





# Sonora ISD's overall operation receives excellent report from auditing team

The long-awaited report on Sonora ISD's overall operations as scrutinized and evaluated by an accreditation team from the Texas Education Agency last spring reveals that the local public school system is progressive and effective in its primary purpose--educating the young people of this area.

The three-member team went over the entire district, from maintenance of the buildings to the hour-by-hour teaching assignments of the classroom teachers, with a fine-toothed comb in order to unearth possible non-compliance with TEA and State Board of Education directives and rules. As a result of the auditing team's search for the good, the bad, and the ugly, only a few technical faults were found, with the district being commended in nearly all areas of major importance.

One of the truly outstanding areas as recognized by the auditors is this community's support of educational facilities and of a dedicated, caring instructional staff. Most highly commended were those classroom teachers who carry on the everyday, sometimes humdrum business of teaching children the basic three R's--plus the sciences at all levels, history and social studies, computers, trig and geometry,

drama, typing, plus homemaking and the vocational trades to add a little spice and variety to the curriculum and to the lives of the students.

The physical plant was one area that shone in the audit. To quote directly from the audit report, "...The community, Board of Trustees, and staff are to be commended for their commitment to provide facilities supporting the district's instructional program.

The new high school campus, with its quality facilities, has greatly enhanced the kind of environment that is conducive to learning."

In addition, the renovation and upkeep of all buildings used in instruction are commended within the report, especially the fine condition of the rock building built in 1908.

Among the more highly-touted programs in place in Sonora were the special education program, the special reading program, and the enthusiasm for learning found in the students, in the faculty and in its administrators and Board.

To cite two paragraphs of the report: "The monitoring team commends the entire staff on its display of concern in providing an instructional program based on all needs of students attending Sonora Independent School District."

"The entire staff displayed a

positive attitude that was reflected in the positive learning environment on the campus and in the classroom. Also, teachers displayed a cooperative spirit in working together for the improvement of learning. There was evidence of a caring faculty for the students in Sonora ISD. The student body was well-behaved, polite, friendly, and appropriately dressed. Overall, there was a positive school climate observed on all campuses."

Among the areas of concern were the students' apparent lack of interest in the tutorial program, and expansion of the academically gifted program to all grade levels. (The Board of Trustees has just recently approved a plan which will result in the gifted and talented program being expanded to all grades by the 1988-89 school year, or a full two years before the state requires it.)

The tutorial program, mandated by the passage of HB #72 in the summer of 1984, is to give extra time and help to those students

who are in academic need of it. However, due to scheduling problems and to Sonora's comparatively large bus population, before-and-afterschool tutorial sessions are sparsely attended. It is anticipated that the next school year will see some effective changes in the program, and that it will be better utilized by those who need it.

According to Superintendent James Bible, the excellent report by the auditing team was to be expected, considering the quality of staff and students and our up-to-date curriculum. He added that the district's administrators have spent many hours in study and attendance at area workshops to insure that Sonora is fully in compliance with state directives as they are issued.

Bible closed with the observation that it was the support of the citizens of this county, the dedication of school personnel, and the quality of the student body which made Sonora the first-class school system that it is.

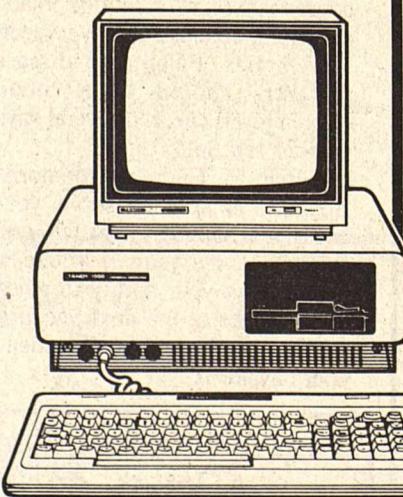

## Noted historian to tell "tales of the old west"

Gus Clemons was born in San Antonio and grew up in San Angelo. He graduated from Central High School, attended Angelo State University, and received a degree in history from St. Mary's University.

He began his professional career in 1969 at the San Antonio Express-News where he was an award-winning sports editor and chief of the copy desk. In 1976, he became a senior editor for The Star, a national weekly published in New York City.

Clemons returned to Texas in 1978 and began a full-time freelance writing and publishing career which continues today. He has written, produced, or collaborated on ten books about Texas, including *The Concho Country* about the San Angelo area, and the *Legacy* about the Permian Basin region. *Legacy* received an award of special

recognition from the Texas Historical Commission in 1985.

Clemons is the publisher of Mulberry Avenue Books Publishing Company and part-owner of the Angelus Bookstore (the oldest bookstore in West Texas). He is active in civic affairs, including Christmas at Old Fort Concho, Fiesta Del Concho, Diez y Seis, and the Convention and Visitors Bureau. He is chairman of the Tom Green County Historical Commission, a member of the San Angelo Downtown Rotary, and active in Holy Angels Catholic Church.

