



Express Mail offers hope

You've waited until the last few days before Christmas and you want to make sure your present will arrive in time. What can you do?

The Sonora post office has the answer says Postmaster Jerry Landers who recommends using the Express Mail Service.

"With Express Mail Next-Day Service, customers can reach the Zip codes beginning with 752, 753, 761, 767, 768, 769, 793, 794, 795, 796, 797, 799 and 882 overnight," says Landers. "You can mail a package one day and have it delivered to the addressee by 3 p.m. the following day in these Zip areas. For those areas not covered overnight, two-day guaranteed service is available."

The cost of sending an Express Mail letter or package weighing up to eight ounces to any address in the country is \$8.75. For packages

over eight ounces and up to two pounds, the cost is \$12. Cost for parcels over two pounds and up to five pounds is \$15.25. Items weighing up to seventy pounds can be sent Express Mail and all packages are insured for up to \$500 at no extra cost.

Customers also have the option of using Express Mail Post Office to Post Office Service and having their Express Mail package available at a designated post office by 10 a.m. the next business day," adds Landers. "Check with the post office for the fees for this service.

We can even supply the containers for your two to five pound packages," says Landers.

Special hours for mailing Express Mail and Priority Mail will be provided Saturday, December 24 from 7:30 to 10:30 a.m.

Wage and hour audit finds for employees

Chief Appraiser Rex Ann Friess reported to the Board of Trustees at their regular meeting on December 13, that about six and one half percent of the total assessment had been collected to date.

She added that a major tax delinquency suit was apparently nearing settlement and that the school district's share of the monies amounted to \$202,000, \$48,000 of which would go into the interest and sinking account, the remainder into the local maintenance and operations account.

Superintendent James Bible told the Board that administrators were to attend meetings on December 15 and January 10 in San Angelo on Effective Schools. Bible added that he was program chairman at the mid-winter conference sponsored by

Family Land Heritage applications due in July

Texas farmers and ranchers will once again have an opportunity to preserve their families agricultural heritage as participants in the Texas Family Land Heritage Program.

The program is designed to recognize more than mere ownership. It seeks to chronicle the personal histories of agricultural productivity which might otherwise be lost.

Since its inception in 1974, over 2,100 properties have been enrolled in the program. Participants who qualify receive a certificate of honor in the name of the land and are listed in the annual Family Land Heritage Registry.

Under the provisions of the Program, Texas residents who own agricultural land may apply if they can trace the line of ownership from the first family member to the present either through direct

relatives or by marriage.

The land, which must be currently productive, must also fit the old U.S. Census definition of a farm: ten acres or more with agricultural sales of \$50 or more a year; or if less than ten acres, sales of at least \$250 a year.

If all the land has ever been rented outside the family, it will not qualify. Also, owners must live on the land and work the property or, if living elsewhere, must actively manage the day-to-day operation.

If you think your land may qualify or you know someone who might be interested please contact Alvis or Patricia Johnson at 387-5921 for the application form.

Deadline for applying in July 15, 1989 but it's wise to start early to document your eligibility. The Johnsons will be happy to assist you in this research.

Bible continued with information that the wage and hour audit by the Department of Labor had resulted in the payment of around \$13,000 to various employees owed back overtime wages.

Dr. Alvis Johnson had requested that the district pay one-half of the cost of replacing approximately 400 feet of fence on the property line between his acreage and the school land which the Board agreed to do.

Bible told the Board that representatives of the Band Boosters would be present at the January 10 Board meeting to discuss the need for new band uniforms.

Enrollment for the district was reported as follows: High School-311; Junior High-236; Intermediate-257; Primary-278 for a total enrollment of 1,082 students.

Bids for a driver education car were considered with Sonora Ford bidding \$250 per month, Cecil Atkisson Chevrolet bidding \$400 per month. The bid was unanimously awarded to Sonora Ford.

Financial audit for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1988 was unanimously accepted with Bible commenting that it was obvious that all accounting procedures were correct and according to state accounting regulations. He also commended Diane Jacoby, district accountant and Cleone Taylor, payroll clerk, for a job well done.

Jim Garrett reported to the Board that the State Highway Department was responsible for street lighting in the area of the high school parking lot and Garrett was asked to find out cost factors involved in putting lights on the parking lot.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be January 10, 1989.

