel as though you've always known him, he carries with him the essence of royalty. Loretta has laughing eyes and glows as she speaks of her husband's accomplishments. Together, they are a most delightful couple and Llano's loss is certainly Sonora's gain.

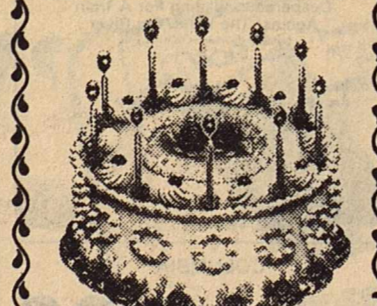

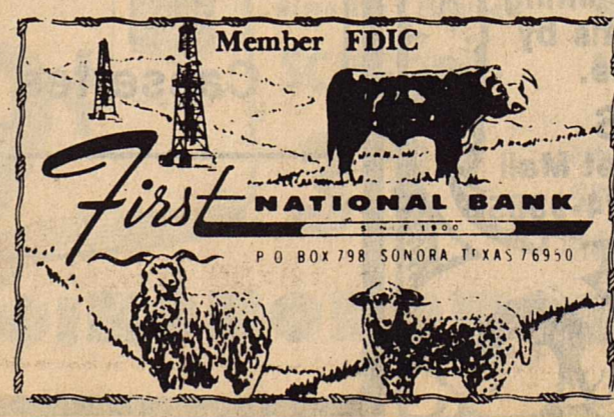

"Sound of Music" comes to Sonora

Rodgers and Hammerstein's immortal *The Sound of Music* will be presented August 22-25 by Sonora Community Arts and Theater. Evening performances are scheduled Thursday, Friday, and Saturday at 7 p.m. with the final matinee Sunday at 2:30 p.m. in the Sonora High School Auditorium.

The production is under the direction of Caroline Canfield, Angelo State University drama instructor. The roles of Maria and Captain Von Trapp are played by locals Joy Galbreath and Joe Lane. Other major characters are: Max-John Tedford, Elsa-Karen Pearson of San Angelo, Mother Abbess-Betty Stephen. The cast numbers 39, including a 16-voice women's chorus. Piano accompaniment is by Valerie Teford and Doris Rousselot, with John Tedford on organ and Patti Strauch on guitar. Virgil Polocsek is in charge of set construction.

Director Canfield, a graduate of Emporia State University, is well known in Texas, having directed productions for both ASU and Baylor University, as well as *Carmen* for the San Angelo and Midland-Odessa Symphonies. She was previously associated with Northwestern University in Chicago and the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C.

Set Design is by Steve Street, University of Texas graduate in art. He served on the production staff of the Dallas Summer Musicals for two seasons. In September he leaves for Spain for a year of independent work in the creative arts.

