

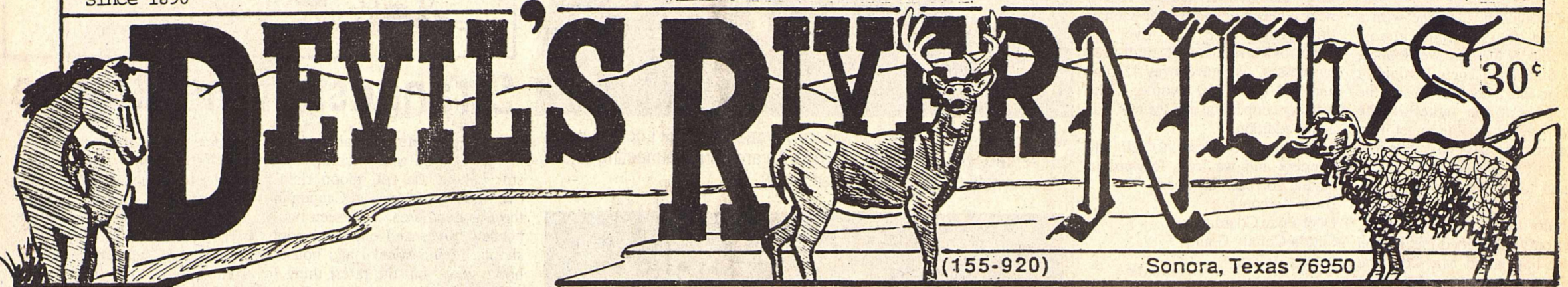

## Broncos head for area championship

If punishment is truly a part of growing up, then the Alpine Fightin' Bucks grew up in a hurry last Saturday in Fort Stockton.

The Sonora Broncos (9-2) punished the Bucks (7-4) with pure and simple ball-control offense to take a 16-0 victory in bi-district play. It was Sonora's fourth shutout of the year.

Sonora now will face Marble Falls (10-1) Saturday at 2 p. m. in Fredericksburg, continuing down the state playoff road for the area championship. (See related story).

The road started out in Fort Stockton on a cold, drizzly night. The weather did not exactly provide the ultimate backdrop for the first-round playoff, but by halftime the clouds had lifted and the precipitation had stopped.

The going was not as smooth for the Broncos as the score might indicate. In fact, the first score did not come until nearly halftime.

After the running the ball down the Bucks' throats (via Adam Youngblood, Sam Taylor and Danny Mata), the Broncos changed things up a bit. On first down from the Alpine 21, quarterback Brian Faris hit Shane Keller on a corner pattern into the end zone, giving Sonora a 7-0 lead.

"Everybody was looking for the run, and coach (Sonora Head Coach

Bob Bellard) thought we would catch them off guard. Coach made a good call. The line gave me plenty of time to throw the ball, too," Faris said.

"In practice, we had been dropping passes a lot. Coach said he wasn't going to throw it to us if we couldn't catch it in practice," Keller said, adding, "Brian threw it perfectly. The ball was just right there."

Youngblood and Mata led in the game's rushing department. Youngblood carried 26 times for 116 yards, and Mata rushed for 109 yards on 14 carries. Together, the duo wore down a Buck defense that found itself completely withered by the game's end.

The only scoring in the third period came on a 25-yard field goal by Armando Robles near the end of the quarter. It was Robles' second field goal of the year. His first was against Crane the last week of the regular season.

Alpine had its chances throughout the game, but could not capitalize. The Bucks could only manage 100 yards.

"Our defense prides itself on its work, and by the end of the second quarter, we were pretty much controlling it," Keller said.

The man who calls the defense for Sonora during games, Assistant Coach Don Sessom, had glowing things to say about the defensive unit.

"This game was our best total defensive effort. I don't think I can single out any one or two people as being more outstanding. It was just a great team defensive effort," Sessom said.

The final points of the game came when Youngblood ran one yard for the score, giving the Broncos a 16-0 lead with 4:01 left in the contest.

"At first, we weren't coming off on our blocks real well, but throughout the second half we were making big holes. The coaches came up with different blocking schemes that gave us a lot more running room," Faris added.

