Election brings little excitement

Absentee voting reported slow

Little enthusiasm has been shown for this Saturday's election as the mayor's race is the only one that has opponents going head to head. The water board, hospital board, school board and city council all have the incumbents running unopposed.

Through early Tuesday, the absentee voting reflected the lack of challenges as just 94 absentee voters had shown up at city hall. In comparison, a total of 160 absentee ballots were cast during the 1988 mayor's race.



Every One Matters.

In 1988, the Mayor's race drew 476 total voters and the 1989 city council election had 344 total voters.

City secretary Becky Covington said the total number

of possible voters in Sonora is around 1,000.

The school board election had drawn just eight absentee voters as of Monday at 3 p.m.

The mayor's race between

incumbent Bill Gosney and challenger Jim Adams has had little controversy. They agreed again on Monday, as both felt the

The water board will return Clay Hicks, Joe David Ross and Norm Rousselot, all unchallenged while the hospital board will have Clay Parker, Smith Neal and Ruth Shurley

Jesse Bustamante and Gary Hardgrave will serve another term

on the school board.

Covington said the polls at city hall will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday with the results to be released soon after.

Ranchers watch sky for more rain showers Ranchers in Sutton County spend a good portion of time Taylor said there are two peak rain times each year. One occurs

Ranchers in Sutton County spend a good portion of time looking toward the heavens. The same question is in their minds each year, how much rain will fall and when will it fall.

Depending on where the rancher is located in Sutton County, they will get a different answer.

Generally, the trend this year shows the ranchers in the south and west are getting the raw end of the deal.

The Rousselot Ranch is located about half north and half south of Interstate 10. Don Patton said the portion south of the I-10 has received less than two-inches of precipitation in 1990. North of the interstate is a bit better.

Patton said the situation is far from being drastic, but the grass has not received the rain needed to get a good start. The grasses are an important part for it supplements the livestock's diet.

If the lack of rain continues into late June or July then some decisions will have to be made.

"You have to make the choice to move livestock, drop livestock or something," said Patton.

That time is still a ways off.
Patton said, "We're not so bad
off to that point because we're

not overstocked."
Patton and other Sutton
County ranchers are helped by the
fact that the area has a long

growing season.

During a study group meeting Tuesday, Dr. Butch Taylor of the Texas A&M Experiment Station said the potential growing season is 240 days. The season is not necessarily that long, but if conditions were to be just right it is possible.

What makes things so difficult for ranchers is that it is impossible to guess what the weather will be like from one month to the next much less one year to the next. Taylor said four wind systems that effect the area make weather predictions difficult.

Taylor said there are two peak rain times each year. One occurs in May and June and another in August and September. This allows for two possible growing seasons.

The Bud Whitehead Ranch just south of the Rousselot Ranch is in much the same boat. Tommy Whitehead, wife of Bud, said that they have received 3.9 inches in 1990. Only a little over two-inches has fallen since March 1.

Tommy said they are losing the best time for the grass to get a good start. Because of a lack of rain in the summer, the rain in September is usually too late to help.

There is some winter grass, but Tommy said, "It is beginning to dry up."

On the Glen Fisher ranch northeast of Sonora, the rain situation is looking good.

"It's as good as it's ever been," said Fisher.

Fisher said range conditions are good and they don't have to feed the livestock. The good conditions should last for another 30 days but there is a need for more rain to help the summer grasses.

Fisher said the range is mostly winter weeds and grasses at this

The Bob Brockman ranch has received 11.13 inches of rain in 1990. That is a little above

normal.
"It's lovely down here," said
Brockman.

The rains started in January and have been consistent through the spring.

"I like to see the rains scattered

out," said Brockman. "It's good for the long growing seaon." Despite the good conditions,

Brockman said he tries to manage for droughts anyway.

To keep the excellent conditions going, Brockman said, "We need another rain in one or two weeks."

The rains would help the grasses become re-established.
"We've been real fortunate."

New doctor joins hospital

Dr. Jay C. Surratt has joined the staff at Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital and nursing home. Surratt joins the staff from the West Texas Medical Associates in San Angelo.

When asked what his number one priority is in Sonora, Surratt said it's getting a decent place to raise his children. Surratt is looking for a good environment where they can get a decent education.

"After all, we're small town people," said Surratt. "Most of my practice has been in small towns."

