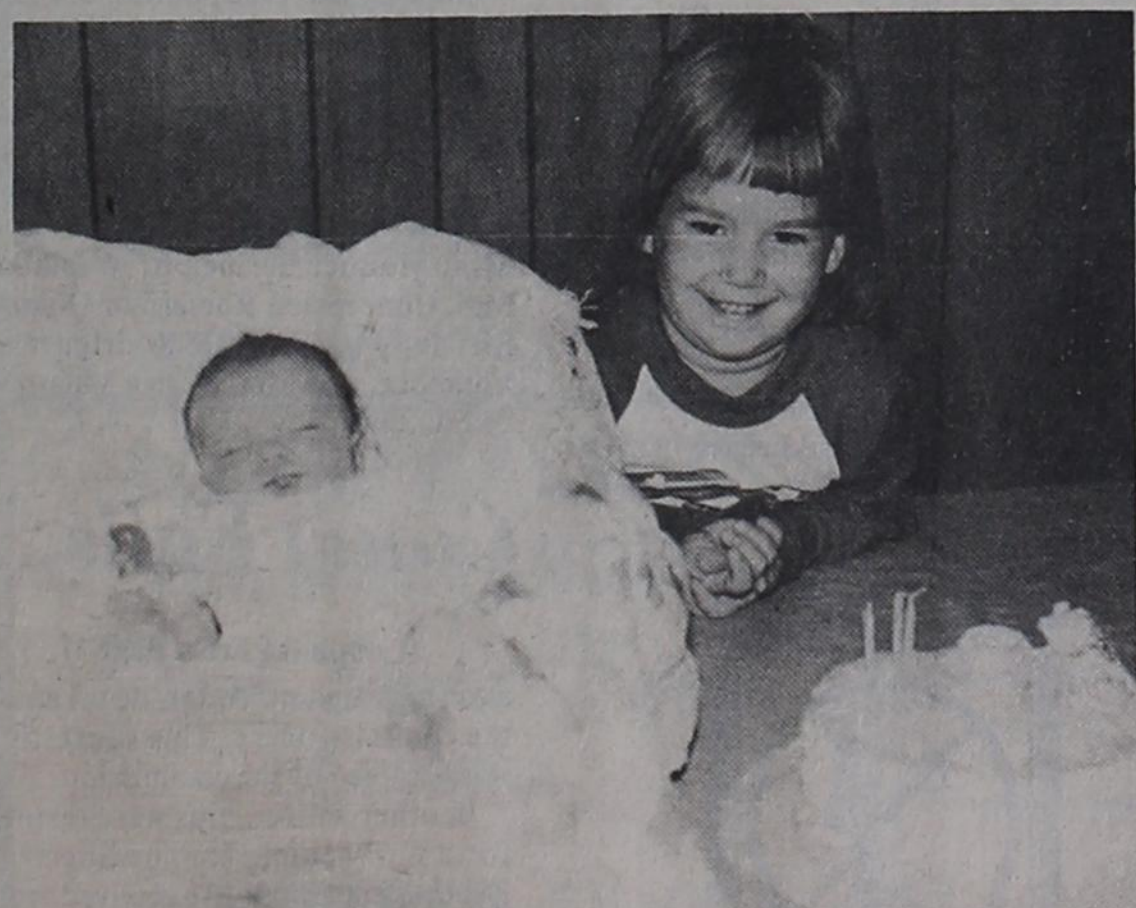
Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director

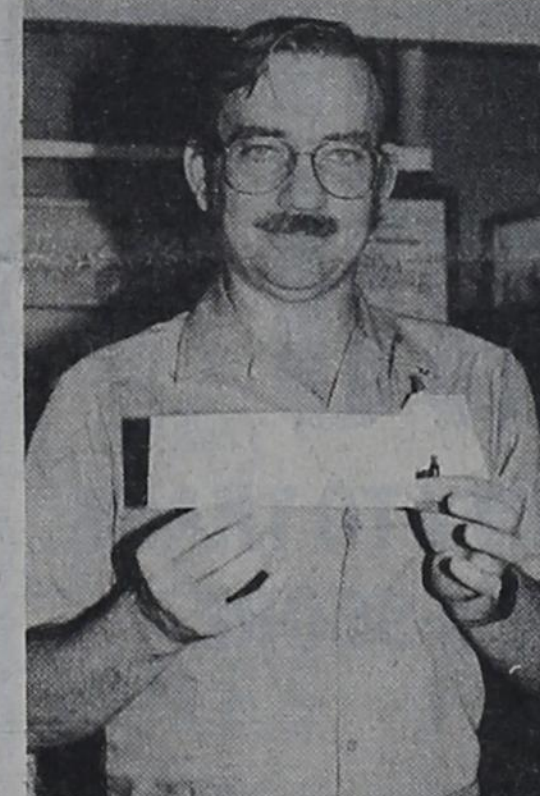
In addition to the tie, Spring missed Texas A&M-Oklahoma State; Arkansas-Mississippi; and Notre Dame-Miami.