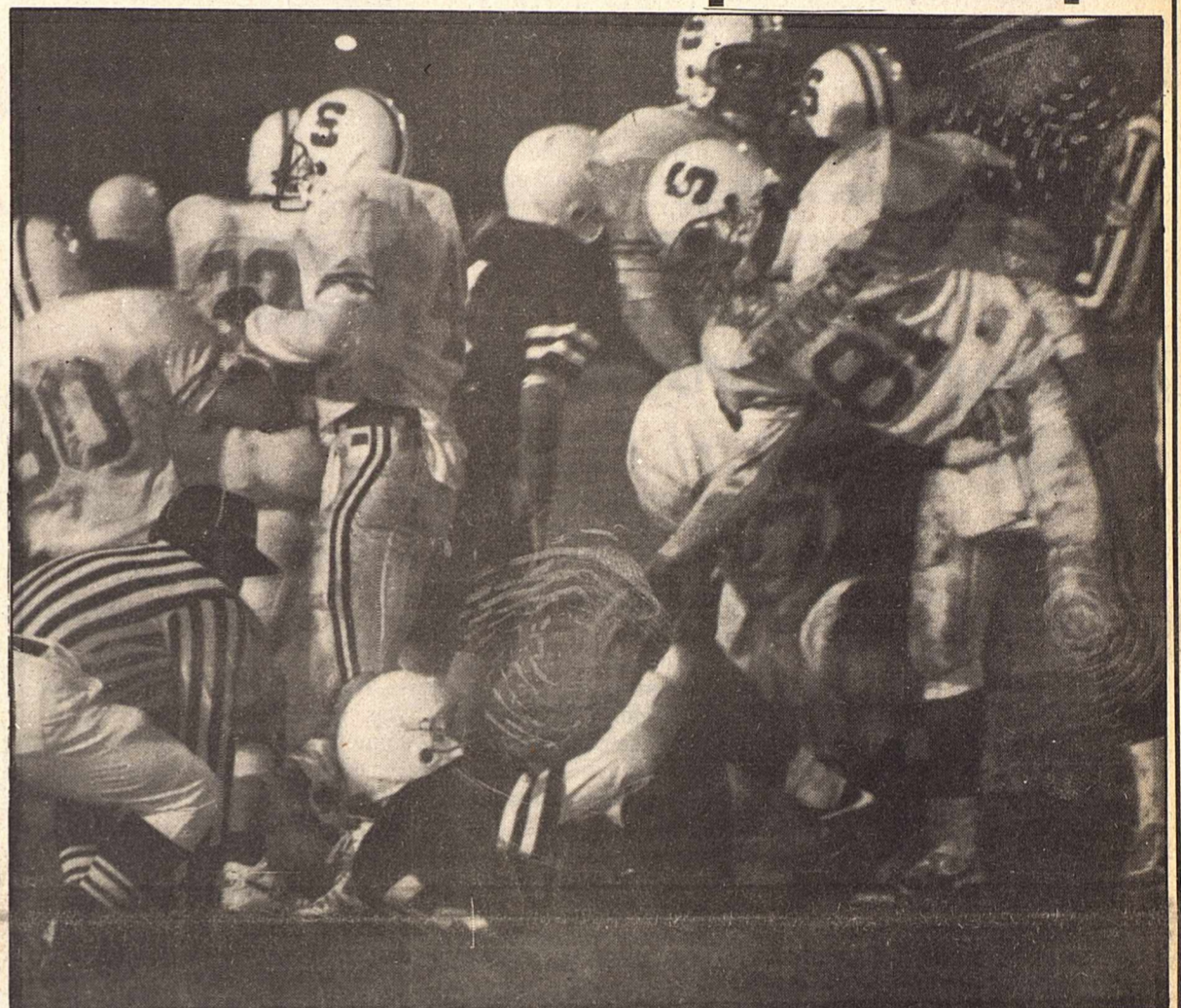

## Mustangs could be tough competition

Just listen to Sonora Broncos Assistant Coach Roy Evans, and you'll realize the importance of this weekend's area football championship that is on the line in the Hill Country:

"Sonora will need to play its best game of the year to win."