Wage withhold for child support may be your responsibility

DEAR COMMISSIONER NABERS: As if I don't already have enough problems, I just received in the mail a court order telling me that I have to withhold earnings from one of my employees to fulfill his child support obligation. I really don't want this additional bookkeeping headache. What happens if I terminate this employee?

Wichita Falls, Texas

DEAR B.I.: If you terminate the employee under these circumstances, you will be in violation of the law which prohibits you from discrimination against an employee because of income withholding for child support. The employee may take

legal action against you and could be awarded damages, courts costs, and attorneys fees...all of which would come out of your pocket.

If you fail to obey the court order, the parent entitled to receive the support may sue for all money not withheld and may also be awarded court costs and attorney fees. In addition, you would be

subject to a \$50 fine for each act of non-compliance.

You need to write to the Attorney General's office for a copy of Withholding Wages for Child Support: A Handbook for Employers. This book tells you everything you need to know about complying with the court order and includes worksheets, instructions, and examples. Write to: Attorney General of Texas, Child Support Enforcement, P.O. Box 12548, Austin, Texas 78711, Attn: Cheryl Kabler.





ONE MAN'S OPINION

I see that I have been in error, thinking this was the Christmas Season. A survey of the political horizon makes it quite evident that it is the "comedy season" of a magnitude that has not been approached in years.

First we have Arafat talking to the United Nations in a somewhat less weasel-worded manner than earlier occasions. He implied, although he stopped short of a rigorous recognition of Israel's right to exist and the world hailed it as a great step forward. Really, whom does Arafat represent when he renounces terrorism, and gives a recognition of the right of Israel to exist, which it does very well without any PLO recognition?

The probable group Arafat represents is Egypt, Saudi Arabia, The Emirates, Morocco, and a battered wing of the PLO which was driven out of Syria and lost Lebanon. He certainly does not represent Libya, Syria, Iran nor the radical strike-force of the PLO headed by Nidal. Above all he does

not represent the terrorists coming across Israel's border nor the rebels in the occupied territory. Remembering the visiting strike-force he missed by hours, received by his security chief, not too long ago in Tunisia, one must wonder if his revoking terrorism and tentative recognition of Israel was sounding a breakthrough, or a personal knell.

The star on the global public relations stage was not to be outdone, however. Gorbachev suggested that the third world nations' debts to the industrialized nations be forgiven. He pulled in the "lime light" and plainly proved that talk is cheaper than actions. His nation has only one percent of the third world's questionable debts with the U.S. holding a large percentage of the remaining paper.

The comedy literally outshone the "Three Stooges" for pure unadulterated insanity when a "World Bank" spokesperson appeared in the next bit part, saying that forgiving the debts would be an injustice to

Mexico's economy measures to pay the debts (including an additional thirty-three billion extended by the U.S. Taxpayers to help them pay the interest.) The loans were largely made by the World Bank to industrial complexes and plants which never should have been made. Our support of the world bank is a national scandal, that in its entirety exceeds by many times the mismanagement in our National Thrift System.

The carrying capacity of our taxpayers has a limit. Last spring, we were told that forty-billion would clear up the Thrift Program's difficulties, now it is noted that the figure is one-hundred and twenty-two billion. Next year, you pick a figure, if it is too high, you only have to wait; it will be exceeded. It is similar to the world bank; a loaded dice game; good money after bad. They are duplicate aromas and the created aura indicates a necessity for a much stronger perfume, or an effective eradication program.


Students managed to drag themselves through the last three days of school before Christmas vacation. Everyone needs the long break!

James Cook continued his explorations of uncharted waters in the southern Pacific Ocean on his flagship Resolution and its sister ship, Discovery. He was the first European to reach a group of islands that later became our 50th state, Hawaii.

The first square on the second row shows Challenger on the launch pad. This launch took place on January 28, 1986. 10...9...8...7...6...5...4...3...2...1... lift off!

The middle square on the second row pays tribute to the *Challenger's* seven astronauts. This was the first space shuttle that was to carry a teacher, Christa McAuliffe, into space.

The last square in the middle row shows the horrifying explosion of *Challenger* that occurred 73 seconds after lift off.

The first square in the third row symbolizes the two and one half years that passed since *Challenger's*







"What's the matter with kids today?" . . .