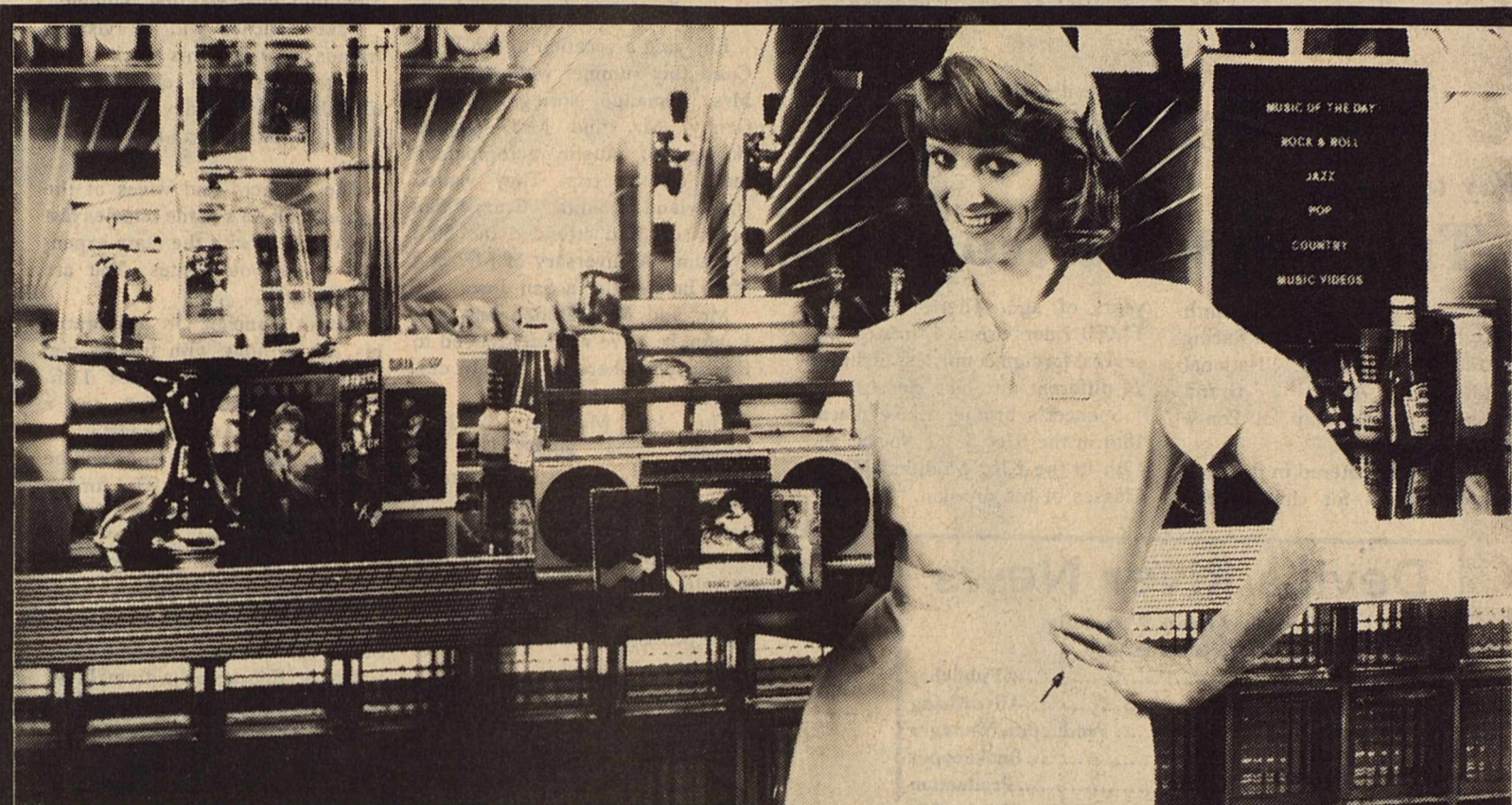

Vehicles stolen minutes apart

At 1:20 a.m. Tuesday August 13th, a 1977 Ford 4-wheel drive pickup was reported stolen from 1412 Tayloe Avenue. This vehicle belonged to Richard Gonzales of Sonora.

At 2:30 a.m. Sonora Police Officer Allen Tucker was flagged down by Rudy reported that his 1978 Ford Bronco had also been stolen from in front of his Glasscock Street residence. A witness had seen a silver 2 door "low rider" type vehicle drive by the Bronco only minutes before the theft.

At 2:32 a.m. Deputy Craddock radioed Patrolman Tucker to report that he had seen the Gonzales pickup and a silver "low rider" vehicle stopped just east of the comfort station on westbound IH-10. Craddock stated that he observed three men siphoning gasoline out of the silver vehicle and that it looked like they were putting gasoline into the stolen pickup.

Officer Tucker and Craddock placed the three men under arrest at 2:40 a.m. The three are identified as Hector Manuel Palacios, 30 years, Juarez Mexico; Homero Palacios Rivera, 33 years, Juarez, Mexico; and Daniel Melendez Perez 37 years, El Paso, Texas.

All three had bonds set before Sutton County Justice of Peace, Herman Moore at \$20,000 each. Melendez was held in Sutton County Jail. Both Palacios and Rivera were transported to Eldorado by Sonora City Officers where they were held, because the Sutton County Jail was full.

At the time of the arrest officers

found four ignition switches in the silver 1975 Chevrolet belonging to Palacios. The keys to these switches were found in the vehicle also.

Both Palacios and Rivera gave voluntary statements at the Police Department before being transported.

