Survey circulates about Wal-Mart

As concerns over the local economy continue to grow, a survey about a Wal-Mart in Sonora has drawn some attention.

Vadie Marshall said she and two other people put survey sheets in a few businesses around town just over two weeks ago. As of Tuesday afternoon, Marshall said the survey had drawn about 400 signatures in favor of a Wal-Mart with five against.

"I've never done this type of thing before, so I didn't know what to expect," said Marshall about the response to the survey. She termed the response as great.

The survey is a second step for Marshall.

"I was just curious, wanted to find out," said Marshall about a letter she wrote to Wal-Mart about locating a store in Sonora.

The letter was answered by Richard G. Lietz, a Real Estate

Manager with Wal-Mart.

The Devil's River News contacted Sandy Brummett, a public relations assistant in Bentonville, Ark. with Wal-Mart. She said nothing had been mentioned about Sonora recently in the Real Estate Manager's meetings, who make the decisions on new Wal-Mart locations.

Brummett was vague on the criteria of what would draw a Wal-Mart to a location, "It's hard to explain all the factors which go into locating a new Wal-Mart."

She did say if a survey was put out it would definitely be taken into consideration by the decision makers, "If the community wants a Wal-Mart, we'll most likely be there sometime," said Brummett.

What must be taken into account is the constricting economy affecting everybody. Wal-Mart recently announced layoffs would occur within the company soon.

"Dirt Roundup" to be in Sutton County

Two legendary Texas heroes will visit Sutton County on Friday, October 25, "The Great Fiesta Texas Dirt Roundup", a statewide campaign to collect a shovelful of dirt from every county in Texas for use at the \$100-million Fiesta Texas musical theme park under construction in San Antonio.

With the help of County Judge Carla Garner and other local leaders, Fiesta Texas ambassadors "Davy Crockett" and "Gregorio Esparza" will collect a shovelful of dirt from the county courthouse lawn in a special ceremony at 12:30 p.m. In case of rain, the event will be held inside the

courthouse.

"We want to make sure that every part of Texas is represented at the theme park since Fiesta Texas will celebrate the musical and cultural diversity of all of Texas," said Fiesta Texas General Manager Bill Hoelscher. "By collecting dirt from every county in Texas, we are recognizing what ties us all together- our love of the land, the very soil we call 'Texas.'"

"With this campaign, we'll make every county in the state a part of Fiesta Texas, from the plains of the Panhandle to the tropical Rio Grande Valley," Hoelscher said.

Sonora area important to production of mohair

DALLAS - The Lone Star State -- specifically a 300-mile radius around Sonora -- is the largest mohair exhibit at the Texas Department of Agriculture's State Fair Food & Fiber Pavilion.

This means if you buy a fine mohair scarf or sweater made in England or Scotland, the fiber was more than likely produced from Angora goats raised in West and Central Texas.

"It's very luxurious," said Brown, who makes his home in Del Rio. "Kings and queens kill for this."

Texas produces about 15 million pounds of mohair each year from Angora goats. The Lone Star State supplies 90 percent of the U. S. Market and 42 percent of the world's mohair, just ahead of South Africa, which supplies 41 percent. But, about 98 percent of Texas mohair is exported for processing in other states and countries.

At the exhibit, beautifully colored mohair blankets and incredibly soft mohair coats are displayed. Brown is promoting