In the Classic Broadway Production, "Bye, Bye Birdie," there was a song featured that still seems relevant three decades later, perhaps more so. "Kids! What's The Matter With Kids Today."

Social workers, Psychologists, Teachers, Counselors and Parents frequently scratch their heads and seek the right answer. Whatever it is, it has proved elusive.

The problems are complex in 1988. Changing moral values, drugs, rebellion and violence are

common. The idea of looking to the bible might seem old-fashioned or passe. Some frown at the concept. Others, ridicule it.

But not Jehovah's Witness. During the second day of their "Divine Justice" District Convention, a symposium, of three speakers looked in-depth at the problem and offered some tough counsel to the 14,000 delegates assembled at the Tarrant County Convention Center in Ft. Worth.

The topic: "Disciplining in Righteousness within the Family Circle."

The first speaker, George Bingham, talked about the father's role in the family, discussing the subject, "How to preside over one's household."

Bingham said the father should be head of the house but that his headship must be one that shows wisdom, discernment and good balance.

"He must know how to preside over the household," Bingham said.

"He has to guide the family by setting a proper example himself, and he has to know how to discipline to get the desired results."

Bingham stressed that in both word and deed he must be a man of principle, totally consistent.

"A man of such spiritual caliber seeks God's help and recognizes his own limitations," Bingham said.

Bob Christian discussed "Parents Adapt Instructions To Reach Your Children."

"Are you reaching your

children?" He asked. Pinpointing two things, Christian said parents need to know what to teach and how to teach it.

Frank McCartney summarized the program speaking on the subject "Children--What Jehovah Expects of You."

Outlining the importance of obedience, McCartney said study of attitude and objective are essential for young people to succeed in living productive, useful lives.

"As you mature," he said, "God expects you to bear more responsibility. You cannot ride on your parents' coattails forever," he said.

"Your parents feed you, care for you, clothe you and love you. Therefore, you owe them your obedience," he said.

McCartney said the chasm between parents and children evident in modern society is the result of independent thinking.

"Do the right thing and you will be blessed," he said.



Laughter and fun are important to strong families. They accept all members for their uniqueness. Parents have high self-esteem and build self-respect in their children.


Strong families, and yours is probably one, accept responsibility for both their successes and their failures. Because life means so much to strong families, they seldom feel overwhelmed by life events.

Social Security

Are you eligible for SSI

Are you in financial need and age 65 or older? Maybe you are eligible for monthly Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments. This is a Federal program that makes cash payments to persons in financial needs who are aged, blind, or disabled.

If you are a blind person whose vision is less than 20/200 with the use of correcting lens in the better eye, or you have tunnel vision of 20 degrees or less, you should apply for SSI payments if you don't own much or have much income. There is no minimum or maximum age limit for blind or disabled people.

If you are unable to engage in substantial gainful activity because of a physical or mental impairment that can be expected to last at least 12 months, or can result in death, you should apply for SSI payments. This program makes monthly payments to disabled persons regardless of age. A child under age 18 is eligible if he or she suffers from an impairment comparable to one which would prevent an adult from engaging in substantial gainful activity.

SSI is administered by the Social Security Administration and is financed from the general funds of the U.S. Treasury, not from the Social Security or Medicare trust funds. Applications for SSI are handled by Social Security offices. There are rules to know if a person or a couple is in "financial

need". For example, an eligible individual or couple cannot have countable income in excess of the maximum SSI payment for individuals or couples. In 1988, the payment for an individual is \$354 a month and for a couple, \$532.

Some might get less than the maximum if they have income from other sources, and some might get more if their States add money to the Federal payment.

We consider as income a Social Security check, any salary, pensions, or any money received, as well as housing, clothes, and food paid by another person in your behalf. If you are a single person and your income is less than \$354 a month or if you are married and your income is less than \$532 a month, some SSI money may be paid.

In addition to the income limitation, an individual cannot have resources in excess of \$1,900 and a couple cannot have resources of more than \$2,850. These limits rise to \$2,000 for an individual and \$3,000 for a couple in 1989. Resources are mainly savings and checking accounts, bonds, stocks, life insurance, a car in certain conditions, real and personal property. Funds set apart to be used for the funeral and burial of an individual and his or her spouse are limited to \$1,500 each.

Not all income and resources are counted. There are some exclusions and exemptions that reduce the

countable earned or unearned income and resources used to determine both eligibility and the amount of SSI payments.

