Lone Star Gas CEO testifies

At 5 p.m. July 15, both sides finished presenting testimony in the multi-million dollar lawsuit involving Martha Miers (along with Jodie Finklea, Bill Finklea, Larry Finklea and Marsha Finklea Cardwell) versus Lone Star Gas Company (joined Enserch Exploration, Inc. and EO Exploration).

The weary, but patient jury was asked to report Wednesday at 9 a.m. to hear the final arguments in the case.

The 13-member jury panel, six men and seven women, began hearing testimony in the case on June 3 in the 112th District Court with Judge Brock Jones presiding.

The final week of testimony included numerous depositions read to the jury. Depositions included Lone Star pumper, Aaron Burns and Railroad Commission employees; Bart Huffman and Dennis Purvis.

Short depositions of Rainey, a meter expert and Cauley, a reservoir engineer were read.

The major testimony of the final week came from David Biegler, the Chairman of the Board of Lone Star Gas Company. The final witness in the case was Lonnie Morrison, an attorney from Wichita Falls.

The testimony of Burns

Burns said he didn't remember who told him to start throwing them away, but he did. When asked about the bypass valve, Burns said he knew nothing about it. He didn't know what it connected and he couldn't be sure whether it was open or closed.

Larry Finklea was recalled to the stand and was questioned about a Railroad Commission report by Dennis Purvis.


Finklea was not familiar with the report. he was asked repeatedly, "Who turned the valve on?"

Finklea said that he could not name a person who did it.

Goat sale to be on July 25

About 65 yearling bucks will sell at the annual Angora Goat Performance Test Field Day and Sale July 25 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station near Sonora.

Almost 250 goats were on the 112-day test at the station, located on Hwy. 55 about 5 miles east of Hwy. 277.

Lunch will be served at noon and a program explaining the results of the test begins at 1 p.

During the program, Dr. Butch Taylor, resident director of the station, will give a presentation on "The Insidious Invasion of Cedar: How Can We Survive?"

Dr. Brian May, executive director of the Mohair Council of America in San Angelo, will update the mohair market.

The fine-haired goat project and the use of inbreeding in animal production will be summarized by Dr. Maurice Shelton, professorsheep and goats, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, San Angelo.

The British Mohair Spinners Award will be given during the program.

Additionally, awards for certified bucks will be presented. The top 30 percent of the bucks are eligible for certification based on indexing requirements. Indexing measures weight gain, hair yield, staple length and fineness. A sifting committee also will judge the animals on structural qualities. The sale begins at 2 p. m. with auctioneer Lem Jones of Harper.

to lower costs

West Texans trying to hold off the effects of summer temperatures received some welcome news from West Texas Utilities Co. The electric utility has lowered the cost of electricity 7.8 percent for July through September compared to costs for the last year.

According to Earl J. Johnson. WTU's local manager, the interim decrease is part of WTU's request to lower the fuel cost portion of the bill to reflect the price it is paying for gas and coal to generate electricity. The Public Utility Commission of Texas will decide whether permanently lower costs should go into effect beginning in October, Johnson said.

Those final costs are expected to be about 2.5 percent lower than they were during the last 12 months. July through September are typically the months of highest use as air conditioners and heat pumps work overtime to keep inside temperatures as much as 30 degrees lower than outside temperatures. The actual size of each customer's bill will be determined by their use.

Health news

Low back pain may be due to many things, but one thing that may be overlooked is a kidney infection. Women are more likely to suffer from kidney infections than men.

If you have a kidney infection here are some symptoms you could experience: weight loss, fever, fatigue, increased urination. painful urination, unusual urination at night, bed wetting at night, involuntary urination without warning, urination in smaller amounts than usual, hesitancy and straining on urination. The urine may be milky or brick dust colored. If you have low back pain without these symptoms it is probably due to either spinal misalignment or muscle spasm. bypass valve and Newberry told him that it was always open.

Reports indicated that after coming to Sonora to investigate, two months of charts were hand integrated and it was decided that no further investigation was necessary.

In cross-examination, it was revealed the investigation was not concerned with theft of gas. No opinion of gas theft was expressed in the reports.

Much of the final week was the testimony of the CEO of Lone Star Gas.

In outlining his career, David Biegler testified he had been head of the Engineering Division in 1976, when the gathering system had been reorganized. That is when the records show the bypass line and valve had been installed.

Records indicated (in a letter to Biegler from the accounting department at Lone Star) that the people in the Dallas office knew that the bypass line and valve were installed.

Biegler approved the funding.

A Lone Star pipe map from that period showed the bypass line and valve. The map labeled the line cross-over.

Biegler was asked to read the pipeline map with the cross-over on it. He was asked to locate the bypass or cross-over line on the model by using the Lone Star map.

He was able to locate one end and the middle of the line, but said that he did know how to read the

Lone Star pipe map to locate the other end.

Biegler said that at the time the bypass was installed, many people had access to the maps, but he had never looked at it. He was simply in charge of approving expenditures.

Much testimony in this case has centered around Lone Star Gas Company's system of accounting. In earlier testimony, Mike

Claiborne had pointed to accounts in Lone Star's annual report. Claiborne testified that the money in this account reflected payments to Oakridge Energy for gas that had been bypassed. Money in this account, #801 must reflect payment for gas taken.

Railroad Commission rules do not allow payments for "take or pay" gas to be placed in this account. Therefore, if the gas payments to Oakridge Energy were placed in this account, they had to be payments for the bypassed gas.