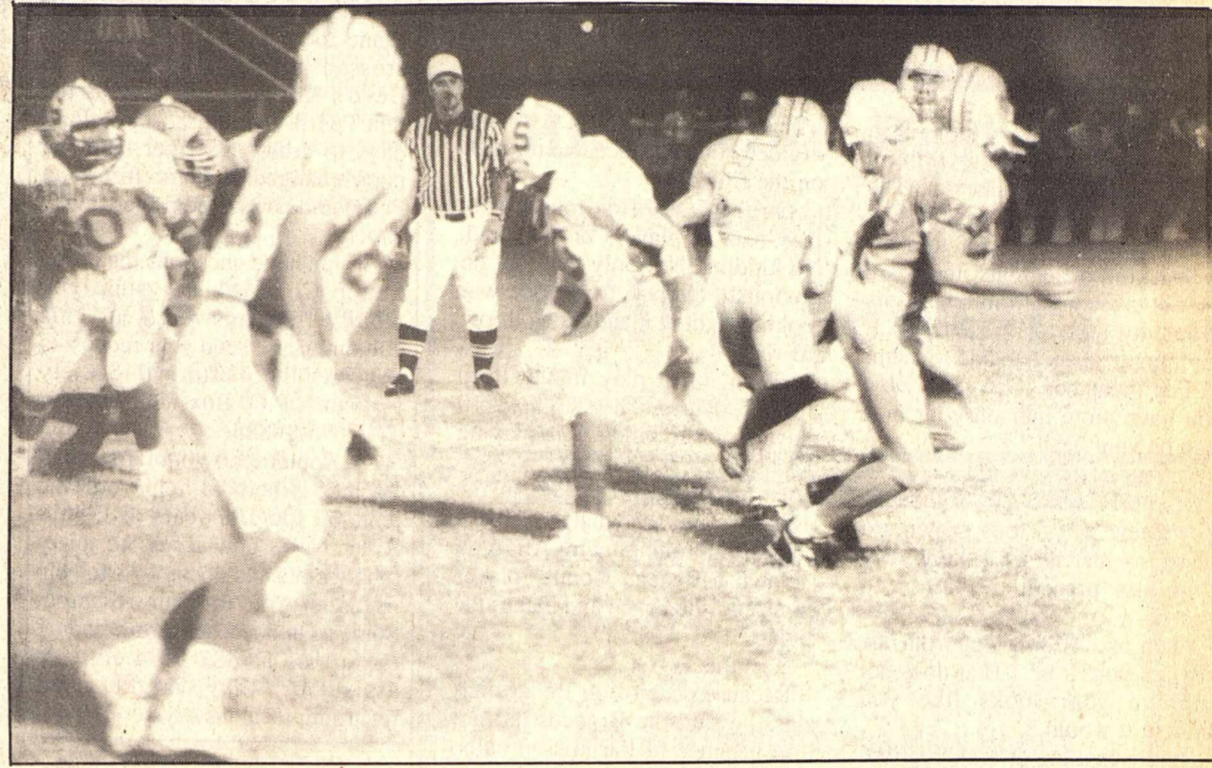

Broncos nipped by Owls 14-13

BIG LAKE - It was a frustrating evening all around for the Sonora Broncos.

There were plenty of chances for the Broncos to defeat the Reagan County Owls and remain tied for the top spot in District 6AAA, but the Owls were able to hold on and edge Sonora 14-13.

As a result, Sonora is tied with Reagan County and Greenwood for second at 1-1, one game behind Crane who is 2-0. Kermit and Colorado City follow at 0-1-1.

In what may be the best game since last year's playoff victory over Ballinger, the outcome was not decided until the final seconds when Shi Flow recovered an Adam Youngblood fumble in the end zone to stop a spectacular drive.

The fumble was one of several controversial calls made by the officials in the game.

The referees huddled together for a few moments to determine whether it was a fumble or not and in the end decided it was.

Asked about the play immediately after the game, Sonora head coach Bob Bellard said, "They (referees) called it a

fumble, so it was."

Taking advantage of a short punt, Reagan County opened the scoring moving 42 yards and capped by a four-yard run by Michael Goodloe.

Goodloe led the Owls with 75 yards on 21 carries in the game. The Broncos immediately started moving the ball to try to retaliate. They held onto the ball for 13 plays, but the drive fizzled when a field goal attempt fell short.

On the final drive of the half the Broncos used possession passes to Larry Chalk to move from their own 41 to the Reagan County 28. Chalk then slipped behind the Owls defense but was unable to hang on to a pass in the end zone.

It didn't matter, as two plays later Brian Faris hooked up with Shannon Escalera for the touchdown to tie the game at seven at halftime.

Escalera had his most productive game of the year, catching three passes for 68 yards and a