So, if you are a citizen of the United States or an alien lawfully admitted for permanent residence and you think you are not eligible for SSI payment because of your income or resources, get in touch with a Social Security office. Ask them to explain the income and resource rules. They will be glad to tell you whether you are eligible for supplemental security income.

what about generic drugs?

"Generics" is a term used for prescription drugs that are sold under their chemical name, instead of a brand name. For example, Valium is a brand name for a minor tranquilizer; the generic, or chemical name for an equivalent to the drug is Diazepam.

Pharmaceutical companies that make brand-name drugs spend millions of dollars to develop, test, and get their products approved. While research is being done, the drug is given a brand-name like Valium, and a patent is issued which provides the company with exclusive rights to sell the drug once it has been approved.

When the patent expires, any other company can produce its own version of that drug and sell it under a "generic" name.

Before a company can sell a "generic drug" it must prove that

the drug contains the same active ingredients as the brand-name drug. In addition, a generic drug won't be approved if there is a difference of more than 20 percent from the brand-name drug in how much is absorbed into the bloodstream and how fast.

Although there may be some variance, experts say in most instances generic drugs work as well as brand name drugs.

Generic drugs are often less expensive than brand-name drugs, but not always. The price of a drug may vary widely; therefore, you may want to shop around before you purchase.

Because there are differences in individual conditions and the way medications affect us, it's important to contact your pharmacist if you have questions or concerns about using generic drugs.

Influenza

Practically every year we have an epidemic during the winter months, usually between January 1 and the middle of March, known as influenza. The status of the epidemic can be followed in the newspaper and on television as it is, indeed, a nationwide epidemic. There are about 20 different viruses involved. Each year that Contagious Disease Center of the U.S. Public Health Service hazards a guess about which strain of the virus will cause this year's epidemic, and a vaccine to prevent the epidemic is then formulated and released during the summer months.

It is most important that we look for the complications of influenza during the course of the illness as these are quite common. Look for higher temperatures than previously noted that might hint of a bacterial complication or severe sore throat or tonsillitis, severe ear infections, cough with production of malodorous or nasty tasting sputum that might indicate bronchitis or pneumonia, or anything else that seems out of the ordinary. It is important that we see the patient quite promptly under these circumstances because antibiotics may be helpful for these complicating infections that appear on top of the influenza. The antibiotics certainly have no benefit at all to offer for the treatment of influenza, and we only use them in very selected patients to attempt to prevent infections from occurring, but this is not generally accepted as part of the best medical practice.

Influenza is eradicated when your body produces antibodies against the influenza virus, and consequently, once having had influenza during an epidemic and recovered, you are immune to this particular influenza virus, and would be subject to influenza again this year only on the very unlikely possibility that you might contact one of the other 20 of the influenza virus family. If you have forgotten the Influenza vaccine in September, it may be taken two weeks ahead of an epidemic still to be effective. Also, there is a drug called Amantadine, also used for Parkinson's disease, that can prevent the Influenza if taken every day as long as the epidemic lasts in your community.

Mineral dietary supplements improve health of herds

Realizing that adequate dietary minerals, especially phosphorus are essential to bone and antler development and good reproduction, some landowners are supplementing minerals for their deer herd according to Steve Nelle, Wildlife Biologist with SCS. Records kept on The South Fork Ranch in Kerr County provide some insights that may be helpful to ranchers contemplating mineral supplementation. An eight to twelve percent phosphorus loose mineral was kept available free choice to deer at 105 "mineral licks" on the 35,000 acre ranch. Deer population was about fifteen acres per deer. There was one "mineral lick" for every twenty two deer or every 333 acres.

Licks were developed merely by pouring twenty five to fifty pounds

of the mineral into shallow depressions in the ground. With time, the mineral gets mixed with the soil and leached into the surrounding area. Deer readily used the licks which are replenished with mineral 2 or 3 times per year. Over a years time 12,000 pounds of mineral was fed, averaging about five pounds per deer or 114 pounds per lick.

At an assumed cost of \$420 per ton, the free choice mineral consumption cost about \$1.10 per deer or seven cents per acre. Biologists on the South Fork believe that the mineral program has resulted in stronger antlers if not larger antlers. Broken tines from bucks fighting are substantially less common since the mineral program was initiated.

World travelers