That sounds pretty sobering, as Evans--along with other varsity assistants Primo Gonzalez and Don Sessom and Head Coach Bob Bellard--has been busily assessing the opponent's strengths and weaknesses. And there aren't very

many weaknesses for Sonora to focus upon.

The Broncos (9-2), the District 6-AAA runner-up, will play the Marble Falls Mustangs (10-1), the District 8-AAA runner-up, at 2 p. m. Saturday in Fredericksburg.

Sonora's 16-0 win over Alpine and Marble Falls' 47-13 victory over Clyde last weekend set the stage for Saturday's showdown.

Evans said that Marble Falls will be "the best team we have played this year."

The Mustangs' only loss this

season was to undefeated Burnet, the champion of District 8-AAA.

"Marble Falls has a very balanced attack with both the run and the pass. Their offense is similar to Sonora's," Evans added.

The Mustangs run the Pro-I offense and 50 defense, and, according to Evans, "They have very talented backs and receivers."

The winner of the Sonora-Marble Falls game will play the winner of the Childress (9-1) versus Breckenridge (7-3-1) game, which will be played Friday night in Iowa Park.

At 10:30 a. m. the building will be formally dedicated, and the public will have the opportunity to see the newly remodeled facilities

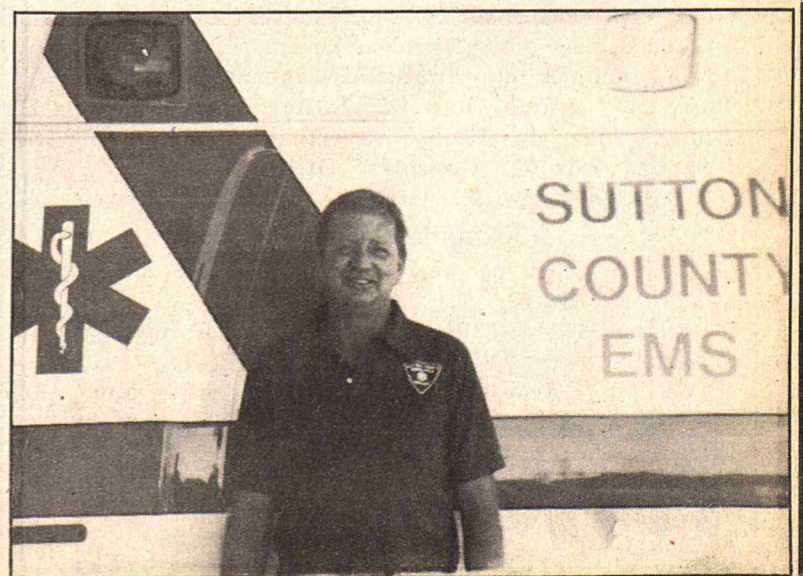
and visit with the staff. This will also serve as the annual Information Day for the Extension Service.

## City Council approves bid

Members of the Sonora City Council unanimously approved a proposal from John Henry Strauch for the purchase of computer hardware needed to upgrade the city's current billing system and a bid from Enco of Lubbock, Texas for the necessary software for the system. The council also accepted a proposal for bank depository from Sutton County National Bank.

At a previous meeting, L.P. Bloodworth offered to donate the old Ritz theater building to the city for use as a meeting hall or civic center. The city would be responsible for the necessary renovations with the primary renovation being the leveling of the floor. The council discussed the possibilities and decided that public opinion should be a primary factor in the decision of this matter. If the community feels the need for another facility to encourage conventions or other large group meetings then the council will act

accordingly.

Casey Thorp was present at the meeting requesting permission from the council to paint the fire hydrants in an effort to obtain the rank of Eagle Scout. The council agreed and offered to help supply the paint.

A petition was submitted to the council by Barbara Stroud with 141 names of Sonora residents who wish to have the council meetings held in the evening. The argument was that many citizens are unable to attend the meetings due to inability to leave their jobs during the day. While the council was divided on the issue, the general consensus was to get public response before any final decision on the matter is made. Changing the council meeting time would require a change in the ordinance.

The next meeting of the Sonora City Council will be Tuesday, December 17 at the city hall.

