## City taxes to increase slightly

The Sonora City Council discussed a less than 1 percent increase in property taxes during a budget hearing at Tuesday's regular meeting.

City Manager Pete Gildon explained that the proposed increase is due to a slight decrease in property values. The total assessed value of taxable property within the city limits in 1988 was \$57,443,510, while this year's figures show an assessment of \$57,091,590.

In 1988, property owners were taxed at a rate of 53.69 cents per \$100 valuation. The proposed 1989 budget reflects a rate of 53.86 cents per \$100 valuation.

The change will mean that taxes on a \$30,000 home will increase 51 cents from \$161.07 to \$161.58. Property taxes on a \$50,000 home will go up 85 cents from \$268.45 to \$269.30; and taxes on a \$70,000 house will increase \$1.19 from \$375.85 to \$377.02.

"In general you can say our tax rate is staying the same," said Gildon. "We don't anticipate any change in water or sewer rates or a drop in services. We feel we can anticipate the same level of services."

The council will act on the proposed budget at a later date.

In other business, the council approved two requests for special use permits. Thelma Ashley was granted a permit to operate a body

shop at 107 Main St., which is zoned as commercial property. Mary Balch, 101 N. Prospect St. was granted a permit to operate a retail business in a residential zone. A parade permit was approved for

St. Ann's Catholic Church for September 16 and the council authorized administration to advertise for bids for health, dental and life insurance policies for municipal employees.

The Eastern Star will operate the concession stand on Thursday and the Tri Cities Shriners will have it on Friday and Saturday nights.

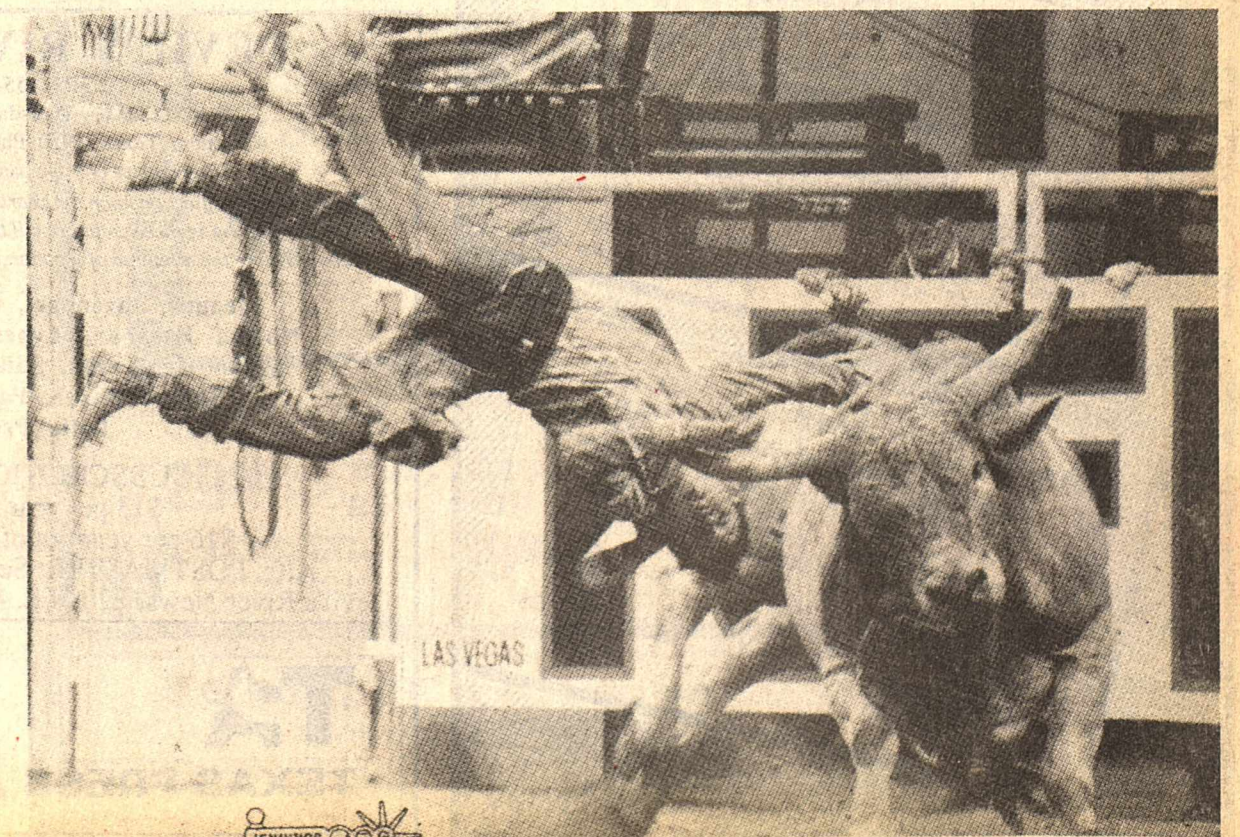
Rodeo and dance tickets are available from any of the nine girls competing for the 1989 MJS Sutton County title.

