Some charges waived pending further study

The City Council met in regular session on May 19. All council members were in attendance with the exception of Hershel Davenport.

Under new business, the council voted unanimously to alternate the depository of funds from the sale of the electric facilities between the two local banks, moving the funds to First National Bank for the coming year.

The Council also discussed the Water and Sewer Ordinance and it's effect on users who did not receive all of the offered services. The question arose as to whether those users should be made to pay for the services not used. There are some thirty cases of this type in Sonora at the present time. It was pointed out that possibly some of these cases would fall under the

"grandfather clause". The Council decided that until which time all of the legal, and health questions, could be answered, the fees for the services not used would be waived.

Claudia Dempsey was once again awarded the contract for the operation of the city owned swimming pool. The pool is set to open to the public on June 1 and remain open until school starts with the exception of the Sutton County Days weekend. Hours for the pool will be from 2 until 6 pm

Though it was not on the agenda, City Manager Jim Dover presented an early pay-off plan to the Council for bonds sold to the Farmers Home Administration in 1976 for the purpose of water and sewer improvements. As a one time offer, Farmers Home Administration is presenting a discount Purchase Program which allows the City to pay off the debt at a 24.993% discount. This pay-off would amount to a savings of approximately \$357,177 with the interest due through maturity of the bonds. The Council voted to start preparation of the paper work involved and ratify the item at the next Council meeting.

Memorial Day 1987



asks for rate hike

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for an increase in its retail electric rates, citing the costs of completing a new coalfired power plant as making the move necessary.

"We have said over and over again that it would be necessary to increase rates when our Olkaunion Power Station was completed," said Earl Johnson, WTU's local manager in Sonora, adding that WTU's last rate request came almost three years

The rate changes being sought would add \$50,361,475 to the Company's annual retail revenue. This is a 23.9 per cent increase over the test year ending March 31, on which the case is based. the request was filed May 19 with cities in the WTU service area and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin.

Johnson said there is no such thing as a "typical customer," but that the new rates, if approved, would mean that a residential electric customer using 625 kilowatt-hours would pay \$29.94

"To put this request in its proper perspective, our overall residential revenues will be only six to eight per cent higher than they were two years ago," Johnson said. "The decline in fuel costs since then just about offsets this increase."

The Oklanunion Power Plant, situated near Vernon, went in to commercial operation December 24, 1986. WTU's share of the cost as majority owner is \$275 million, which increased the

Company's total investment in facilities by 75 per cent.

"Until this cost is reflected in our rates, the Company does not have the opportunity to recover its expenses and earn a reasonable return on its investment," Johnson explained.

Construction at Oklaunion started in May 1982, and the plant was completed on time and well within the original budget. Industry surveys show that Oklaunion was the most economically constructed coalfired power plant built during the mid-1980s.

The plant will provide 25 per cent of WTU's total generating capacity. The long-term contract for low sulphur western coal diversifies the Company's fuel

base and will help stabilize fuel costs, which in recent years have been affected by sudden changes in natural gas prices.

Other company's owning shares of the plant are Public Service Company of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Company, both associated with WTU as members of the Central and South West System; the city of Brownsville and Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority.

Usual procedures at the PUC indicate that a full-scale hearing of WTU's case would be held in late summer, with a final order by the Commission coming late this year. This would make it almost three years since WTU's last change in basic retail rates.

Quit or Discharge? A critical distinction

Dear Commissioner Nabers:

An employee of ours went on vaction last week. Before she left, she told me and another manager that when she returned, she would give notice of quitting. Based upon what she told us, we replaced her. She is returning this week. Where do we as the employer stand? We know we need documentation, so we will probably ask her to sign a resignation letter.

Dear Sir:

There were some pitfalls in your situation. Whether the TEC decides that the work separation was voluntary or involuntary will depend entirely upon what the employee said about her intention to leave. If she actually said she would leave by a certain date, the TEC will probably rule that her leaving was voluntary. However, if she gave no date for quitting, but only said she might quit at some unspecified point in the future, the TEC might decide that the work separation occured involuntarily when the employer replaced the claimant during her vacation. Another problem could arise with the resignation, then the TEC could most likely consider that to be a constructive

discharge, instead of a voluntary quit. If the employee volunteers to write a letter of resignation, then the reverse would hold true. In general, the employer should be sure of itself before proceeding upon what may be only a vague statement that a future resignation is possible.

Dear Commissioner Nabers:

This morning one of our data entry clerks was arrested at work on a warrant for writing too many insufficient checks. She had known about the checks bouncing, but had not taken care of them. She has now missed a day of work, and we don't think we should keep her as an employee. Where do we stand if we discharge her?


If the employee files a claim for umemployment benefits, the TEC will investigate why she was discharged. Among other things, it will want to know whether the bank has a written policy against employees writing bad checks. However, this case would be somewhat more straightforward, since this involves an arrest at the work place on a criminal charge. In cases in which a claimant was discharged for disruption of the work place or absence resulting from an arrest on criminal charges, the TEC then inquires whether the claimant was at fault in the arrest. Fault can be shown by such things as a conviction for the offense, a guilty or non contest plea, a sentence of deferred adjudication, or simple admission to the TEC that the charge was true. If the claimant was at fault in the arrest, and the arrest caused an absence or disruption, generally the TEC will disqualify the claimant from benefits, and the employer's account will not be charged.