Ask the Historical Society

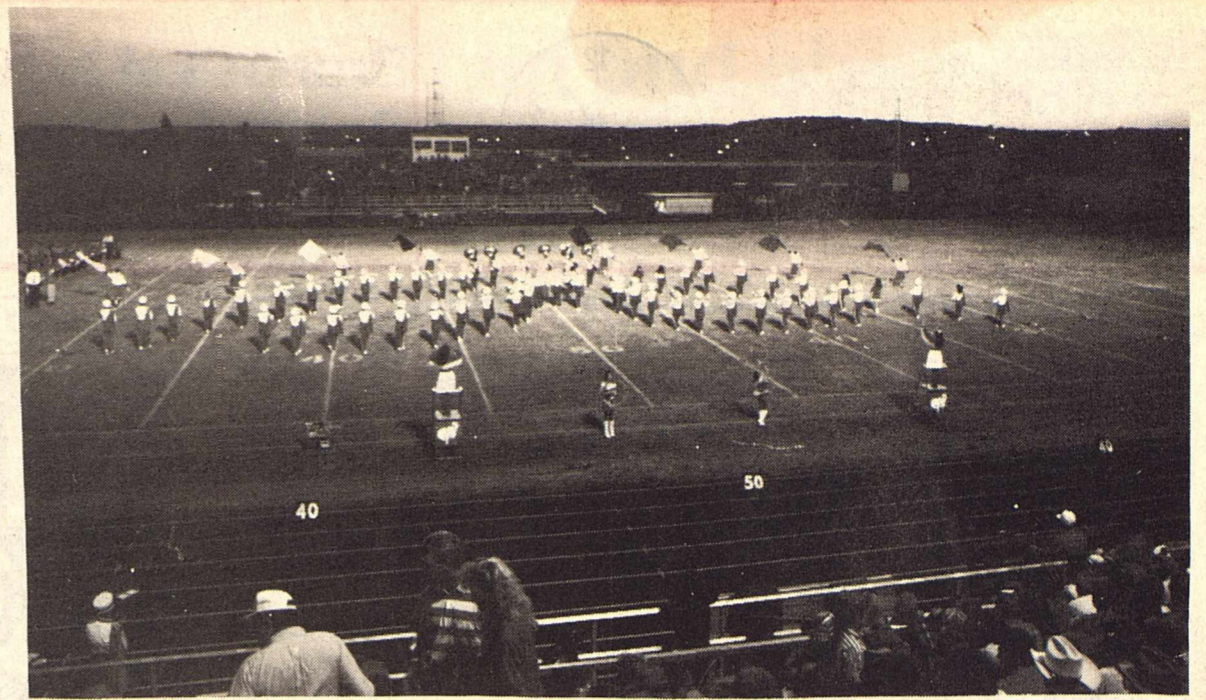
Q. How did the Devil's River get its name?

A. According to an article published in the FRONTIER TIMES MAGAZINE in February 1938, the Devil's River was given its present name in August of 1848. On August 1, 1848 the San Antonio Expeditin of 1848, under command of Captain Jack Hays with John Conner and one Lorenzo to act as guides and interpreters, along with a company of Rangers from the Llano and citizens from San Antonio, left their camp on the Llano.

They traveled up the South Llano to its headwaters and then crossed to the headwaters of Devil's River, then known as the San Pedrp. It required three long days to cross this river, and the party changed its name from San Pedro and christened it the Devil's River.

mohair for Jimmy Cahill, president of the Ol' Sonora Trading Co. The company sells coats made of Texas mohair that are manufactured in the United States.

Cahill, a businessman-rancher, also is trying to start a mohair textile marketing association that would add value to Texas mohair and encourage in-state mohair processing.

Raw Texas mohair earns about \$30 million a year. But, in final retail sales, Texas mohair captures \$3 billion. Cahill recently said that he is trying to retain more of mohair's end profit.

"I'm trying to take a Texas agricultural product and add value

to it," he said. "The money is being made after it leaves the ranch."

Agricultural Commissioner Rick Perry is encouraging such moves statewide to enhance the value of Texas's food and fiber. TDA's Make it TEXAS is working with local communities to start their own processing projects from the ground up. Make it TEXAS also is working to entice existing processing facilities to relocate to Texas.

The largest consumer of mohair in the world is the Russian Republic of the Soviet Union. Enhanced mohair marketing needs to be done in the United States to reach Americans who have more spending power, he said.

"I feel the American consumer is unaware of this real treasure," Cahill said.

The only U. S. mohair processing facilities are in Maine, Tennessee, Pennsylvania, Virginia and Missouri. The only Texas mohair processing is done by two Brady companies. The locally-owned Roddy Scouring Co. washes and scours mohair. The South African-owned Texas International Mohair then makes the mohair into rope top which is sent elsewhere to be made into yarn.

Cahill is taking raw Texas mohair and having a U. S. company make it into coat cloth. He then sells the coat cloth to a coat manufacturer. The coats, which are three times lighter than wool, sell for \$400 a piece.

At the State Fair mohair exhibit, Brown shows visitors examples of how mohair looks through its different stages, from shearing to scouring.