# You won't like this answer

DEAR COMMISSIONER NABERS: A couple of weeks ago I had to fire a woman who had been hired as a Secretary/Receptionist. She was just never able to do the job to my satisfaction. In an attempt to ease the pain I insisted that the company give her three weeks pay. It seemed to me that it was the least we could do since she had a family to support. Now, however, I find that she filed for unemployment benefits the very next day. Surely the Texas Employment Commission will not give her benefits after we gave her such a nice severance pay lump sum.

DEAR D.W.S.: You will most likely not like the answer to your question. The fact is that under our law, the severance pay you gave your ex-employee will not delay any benefits to which the woman might be entitled. The only type of post-employment payment that will delay a claimant's receipt of benefits is wages in lieu of notice. That payment means just what it says. If you had given the woman no notice of termination and had instead designated that the lump sum was to make up for this lack of notice, then those wages would have delayed payment of unemployment benefits for the number of weeks the payment represented.

Severance pay, on the other hand,

is not listed as a type of payment which will delay, reduce, or otherwise affect the payment of unemployment benefits. Under the circumstances you describe, it would be considered more of a "gift".

In most cases, severance pay is something your company has obligated itself to pay, either verbally or through written company policy or contract. The payment of severance is not a substitute for notice because it would be payable regardless of the amount of notice given.

There is a Memo on the subject available from my office at no cost. I will see that it is mailed to you this week.

