# Civil suit against Lone Star Gas begins in district court

The Sutton County courtroom is the scene this week of a major civil law suit involving a local Sonora family, Martha Miers, et al, and Lone Star Gas Co, et al.

Judge Brock Jones is presiding as the lawsuit is being tried in the 112th District Court.

A total of 150 jurors were called on June 4. After two days of questions, 12 jurors and an alternate were selected in the case, which is expected to last at least three weeks.

The panel of six men and seven women was selected late June 5 and opening statements followed June 9.

Plaintiffs in the case are Martha Miers, Jodie Finklea, Larry Finklea, Bill Finklea and Marsha Finklea Cardwell. Representing the Miers family are jeff Hart of the Austin firm of Cardwell and Hart and Randall Stout of San Angelo.

Defendants are Lone Star Gas Co., a division of Ensearch, Corp., represented by Ed Norwood of Fort Worth; Ensearch Exploration, a wholly owned subsidiary of Ensearch Corp., represented by Dustin Fillmore of Fort Worth; and E.P. Operating a wholly owned subsidiary of Ensearch Corp., represented by Bob Keith of Johnson City.

Both groups of attorney are assisted by several staff members

and experts. The opening statement of Jeff Galindo bail hearing set for next week

A hearing has been scheduled for June 19 in Sonora to determine bail for Alfredo "Primo" Galindo following the successful appeal of his drug conviction.

An order signed June 6 by the Fourth Court of Appeals in San Antonio reverted the Galindo case back to 112th Judicial District Judge Brock Jones according to an assistant court clerk in San Antonio. The clerk said a bail hearing must be held within 14 days from the day the order is signed.

An assistant district court clerk

Hart, made Monday, indicated the Miers' family alledges for some 13 years (1976-88), gas produced on the Miers' "Black" ranch in Edwards County was diverted through an open valve and a bypass line to pass directly into Lone Star's pipelines without passing through meters to be measured.

It was alledged that the gas was not metered and the owners were not paid for their gas.

The suit asks for the recovery of the estimated price of the gas that was alledgedly stolen and confirmed Tuesday the hearing has been set for June 19 at 2 p.m.

Galindo is expected to be present for the hearing.

The October 1989 drug conviction of Galindo was reversed and remanded May 15 on the grounds the State improperly excluded Mexican-Americans from

The exclusion of jurors due strictly to race is in violation of the Batson Supreme Court ruling.


Galindo was convicted on a charge of delivery of a controlled substance and sentenced to life in prison in October 1989.

exemplary compensation. Amounts may be as much as or more than \$20 million. Ed Norwood, representing Lone

# Carrasco appointed to council by Governor

**DRN Editor** Ed Carrasco will represent the private sector in the reorganized Concho Valley Private Industry Council.

Governor Ann Richards informed Carrasco of his appointment by a letter received in

Representatives for the Industry Council were first solicited by County Judges.

"I...wanted to help or know more about the needs of the Concho Region," said Carrasco, who describes the Industry Council as, more or less, a job training program.

"Industries are advancing in technology and we need to train people to handle those jobs," Carrasco said.

At press time Tuesday, Carrasco was attending an organizational meeting of the Concho Valley

Private Industry Council (CVPIC). Carrasco said the officers would be selected along with terms of one or two years.

A seminar has been planned for July 1-3 in Corpus Christi as the next step for the CVPIC.

The CVPIC represents 13 counties, including Sutton, which are represented is the Council of Governments (COG). Lemuel Lopez, a member of COG, said CVPIC is somewhat under COG.

This is the second round for the CVPIC which was decertified after an audit showed the group was not fulfilling its duties.

Lopez said the recertification and reorganization allows for better management and is stronger because of more minority representation.

According to Carrasco, the funds have already been allocated to the different portions of the state.

**Identifying plastics** To help Texans turn plastics into new products -- thereby saving

Activities in full swing natural resources, energy, and landfill space -- the Texas Legislature enacted Senate Bill 444 in the 71st Session. The law requires coding of plastic containers and bottles to make it easier to identify types of plastic for separation, reprocessing and reuse.

Plastic bottles and containers produced or distributed in Texas after July 1, 1991, must contain one of seven identifying symbols molded into or imprinted on the bottom, or near the bottom, of the bottle or container. The symbol indicates the type of plastic resin used in production of the container.

= PETE (polythylene terephthalate) 2 = HDPE (high density polythylene) 3 = V (vinyl)

4 = LDPE (low density polyethylene)

5 = PP (polypropylene)6 = PS (polystyrene)

7 = OTHER (all other resins, including layered plastics of a combination of materials.



#### June sales tax rebates increase

AUSTIN - "The Texas economy is no longer stalled, but has shifted into drive," Comptroller John Sharp said as he sent city and county governments more than \$240.8 million in local sales tax rebates--or almost 13 percent more than last June. In the first six months of 1991, the state has rebated a total of \$981.7 million to city and county governments, an 11-percent increase over the first half of last year.