Another riddle emerges in the ongoing comedy we erroneously call democracy. The front running Democratic candidate for the presidential nomination dropped out of the race under a moral stigma. It is clear cut on the surface and the media had a heyday.

The media pounced on it like the turkey on the grasshopper and then a greatly chagrined Hart withdrew from the race for, of course, the good of the party. The family closed ranks.

He goes home now, where the media blames the media, and tainted but undaunted political figure. He may be back in the Senate, time will tell. The lesson he should have learned is; you do not run for president unless you have a major funding source such as Big Oil, Tri Lateral, or major fortunes behind you. I know it is a democracy, on paper at least.

founded was May 19, 1890 and since it was the town selected by popular vote as county seat on November 3, 1890, and since the Diamond Jubilee was celebrated in 1965. It will also be the celebration of 100 years of Sutton County history although the county actually created by the Legislature of 1887 by House Bill Number 387 entitled "An Act to Create the Counties of Sutton and Schleicher from the County of Crockett."

The town's roots actually came to life earlier than 1890 with two events, both concerning water that life saving fluid without which any birth is extremely difficult; the first in 1881 when Ed Wall and Tom Birtrong, on a hunting expedition from Ft. McKavett discovered the well still known today as Wall's Well; the second in 1889 when a water well was drilled on the courthouse square.

As a part of that Centennial Celebration it is planned that a drama reliving the birth and the ensuing 100 years growth and development of Sonora and Sutton County will be staged in an outdoor amphitheater. Preparatory to that full production in 1990 there will be outdoor productions on a smaller scale during the summers of 1987,88 and 89.

The 1987 production, a Dinner Theater, will take place 8 miles west of Sonora on I-10 at the Caverns of Sonora, Sutton County's already popular tourist attraction. It is hoped the Dinner Theater will be an additional attraction for the tourist and for townspeople in the surrounding areas as well. More than a dozen local "Storytellers" and talented entertainers will perform during this summer season, and since no two performances will be alike, it is hoped that each evening will be a sell out.



Although progress has been made in improving the health and longevity of the American people in general, statistical trends show that in certain minority populations this is not the case. In 1983, life expectancy reached a new high of 75.2 years for whites and 69.6 yearsfor blacks, a gap of 5.6 years. Blacks today have a life expectancy that was achieved by whites in the early 1950's, a lag of about 30 years. Despite the unprecedented explosion in scientific knowledge and the phenomenal capacity of medicine to diagnose, treat, and cure disease, Asians, Blacks, Hispanics, Native Americans, and Pacific Islanders have not shown the same reductions in mortality rates as have whites. The task force on Black and minority health in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services was established in 1984 to study this significant

problem and make recommendations. In analyzing mortality data from 1979 to 1981, the Task Force identified six causes of death that together account for more than 80 percent of the excess mortality observed among Blacks and minority groups. One of these was cardiovascular disease. High blood pressure is a major risk factor for heart disease and stroke.

Behavioral risk factors--such as diet, smoking and exercise--are often part of cultural patterns and socioeconomic conditions

associated with increased risk. Certain cultural patterns may impede efforts to reduce risk. Indeed, cultural factors may actually determine the effectiveness of efforts to prevent or treat high blood pressure and to lower the risk of coronary heart gramming Diana Corasasib

Hypertension can exist for years without symptoms and most cases arise for no known reason. But certain factors increase your statistical risk. These include: Family History: Children with

one hypertensive parent have a higher risk than those with no high blood pressure in the family. When both parents have hypertension, the odds are even greater.

Age: High blood pressure often developes in the 30's and 40's, but it becomes more prevalent with age. Many elderly people develop some degree of hypertension.

Race: Hypertension is generally more common in blacks than in whites. The reason socioeconomic factors.

Salt Consumption: Some people seem genetically susceptible to the effects of sodium in the blood vessels. Since it's difficult to screen for salt sensivity, it makes sense for everyone to moderate salt

Obesity: Being overweight increases your risk of high blood pressure and several other disease. To compound the problem, salt intake is often higher in obese people, due simply to eating more food.

Alcohol: Heavy drinking can elevate pressure in the arteries. People with hypertension should have no more than one or two drinks a day--at the very most.

The Pill: Oral contraceptives cause slight blood pressure rises in many women. In women over 35, the combination of smoking and the Pill may be especially dangerous.

Cigarette Smoking: Smoking a cigarette temporarily elevates blood pressure; it also makes the heart work harder. While there's no direct link to hypertension, smoking is a risk factor for heart disease.

Diabetes and Kidney Disease: Both of these conditions make the development of high blood pressure more likely.

Chronic Stress: Increased heart rate and a temporary rise in blood pressure are typical reactions to psychological stress. It has been postulated that prolongs stress can lead to hypertension.