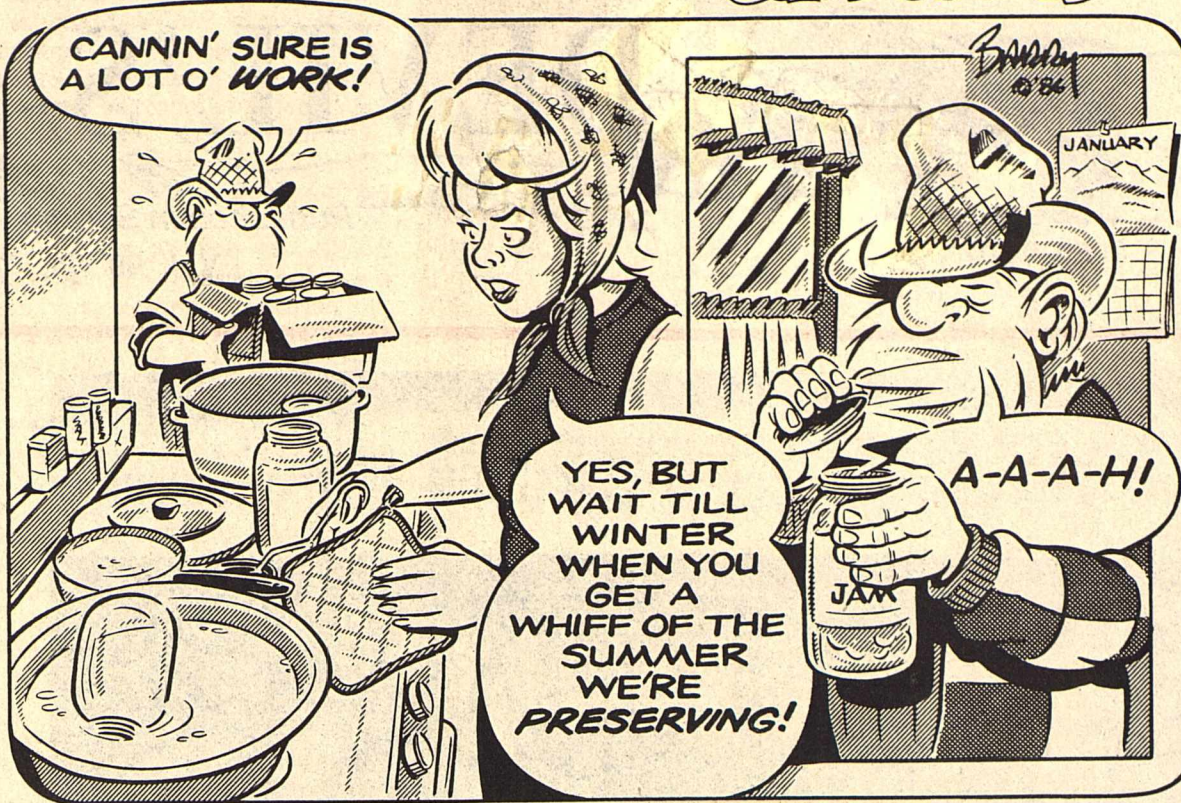

## ONE MAN'S OPINION

We in Texas should invest, not more in the super collider, but in a pilot study to revive the Project Cassandra. That project was a Bureau of Mines Project, in which a number of Texas A and M Student and Staff participated. It was directed toward taking a low grade of coal that the EPA would have jailed you for burning it on an industrial site, and converting it into gasoline and usable secondary products.

Lignite, of which Texas has a considerable deposit, was converted into low octane gasoline, plus industrial coke and numerous petrochemical raw materials. It was not a new process. Hitler had provided petroleum and petrochemicals for his entire war efforts by a similar technique. In the 50's the cost per gallon was impressive. Reduced by the selling price of the byproducts, it came out around one-cent per gallon for 67 octane gasoline. Hitler had plants that produced 30,000 barrels per day and state of the art of chemistry today should give us a better octane rating.

In the 1950's we did not need synthetic fuel, we had a considerable domestic supply and adequate foreign sources. Today, however, we have a trade deficit that could certainly use a million or two barrels a day of domestically produced motor fuel. Political science students will find the major

petroleum lobby that took the money out of Cassandra Project was indeed a classic example of Washington power lobbying.

A change occurred and 1973 found us in dire need of a source of petroleum. This need resulted in Cassandra being unearthed again and sixteen billion paid out for a feasibility study. The party in power, demonstrated the astuteness it has an affinity for and selected a special group to conduct the study. The party selected; the group with the greatest vested interest in failure of the project; the major oil companies. The sixteen billion was spent and the result was reported; not a feasible solution.

In spite of Hitler, the oil companies denied the feasibility of Cassandra, but Texans have an intuitive belief that if the "Aggies" can do it, anyone can do it. It now appears that the oil companies shared the Texan belief, but were not putting their mouth where their money was. You can check their financial diversification programs since 1973. If you do not find a singularity in the difficulty of locating a major coal company that is not owned or controlled (a majority stock holding) by a major oil company, check the acquisition pre 1973 and post 1973 for another perspective.

You must remember that the "Seven Sisters" consisting of British Petroleum, Shell, Exxon,

Mobil, Texaco, Gulf, and Chevron are multi-national companies, and the major operators and advisors in all the OPEC countries. They are the cartel which controls the world oil market. Since Chevron brought Gulf, perhaps we should change the names to the "Five Sisters and the Siamese Twins". This means that world oil is dominated by British, Dutch Shell, and Five divisions of old Standard Oil. It is an international cartel concerned only with the oil market, not with the welfare of the United States.

Texas, in conjunction with a minor oil company should develop a small pilot operation to utilize the Cassandra results and see where the path leads. Our involvement in the Middle East virtually demands that we have an ongoing program in hand, to guarantee our independence from a petroleum shutdown through development of a viable system capable of expansion to produce a substitute gasoline from any or all raw materials we have at hand domestically. Rest assured, the Arabs have not forgotten that seventy-five dollar barrel of oil, and the "Seven Sisters" would be only too glad to see it (if they could blame it on the Arabs and the Africans without damaging their public relations image they have built here). The Seven Sisters could not care less what our gasoline costs us here; their production costs are fairly stable--any increase is pure profit.

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**LETTER TO PARENTS**

Dear Parent or Guardian:  
The Sonora Independent School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 90¢ (grade K-5), \$1.00 (grades 6-8), \$1.50 (grades 9-12) and breakfast for 50¢. Children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast. If your child does not bring home an application, you may obtain one from the principal's office in your child's school.

