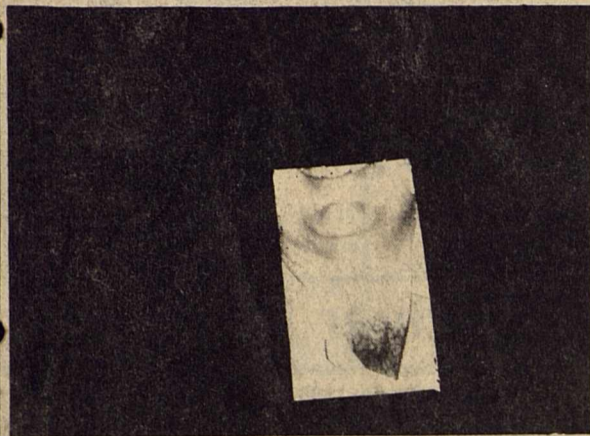

Lions Auction raises \$11,300

and a good time was had by all

The 47th Annual Lions Club Auction last Tuesday night was another roaring success with the total hitting \$11,300 for the evening.

"Old Faithful"

The Mystery Package, "Old Faithful" twice, or "Old Faithful" as it has been dubbed was donated in 1945 by Berry Duff. The purpose of the package was to boost interest during the flagging, wartime era. Duff probably gave no thought to the fact that forty years later, "Old Faithful" would still be generating interest in an economy, again, less than prosperous.

In its forty years of service, "Old Faithful" has generated a total of \$13,042.50. The least it has ever brought was in 1958 when it was purchased by Stockmen's Feed Co. for \$52.50. The record high was in 1977 with Mack and Addah Cauthorn paying \$1650.00.

The person who holds the record for purchasing the most times is W.L. Miers who bought the box in 1945, '46, '55, '60, '68, '69, and in 1970. R.A. Halbert was the owner five times and Mrs. Halbert once. Haynie Davis and Lea Roy Aldwell have each purchased it three times. The following have each owned

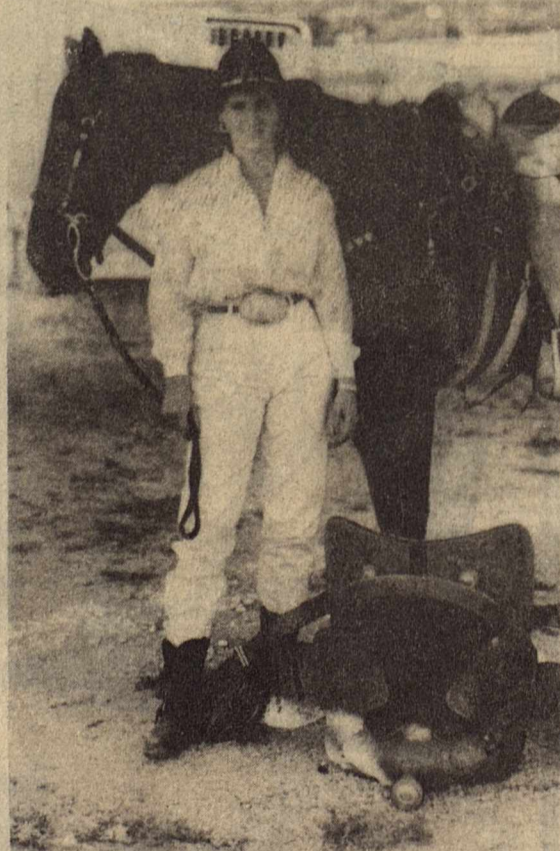

HOMEMAKER UPDATE

Used laundry appliances can be good buys

If you're on a limited budget, buying a used laundry appliance can be a good buy, and save you the trouble and cost of making constant trips to the laundromat. Used washers and dryers are available from appliance stores that take trade-ins, independent repairmen who recondition appliances and people who advertise in newspapers or on community bulletin boards.

A secondhand appliance may appear to be a good buy, but if it requires expensive repair bills and has a short life, it won't be economical. That's why careful shopping is necessary.

Here are some points to remember when you shop for a used washer or dryer:

*Find out if parts can be replaced. Are the use and care books available? If not, are the model and serial numbers visible so books can be requested from the manufacturer.

*Controls should be clearly marked, flexible and easy to operate. Electrical connections should be secure, and wires and plugs should be insulated.

*Check for unusual noises by running the machine if possible. Be sure leveling legs can be adjusted to reduce vibration.