It was Youngblood who put the Broncos up 13-7 on a 25-yard run after the Owls turned the ball over on a fumble.

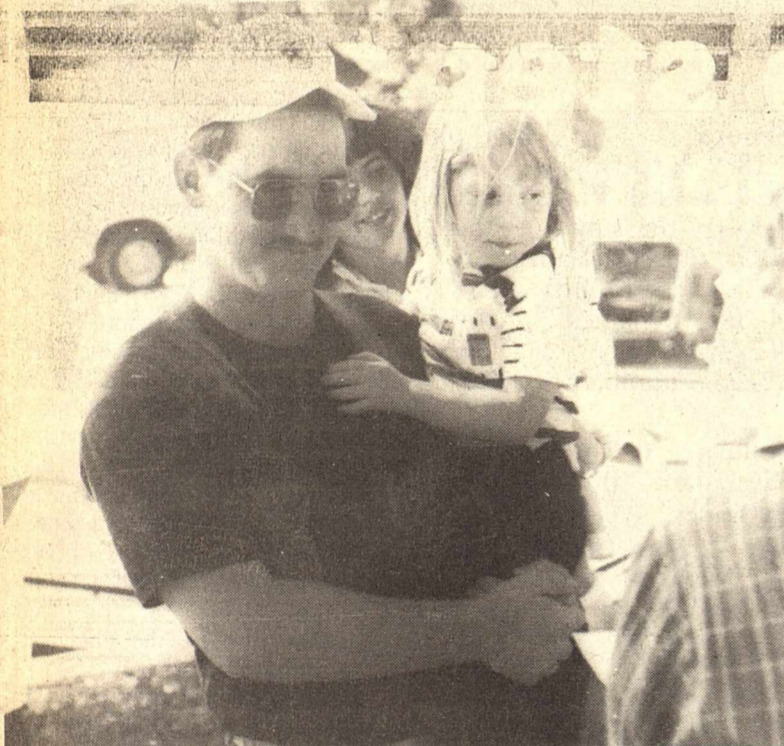
On the turnover, Chalk just took the ball away from Goodlowe.

The Broncos got the ball for the last time on their own 26 with 7:14 remaining. They held onto the ball for 7:08 and 17 plays before the fumble.

After the game Bellard said, "I'm proud of them. Our kids played well. We deserved to win and it's a shame we didn't."

Sonora will be on the road this Friday night playing Colorado City. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