Clemons is married to Leona "Miki" Ross Clemons. They have two children, Augustus Ducas Clemons, 6th and Sarah Ross Clemons.

Gus is scheduled to kick-off the summer long Covered Wagon Dinner Theater. He will open Friday evening, June 26.

## Summer Cautions

Rain, ants and FOOD can ruin a picnic! Summer heat provides the ideal condition for bacteria to taint your food and fun. In case of poisoning:

**SYMPTOMS:** Severe cramps and abdominal pain, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, occur 3 to 24 hours after eating.

**FIRST AID:** Victim should be kept quiet, warm and drinking a lot of unsweetened fluids (taking small sips.) Contact a doctor if victim is a young child, elderly, or if symptoms persist.

**GETTING THE BUGS OUT!** Stay away from insect nests. Avoid wearing bright clothing. Avoid the use of perfumes, lotion, hair sprays. Don't leave sweet foods uncovered. Some insect stings may cause serious allergic

reactions. If allergic reactions occurs, get a doctor immediately.

**WHO SHOULDN'T FLY!**

Don't fly basics: Those who have had a heart attack within four weeks of takeoffs...a stroke within two weeks...surgery within two weeks...of deep-diving session within 24 hours should wait to fly. Don't fly at all if you have severe lung problems...uncontrolled hypertension...epilepsy not well controlled...severe anemia...a pregnancy beyond 240 days or threatened by miscarriage.

Flying can also be hazardous to victims of chronic obstructive disease (COPD). Reason: sudden changes in atmospheric pressure can deplete oxygen levels in the bloodstream. Possible consequences: shortness of breath, dizziness, collapse and even heart arrhythmias. Pulmonary disease sufferers should have blood oxygen levels checked several days before a scheduled flight.

 subparagraph 3, which shall read as follows: "A final appeal may be made to the City Council, in Executive Session, if necessary, and the decision of the majority of the Council will be final and binding upon all parties concerned."  
 The City Attorney advised the Council that the last paragraph of the motion be excluded until a legal opinion could be sought due to the new changes in the open meetings law. The section was: Section 29, shall further be amended by the addition of paragraph B, which shall read as follows: "Providing that nothing in this manual nor in any City policy, either written or verbal, shall prohibit or restrict any employee from communicating directly with any Council member, either privately or during Council meetings, concerning any matter

of City business; and any such contact shall in no way jeopardize the employment or working conditions of the employee."  
 The motion carried with Alderman Mooney, Davenport and Alderwoman Cascadden voting for and Alderman Trainer voted against.  
 A motion was made by Alderman Mooney that any item of city property that has been declared surplus, unnecessary, or unfit for further use by the City will be offered for sale by sealed bid or at auction. Any item not sold as above will be disposed of at the discretion of the City Council. The motion carried unanimously.  
 Alderman Mooney made a motion that no amendments will be made to the present or any future Fiscal Budget without prior City Council approval. For the purposes of this motion, "Amendments"

shall include; the creation of new accounts or deletion of existing accounts; and the purchase of any capital item not specifically itemized in the budget.  
 The motion carried with Alderman Mooney, Davenport and Alderwoman Cascadden voting for, Alderman Trainer against.  
 Alderman Mooney then made a motion that no purchases will be made by, or in the name of the City of Sonora for the personal use of any City employee or other private person. An exception may be made if the item purchased is to be used exclusively by a City employee only in the performance of his or her official duties. This motion carried unanimously.  
 Rex Ann Friess of the Sutton County Appraisal District told the Council that 89.4% of the city taxes had been collected for the

year.  
 City Attorney Beth Wallace reported on the State Health Laws regarding septic tanks in the City. Mrs. Wallace stated that Sutton County did not have a model septic tank code but could approve one.  
 A motion was made by Alderwoman Cascadden that an amendment to the Water and Sewer Ordinance be made to include a clause whereby if sewer was not available at the time a house was built it would be exempt from having to connect to the sewer when it became available and the sewer charge be excluded. Also to exempt residents who were in a nursing home but wanted to keep their yards to only charge a water charge and exclude sewer and garbage. The motion received a unanimous vote.  
 The third reading of Ordinance 331 was held regarding taxation of telecommunications services and was passed unanimously.  
 Tom Payton was appointed to fill a vacancy on the Zoning and Planning Board.  
 The recommendation of the Zoning Board to approve a variance to the First Baptist Church to build a fence was passed.  
 Bids were received for new trash containers. The bid was awarded to Emco to purchase 31 1 and 1/2 yard containers at \$168 each and 22 3 yard containers at \$219 each for a total of \$10,026.  
 A motion was made to purchase seal coating materials for street paving. Aggregate will be purchased from Reece Albert and oil from Riffe Petro.

City Manager Jim Dover spoke to the Council in regards to Council priorities. No action was taken.  
 The Council met in special session on June 23 to accept the resignation of City Manager Jim Dover. With a motion by Alderman Mooney, second by Alderman Davenport the motion carried unanimously. Dover's resignation will become effective on July 10, 1987.
