



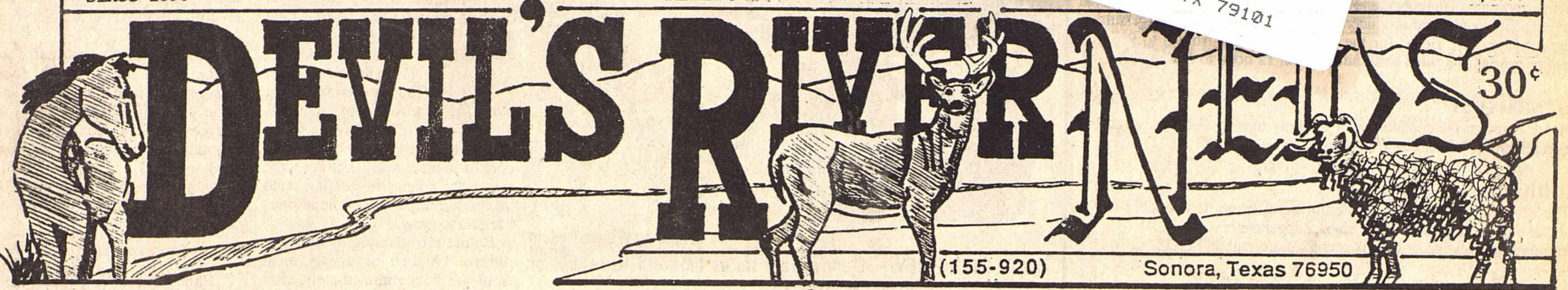

Season ends for Broncos with 33-22 loss

Santa Claus is coming to town

It was too little, too late. The Sonora Broncos, however, gave a valiant effort against a strong Marble Falls team last Saturday afternoon in Fredericksburg, but the Mustangs held off a Bronco rally to win the Area I championship 33-22.

The Broncos (9-3) ended their season, while the Mustangs (11-1) get set to face Breckenridge this weekend in the regional round of the state high school playoffs.

Sonora, down 20-8 to begin the fourth quarter, came alive quickly to score two touchdowns in two minutes to close the gap to 30-22.

But super-Mustang Jamie Graham booted his second field goal of the game with just over two minutes to play, putting the contest

out of Sonora's reach, 33-22. Graham alone accounted for 21 of Marble Falls' points. The senior tailback scored two touchdowns and kicked two field goals and three extra points. He also rushed for 101 yards on 26 carries.

Sonora jumped out to an early 8-0 lead when Adam Youngblood, the game's leading rusher, scampered 39 yards for a touchdown. Youngblood finished with 167 yards on 24 carries. The Broncos faked an extra-point attempt, as holder Larry Chalk tossed a shovel pass to Shannon Escalera, who ran in for the two points.

Marble Falls, though, got on the board with two quick touchdowns and a field goal to take a 16-8 lead--and the momentum--into the locker

room at the half.

The Mustangs put up two scores in the third period to stretch their lead to 30-8.

Then, like lighting, the Broncos struck.

Sonora quarterback Brian Faris ran two yards for the touchdown with 9:44 remaining in the game. The TD capped a 10-play, 66-yard drive. Faris passed to Sam Taylor for the conversion, and Sonora narrowed the Marble Falls lead to 30-16.

When Marble Falls got the ball back, quarterback Paul Moore was intercepted by cornerback Michael Escalera. Escalera intercepted the pass at about midfield, returning it 49 yards to the Mustangs' one yard line. Youngblood ran it in for the

touchdown on the next play.

With 8:19 left in the game, Marble Falls was clinging to a 30-22 lead.

However, after the Mustangs received the kickoff, they managed to eat up the clock, holding onto the ball for almost six minutes. Graham's 33-yard field goal iced the game with 2:16 left.

The Broncos then were forced to play desperation football, and the game ended on an interception of a Faris pass.

Sonora Head Coach Bob Bellard said, "It is hard to find a turning point in the game. They (Marble Falls) had important conversions on third down plays that they took in for touchdowns."

When the game was 30-8, Bellard said he "knew our kids weren't going to quit. We made some big plays in key situations. We fought hard the whole ballgame."

He added that credit must be given to Marble Falls. "They're a good football team, and I've got to give credit where it's due."