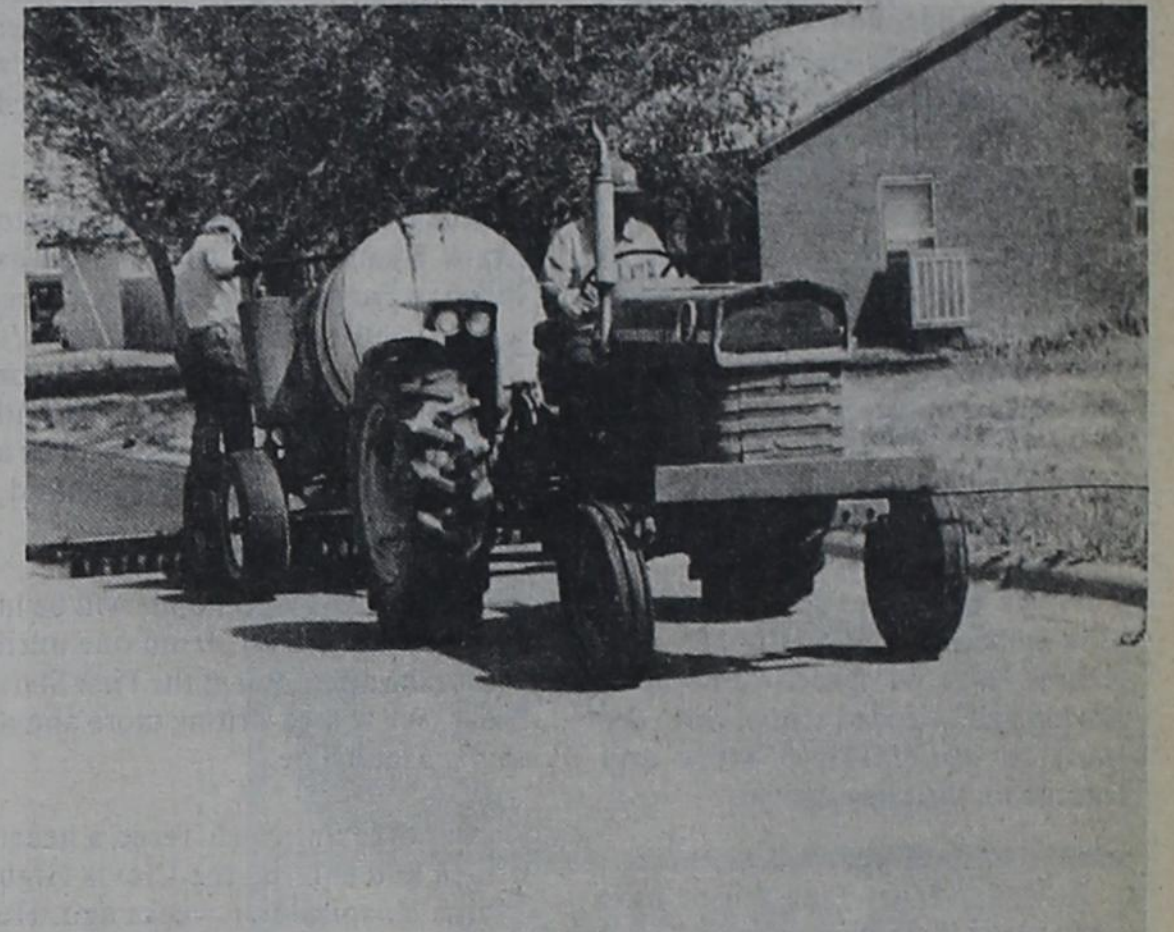
Mrs. Ryburn was driving a southbound motorcycle on State Road 108 when she failed to yield a stop sign where the road intersects with State Road 77, the report said.

Mustangs Will Host Cooper Pirates Friday

Bovina High School Mustangs will attempt to get back on the winning track Friday when they host the Cooper Pirates from South Lubbock. The Pirates may find the Mustangs in a bad mood.

"We've got a Mad-on this week. It's our time to win, and we're going to try to do something about it," said Coach Larry Helton.

