# Hospital looks at major moves

Heading into the middle portion of April, Lillian Hudspeth Memorial Hospital may be facing its greatest tasks yet.

Earlier this year it became apparent a tax increase would be necessary to keep the hospital functioning. The hospital board is also searching for a new doctor at a time when they are not able to offer what competitors can.

A further complication hit at the beginning of April when Hospital Administrator Scott Gilmore resigned to accept a position in Mart, just outside of Waco.

For Gilmore, leaving will not be just a matter of packing up and moving on.

Gilmore said the search for a replacement has begun, but it will not be an easy process. Whoever takes over needs a nursing home license and hospital administration experience.

All this is to, as Gilmore said, "Find someone who can hit the ground running.'

Of course, whoever comes in will be facing the possibility of a vote for increasing the cap in the property tax for the hospital.

And then there is the time

Dr. Alvis Johnson, President of the Hospital Board, said the board has just 30 days to hire a new person or lose accreditation for the hospital.

"The monkey is on the board's back to hire someone pretty soon," said Johnson. "We don't have a big pool of people to

choose from. Johnson said the board is looking for somebody with administration experience, accounting, dealing with people and most importantly, "manage on a shoestring budget.

"I'm trying to be instrumental, but not in the way," Gilmore said about the decision process.

As for the referendum, it will be the board who will be making the


big push to get it passed.

The bill, which increases the cap in the ability to tax, has already passed the House and gone to the Senate where it is in the hands of Sen. Bill Sims D-San Angelo.

Gilmore said the bill still needs to be passed by the Senate and then back to the House. "It should be out somewhere in early June," said Gilmore.

The bill would increase the cap on taxes from the current 10 cents/\$100 to 20 cents/\$100 of property. There is an amendment in the bill which automatically calls for an election for any change

# oncern grows about rabies

A rabies outbreak in the Sonora area has seen the number of reported cases in the first quarter of 1991 almost double the total from the previous three years.

Dr. Evret Newman, registered veternarian for the Texas Department of Public Health, said 11 cases of rabies have been reported through April 1, compared with only 12 rabies cases from 1988-90.

As of yet, no humans in the Sonora area have contracted the disease said Newman.

"The scary thing is foxes," Newman said.

Six foxes have been reported with rabies. In the previous three years only two rabies cases in foxes had been reported.

Along with the foxes, two cases of rabies have been found in skunks and raccoons along with one white-tailed deer.

Concern rises about the human

population as the rabies count continues to grow in wild animals.

Newman said the population needs to use common sense when dealing with wild animals to prevent the spread of rabies.

"It sounds obvious, but if they see an animal acting abnormally leave it alone," said Newman.

Abnormal behavior for skunks, foxes and other wild animals would include the animal not Please see Rabies, page 2

### Robbery suspect apprehended

Sutton County Sheriff Bill Webster announced Friday, April 5 the apprehension of a suspect wanted in Ozona for the armed robbery of a service station that ocurred Thursday night.

After being notified by the Ozona authorities of the armed robbery, local law enforcement authorities set up a road block on IH-10 just west of the city limits. Upon receiving additional information on the suspect and vehicle, the officers at the roadblock remembered a vehicle closely matching that of the

wanted vehicle. Chief Deputy Joe Fincher and Chief of Police Brent Gesch overtook the vehicle approximately 24 miles east of Sonora. The driver arrested was John Alvin Markham, age 47, recently of California. The money from the robbery in Ozona was recovered from the suspect and a sawed off shotgun was recovered in the floorboard of the vehicle.

retreating when confronted or becoming aggressive.

"Rabies should be suspected right then," said Newman.

Newman said paralysis is another warning sign of rabies.

"The animal can appear injured...dragging its hind feet," said Newman. "We tend to want to feel sorry for and help it....Our recommendation to the general public is to let the pros (animal control officers) handle them."

Another important step to protecting the public is to have all pets, especially dogs and cats vaccinated.

"They (pets) are an intermediary between us and wildlife," said Newman.

State law requires pets be vaccinated for rabies each year. Though, Newman said, vaccinations are good for three

When questioned by people about why a vaccination should be done each year he always asks the person when their drivers license is due.

"I have rarely had somebody be able to tell me the right date without looking," said Newman. "And if they are not going to remember their license due date how are they going to remember when their pet was last vaccinated?"

With the rabies outbreak this year, Newman is stressing the rabies vaccinations.

"We're to a point where we have to insist on this being done each year," said Newman.

By state law a current vaccination must start when the pet is three to four months old. Also, vaccination is not

and respiratory cancers? Did you know that the fiber, which is found in whole grains, vegetables, and fruits seems to prevent cancer-causing chemicals from accumulating in your body?