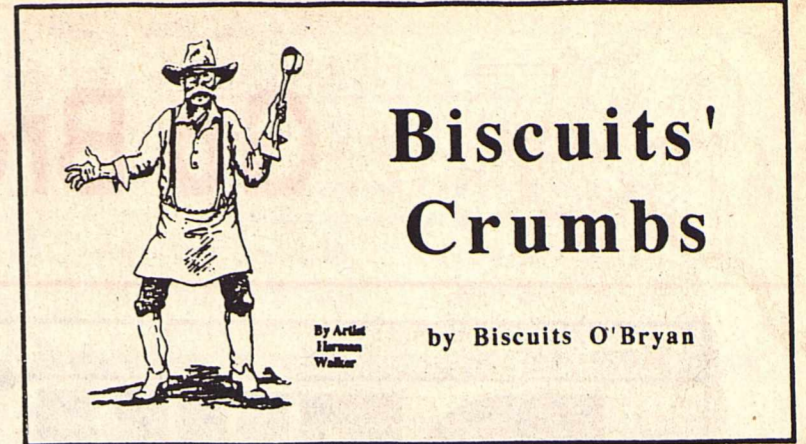

## Strangest of the strange

I've seen some unusual sights in my day. You may recollect my story about the full moon risin' over the rim of Mariscal Canyon in the Big Bend area. I've seen two-headed calves and one-eyed pool sharks, albino skunks and house-broke goats, but the rarest thing I reckon I ever encountered in all my born days has been a vegetarian cowboy.

I mean if that don't beat all, well I don't know what would. It was just this fall, out here on the I. O. Everybody ranch, that he come along, pullin' this little one-horse trailer with an ol' Volkswagon beetle made over into the funniest lookin' pick-up you ever laid an eye on. He come a'putt-puttin' up to the house and said he was lookin' for work, and, since we was about to do lots of roundin' up and stock workin', the boss hired on the spot.

He said his name was Jack Smith and he'd worked ranches all over the southwest and some in the northwest, too, but he was borned and reared in West Texas and wanted to be back close to home. He's seen our ranch sign on the highway and turned in on the spur of the moment. He had a right fair lookin' mount and better'n average gear, and he told the boss, without soundin' braggy, that he's make us a good hand. It was only after he was hired that he sprung the news that he didn't never eat no meat or anything fixed with meat in it. He didn't have no objections to eggs or milk products, just meat, although he did allow as how he'd eat fish if it was just caught.

I reckon you can imagine how calm and polite I took that kind of news, but he put up with my tirade, then explained as how he didn't want to be coddled or nothin', and how he'd manage to make do on his own. He really won me over when he said if he wanted toe phue, he'd cook it up hisself in his own pan. I didn't have no notion whatsoever about what toe phue might happen to be, but it sounded strange enough that I didn't even want to ask.

Another thing I come to learn about this meatless cowhand was that he could be right helpful in the cookhouse when he had some spare time, and he didn't get in the way or nothin'. He'd just ask if I could use a hand with somethin', like peelin' taters or washin' fresh greens. Even though he'd rope, brand, cut, and earmark calves, he couldn't have nothin' to do with fixin' meat for a meal.

Our first big problem come up over my frijoles, 'cause he

wondered if maybe I couldn't fix'em without salt pork. But the other boys set up such a ruckus that I told him we'd have to work out another arrangement, so he fixed his own beans with a splash of vegetable oil 'stead of sow belly. I tried a bite, but they lacked character. He was real obligin' about the whole thing, though.

In fact, he was so easy goin' about the whole food thing that once, when I come home with a big mess of purple hull peas, I decided to try somethin' without tellin' the boys what I'd done. I cooked them peas up without a touch of side meat, and I didn't tell nobody but ol' meatless Jack about it. Them boys plumb licked the bowl clean of pot likker and asked me to fix the peas that way whenever I could come by some. Then I sprung it on 'em, that I'd fixed 'em vegetarian-style. They tried to get themselves all riled up, but they'd eat so many helpin's that they couldn't pull it off, and we all had a whoopin' good laugh over the whole situation.

So 'ol meatless Jack Smith hung around 'til the fall workin' was done, then he loaded up his VW pickup and headed on down the road, sayin' he'd likely see us next spring. And in the process, everybody at the ol' I. O. ranch learned another lesson about tolleration, I reckon. And I learnt a new way to cook peas.

