

Council Receives Honors


The Bovina Student Council recently attended the State Student Council Convention, April 30-May

Most pre-medical students will of Bovina High School, has been agree that only a fraction of the accepted to one of the more prestigious dental school's in the world. Scott recently received a letter of acceptance to Baylor's College of Dentistry in Dallas. Only 14 percent of all students who apply to Baylor are accepted.

Scott is the 22-year-old son of One Wayland Baptist Univer- Mr. and Mrs. Larry Scott of Abilene and grandson of Edna Scott and Erra Jamerson, both of Bovina.


After his interview last September, Scott received word that because of his academic achievement at Wayland, his scores on the Dental Aptitude Test (DAT), and his performance in his interview, he was a likely candidate for admission to Baylor. Scott scored in the 89th percentile nationally on the DAT and was the first applicant interviewed at Baylor.

"I've always wanted to go into the medical field," said Scott, who plans to pursue a specialization in oral and maxillofacial surgery. It will take him four years to complete the dental program and at least two more years for his specialty.

In addition to his acceptance, Scott is the recipient of a \$450 Trustees Academic Scholarship for his first year of study at Baylor. Scott received a letter from Assistant Dean, Dr. James Henry, awarding him the scholarship for his outstanding academic performance at

Scott has prepared himself for dental school with a double major in biology and chemistry. From those two fields, Scott had to take a total of 72 course hours. He has also spent time observing in dental offices, which is a requirement for

Last summer, Scott was one of 20 people from across the country well known for being able to place selected to study in the summer honors program in chemistry re-

search at Baylor. He received a stipend for participating in the project. Scott's area of research was Analytical Chemistry.

Scott's research centered around developing a technique for cleaning ancient metal artifacts. The process they chose was electrolytic reduction using various surfactants.

The coins used in the research were first century A.D. coins which came from a Baylor excavation site in Isreal. The process caused the coins to sluff off their corrosion and cause the copper ions to turn back to the surface of the coin, preserving the majority of the metal. This is one of the newest techniques

Scott was able to participate in the research program in a one-onone setting with a Baylor professor. However, the research and work was done entirely by the students. The technique he helped with was published and submitted for publication in the chemical abstracts by his professor, Dr. Alton Hassell. Scott was allowed to keep one of the coins which was dated 14 A.D.

Participating in the summer honors research program at Baylor greatly enhanced Scott's acceptance into Baylor College of Dentistry.




The check from the 1991 Bazaar was given to the City of Friona to pay for the new sound system at the Community Center. The sound system was purchased and installed in January of 1992.

Last week we discussed the need to add a safety pin style spinnerbait to your tackle box. Every pro and successful fisherman uses this dependable lure, but each will modify it in hopes of catching more fish.

Blade styles vary from the Colorado (round blade) to the Tennessee (oblong blade), and finally the willowleaf (skinny pointed blade). Every angler will develop "confidence" in some combination of these blades. I favor using a single blade (Tennessee style) until the water temperature reaches 65 and then switch over to a tandem style--a small Colorado blade in front of a large willowleaf. During the dog days of summer, a tandem willowleaf will work wonders if you are the only angler using that combination.

Blade color can be the easiest part of the selection process. Tournament expert Billy Moore suggests every fisherman needs three colors of blades--silver, gold

Driver Caution Urged

Major Cawthon said, "In order to make this an accident free summer vacation, motorists need to take a more mature attitude toward safe driving. Let's all remember to slow down a little and live alot by driving defensively each and every day of this summer while school is out.

silver in front of gold is the norm. Mixing a small silver Colorado in front of a bigger gold Tennessee (or gold willowleaf) can load the boat.

Minimum selection might include a total of six spinnerbaits: three 1/4 oz. lures--one with #4 black Colorado blade, one with tandem rigged #3 silver Colorado in front of #5 gold Tennesee and finally a double willowleaf-#3 silver in front of a #4 gold; three 1/2 oz. lures rigged with larger blades than the 1/4 oz. sizes. Buy several extra Colorado, Tennessee and willowleaf blades and start your search for the perfect spinnerbait.

After all that information, I now offer the best piece of advice on using a spinnerbait: "No matter how

When rigging tandem blades, it is rigged, bump something on every cast." According to experts like Gordon Cummings of Spearman, most strikes will occur after the bait is deflected off of something--a rock, tree, weed or even the bottom.




