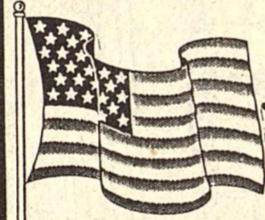

### Transamerican diagnostic receives accreditation

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which services Sonora received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image

quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 14,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As

### Hospital to sponsor detection unit April 21

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, Texas, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a

problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has 90%-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

### Cancer Society cookbook available

"People are confused about the link between nutrition and cancer risk," says Charles Graves of Sutton County Unit of the American Cancer Society. "Even those who are aware of the link don't always know how to act upon their knowledge."

To help people prepare delicious meals that might reduce their risk of cancer, the American Cancer Society has published a cookbook with over 200 recipes, from appetizers to desserts. The American Cancer Society Cookbook gives the Society's nutrition guidelines and tasty ways to follow these recommendations.

"The American Cancer Society nutrition guidelines are based upon an exhaustive review of more than 30 years of epidemiologic and laboratory data," says Graves. "But the good news is that these guidelines are not restrictive and can be easy to follow and inexpensive."

Often, Graves points out, it's just learning to make simple substitutions to improve the nutritional value of recipes. Sometimes, it's learning how to cook meat and fish properly to reduce fat. Or it could be learning how to pick the best sources of fiber.

"These changes are simple, yet delicious," Graves says. "Basically, we stress choice. People can make a difference in their diet by choosing foods and methods of preparation that are

healthy and good tasting. People needn't feel like good nutrition involves feeling guilty all the time."

Por ejemplo, si su casa está valorada en \$50,000 y usted recibe una exención de residencia de \$5,000, usted va a pagar impuestos de residencia como si su valor fuese de \$45,000.

Si usted recibe la exención porque su edad es más de sesenta y cinco años, usted califica para un límite en los impuestos escolares. Otras exenciones pueden ofrecerse a propietarios por distritos escolares, condados, ciudades y distritos escolares.