**FOOD STAMP/AFDC HOUSEHOLDS:** If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you have only to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

**ALL OTHER HOUSEHOLDS:** If your household income is at or below the level shown on the following scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: (1) list the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household, (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None", (3) list total monthly income and amount of income (BEFORE deductions for taxes, social security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement, or welfare. If you have a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

**VERIFICATION:** The information on the application may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year.

**REPORTING CHANGES:** If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

**FOSTER CHILD:** Your foster child may be eligible for meal benefits. If you wish to apply for meal benefits for a foster child, contact the school for help with the application.

**NONDISCRIMINATION:** Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

**FAIR HEARING:** If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official:

**CONFIDENTIALITY:** The information you provide will be treated confidential and will be used only for eligibility determination and

verification of data.  
**REAPPLICATION:** You may apply for benefits any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but need to apply later in the year, please fill out an application at that time. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

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## American Cancer Society receives education award

Loma Surber, 1988-89 Public Education Chairman of the American Cancer Society's Sutton unit announced that Sonora volunteers received the coveted P.A.C.E. Award from the Society for achievement in educating people about cancer awareness.

"Since the start of our fiscal year in September, our volunteers have worked hard to provide free educational programs to schools, businesses, clubs and other organizations," Loma Surber said, "Thanks to their efforts more people are aware of early detection and risk reduction techniques which can save their lives."

P.A.C.E. stands for Priority Activities in Cancer Education and

is given to a unit which provides free education programs to at least ten per cent of the adults and forty per cent of the youth in its area.

These programs must also be equally divided between early detection programs such as breast self-examination and risk reduction programs such as "EAT SMART", a program that teaches the importance of a good diet.

According to the American Cancer Society, about 178,000 Americans will probably die in 1989 who might have been saved by earlier detection and prompt treatment.

### High tech consumer products-risks and benefits

Should you have the right to know who's calling before you answer the phone?

The question comes up because of a new service some phone companies offer called "Caller ID." If you subscribe, you'll get a device that shows the phone numbers from which incoming calls are made.

Caller ID allows you to avoid unwanted calls. It gives you control over who you talk with on the phone. It may also help the police catch people who use the phone for illegal activities.

But imagine a suicide hotline using Caller ID. Would that keep people from calling for fear of being revealed? On the other hand, doctors making after-hour calls to patients may not want to reveal their home numbers. And what about kids, home alone after school, who call toll-free numbers shown on TV? Could their safety be at stake if their number is revealed?

These are some of the concerns I'm hearing about Caller ID technology. But another technology may be part of the answer.

An item called a "blocker" prevents your phone number from being revealed. And if you have

Caller ID and a caller blocks their number, you have the choice of answering. You may want to—it could be an emergency call. (The same goes if you get a call from an unfamiliar number.) But you might use another device—an answering machine—to screen the call. The key is that, if these services become available nationwide, technology will leave the choice up to you.

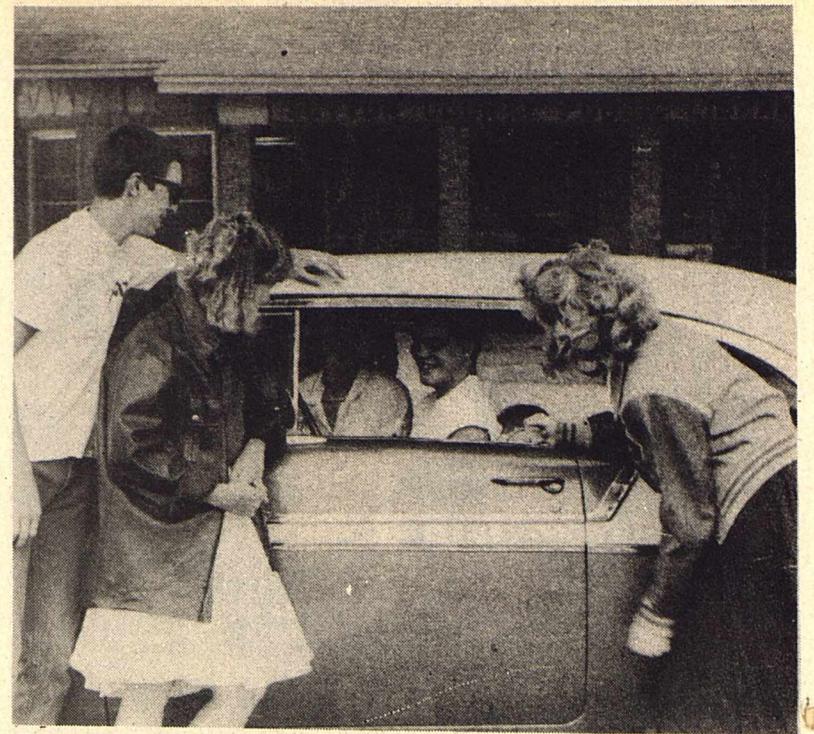
Have you heard of the Medical Information Bureau? It's not new, but it was news to me! It's a group of 800 insurance companies who share information about consumers.