Did you know that your body makes vitamin A out of dark yellow and dark green vegetables, and that helps to protect you against cancer of the larnyx, lung,

and esophagus? Did you know that a diet rich in fruits and vegetables containing large quantities of vitamin C (grapefruit, oranges, cataloupe, broccoli, cauliflower) may be a protective factor against cancer of

the esophagus and stomach? Did you know that with the help of The American Cancer Society Cookbook you can become the prime determinant when it comes to maintaining your own good health? 1 c. thinly sliced red cabbage 1 c. thinly sliced green cabbage


In small dish, mix together vinegar, water, soy sauce, and cornstarch; set

In wok or heavy skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Add ginger and onion; stir-fry for 1 minute. Add both kinds of cabbage and stir-fry until tender, 3 to 5 minutes.

Pour in soy sauce mixture and stir-fry until liquid comes to a boil, about 1 minute. Serve hot. Makes 3 serving.

Classic signs of a heart attack

Typically, heart attack pains begins at the center of the chest and may spread to the neck, jaw, shoulders and arms. Sometimes it is accompanied by other symptoms such as nausea, vomiting, sweating, dizziness, fainting or shortness of breath.

According to the American Heart Association, most heart attack victims wait three hours before deciding to get help. This is why more than half of the people who have heart attacks die before reaching the hospital.

over a nickle.

muscle tissue.

Gilmore said in these times it is tough to get a tax increase for anything, but an added difficulty is that this will be a single issue election. A lot of times those in favor will figure it will pass and those against the issue will vote and defeat the issue.

"The positive part of that is that this Hospital Board is the best governing body in the county," said Gilmore.

"I've been surprised to find more people for it (the increase) than I thought," said Johnson. "There's a lot of people who have the attitude, 'If you can't run the damn thing (the hospital) and break even, close it."

In 1986 Sonoran's were told that they would pay seven cents/\$100 and at the time it was believed to be enough. With the rising costs in the medical field it has turned out not to be the case.

Gilmore said a bill passed by Congress in 1983 created a lot of hardships on hospitals. The bill created a new way of reimbursing hospitals for Medicare patients.

The bill, Gilmore said, made treating patients almost like a

gambling game in Las Vegas. "If you get them well for less than the flat rate for the diagnosis you make money, if not you

lose," said Gilmore.







### **ASCS** news

The Sutton County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) announces Wool and Mohair rates for the 1990 marketing year. The National Wool Act of 1954, as amended,

provides a formula to determine the wool and mohair support price each year. Herb Schwertner, County Director, reports the 1990 support price for wool is \$1.82 per pound. The support price for

mohair is \$4.532 per pound. (Incentive) Payments are based on the percentage needed to bring the national average market price received by all wool and mohair producers up to the announced price support levels.

A producer cannot receive price support payments on that portion of proceeds from marketed wool or mohair (the net sales price per pound for any individual sales document) which is more than four times the national average for wool or mohair.

The 1990 national average price for shorn wool is 80 cents per pound. Mohair is 93 cents per

Payment rates for 1990 marketings are 127.5 percent of the net sales proceeds for shorn wool; 4.08 per hundred pounds liveweight for unshorn lambs; and 387.3 percent of the net sales proceeds for mohair. Promotion fund deductions are 6 cents per

pound for shorn wool; 30 cents per hundredweight for unshorn lambs; and 4.5 cents per pound for Promotion fund mohair. deductions from wool and mohair payments were approved by producers in a referendum held in

Once the detector is installed, you should test its operation at least once a month. Push the test button to be sure that the alarm sounds. Replace any bad or weak batteries immediately. Teach your family (especially children) what it is and how it works. Test it (to sound the alarm) so they know how it sounds and won't think that they are being invaded by martians. Tell them what to do if they hear it and Mom and Dad are not around.

Smoke detectors have already proven themselves to be effective in alerting residents to imminent danger and allowing them the time to put out a small fire or to get away from a large fire. When you compare the price of detectors, and the effort involved to install them, with the preciousness of human

### Tax deferral available for elderly homeowners

Texans aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homesteads by taking advantage of a tax option called over-65 deferral. The elderly homeowner simply signs a deferral affidavit at the Sutton County Appraisal District office.

This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's homestead, according to Rex Ann Friess, chief appraiser of the Sutton County Appraisal District. To stop a delinquent tax suit, Friess said, the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

"This law means that, if the proper affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes," Friess said.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can initiate or pursue a suit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that homestead.

Friess stressed, though, that tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the homestead; it does not cancel them. During the deferral period, taxes and delinquent interest continue to add up, she said. "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, those accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax and interest."

While a penalty may not be imposed on the delinquent taxes during the deferral period, the filing of the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties which were

already due. Also, an additional penalty associated with referring the account to a delinquent tax attorney may be charged if taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends.

Forms for filing a tax deferral affidavit are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," Friess said.