If money paid Oakridge Energy was for gas bypassed, then the defendants would be admitting they had taken gas that had not been metered.

If the money placed in the Oakridge account was for take or pay gas, then the money was in the wrong account.

In answer to questions concerning this accounting decision, Biegler simply stated that Lone Star put the money in the account because they decided to put it there.

Testimony concerning the accounting rules indicated that by putting the payment in this

account, a public utility is allowed to pass the amount on to their customers.

Testimony was given by Biegler concerning an earlier case in Wichita Falls. Oakridge Energy had sued Lone Star, Enserch, and EO Operating.

A settlement was made by the corporations which gave Oakridge \$20 million cash, sold them the entire field for \$3.5 million, guaranteed them a \$3 price for their gas (spot market gas is about \$1), will allow them to market their own gas if the price goes above \$3, assures that Lone Star will transmit their gas to the new market and included a "take or pay" clause that requires monthly purchases of 80 percent.

Testifying concerning the Oakridge case, Biegler stated the two cases were not alike and could not be compared.

In rebuttal, a letter from Clint Adams (a Lone Star attorney) to Biegler described them as "the same case.'

Biegler explained that the settlement was a calculated decision on his part to have peace in the area. He had explained much of the \$20 million as 'take or pay" costs and that none of the money was for gas "bypassing" the meters.

Miers' attorney, Jamie Baskin, questioned the placement of punitive costs in the account #801.

Rules quoted in the courtroom idicated only actual cost of gas can be placed in account #801, and only actual costs of gas can be passed on to the consumer. Biegler was adamant concerning

the settlement.

He said he made the deal, and he certainly knew what he was paying for.

Attorney Lonnie Morrison from Wichita Fallas appeared as the final witness in the case.

He was the attorney who negotiated the settlement in the Oakridge case. "Take or pay" claims were never considered. He did feel that the settlement was overwhelmingly beneficial to Oakridge.

Biegler testified that Lone Star Gas Company had developed a reputation for some 80 years as a company that was fair and honest.

Baskin questioned Biegler concerning other settlements where punitive damages were passed on to customers as costs of gas.

Biegler was questioned concerning another case involving the bypass line and valve.

In this case, to be tried in Edwards County, he is personally being sued for fraud along with the companies involved in this lawsuit. This case involves the same bypass line and valve on the Wallace lease in Edwards County.

The case involves the same defendants, Lone Star Gas et al; plaintiffs are the Wallaces (George, Martha and Jeri).

Biegler was aware of the case, but not of any details.

The charge to the jury was debated Tuesday.

The lawsuit has been long and often repetitious, but final arguments were expected to begin Wednesday morning with the case in the hands of the jury by Thursday.

Obesity is one of the fastest growing health problems facing Americans today. Many people watch their weight so they can look good but it is very important to watch your weight to stay healthy. Some of the disorders associated with being overweight are diabetes, high blood pressure, arthritis in weight wearing joints, breast cancer in females, psychological and back pain.

Weight reduction may be achieved through medically supervised dieting and intensive behavior modification. This includes exercise, a low fat diet, eating fruits and vegetables and no snacking.

Gastrointestinal surgery which is endorsed by the National Institute of Health is another option for treating severe obesity. This is done by making a small pouch by the process of stapling off a large section of the stomach, creating a narrow restricted pathway to the intestinal tract. Significant weight loss is usually the result with this surgery, but it is not always successful. Death is rare but side affects may occur, including leaks from the sutures, diarrhea, vomiting, ulcers and gallstones.

Pickling garden produce is fun, easy, and it tastes good. If you still have beets, try some delicious beet pickles. Okra will continue to produce during summer's hot months, so experiment with pickled okra too.

Beet Pickles

3 qts. peeled, cooked small beets 2 c. sugar 2 c. water 2 c. vinegar 1 t. whole cloves 1 t. allspice 2 sticks cinnamon, broken into small pieces

Select small, tender beets. Cook until tender, and skins slip easily. Dip in cold water. Slip off skins.

Make syrup of sugar, water, and vinegar. Add spices. Add beets; cook 10 minutes. Pack beets into hot jars. Add boiling syrup to within 1/2 inch of jar tops. Close jars. Process in boiling water 20 minutes if whole, 5 minutes if sliced. Start to count processing time as soon as water returns to boiling.

Pickled Okra

Okra, small, young tender (avoid large pods) Whole garlic cloves Jalepeno peppers or Seranno peppers Fresh dill, if available 3 c. vinegar 1 c. water 1/2 c. pickling salt

Place 1 garlic clove, 2 fresh peppers, and 1 cluster of fresh dill (or about 1/4 t. dill seed) in the bottom of clean, hot jars.

Wash okra, and pack tightly into jars. Combine water, vinegar, and salt. Bring to a boil, and simmer 5 minutes. Pour hot mixture over okra leaving 1/2 inch head space. Seal jars and process 10 minutes in boiling water bath.

People with disabilities can earn more while receiving benefits

People with disabilities may work and still receive Social Security disability insurance benefits or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) disability payments. And, they may be able to earn more than thay think under changes in the law, according to Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, Texas.

"The law has changed considerably in recent years, and many people may not be aware of how much they can earn and still keep their cash benefits and Medicare or Medicaid coverage," Upp said.

Special rules, called " work incentives", are designed to continue cash benefits and health care assistance, help with special work expenses caused by the disability, and provide rehabilitation and training.

Still in its fledgeling stage, the Jaycees are planning a membership drive soon and is open to anybody between the ages of 21 and 40.