When you apply for health or life insurance with a Bureau member, that company sends information about you to the Bureau, and a file is created. It will include medical data, as well as non-medical data about the risk of insuring you—such as a failure to pay premiums of employment in a high-risk job.

With your written permission (you usually give it when you sign the insurance application), other Bureau members see your file—using it for background checks on applicants, for example. This reduces insurance fraud, and the high premiums that result from fraud. Information can also be released to any doctor you specify.

What concerns me is that most consumers don't know that a file on them exists. Further, they can't get a copy of the medical part of their file to check it for accuracy. (The Bureau only gives consumers a copy of the non-medical information and the names of insurance companies that either contributed to or requested information from the file.)

What can you do? First check your file and make sure it's correct. (Write: MIB, P.O. Box 105, Essex Station, Boston, MA 02112.) Then, anytime you apply for insurance, ask the company if they're a member of the Bureau. (Check the fine print!) If so, find out what information will be provided to the Bureau. Then, as with Caller ID, the choice is yours.

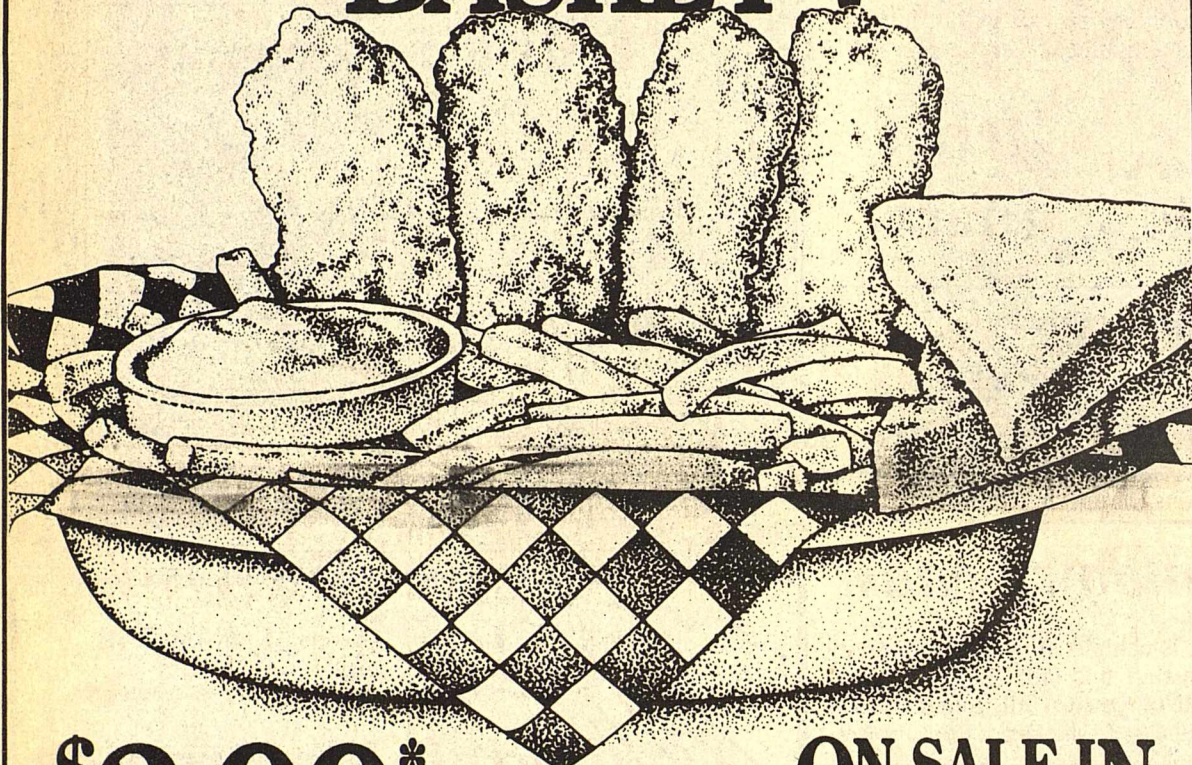

### "THOSE CRAZY EPISCOPALIANS"



just what is their bag?