*Check the cabinet exterior for appearance. It may not reduce the appliance service life, but it can be a factor if you plan to place the unit in a room where it will be seen often.

*On an automatic washer, check to be sure the inner tub and door surfaces are smooth and snag-free. Check that there are no crushed or chipped areas, especially around hinges and agitator and make sure door gaskets are in good condition, especially on front-loading machines.

*Examine the interior surfaces on a dryer, and actually use the machine if possible. The dryer drum should revolve freely without any grinding noises. If the blower, belts, motor and drum have been kept clean and free, a dryer may last years past its life expectancy.

Out of the Past

Oct. 17, 1930

Each member of the Sonora Lions Club was given or mailed five tickets to the Lions play, "Bad Man" to be staged at the school auditorium, Friday night, October 24, beginning at eight o'clock. Admission to the play will be fifty cents for adults and twenty-five cents for children. Each Lion will be responsible for his five tickets and if not sold will have to be paid for as they cannot be returned.

A three-inch rain which fell north and east of here Sunday put the McKavert draw up seven feet in Sonora, covering part of the town. It is estimated that \$5,000 damages were done by the high water. The water was the highest it had been in thirty years, according to old-timers here. The dry Devil's Draw was up and cut off traffic.

Roy Aldwell's damage amounted to about \$200; Brasher's filling station \$1,000; several residences were damaged, and it is thought the total loss will not exceed \$5,000.

Water Has Been Up to Courthouse Yard
G.W. Stephenson and J.W.

Fields, both pioneer Sutton county ranchmen, stated Tuesday morning that the water Sunday was nothing compared to what it has been years gone by. They recalled the time that Peter Robison, now deceased, said he saw both draws on a rampage forcing backwaters to the courthouse fence. Tom Adams, the founder of Sonora, it is said remembered seeing drift logs at the big liveoak tree between J.W. Trainer's store and the courthouse. That was before the '90's.

Mr. Fields said he had seen much more water here than there was during the recent rainy spell. He said before there were any telephones and automobiles the people knew nothing of what happened for maybe several weeks.

The Word of God

"All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." II Tim. 3:16.

I meet many people who have problems and questions covering a wide variety of subjects. Financial problems, emotional and family problems just to name a few. I suppose that everyone has some of these problems from time to time, myself included, but the older I get, the more of it I see. And it seems to me that these problems and questions are increasing in both number and severity.

Often a friend will ask me for advice on some problem, not so much as a person asking advice from a pastor but more as one friend asking advice from another friend. When I answer by quoting

the Bible they look at me in surprise as if saying, "I didn't know that the Bible talked about that." Then I give them a look to say, "The Bible provides the answers to many everyday questions if you'll just take the time to look for them." (You have to be careful how you say something like that verbally but sometimes a look says it all!)

The Bible is not just a book of philosophies for intellectual and spiritual stimulation.

The Bible is a guide for daily living, written by the one who created you. Someone said, "Show me a Bible that is worn out and falling apart from much use, and I'll show you a life that isn't."

How true! The answers to many of our questions, the solutions to many of our problems and the lifestyles which prevent many of

the problems from ever starting are in the Bible. For example, if enough people had followed the Biblical teachings on homosexuality, there would be no such thing as A.I.D.S.

Let me warn you, that reading the Word of God, the Bible, is not always pleasant. God doesn't pull any punches. Hebrews 4:12 says, "For the word of God is quick (living), and powerful, sharper than any two edged sword, piercing...and is a discerner of the thought and intents of the heart." Reading the Bible is like looking in the mirror after a strong wind. No matter how hard you tried, you look to yourself as if you just woke up. Horrible! But if you let it, the Bible can be like the exploratory surgery used in cancer treatment. God will tell you what the problem

is and how to remove it. Not just cover it up again, but get rid of it. God will show you that you need a new heart and mind, the old ones, don't work right. But that double transplant, which only God can perform, will cure the problems, with your eyes, ears, mouth, hand and feet.

It all starts when you pick up your Bible. Romans 10:17 says, "So then faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God."

Once you start following the Bible you have many choices, put the book down and forget it, or take the next step. The next step is often difficult and God is a perfect gentleman. He lets you make your own choice. But always remember that if you make the wrong choice, you're the one who must live with it. Please, choose God's way.