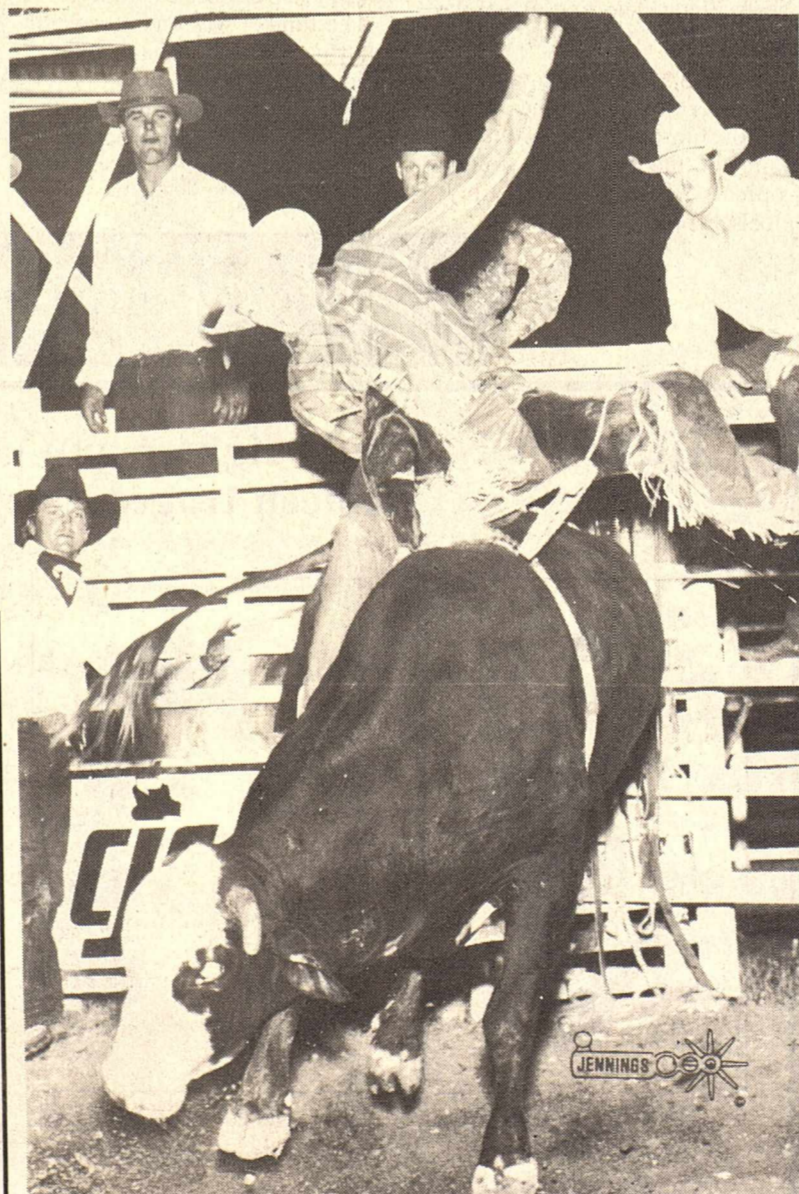

I've had several requests lately to repeat the recipe for Pickled

Jalapenos. This recipe works well for Serrano peppers:

PICKLED JALAPENOS

Wash jalapeno peppers. Pack tightly in hot jars. For each cup of vinegar use 1/4 cup water, 1/4 olive oil, 1 teaspoon salt and 1 clove garlic. Heat mixture to boiling. Pour over peppers to cover. Close jars. Process 10 minutes in boiling water bath.

Start to count processing time as soon as water in canner returns to boiling. Ready in two or three weeks.

NOTE: A few slices of carrot and onion also taste good pickled with the peppers.

Halloween safety tips for ghouls and goblins

TEMPLE - Halloween is almost here, and everyone is preparing for the big night. Although having fun and filling up those trick-or-treat bags are foremost in their minds, children need to remember to follow safe practices. According to the Department of Emergency Medicine at Scott & White in Temple, parents should keep in mind the following safety tips:

*Make costumes short enough so the child won't trip when going up or down stairs.

*Use white colors or big patches of white on the costumes to ensure good visibility.

*Use fire-retardant fabric for the costumes or treat the material with a chemical fire-retardant.

*When making masks or hoods, cut out holes in them that are large enough to assure easy breathing and good vision. Using makeup or face paints instead of masks is an even better idea.

*If face paints are used, make sure that they are designed specifically for this purpose, they are non-poisonous and that the paint can be washed off easily.

*When lighting Jack O'lanterns, use small flashlights -- not candles

-- in order to prevent fires.

*Have an adult accompany the children while they are trick or treating.

*Trick or treating should be done before dark, especially if you have young children. Set a curfew for the older children and enforce it.

*Instruct the children to stay in their own neighborhood and to call on only people they know and trust.

*Give each child a flashlight and remind him or her not to shine it into anyone's eyes, especially someone driving an automobile.

*To prevent falls, remind children to use sidewalks instead of cutting across yards and vacant lots.

*If your child gets sick, try to find out exactly what he or she ate and where it came from. Call your doctor immediately or contact the Scott & White Poison Control Center at (817) 774-2005.

Road work begins in various counties

SAN ANGELO - Flasher Equipment Company of San Antonio is scheduled to begin a project to place raised pavement markings on 350 miles of highways in District 7. Various sections of highways in Val Verde, Kinney, Real, Edwards, Sutton, Crockett, Menard, Runnels, Coke, Tom Green, Irion and Glasscock counties will receive the new markings, according to Joe W. Lane, P. E., of Sonora, the engineer in charge of the project for the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).

The following highway in Sutton County is included in the

project: U. S. 277 from St. Ann's Street in Sonora to the Edwards County Line.

The contractor began work on Monday, October 14, in Glasscock County, and will move east and south as they complete a section. They estimate it will take 80 working days, including some Saturdays.

In the area where the crew is working, adequate warning signs, barricades, flaggers and other warning devices will be utilized to direct the traveling public. Motorists approaching the work area should slow down and watch for men and equipment.

Cancer Society urges letter-writing efforts

The American Cancer Society, Texas Division is launching a state-wide letter-writing campaign among its 200,000 volunteers to urge Congress and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to allow the continued use of breast implants as an option for mastectomy patients seeking reconstructive surgery. The society is also urging all Texan to get involved in letter-writing efforts.