In their statement both men said that they left Juarez, Mexico about eight days before to go to Austin, to get work. They stayed in Austin with a brother-in-law but could not find work. They met Daniel Perez and a man known as Antonio Rodriguez while in Austin. The four decided to go to Juarez. When they got to Sonora, Daniel wanted to get some transportation, so that he could go to California instead of Mexico. Palacios drove by the pickup and the Bronco. He stopped about a block away and let Perez and Rodriguez out of his car. Palacios met Perez and Rodriguez somewhere near IH 10 and US 277 North.

Perez stated that he was going to California and Rodriguez was going back to Austin because he knew where he could sell the Bronco there.

Rodriguez east on IH 10 and Perez drove west on IH 10.

Palacios stated that he then headed west on IH 10 toward El Paso and that he came upon Perez about five miles out of town. Palacios said that the pickup had run out of gas, that they siphoned gasoline out of his car, and were fixing to put the gasoline into the pickup when the cops arrested them.

Rodriguez had not been arrested nor has Bautista's Bronco been recovered.

Old jail deserves place in history

The Sutton County Historical Society held its annual meeting at the home of Mrs. Lena Belle Ross on Sunday August 11.

Bill Stewart, the chairman, reported that \$500 had been approved by the County Commissioners for the needs of the Historical Society projects which include the Miers Home Museum and the renovation of the "Old Jail". Recent gifts of old record books were viewed by society members. Among these were a bounty book dated 1912 signed by County Judge E.S. Bryant, an inquest book and an old Post Office journal.

Present at the meeting was Carrie Cox the Historical Society's candidate for Miss Sutton County.

Patricia Johnson, representing the Sutton County Sesquicentennial Committee, discussed various ideas for community participation in the celebration of "150 Years for Texas" in 1986. Projects suggested by Society members were an historical marker for Wall's Well and the continuing work on the old jail. The ultimate plan for the jail calls for the furnishing of an "Old Timey" sheriff's office which would also serve as the permanent home of the Sutton County Historical

Society. (The offer of an old roll top desk will be graciously accepted!) Also on the list for the jail is the return of the kitchen to its early day appearance.

--wood burning range--pine on oak table--old utensils--a truly exciting prospect. The old jail is unique frontier structure.

It will be a real plus for our town. It deserves to take its rightful place in Sonora's history.

Also explored was the feasibility of a long range plan to construct a replica behind the Miers Home of the windmill which once stood in the courthouse yard. This was the original water supply for Sutton County and provided water for all the early inhabitants and their stock. A committee was formed to study this.

The Miers Home Museum and the Old Jail will be open for tours all day Saturday August 24 during Sutton County Days. The Sutton County Historical Society invites all interested persons to join and support the Historical Society. There are many exciting ideas and projects coming up this next year. The Society needs your physical help and your financial support. Memberships may be purchased at the old jail or at the table outside on the courthouse lawn.

The EMT Course provides emergency medical training in areas such as bleeding and shock therapy, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation, airway obstructions, and Emergency Childbirth. Upon completion of the course, a student would be trained to work for public or private ambulance firms or in hospital trauma centers.

If you are interested in this course contact Emergency Medical Service at 387-5132, Lenora Pool at 387-5318, or Judy Barton at 387-5284. Students must be 18 years or older.

If you are faced with an emergency situation such as a car accident take a split second to collect your thoughts. The first thing you need to do is observe the situation well and then call for help.

Important when you call for help:

1. Identify yourself
 2. Explain what type of emergency exists
 3. What is the location? Give part of town or country. Give a cross street, cross road or other information to help pinpoint the location.
 4. How many are injured?
 5. Do the injuries appear serious?
 6. Do the fire injuries appear serious?
 7. Is fire equipment needed (spilled gasoline)?
 8. Is a rescue truck needed? (are victims pinned in?)
 9. Are electric lines down?
- DO NOT hang up until you are certain the message is understood!**
- What can you do to assist until the ambulance arrives?
1. Talk to the victim. Try to calm him. Let him know that help is on the way. Keep him still. Keep him warm.