### Vegetarian Style Purple Hull Peas

Buy twice as many peas as you think you'll need, and maybe that'll be nearly enough. Shell 'em, snappin' them that's too little to shell. Wash 'em good, 'cause they tend to be sandy. Heat a pot that's just big enough to hold the peas, add a couple of tablespoons peanut or other vegetable oil. Throw in a chopped up onion. When the onion's clear, add a clove of smashed garlic. Add water not quite to the top of the peas. Bring to a good, hard boil. Cut the heat back, but keep a boil goin'. Season with salt, black pepper, and Louisiana hot sauce (Don't use Tabasco). Cover the pot and let 'em cook, stirrin' ever now and then. You want to end up with the peas gettin' done just before most of the juice has cooked away, leavin' about 1 inch of liquid in the pot.

Them peas go good with just about anything, or they make a meal all by themselves. Try this out, but only with the knowledge that you'll never be able to stand canned blackeyes ever again. Ya'll keep on cookin'.

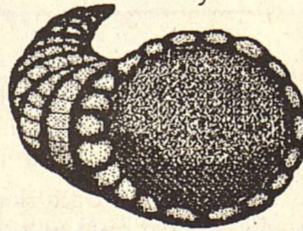

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## Land Bank reports performance

Declining interest rates and new financing options have contributed to strong performance through the third quarter for the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora, according to President Jack B. Smith, Jr.

The local agricultural lending cooperative reported loan volume of 36.9 million at September 30, 1991, as compared to 37 million at year-end 1990. Net income totaled \$58,673 for the third quarter of 1991 as compared to \$67,736 for the third quarter of 1990.

"We have been able to take advantage of lower costs of funds and have passed those savings on to our members," said Smith.

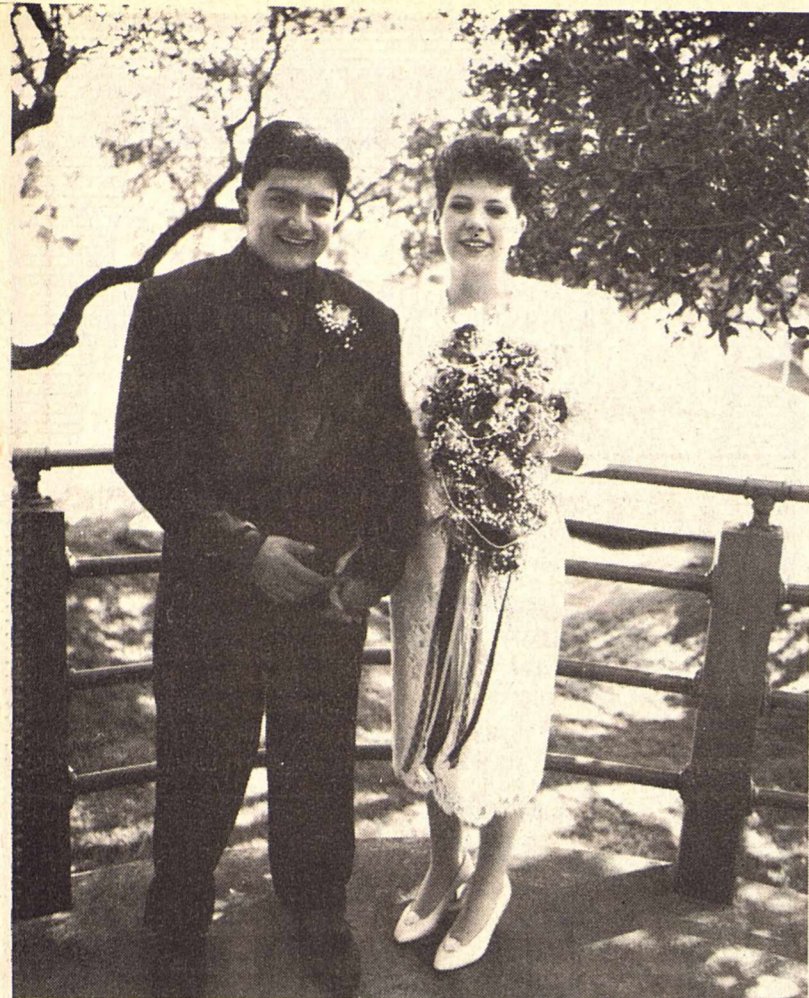
"The new adjustable rate loan we introduced this year has provided steadily declining rates since its introduction. As of today, it is priced at 7.65 percent.