Volunteer leaders of the American Cancer Society in Texas are concerned about the potential ban of breast implants for the use of reconstruction in breast cancer patients. At its recent annual meeting, American Cancer Society volunteer leaders agreed to organize a letter-writing campaign to support the use of breast implants as part of a patient's healthcare choices.

The Society's Texas Division approved the following policy:

"The Texas Division does not support a ban on silicone breast implants for breast reconstructive surgery. We do support continued research, quality assurance of implant devices to maintain their safety. We feel women should be well-informed of risks and benefits of reconstructive surgery so that they may make an informed choice."

"We're afraid that women will delay treatment if breast implants are no longer part of their reconstruction options", says

Summer tourism increased despite forecasts

Despite ominous forecasts, the Persian Gulf crisis and economic recession did not stop tourists from traveling through Texas. According to the Texas Auto Visitor Survey, 5.8 percent more vacationers visited Texas Travel Information Centers this summer than last. The survey, released by the Texas Department of Transportation, covers June through August, the peak of the tourism season. Texas does not appear to be as affected by the recession as other regions and tourist destinations across the nation. Nationwide, tourists took shorter vacations and

stayed closer to home, according to the U. S. Travel Data Center.

"It seems that people have taken their vacations as planned, but maybe they've been a little more cautious," said Milton Meharg, director of the Travel Services Section of the Department of Transportation.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

THE STATE OF TEXAS SECRETARY OF STATE

I, John Hannah, Jr., SECRETARY OF STATE, OF THE STATE OF TEXAS DO HEREBY CERTIFY, in accordance with Tex. Elec. Code Ann. S 274.003, (Vernon 1986) the following proposed constitutional amendments as submitted by the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session, and the 1ST and 2ND Called Sessions, to appear on the ballot for the constitutional amendment election to be held November 5, 1991.

PROPOSITION 1

"The constitutional amendment allowing home-rule cities with a population of 5,000 or less to amend their charters by popular vote."

"Enmienda constitucional que autorice a los poblados autonomos de cinco mil o menos habitantes a reformar su acto constitutivo por votacion popular."

PROPOSITION 2

"The constitutional amendment mandating the repayment to the Department of Transportation of monies expended to assist the Texas Turnpike Authority in the construction, maintenance, and operation of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges."

"Enmienda constitucional que disponga el reintegro al Departamento de Transportes, de fondos que se gastan para ayudar a la Direccion Estatal de Carreteras a construir, mantener y administrar carreteras, caminos y puentes de cuota o peaje."

PROPOSITION 3

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to further implement and enhance the administration of the veterans' housing assistance and land programs and to expand the investment authority of the Veterans' Land Board."

PROPOSITION 4

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new prisons or other punishment facilities to confine criminals, mental health and mental retardation institutions, and youth corrections institutions, for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of those institutions, and for the acquisition of, major repair to, or renovation of other facilities for use as state prisons or other punishment facilities."

PROPOSITION 8

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the voters of this state to consider state debt questions in the form of ballot propositions that must clearly describe the amounts, purposes, and sources of payment of the debt only after approval of the propositions by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature."

PROPOSITION 9

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free

school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years."

PROPOSITION 10

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxes certain property of a nonprofit corporation that supplies water or provides wastewater service."

PROPOSITION 11

"The constitutional amendment authorizing a state lottery."

"Enmienda constitucional que autorice una loteria estatal."

PROPOSITION 12

"The constitutional amendment to increase from 20 percent to 50 percent the percentage of Texas water development bonds previously authorized by Texas voters that may be issued for economically distressed areas."

"Enmienda constitucional que autorice un aumento del 20 al 50 por ciento del porcentaje de bonos par recursos hidraulicos previamente autorizados por los votantes de Tejas par su emision en pro de zonas economicamente debilitadas."

PROPOSITION 13

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds not to exceed \$300,000,000 to continue existing programs to provide educational loans to students, with repayments of student loans applied toward retirement of the bonds."

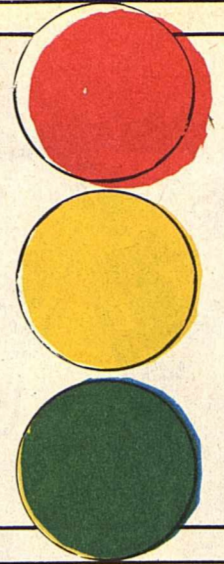