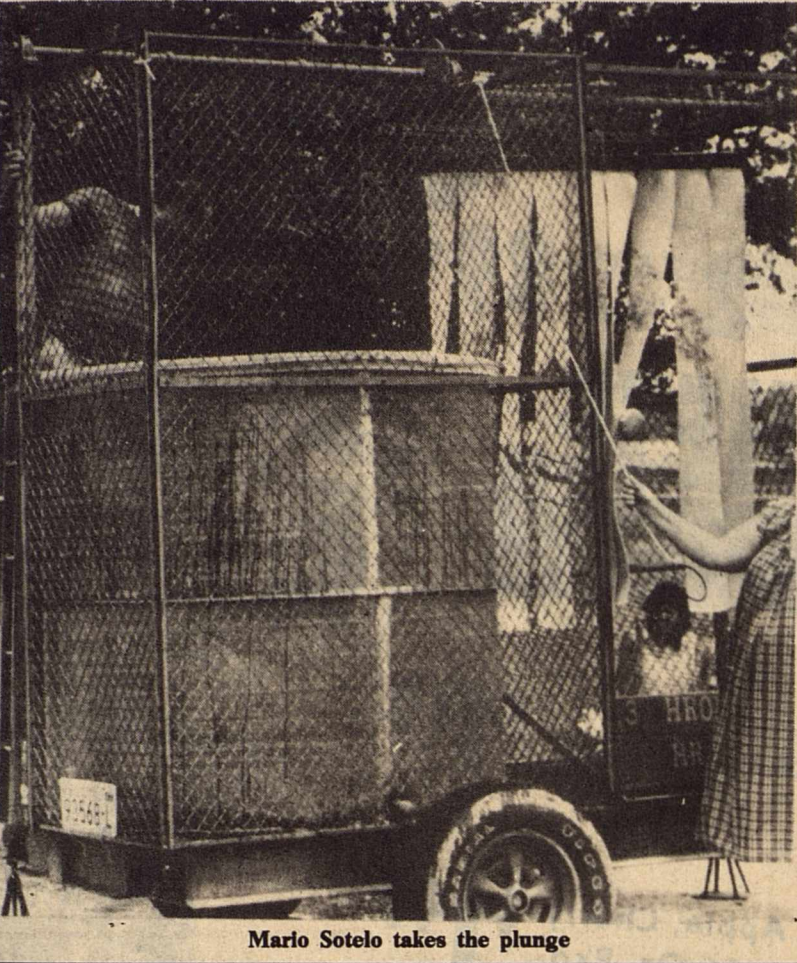

HOMEMAKER UPDATE

Most working mothers agree that finding enough time for work, family, themselves and their spouses is a difficult task. When there isn't enough time, work sometimes spills over into family life and vice-versa, making the working mother's task even harder.

That's why it's important to compartmentize--concentrate on work when at work, the family while at home, and also reserve some time for yourself and your spouse.

Start by developing strategies to keep from taking work home with you. Occasionally needing to catch up on some work at home is normal. But if you frequently need family time to get your work done, important relationships are probably being neglected.

Think about why you bring work home. Are you using your time well? Are you lacking in some skills or knowledge that would make you more efficient? Or is work providing an escape from family problems that need to be faced?

Once you have realistically ex-

amined the reasons for bringing work home, plan for more on-the-job. You might want to read material on time management, ask for retraining or a re-organization of work responsibilities, or see a counselor to begin to confront the family problems you're trying to escape.

Next, develop ways of "making space" for your children, your spouse and yourself. Here are some possibilities:

Get up an hour earlier to have personal, private time to exercise, read, meditate or think through the activities of the day.

Plan a regular family night, afternoon or weekend. Keep this space free from chores and use it for family communication and recreation.

Having a standing weekly "date" with your spouse to go out or just spend time together without family members or friends.

However you choose to build space into your life, it can give you the time you need for satisfying family relationship, personal growth, and work.

Chuck Kinney was born and raised in Southwest

Louisiana. His father was a PRCA stock contractor in the 1950's and 60's. Chuck competed in all rodeo events throughout high school and college. So, this twenty-seven year old cowboy has been around rodeo all his life.

Chuck started fighting bulls in 1975, when he graduated from high school. Later, he went to Sul Ross State University, in Alpine, where he received a Bachelor of Science degree in 1982.

Chuck has been a professional bullfighter for four years. He has fought bulls at rodeos like San Angelo, Pecos, Louisiana State Finals (3 yrs.); College National Finals (1983); AJRA National Finals (2 yrs.); and a lot of other youth, collegiate and professional rodeos.