Surratt was originally a Kentuckian, but moved to Michigan where he grew up, then to Kansas City where he got his medical training.

He went back to Michigan for internship and while there he married his wife Sarah, who was Boonesville, Mo. He had a practice in a small town in Michigan for eight years, then moved to Stockton, Mo. at the foot of the Ozarks. That was where he spent the next eight years, being the only doctor for 30 miles in any direction.

In addition to the day to day medical needs of the community, Surratt was also responsible for the care of 110 nursing home patients in the town.

After working very hard for

that period of time, Surratt went into the Air Force where he served in Georgia, Panama, Oklahoma and ended his service at Goodfeilow AFB in San Angelo.

After leaving the Air Force, Surratt worked for a time for West Texas Medical Associates until he could locate here.

Jay and Sarah have four children; Anne, a sophomore is transferring to Texas Tech next fall; Gordon, who will graduate from San Angelo Central High and is going to Austin College; Grant, 10, and Gregory, 8.

Surratt said the children are the centers of their lives.

As for his profession, Surratt said, "There isn't that much difference between a M.D. and a D.O. anymore. It used to be that there was an additional modality of treatment.... manipulation."

"I don't think in the modern day the one little modality warrants a separate degree and a separate school of medicine," said Surratt. "We take the same State Boards and work in the same hospitals with all doctors."

But maybe the biggest difference is in philosophy: D.O.'s tend to use a "holistic" approach. We don't just treat a liver, or a toenail. We treat the whole person."

"Of course, there are the economic realities," said Surratt.
"But to me, what it's all about, is to help people and do some good for people. To establish a practice where people can rely on the doctor and know he's going to do a decent job."

Surratt has many interests outside of his practice; golf, sports and music with his boys. His wife has a private pilot's license, but again and again, his real interest is in his family.

"We've heard so many stories about what a friendly town this is," said Surratt. "My biggest goal at this time is to find a house down here so I can give up commuting to Angelo."

Dr. Surratt opened his practice on April 2. His hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday with a half-day off on Wednesday. He is alternating calls in the emergency room at the hospital with Dr. Pajestka.

Bus Routes

Sonora ISD runs seven bus routes to serve our rural students. The routes are run in the mornings and afternoons, and vary in distance from 77 miles to 50 miles round trip. We have a total of 173 students who qualify to ride the bus. To be eligible, a student must live a minimum of two miles from the school they attend.

Know IRS definition of independent contractor

Withholding income taxes for agricultural employees is mandatory, but farmers and ranchers should be cautious before they claim their workers as "independent contractors," according to Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

If producers do claim farm or ranch laborers as "independent contractors," the IRS could try to reclassify them as "employees" and charge the producer for unpaid employment taxes. Thus, it is useful to know the criteria the IRS uses to make the distinction between "employee" and "independent contractor."

Hayenga offers several tests that are used to tell if a farmer or rancher is an employer. If the farmer/rancher instructs the worker when, where and how the work is to be performed, or trains the worker for the job, then the producer is probably an employer.

Also, if the producer pays the worker by the hour, week or month, and the worker cannot delegate tasks or hire others to do

the work, then the worker is considered an employee.

If the worker is furnished equipment or toois, is employed full time and doesn't work for others, the worker is an employee.

But if the employer has the right to control only the result of the work, not the way the work is done, and the worker is free to take jobs from other businesses, then the worker is probably an independent contractor.

If workers do not meet the criteria to show they are independents, they may still be classified as independent contractors if it can be demonstrated that it is a longstanding custom within a particular industry to hire independent contractors.

If the situation involving workers is still questionable, Hayenga suggests that producers should seek the help of a competent tax lawyer or certified public accountant (CPA) and ask to discuss a situation as compared to Revenue Ruling 87-41 and Circular 530.

Being stale with the play is one problem Marrs does not see. Despite doing the play for 11 weeks, Marrs said the kids still have fun.


"Those involved have really enjoyed it and continually are amazed in what they find it it," Marrs said.

comfort me seemed trivial compared to the profound sense of sadness I felt. Death and dying became closed subjects in my family, rarely mentioned and quickly dropped. References to my father were almost hallowed, alluding to his positive aspects and characteristics only. My grief subsided somewhat but remained quite painful for twelve years. I was in my twenties before I discovered he was an average man who made mistakes

and had character flaws. Well, my ability to handle the loss of loved ones has faired better since my dad's passing, but words still seem to fall short of the comfort intended. What can you say to a grieving person that has not been said and said again?

