Bovina Hurdler Hopes To Benefit From Experience

Bovina's Corey Kirkpatrick can only hope there is no substitute for experience.

Last year his eyes were as big as a discus when he competed in the 1A 300 hurdles.

For sure, there was nothing like 78,000-seat Memorial Stadium in Bovina. Kirkpatrick let nerves get the best of him and he finished fifth. **KIRKPATRICK**

"When I got there, I was astounded at how big the place was," said Kirkpatrick, one of three Bovina athletes competing this weekend. "Right before I ran, I got real nervous and stuttered-stepped the first hurdle. That threw me off. But my adrenaline got pumping, and I couldn't control it."

This year, Kirkpatrick is hopeful any nervous tension will work in his favor. He enters the meet with the second-fastest qualifying time of 39.26. Jody Brown of Cross Plains, a football signee for Texas Tech, has the fastest qualifying mark of 38.86.

"Having been down there before, at least I know what to expect as far as all the people and the humidity," said Kirkpatrick.

"Last year Corey got the flu early in the week, and that took a lot out of him," said Bovina track coach Bobby Ventura. "Then I think he let nerves get the best of him. This year he told me, 'Coach, I got nerves of steel. Don't worry about it.'"

"When it's time to get going, he

definitely gets going. We think he's got an excellent chance to medal--and maybe even win it."

A key to winning may be which lane Kirkpatrick draws. The turns on the Memorial Stadium track are tight, and the more of an inside lane, the tougher it can be fighting the curve.

"I'm hoping for lane five or six," he said.

"He had lane two last year," said Ventura. "The curves are so sharp that your momentum can pull you out of the lane. So if we were to

Kirk Scott Accepted By Baylor College

Most pre-medical students will agree that only a fraction of the struggle in achieving their "Doctor" status is in undergraduate work. Once graduation is approaching, there comes the obstacle of being accepted to the medical school they wish to attend, or being accepted at all.

One Wayland Baptist University senior has proven himself enough that the struggle is behind him. Kirk Scott, a 1988 graduate

of Bovina High School, has been accepted to one of the more prestigious dental schools in the world. Scott recently received a letter of acceptance to Baylor's College of Dentistry in Dallas. Only 14 percent of all students who apply to Baylor are accepted.

Scott is the 22-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Scott of Abilene and grandson of Edna Scott and Erra Jamerson, both of Bovina.

After his interview last September, Scott received word that because of his academic achievement at Wayland, his scores on the Dental Aptitude Test (DAT), and his performance in his interview, he was a likely candidate for admission to Baylor. Scott scored in the 89th percentile nationally on the DAT and was the first applicant interviewed at Baylor.

"I've always wanted to go into the medical field," said Scott, who plans to pursue a specialization in oral and maxillofacial surgery. It will take him four years to complete the dental program and at least two more years for his specialty.

In addition to his acceptance, Scott is the recipient of a \$450 Trustees Academic Scholarship for his first year of study at Baylor. Scott received a letter from Assistant Dean, Dr. James Henry, awarding him the scholarship for his outstanding academic performance at Wayland.

Scott has prepared himself for dental school with a double major in biology and chemistry. From those two fields, Scott had to take a total of 72 course hours. He has also spent time observing in dental offices, which is a requirement for acceptance.

Last summer, Scott was one of 20 people from across the country selected to study in the summer honors program in chemistry re-

search at Baylor. He received a stipend for participating in the project. Scott's area of research was Analytical Chemistry.

Scott's research centered around developing a technique for cleaning ancient metal artifacts. The process they chose was electrolytic reduction using various surfactants.

The coins used in the research were first century A.D. coins which came from a Baylor excavation site in Israel. The process caused the coins to sluff off their corrosion and cause the copper ions to turn back to the surface of the coin, preserving the majority of the metal. This is one of the newest techniques used.

Scott was able to participate in the research program in a one-on-one setting with a Baylor professor. However, the research and work was done entirely by the students. The technique he helped with was published and submitted for publication in the chemical abstracts by his professor, Dr. Alton Hassell. Scott was allowed to keep one of the coins which was dated 14 A.D.

Participating in the summer honors research program at Baylor greatly enhanced Scott's acceptance into Baylor College of Dentistry.

Wayland Baptist University is well known for being able to place 100 percent of its pre-medical students into medical schools.