The American version of Bullfighting is not only a method of getting cowboys to safety, but if an angry bull is determined enough to "hook" the bullfighter, he must use quick reflexes, speed, and "bull sense" to escape injury, while trying to make it look funny.

Does a bullfighter have only fear? "I think that fear is the thing that gets your adrenalin flowing," Chuck says, "I respect those bulls, and I get personal satisfaction when I save a bullrider or beat a bull in one-on-one."

Chuck has been fighting bulls for ten years, and now he invites you to watch as he protects these bullriders by distracting the bulls until the cowboy scrambles to safety and then plays a little "One-On-One" with the Bull!

He has participated in some capacity in events such as bullriding, saddle bronc riding, or bareback riding in fourteen or more states. He has worked with the following contractors namely: Bob Barnes of Cherokee, Iowa, Silver Spurs of Kissimmee, Florida, Flying G of Okeechobee, Florida, and Mac Altizer of Sonora.

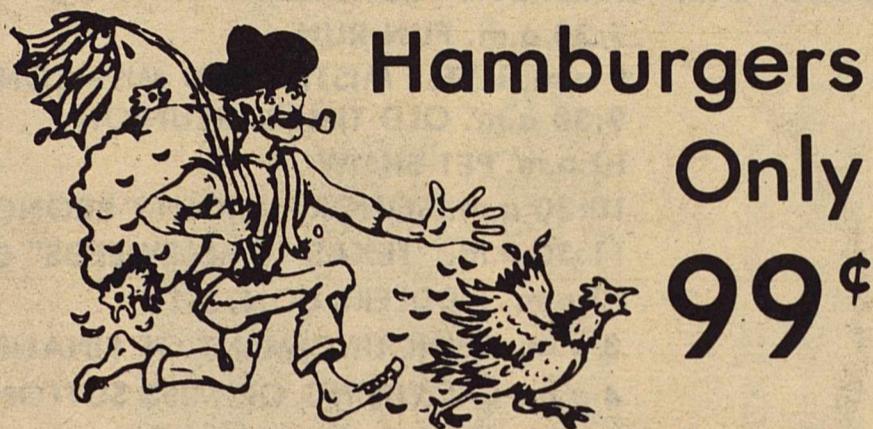
In November, 1983, at the Big Green Invitational Bullfighting Tournament held in Temple, he shared top honors splitting first and second.