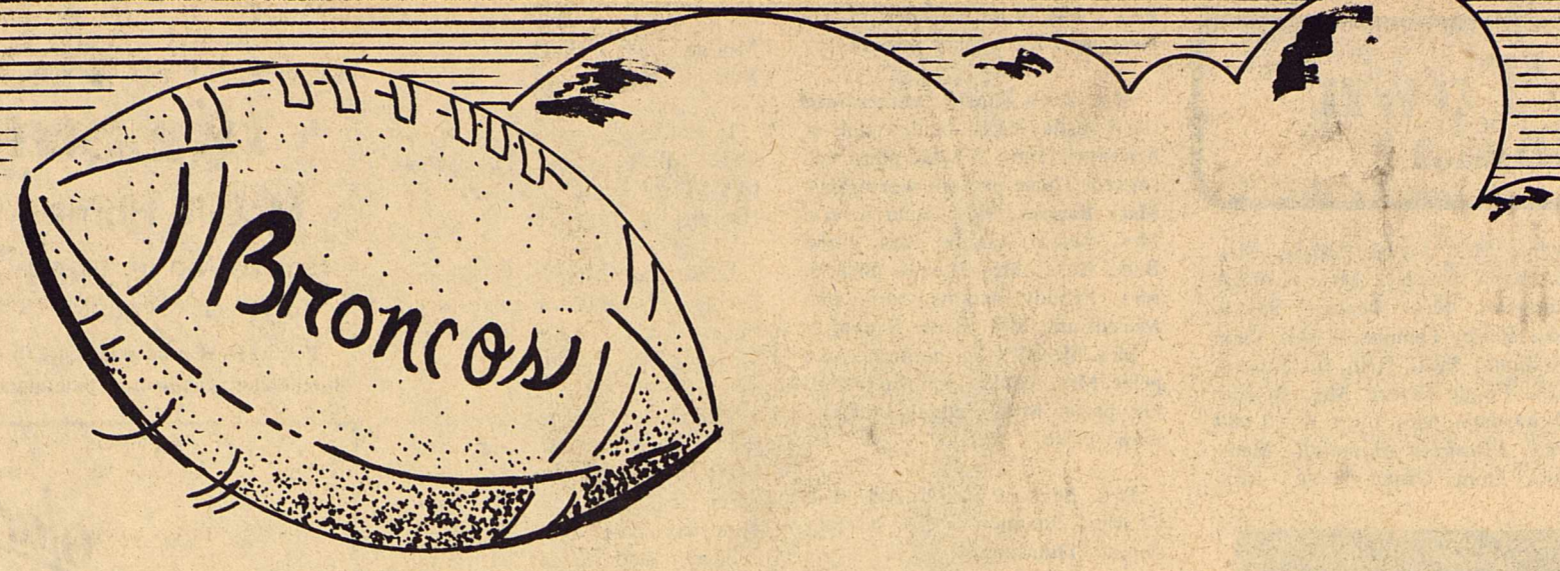

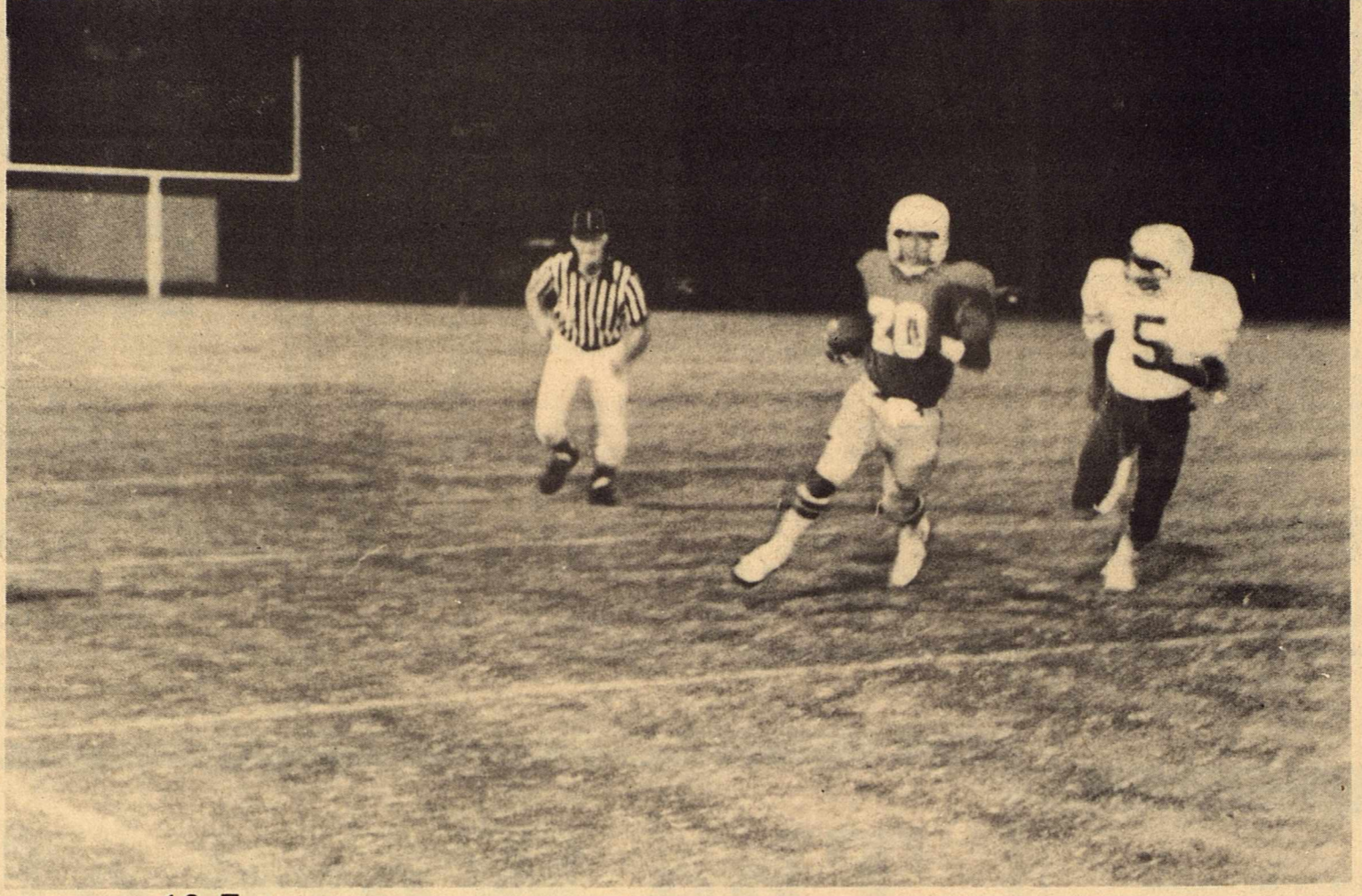

 The Broncos will try to redeem themselves here this weekend against the Brady Bulldogs.