Are they Protestant, Catholic, or something in between? Call them anything you please. Episcopalians are Protestant because their forebears were among the leaders of the Protestant Reformation in 16th-Century England. But the word "Catholic" means "universal"...and Episcopalians are quick to embrace the universality of all Christian denominations. They do not believe that heaven is reserved for those who agree, jot and tittle, with their particular views.

What place does the Bible occupy in the Episcopal faith? It's central. No Episcopalian is required to accept any belief that doesn't agree with Holy Scripture.

Then why do they use a Prayer Book? The Episcopal Book of Common Prayer serves several purposes. It's an excellent key to understanding the Bible. It assures reading and teaching in church solely from the Bible; it's a complete guide to worship.

The word "common" in the title means "together." Episcopalians pray and praise God together, believing—as they do—that worship is no spectator sport. Thanks to the Prayer Book, their services cannot be dominated by the minister's whims.

Then why the need for instruction and confirmation? In the Episcopal church, confirmation marks the renewal of baptismal vows.

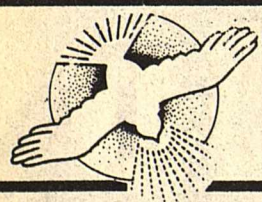
Thus the promises made for a child in baptism are confirmed by the candidate himself in a spirit of matured Christian conviction.

Correspondingly, the service signifies a confirmation, on God's part, of His promise of salvation.

Simple instruction by the clergy assures an understanding of the Church's basic beliefs and customs before the candidate assumes the responsibilities of communicant status.

Does this mean they have a "closed" communion? Not at all, although the Episcopal church regards communion as a true sacrament and not just a memorial. Any baptized person is welcome to join in an Episcopal communion service if his own church's discipline permits him to do so.

Are visitors welcomed to Episcopal services? Absolutely. At any service. It's customary for Episcopalians to remain quiet until they're outside the church, which explains why some visitors look on them as unfriendly. Just stick around after the service. There's usually coffee in the nearby parish hall...and plenty of opportunity to get acquainted. Feel free to ask the minister for an appointment to discuss anything you find puzzling about the Episcopal faith. He'll be delighted...and wouldn't think of "twisting your arm" to join his church. That sort of decision must come from you, or it loses meaning.

## Shanna Patton

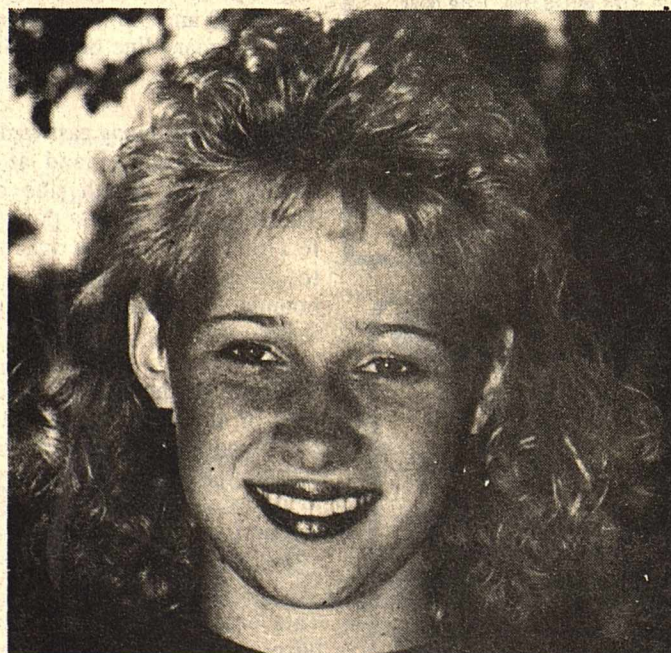
Sutton County Days Queen candidate Shanna Patton, 17, is the daughter of Donald and Marsha Patton.