"Not only are local sales tax rebates up--but there's a sizable increase in the number of Texas business locations collecting the tax," Sharp said.

The Comptroller's Office has identified a net gain of 17,210 new business locations in Texas between May 1990 and April 1991, with the majority of the sales tax applications filed during the first months of 1991. These figures are derived by comparing applications for sales tax permits with out-ofbusiness notices sent to the Comptroller.

By comparison, during those same months of 1989-90, the net rise in businesses collecting the sales tax was 13,213, and in 1988-89, the net gain was 4,014.

"We're not quite sure why this concentrated surge in new applicatons occurred. It very well may be primarily due to the El Camino Council serves over renewed vitality in the state economy. But whatever caused the increase, those new businesses reflect increased economic activity in Texas," Sharp said.

Sharp issued local sales tax rebates for June totaling \$88.6 million to 908 Texas towns and cities, a hike of 18.2 percent over last June's payments. This brings the 1991 city government rebate total to \$617.2 million, 11.7 percent more than last year's total payments at this time. City sales tax rates range from 1-2 percent.

The city of Houston received almost \$15 million, the largest payment in the state, to bring that city's 1991 total to \$102.9 million. Dallas received the second largest payment, \$9.4 million, for a 1991

total of \$62.1 million. San Antonio's check for \$5.1 million was the third largest in the state, for a year-to-date sum of \$35.2 million, and Austin followed with \$3.8 million, adding up to \$26.9 million for the year.

Quarterly payments to six metropolitan transit authorities and a monthly payment to the El Paso City Transit Department totaled \$141.7 million--an 8.8 percent increase over last June's payments.

Checks to 105 county governments totaled \$9.8 million, up 16.2 percent from last June's payments. This month's checks to counties bring their 1991 total to \$67.6 million, or 20.5 percent higher than last year at this time.

Hospital districts in Baylor, Ector and Reeves counties were sent a combined total of \$696,783.

Merchants collect the state's 6.25 percent state sales tax and all local sales taxes and send them to the Comptroller's Office with their tax returns. Businesses file returns monthly, quarterly or annually, depending on the amount of sales tax they collect. The state then retains its share and returns to cities, counties and other taxing entities their local portion of the

All local sales taxes must be approved by area voters. Most local governments deposit the money in their General Fund to pay for services such as fire fighting, road maintenance and law enforcement. City sales taxes may also be dedicated for specific purposes, such as economic development and property tax

Sutton County received \$22,423.27 for sales tax rebate for the month of June.

AUSTIN - A total of 1,244 rilling permits were issued by the ailroad Commission in May, cording to RRC Chairman Lena uerrero. In April, the total was May 1990's total was

The May total included 756 ermits to drill new oil and gas ests, 39 to re-enter existing well ores, 32 to deepen existing holes, 70 to plugback existing holes, and 9 for other wells. Operators were lso issued 158 amended drilling ermits.

Guerrero said permits issued for new oil and gas holes in May included 75 in the San Antonio area, 33 in the Refugio area, 50 in the Southeast Texas, 71 in deep South Texas, 14 in East Central Texas, 36 in East Texas, 14 in East

drilling permits, a 0.2 percent increase from the 5,659 issued during the same period of 1990.

Central Texas, 36 in East Texas, 79 in West Central Texas, 78 in the San Angelo area, 110 in the Midland area, 78 in the Lubbock area, 101 in North Texas, and 31 in the Panhandle.





### Oil/gas well completions decrease

AUSTIN - Texas oil and gas operators reported 215 gas and 522 oil completions in May, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Lena Guerrero. In April the total was 285 gas and 611 oil completions. May 1990's total was 262 gas and 403 oil completions.

Gas completions in May included three in the San Antonio area, 27 in the Refugio area, 26 in Southeast Texas, 61 in deep South Texas, five in east Central Texas, 28 in East Texas, 11 in West Central Texas, 28 in the San Angelo area, five in the Midland area, two in the Lubbock area, eight in North Texas, and 11 in the Panhandle, according to Guerrero.

Oil completions included 61 in the San Antonio area, 21 in the Refugio area, 44 in Southeast Texas, 18 in deep South Texas, 17 in East Central Txas, 15 in East Texas, 46 in West Central Texas, 35 in the San Angelo area, 118 in the Midland area, 78 in the Lubbock area, 58 in North Texas, and 11 in Panhandle.

Total completions reported in May included 522 oil, 215 gas, and 42 service completions. In May 1990, operators filed 403 oil, 262 gas, and 41 service completion reports.

In the first five months of 1991 the Commission has recorded a total of 3,550 well completions, a 12 percent increase from the 3,144 well completions recorded during the same period of 1990.

Guerrero said operators reported 1,129 holes plugged in May, compared to 1,572 in April. A total of 203 dry holes were reported in May, compared to 186 in April.





CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION AUGUST 10, 1991

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment hat would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education disricts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment nat would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas ligher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and ell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educaional loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the ponds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming nto the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."