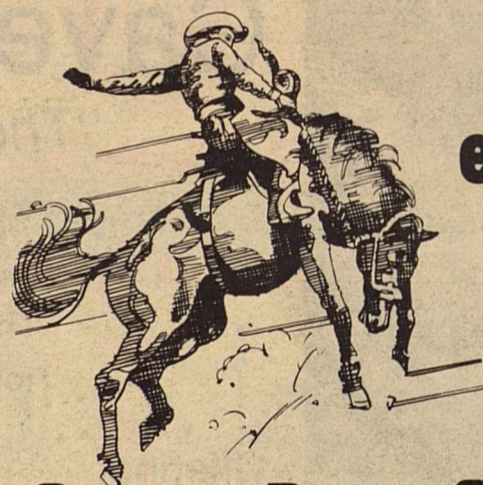

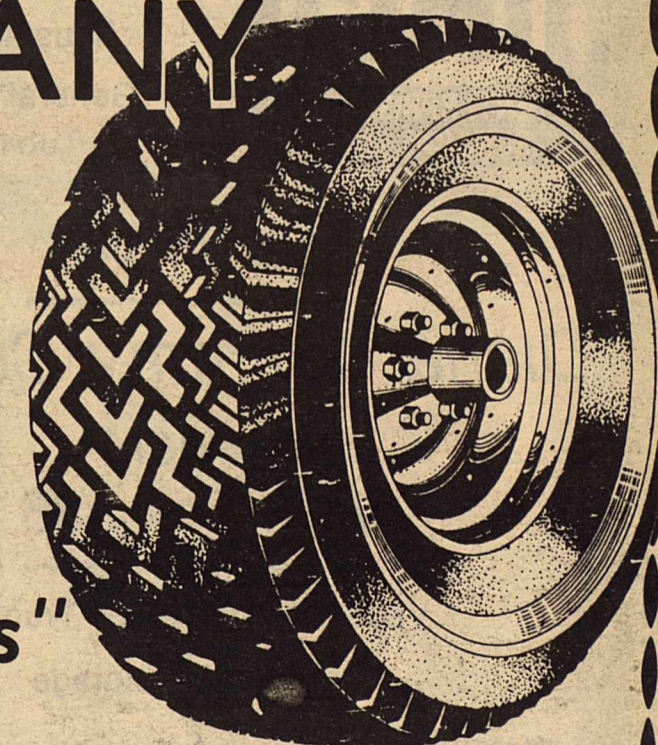

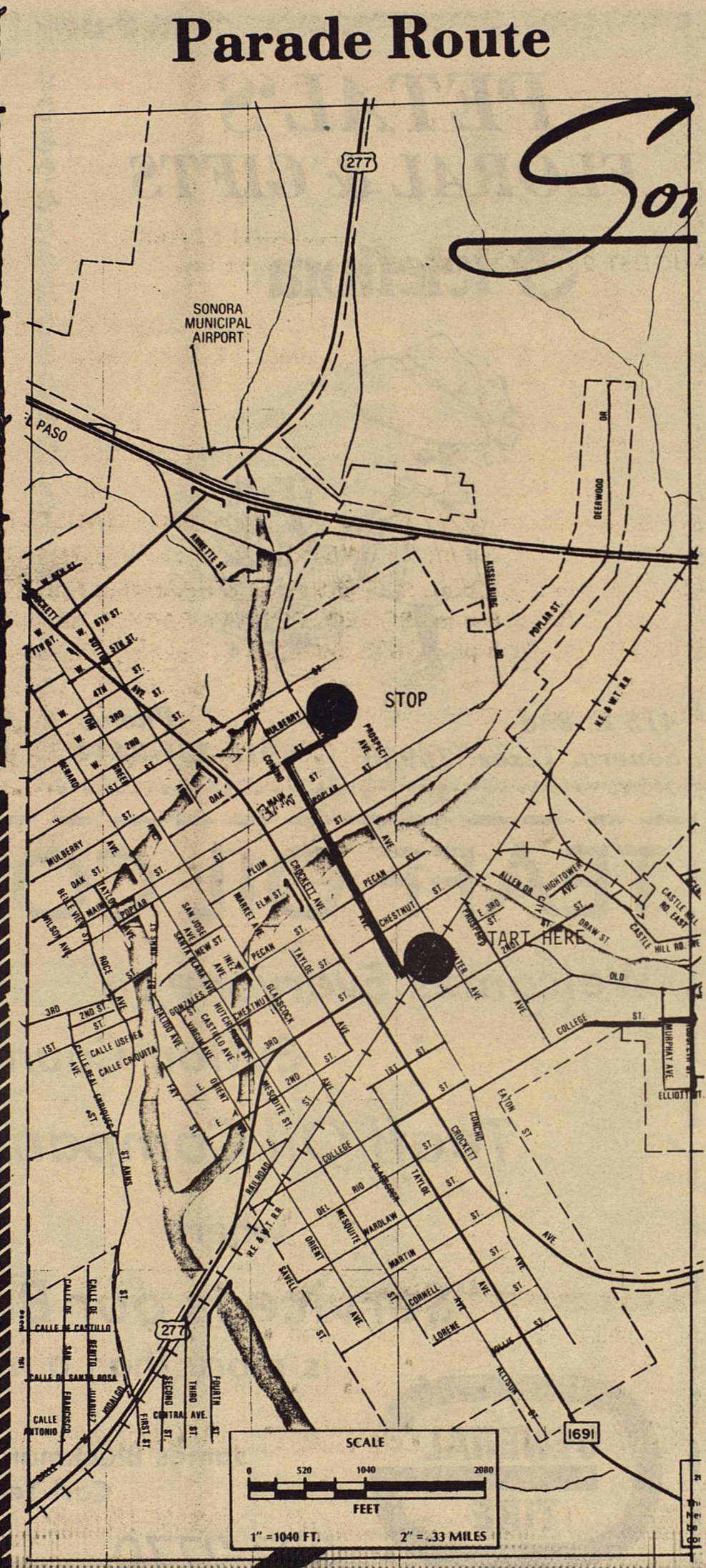