Smith added that the variable rate loan was lowered one quarter percent, to 9.50 percent, bringing the variable rate down a full percentage point over the last two years.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora provides long-term agricultural financing in Sutton, Schleicher, Crockett and Edwards counties. It is a part of the Tenth Farm Credit District, which reported \$3.66 billion in loan volume at September 30, 1991.

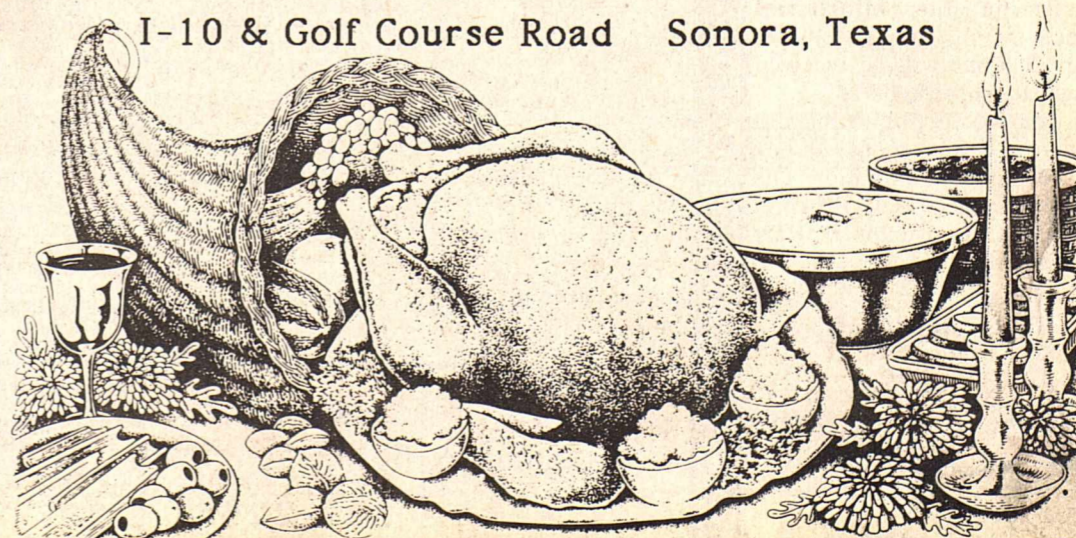

The Senior Companion Program is part of ACTION, the federal domestic volunteer agency. In Sonora the program is coordinated through the Sutton County Senior Center. Carole Thorp, the center's director, works directly with the Senior Companion volunteers and clients. A donation from the Sutton County Senior Committee on Aging helped bring this program to Sonora.

Senior Companion volunteers are people age 60 or over, who are helping their peers maintain the independence they have worked for all their lives.

To be eligible for the program volunteers must be physically able to perform 20 hours of service each week and meet income eligibility requirements. Because Senior Companions have lower incomes, the program provides some direct benefits that enable them to volunteer. Benefits include a modest stipend, training, on-duty insurance and an annual physical exam.

# Ask the Historical Society

Could you please tell us what things cost in the late 1920s?

In advertisements in 1926-1928 copies of the Devil's River News we found the following:

San Angelo and Southern Bus Lines daily round trip rates: to Eldorado \$1, Christoval \$2, San Angelo \$3 and Del Rio \$5.

Mrs. J. Ervin Renfro of Sonora will sell hatching eggs for 10 cents each, baby chicks for 25 cents each and Del Rio \$5.

The Sanitary Dentist of Austin had special introductory rates: Painless Extraction \$1 and up, Amalgam Fillings \$1 and up, Full set of teeth \$10 and up, Gold Crowns 22k \$7 and up, Bridge work per tooth \$7 and up, and they gave a written guarantee.