Say as little as possible. Just listen. Let them share their feelings and release emotions. If you bear the grief as well, do likewise--share your thoughts and emotions.

We can balance our grief My purpose here is neither to comfort nor trivialize the grief we all have experienced at one time or another. Instead, grief is a state in which we gain insight into life itself and can learn to function more effectively.

It is while suffering a loss that most of us have the opportunity to draw a new perspective on our own existence, to look at our lives as a whole. Many suddenly discover a spiritual self, long buried in the rubble of daily struggles and routines. We learn there is more to us than what our physical needs

Verbalizing our feelings and listening to those who grieve brings emotions out into the open where they can be more easily managed. The contributions and memories of those we survive are what immortalizes and gives them the capacity to do us more good. Tears, as well as humor, help us to accept the loss more realistically.

The fear of our own death is a matter most formidable in these times. Grief and the little deaths we experience frequently (loss of friends, a job, possessions, etc.,) help to overcome and accept the "finality" of life--the balance of nature as it were

Maximum FHA loan amount is \$67,500 not \$72,800

I must apologize and retract a statement in a recent article written by me in this column. Because of erroneous information that I had received and because of the elation at the prospect of an increased FHA maximum loan amount for our area, I reported that FHA had raised its allowable. FHA ensured Home Mortgage to \$72,800 from \$67,500 for Sutton County.

Evidently, U. S. Departments of Housing and Urban Development Officials assign different maximum loan funds to each county, rather than by region. We talked by telephone, directly to an HUD official in Dallas on April 23, 1990 and he informed us that the maximum FHA Loan amount set for Sutton County is still \$67,500. Fortunately, we obtained the correct information before the application of an FHA based on the incorrect available amount.

The HUD official is sending more information concerning the maximum FHA insuable Home Mortgage amounts set by HUD

Hopefully this information will give a clean understanding of their reasoning as to why our allowed maximum is less than those in other counties.

The popular 203 B FHA Home Loan allows a borrower to secure a loan equal to 97% of the maximum FHA loan amount set for the county wherein the property is located; provided the property appraises at or above the maximum allowable amount. The borrower must also be "qualified" for the loan and have good credit. In order to be qualified one must have sufficient income to provide for a Housing expense ration of 29% or below, and a total debt ratio of 41% or less. Also the home must meet the construction standard's set by FHA in order to be qualified for a FHA insurable Home Mortgage.

The qualifying ratios are the same for all FHA 203B loan applicants regardless of the county in which they reside. So one is limited by HUD guidelines as to the price of home that one can mortgage through FHA with just a 3% down payment because of the area in which the property is

May seminars to discuss estate taxes

Texas farmers and ranchers interested in avoiding high estate taxes can find help at seminars offered in May by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The two-day seminars are designed to help producers learn how to reduce taxable estates and learn new methods for passing their operation to the next generation without tax and administrative burdens.

"Of major importance is how every farm estate will be affected after the recent estate tax law changes," said Dr. Wayne Hayenga, Extension Service economist. "The best tax planning of the past may be the worst under the new law.

The locations and dates of the seminars are San Angelo, May 8-); Waco, May 15-16; and Harlingen, May 22-23.

Each seminar will present estate planning devices in depth, including such topics as wills, bypass trusts, gifts, disclaimers and property titles.

Relating estate plans to income tax sayings can be advantageous. In fact, sometimes income tax savings can even be greater than estate tax savings for people with commercial farms and ranches.

One part of the program will discuss treating beneficiaries fairly. This segment could be most valuable in cases where not all heirs want to continue farming.

Another discussion will center on estate planning tools and will deal with corporations, partnerships and selling part of the business to heirs.

Estate tax rules for agriculture will headline the second day of the program. Farm land evaluation, deferred estate tax payment rules, life insurance and "flower" bonds will be the main topics discussed.

"Estate planning is a step toward reduced taxes," said Hayenga. "This process should start when you plan to inherit substantial property, when you still have an active and growing business, when you still have time to take tax-savings actions, when you have minor children, or when your children marry or divorce.'
