# Galindo trial revelation

# Drug agent labeled army deserter

Defense attorneys for alleged Sonora drug dealer Jose Alfredo Galindo say the military record of the state's star witness is proof the man cannot be trusted, and that his testimony cannot be believed.

William Lonnie Hood, a free lance undercover drug agent who claims he purchased illegal drugs from 16 local residents between Nov. 1988 and Feb. 1989, was classified as a deserter March 26, 1972 after being absent without leave for 30 days.

The 35-year-old high school dropout was given an undesirable discharge from the United States Army on May 2, 1972.

Hood, an uncommissioned selfstyled drug agent who claims he has 17 years experience in undercover work, was hired by Sutton County Sheriff Bill Webster last Nov. 1. As a result of Hood's work, a Sutton County grand jury last March returned indictments for drug offenses against the 16 area residents.

Webster has testified that Hood was recommended to him by Yoakum County Sheriff Jim Rice.

Rice, in turn, said he was satisfied about Hood's past after speaking with New Mexico authorities.

The question of Hood's background surfaced Thursday when Galindo's lawyer asked Rice if he was aware Hood was an army

Rice said he became aware of Hood's military trouble only after

# Lykins freed on probation

Former Sonora automobile dealer Earnest Lykins, convicted earlier this year of two counts of forgery and one count of misapplication of fiduciary property, was put on seven years probation Friday by 112th District Judge Brock Jones.

In addition to the probation, Lykins must make restitution to the victims involved. Aside from more than \$8,000 the former owner of Chaparral Motors owes Sutton County and the State of Texas, Lykins must repay Sutton County National Bank nearly \$115,000.

Lykins was convicted of the three felonies in March, and a month later sentenced to seven years in prison on each count. The sentences were to run concurrently.

Lykens was also fined a total of \$15,000.

During Lykins' trial, the prosecution charged that the automobile dealer sold vehicles he did not own; wrote bad checks to pay for taxes, titles and registrations; forged documents and failed to pay Sutton County National Bank for vehicles he had

District Attorney J.W. Johnson agreed to a shock sentence for Lykins, but later became angered when he learned the Sonora man served only a few weeks in the Texas Department of Corrections before being released to a halfway house in Mineral Wells.

When Lykins returned to Sonora on a weekend pass, Johnson had him arrested and held in the Sutton County Jail.

the undercover drug operation in Yoakum County was underway. He apparently never informed Webster of his discovery.

Galindo, 33, is on trial for delivery of methamphetamine. The defendant in the first Sonora trial at which Hood testified, Tomas "Tiny" Favela, was convicted two weeks ago and sentenced to 90 years in prison for selling Hood about 1/10 of a gram of methamphetamine.

In both cases the only witness to the alleged transactions was Hood. Favela and Galindo both contend they are innocent.

District Attorney J.W. Johnson says Galindo's Dallas attorney, Domingo Garcia, is distorting Hood's military record.

"He (Hood) had a lot of problems back then," Johnson said. "He was only 18 years old and his father had just died. Besides, the discharge was under honorable conditions."

Department of Defense records show, however, that Hood's May 2, 1972 discharge was classified as "under conditions other than honorable." A Department of the Army document issued at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, lists Hood's type of discharge as "undesirable."

During his one-year and one-day Army career Hood received no decorations, medals, badges or commendations. Trained as a cook, Hood was discharged with the Army's lowest rank: Pvt. E-1.

Galindo's trial has been a heated one, with Garcia questioning Johnson's motivation in striking Mexican-Americans from the jury. Garcia accused Johnson of deliberately stacking the jury with Anglos, and - without the jury present - twice asked 112th District Judge Brock Jones to declare a mistrial.

"The district attorney's peremptory challenges show there's a bias and a prejudice in intentionally excluding Mexican-

American jurors," Garcia said. "There was only one Mexican-American on the jury in Tomas Favela's trial," Garcia said. "There are only two Mexican-Americans on the jury in this trial. How is that possible when this community is about 40 percent Mexican-American?"

Jones denied Garcia's request for a mistrial, and Johnson voiced his displeasure with the outsider who referred to Sonora's "long history of discrimination."

"Really, what I think he succeeded in doing was alienating most of the potential jurors," said Johnson. "He was trying to stir things up here that our community can definitely do without. Unfortunately there's that small percentage of people who will let someone like this be an outside influence on us and get things stirred up - and they get to leave while the rest of us have to stay here and contend with the animosities that have been stirred

The nine-man, three-woman jury was finally called into the courtroom at 1:32 p.m. Wednesday.

Hood's military record and his credibility as a witness has been one of the main issues in the trial which entered its sixth day Wednesday.

Galindo contends that he was in church when the alleged drug transaction occurred.





the proposition slate, and we were struck by the depth of duplication between city, county, state and federal participation in some of the areas appearing.

The resulting conclusions were eleven "yes" and ten "no" answers debated all the way, but even stronger conclusions were that we should revise the Texas Constitution and place full responsiblity on our legislators, and under the new program their compensation and per diem should be increased. There is no sense confronting our electorate with problems of the magnitude these 21 propositions required solutions in order to cast a remotely sensible

The weather contributes a problem to this area in Texas and although there are some favorable omens, there is little we can do about it. The Texas Constitution portends some devastating problems in the future as we require a rural and largely frugal philosophy to overlap a metropolitan "think big" philosophy. There is no reason that we should not do anything about the "buggy whip" doctrine that is politically wrapped around our neck before problems get out

It is estimated that the proposed rate changes and the addition of the nineteen (19) Primary Market Areas will increase the Company's annual revenues during the first year the proposed changes are in effect approximately \$140,000. 





That wooden school building was located on Water Street next to the present Masonic Lodge. It served all grades until classes opened in the rock school on College St. finished and ready by October 1905.