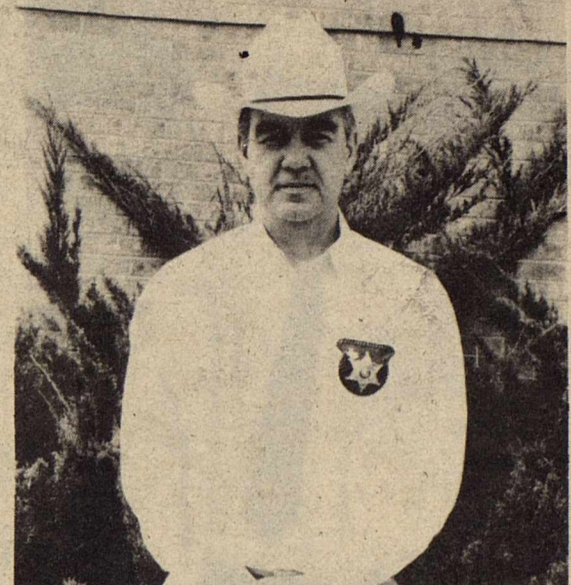
Sheriffs Department

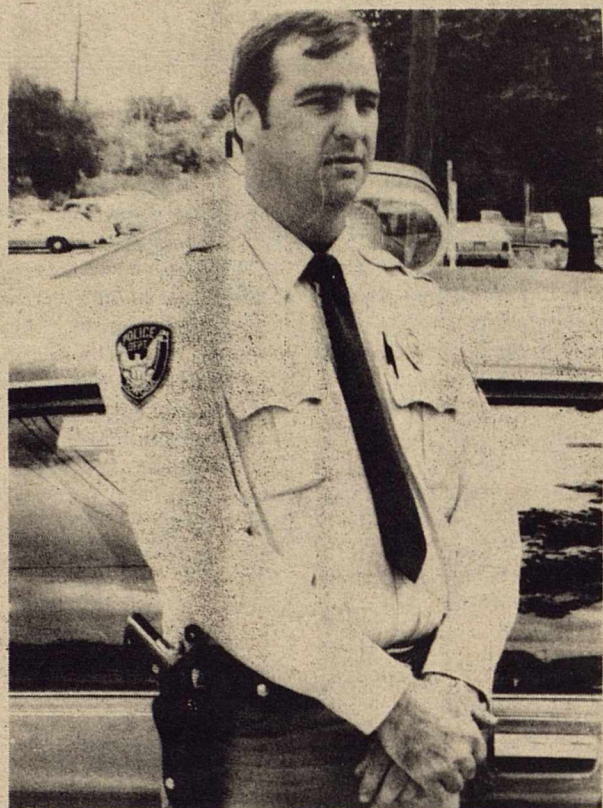
EDWARD MIKE HOUSE

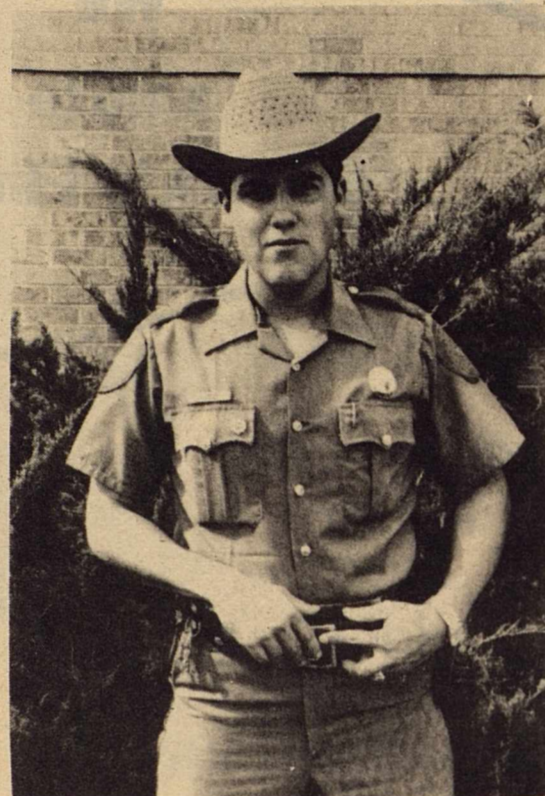

He is married to Nita Ware, who works at Republic Supply Company, and has one daughter,

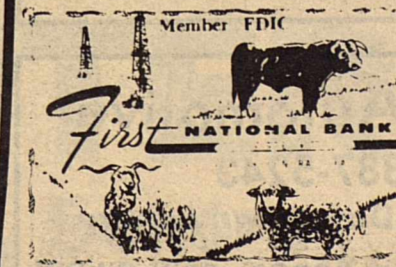

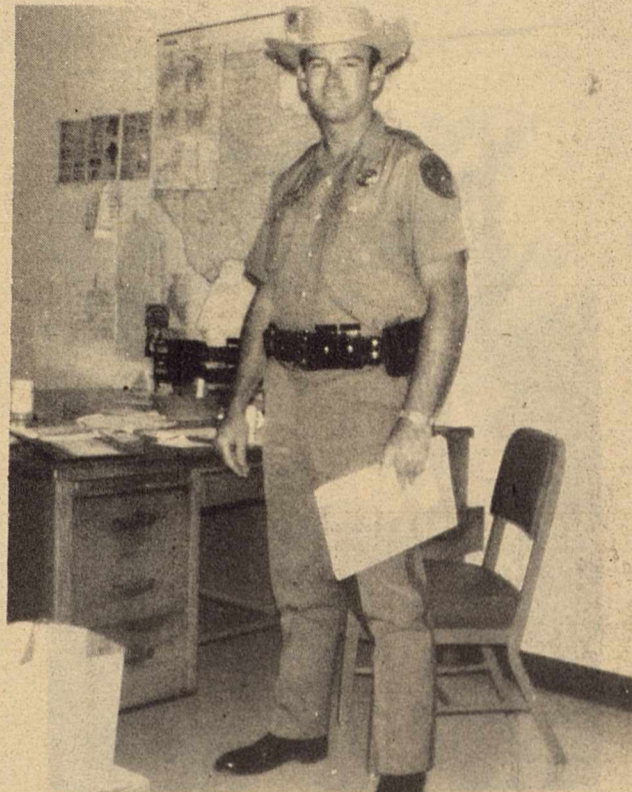


RICHARD LEE DICKSON