Ford Motor Company listed, FOB Detroit prices of \$520 for a Tudor Sedan, \$290 for a Runabout, \$310 for a Touring Car, \$500 for a Coupe and \$565 for a Sedan.

The Devil's River News cost \$2 per year.

West Texas Elevator & Grain Co. listed prices: No. 1 Fine TX Evaporated Salt 90 cents, No. 2 Coarse Evaporated Salt 85 cents, No. 4 Crushed Rock Salt 80 cents, Plain White Block Salt 40 cents, Sulphurized block salt 50 cents and Plain gray block salt 35 cents.

Ira Green was selling 700 ewes with lambs by side, age 2-6 years at \$13 per ewe and lamb. He pastured goats at 10 cents per head per month and cows for 50 cents per head.

Bill Mittle was selling dry live oak cord wood for \$10 a truck load.

5% Farm & Ranch Loans for 5-36 years were given by the Federal Land Bank of Houston - Aldwell & Elliott Co. were charging 6%.

The RCA Radio and Victor Shop sold RCA Radiolas and dependable Victrolas in beautiful cabinet models for \$250 and up.

M Systems Stores in San Angelo advertised the following: 48 lbs bag Royal Oak flour for \$1.75, 100 lb. bag of Pure cane sugar \$6.00, Calumet Baking Powder 10 lbs. \$1.35, Tomatoes per 24 No. cans \$2.00, Potatoes by the sack per lb. 2 cents, Lard 45 lb. can \$5.95, Peaches gallon can 45 cents, Apples per box \$2.75.

Angelo Furniture advertised in Jacquard Velour, 2 piece living room sets for \$110 and occasional table \$10.

McDonald Hotel newly remodeled had rates of \$1.25 and up.

Baker & Hemphills sold a suit of men's clothes with 2 pair of pants for \$37.50 and up.

Brunswick Pocket Pool tables sold for \$145.00, with balls, racks and tips.

Fall and winter shoes at J. W. Trainers were \$6 to \$18.

Sonora Drug Company sold bud vases for \$1.25 per pair, a large bottle of bath salts with bottle of perfume attached for 79 cents and Stationery reg. \$1.25 and \$2 value for 98 cents a box.

E. F. Vander Stucken Co., Inc was selling straw hats for \$3.50 to \$6.

West Texas Utilities were selling refrigerators for \$215 installed and Federal wringer washing machines for \$119.50.

Cinderella Shoppe in San Angelo sold evening frocks for \$16 to \$29.50, Spring Coats for \$16 to \$29.50, Winter Coats for \$18.95, shirt dresses for \$9.95 to \$39.50, hats for \$5 to \$8.50, dance frocks for \$10 to \$16.50 and slip on sweaters for \$1.95 to \$3.95.

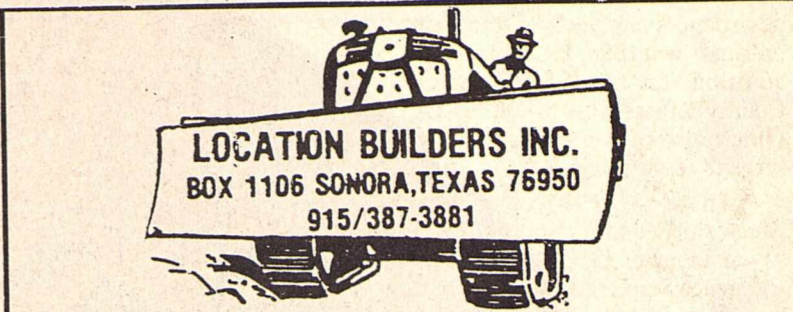
A half million pounds of Sutton Wool 12 month clip was sold with a top price of 42 cents a pound.

# School Board holds meeting Nov. 12

The Board of Trustees of the Sonora Independent School District met in regular session at 7 p. m. on Tuesday, November 12, 1991 in the Board Room of the Administration Building, 807 S. Concho, Sonora, Texas.

Board members present at the meeting were: Donald Patton, President, Jesse Bustamante, Jim Garrett, Gary Hardgrave, Becky Johnson, Gloria Lopez, Michael Smith and Charles Russell, Superintendent. Others present were Rex Ann Friess, Cynthia Keel and Carol Love.