Adding to the frustration connected to this particular game is the fact that coaching the Pirates is none other than former Mustang Coach Paul Topliff, who left following the 1981 season for the Cooper position.

To say that there's "no love lost" between the two coaching camps is probably putting it mildly, to say the least.

Last year, in the two teams' first meeting at Cooper, Bovina claimed a 34-8 win, after falling behind 8-0 in the early going.

However, the Mustangs may have their work cut out for them, since Cooper is bringing a 3-1 record into the game, assuring that they will have

a better season mark than a year ago. The Pirates have scored 84 points in four outings, while giving up 45.

Meanwhile, Helton and his staff are hoping to get a few of their "walking wounded" back in action this week. Lineman Terry Glasscock, out since the opening game, has been working out this week. Terry Moore, who sustained a concussion against Morton, might be available. "We don't want to rush any of our injured, but it would be nice to have some of them back," Helton said.

Friday's game is the last non-conference outing, and last 8 p.m. game for the season. Starting October 7, district play will begin, and games will start at 7:30 p.m. for the remainder of the season.



'Disappointed With Score, But Not Kids,' -- Helton

"We were disappointed with the score, but we weren't disappointed in the kids," said Coach Larry Helton regarding Bovina's 22-16 loss at Dexter, N.M. last Friday.

After the team's 55-0 loss at Morton the previous week, Helton had said that the players needed to win back their confidence as a team. "We took a step in that direction--and we should have won the game," he lamented.

The Mustangs fumbled a handoff in the last 30 seconds of the game, on the Dexter two-yard line, when the team could have tied the game and possibly won it.

"That was tough--we weren't hit or anything--we just fumbled," Helton said.

The Mustangs played the game without eight players--six of which had been starters at one time this year.

"We were extremely proud of the way our young players played. They moved in and did a great job--they had to get on-the-job training," Helton said. He mentioned in particular Blake Scaff, Chet Hawkins, Matlock Howell, Elizar Lara, Mario Lara and Toby Dutton.

In order to punch up the team's running game, Helton had moved junior varsity quarterback Blake Scaff into the signal-calling role, in order to let Richard Shepherd take a turn as a running back. Both Scaff and Shepherd saw action at the

quarterback slot. Dexter scored first, but missed their extra point, to take a 6-0 lead. But the New Mexico team later scored a safety, for an 8-0 count.

The Mustangs tallied when Henderson Griggs made a super catch of a pass from Shepherd, then literally ran over a couple of defenders to get into the end zone.

Raymond Rocha, Jr. scored a two-point PAT, to tie the score at eight-all.

Bovina scored twice in the second quarter. Their second TD came on a pass from Shepherd to Jessie Gonzales. Danny Silva ran for two

points, and Bovina had a 16-8 halftime lead.

But Dexter scored individual touchdowns in the third and fourth quarters, and Bovina came up empty on their major threat of the second half.

"Dexter was well-coached. They did a good job of taking advantage of our weaknesses," Helton said.

Martin Contreras was credited with an outstanding game for the Mustangs. Contreras has stood out in each of Bovina's games this season.

Statistics were not available early in the week, as the team's game film did not come out.

Court Fails To Act On Chief's Request

Discussion of a proposition offered by Friona's Chief of Police Bill Thieman was a major item of business at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners on Monday, September 12.

Thieman had proposed that telephone lines be run from Friona to Farwell, and that the Farwell dispatchers receive all calls placed to the Friona Police Department during the late night hours.

The Friona chief of police also wanted the county deputies available for patrol work in Friona when police

department personnel were off duty.

No provisions were made for handling of calls for the Friona Fire Department, the ambulance service or doctors' pagers during these hours, nor mention of monetary reimbursement from Friona to the county for these added services.

Sheriff Bill Morgan stated that with the personnel, equipment and budget the Friona Police Department has, it should be able to furnish 24-hour coverage for the City of Friona, for both patrol work and dispatchers,