The biggest accomplishment this year in the Sonora football program, Bellard said, was in making the playoffs for the second straight season.

"We established that we're going to be a playoff team, not just a one-year thing, or that last year was a fluke. We proved that Sonora was for real. Our kids need to be remembered for that," Bellard said.

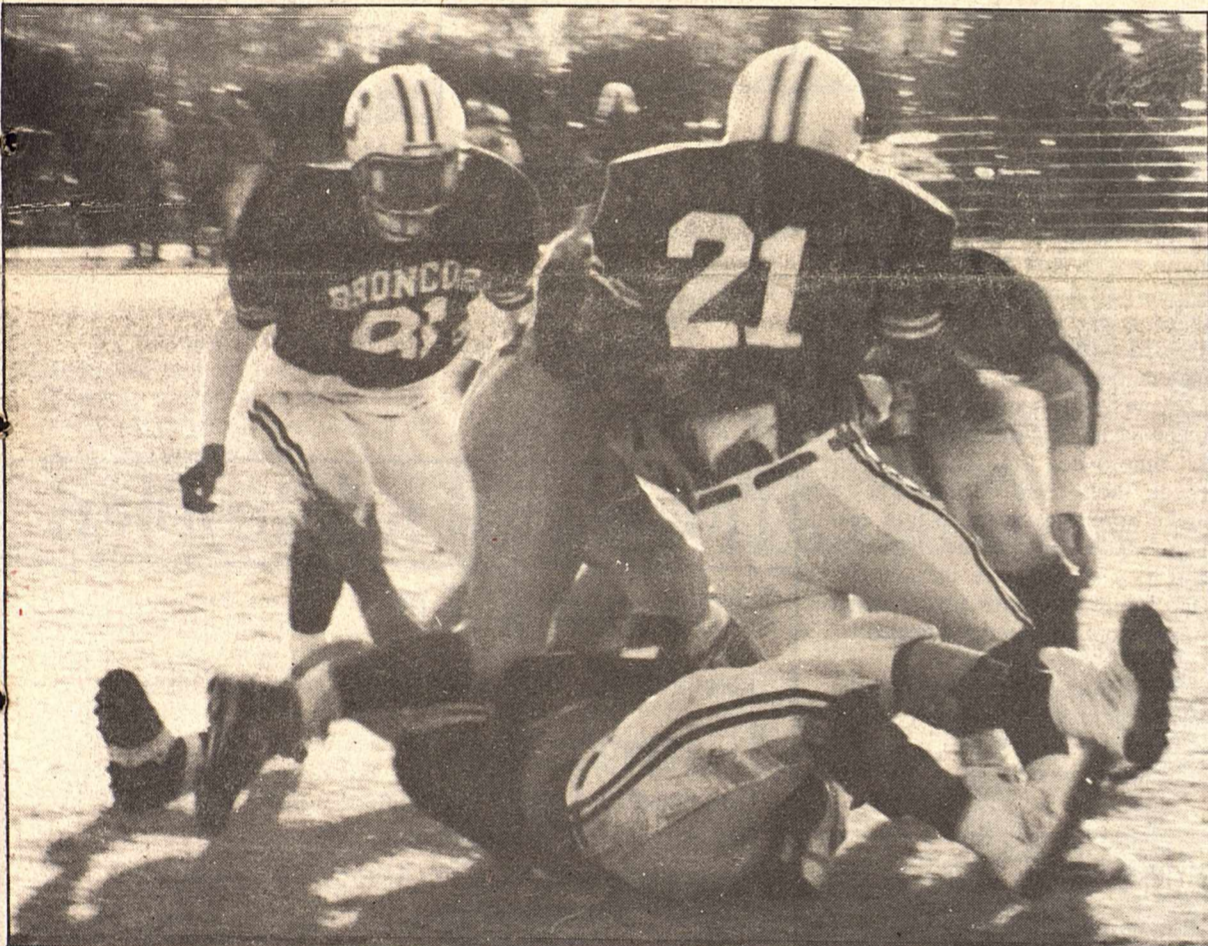
Last year's team, Bellard's first as a head coach, reached the regional round before losing to Childress. For the two-year period, Bellard has a 17-8 record as a head coach in Sonora.