The meeting was called to order by President Patton and the invocation was given by Superintendent Charles Russell.

The minutes of October 8, 1991 were unanimously approved as written after a motion by Jim Garrett and a second by Gloria Lopez.

There being no comments from visitors at this point, President Patton moved to the next item on the agenda.

Superintendent Charles Russell reported on the November meeting of the District Committee and commented that various items had been discussed, including career ladder, the teacher job description, the school calendar, the Halloween Carnival, and Open House.

He listed enrollment as follows: High School 276, Junior High School 243, Intermediate School 256 and Primary School 252 with a total of 1,027 students enrolled in the school district.

The Superintendent continued with information on the upcoming board training session which will be held in San Angelo and encouraged board members to attend if at all possible.

He concluded his remarks by distributing copies of the Academic Excellence Indicator Report and encouraged board members to study it at length, since it provides a great deal of worthwhile information concerning students in the district.

Current bills in the amount of \$211,942.89 were unanimously authorized for payment after a motion by Michael Smith and second by Jim Garrett.

Carol Love, junior high science teacher and science support person for the district, presented information concerning several projects she has developed to enrich the science program district wide. She continued with a detailed presentation concerning the plans to turn the unused 6th grade building into a nature center which would provide hands on learning not only to junior high students but also to students in both Primary and Intermediate schools.

Members of the Board thanked Mrs. Love for sharing her projects with them and for her enthusiasm and her dedication to the students of the district.

Chief Appraiser Rex Ann Fries reported that 3% of the current tax levy had been collected and that collections for the recently formed County Education District seemed to be going smoothly. President Patton, on behalf of the Board, thanked Mrs. Fries for the excellent work she performs.

Gary Hardgrave made a motion to approve Policy DPN (Local) revising the job description for Sonora ISD teachers. The motion was seconded by Becky Johnson and

carried unanimously. The policy is attached to and made an integral part of these minutes.

Superintendent Russell presented the new job description for the Sonora ISD Superintendent and commented that it complied with new state requirements. The Board was encouraged to look over the job description before action is taken at the December meeting.

A motion was made by Becky Johnson to adopt and rescind policy statements according to the instruction sheet for TASB Localized Update 40. Gloria Lopez seconded the motion and it carried unanimously. The instruction sheet for Update 40 is attached to and made an integral part of these minutes.

Motion was made by Gary Hardgrave, seconded by Jesse Bustamante, to adopt Policy CRE: Insurance and Annuities Management -- Worker's Compensation which is a revised policy from Update 39. The motion carried unanimously.

The Board unanimously approved adoption of Policy DEC (Local): Compensation and Benefits--Leaves and Absences which addresses local sick leave policy. Motion was made by Gloria Lopez and seconded by Jesse Bustamante.

Both policies are attached to and made an integral part of these minutes.

The Board unanimously approved Susan Bloodworth, Alvis Johnson, and Norm Rousselot as its 3 nominees for the Board of Directors of the Tax Appraisal Board. The election, which also includes nominees from the city and the county, will be held in December.

The Superintendent commented that, because of problems with school funding, it has been difficult to follow a budget calendar. However, he stated that it is important to have these timelines in order to stay in compliance with state laws. The Board unanimously approved the budget calendar for the 1992-93 school year after a motion by Michael Smith and a second by Becky Johnson.

After a motion to select 1992-93 textbooks was unanimously approved after a motion by Jesse Bustamante and a second by Jim Garrett. A list of the Textbook Committee is attached to and made an integral part of these minutes.

Gary Hardgrave made a motion to approve career ladder appointments and to make career ladder payments in December, 1991. The motion was seconded by Gloria Lopez and carried unanimously.

The Superintendent distributed information concerning test results for 1990-91. He continued by stating that he was quite concerned by the discrepancy between Anglo students' scores and the scores of Hispanic students. He stated that he had several ideas which could address the problem, including expansion of the summer school program, developing a latch key program to help at-risk students, expanding the pre-kindergarten program to serve 100% of four year olds, and providing an aide to visit homes to encourage parent support and to distribute reading materials. However, the Superintendent stressed that, although the problem needed to be addressed immediately, it would take several years to resolve fully.