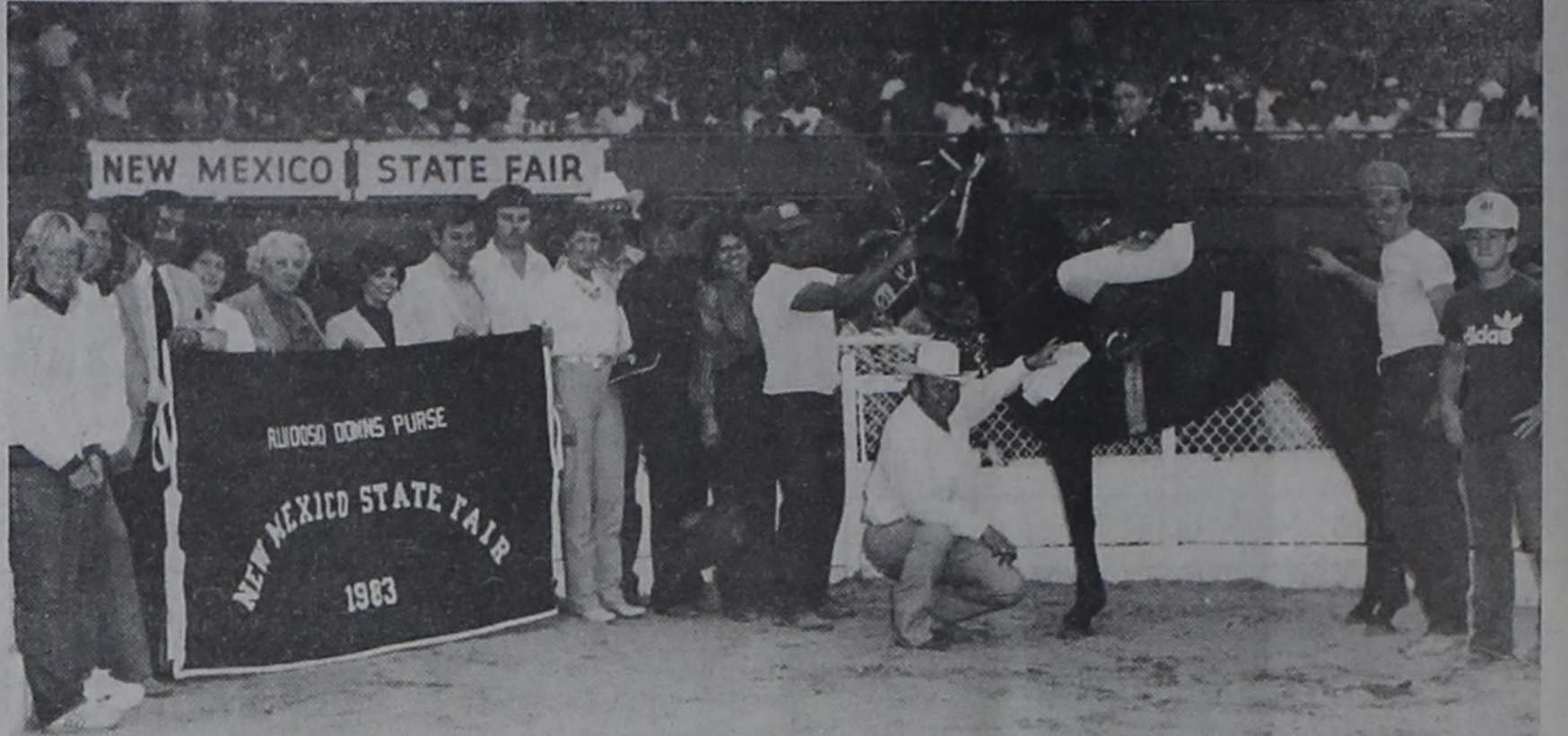

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

Around The House

By LAURA JACOBS
 Most of us think that playing with our babies is something we do just to entertain them or to express our love. But research shows that quality interaction with a significant, caring adult also contributes to a baby's mental development.
 Many studies demonstrate

that infants who receive stimulation during the first year of life are more likely to do well in kindergarten and early elementary school experiences. Parents who read books to their children, sing and talk to their children, answer their questions, and play with them in a stimulating way are more likely to have children with higher levels of mental development.

Research done in the 1960's first showed that infants and young children from impoverished homes could increase their mental capacities when they were played with and stimulated in programs such as Head Start.

In spite of all the research, a significant number of babies do not receive enough quality interaction with their parents. For example, babies born to very young mothers are "at risk" for quality mental development.

Today, one girl in eleven is a mother before she is 18 years old. Babies born to very young mothers are much less likely to have IQ's of 100 or above at the end of infancy. Many adolescent mothers come from low-income families and this contributes to the problem of quality mental development of their infants.

Parents who are poor experience stress that robs them of the time, energy, and motivation to respond to their children. Research shows that families under economic stress do not talk to their children or play with them as much as other families.
 Since all children benefit from quality interaction with adults, we need to educate all parents to play with their children.

All county directors are to report the names of their champions to the Amarillo Globe-News by April 7. The 1984 district winner will go to Washington, D.C. in late May for the 57th national competition. In 1983 there were 137 finalists from across the country and already the national sponsors, the Scripps-Howard Newspapers, are predicting about 150 area contenders.