Edward Plateau SWCD holds ribbon cutting ceremony

Last Monday, November 25, 1991, the Edwards Plateau SWCD had the formal "ribbon-cutting" for their newly remodeled office facility at 301 SE Crockett.

Bob Brockman, chairman, gave a brief history of the Edwards Plateau District to the crowd assembled for the ceremony. He said that Edwin Sawyer and Joe Brown Ross presented an application for certificate of organization of the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District to the Department of the State, and on October 31, 1946, the Secretary of State signed and certified that the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District had been duly organized as a governmental subdivision of the State of Texas.

The first meeting of the Edwards Plateau Soil & Water Conservation District #222 was December 18, 1946. The five original "supervisors" as they were known then, were Edwin Sawyer, Joe Brown Ross, Frank Bond, Joseph Vanderstucken and Fred Earwood.

Since that time, others who have served as District Supervisors (later called directors) are W. B. McMillan, Vestel Askew, Armer Earwood, George Brockman, Bob Caruthers, Albert Ward and Scott Shurley. Present directors are Glen

Fisher, Norm Rousselot, Bob Brockman, Judy McDonald and Edward Earwood.

The Edwards Plateau District includes all of Sutton County and the northwest portion of Edwards County and is divided into five

zones. The District is authorized and responsible for coordination and carrying out soil, water, wildlife and plant conservation work.

Joseph Vanderstucken, the only surviving original supervisor, had the honor of cutting the ribbon; and

Bill Gosney, Sonora mayor, spoke briefly on the significance of the Edwards Plateau SWCD.

Refreshments were served and an Open House was held for the remainder of the day.

Family Violence

Guide victims to community services

When the victim asks for advice on what she should do, share the information you have gathered with her privately. Let her know she is not alone and that caring people are available to help her. Encourage her to seek the assistance of battered women's advocates at the local domestic violence hotline or program. Assure her that any information she shares with them will be kept strictly confidential.

Many battered women first seek the advice of marriage counselors, psychiatrists, or members of the clergy. Not all helping professionals, however, are fully aware of the special circumstances of abused women. If the first person she contacts is not helpful, she should be encouraged to find assistance elsewhere.

FOCUS ON HER STRENGTHS
Battered women live with emotional as well as physical

abuse. Your friend is probably continually told by the abuser that she is a bad woman, a bad wife, and a bad mother. Without positive reinforcement from outside the home, she may begin to believe she can not do anything right- that there really is something wrong with her.

Give her emotional support she needs to believe that she is a good person. Help her examine her strengths and skills. Emphasize that she deserves a life that is free from violence.

Social Security news

It's that time of year for the Social Security Administration (SSA) to urge employers who will soon be preparing their annual wage reports to carefully check them for accuracy before submitting them.

At the close of the calendar year, employers are responsible for submitting Form W-2 (Wage and Tax Statement) to SSA, and giving a copy to each employee. The W-2 information must be reported in a timely fashion and with the employee's correct name and Social Security number. Because all Social Security benefits are based on those earnings, this will ensure that workers and their families will one day receive the benefits they are due. Employers should check wage

reports carefully to be sure the name and Social Security number are correct for each employee. If there is an error, the employer should furnish the correct information to SSA by completing Form W-2c (Statement of Corrected Income and Tax Amounts).

Employees are also urged to check their copy of the W-2 to make sure the correct name and Social Security number is shown and they should save their W-2's (for future reference in the event wage records need to be corrected.)

Food safety for the holidays

Planning the holiday meal is an exciting prospect, but several food safety problems should be considered.

Are you going to serve roast turkey? Stuffing can be a breeding place for bacteria. Don't stuff the turkey; cook it separately. After mixing a large quantity of stuffing, cook it immediately. Letting large masses of lukewarm stuffing stand at room temperature encourages bacteria to grow.

Before refrigerating or freezing, remove chicken or turkey meat from the bones immediately after cooking. This is a time-consuming process and often it is done during odd moments between other jobs. This means the food may stand at room temperature for long periods. If the food is contaminated with bacteria and held at room temperature long enough, the bacteria will produce a harmful toxin. Once this toxin is produced in the food, it is not destroyed by ordinary cooking.

If ham is sliced or ground, work with small amounts and store properly in refrigerator.

Broth and gravy are especially subject to spoilage. Cool leftovers quickly and put them in the refrigerator. Don't hold broth and gravy more than a day or two. To

serve again, reheat and boil for several minutes before serving. Always serve hot.

Cream pies and cream puffs are foods often involved in food poisoning. Since cream pies and cream-filled pastries get soggy if refrigerated too long, it is a temptation to leave them at room temperature. Don't! This encourages bacteria to grow. Fill pastry as close to serving time as possible.

Ham sandwiches, turkey and chicken salads, and deviled eggs need special care. If you serve sandwiches, why not plan to have the kind you can freeze ahead? Thaw them as needed. Are you going to serve chicken salad? Why not freeze the cubes of chicken and use them in preparing the salad? They will thaw as the salad stands, keeping it as cold as possible. With any salad, there is much handling in preparation and serving. Make sure all ingredients are clean and well-chilled.

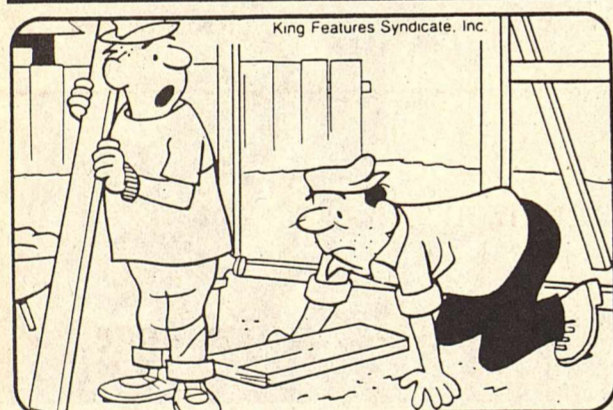
Mixtures of foods that require several steps and handling such as meats, fish, and salads are most likely to be contaminated. Use clean hands, utensils and work surfaces.

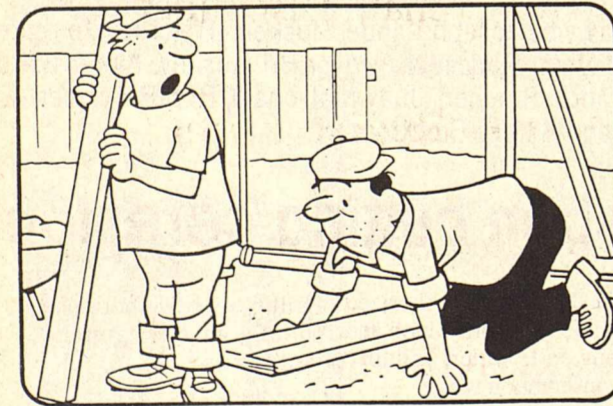

Christmas at Old Fort Concho scheduled for Dec. 6-8

SAN ANGELO - For three days during the first weekend in December in San Angelo, the public will have the opportunity to savor the sights, sounds and smells of a festive Christmas as it was celebrated more than 100 years ago at a Texas frontier fort.

During its 10th anniversary, Christmas at Old Fort Concho will bring to life the 40-acre, restored, fort site and enable visitors to relive the past. Besides photographs and memories of re-enactments by the fort's Living History groups and artisans of the era, guests may take home selected treasures provided for sale by more than 75 arts and crafts merchants.

Food, entertainment and the opportunity to learn more about how early settlers and the military celebrated the Christmas season will lure visitors from around the world as it has in past years.

One of the largest yuletide celebrations in Texas, Christmas at Old Fort Concho has become a tradition in San Angelo, bringing out hundreds of costumed volunteers who provide western hospitality and a true learning experience as they mix and mingle with visitors to the fort. All sorts of authentic demonstrations, wares and entertainment are available to families and individuals who lose themselves in their trek into the past.

Uniformed soldiers and mounted cavalry, depicting frontier policeman of the past century, perform their drills. Children and adults board horse-drawn wagons for a ride through history. Visitors wander Officers' Row, savoring the authenticity of period decorations and the delicious ethnic foods served there. Tours of the Enlisted Men's barracks will indicate the simple and rugged lifestyle endured by most soldiers.

In the Arc Light Saloon, visitors sip their liquid refreshments, enjoy the tastes of wide range of foods, and tap their toes or dance to the music provided by various bands. On the parade ground, cowboys occupy an authentic western camp, complete with chuckwagon, inviting visitors to join them by the campfire.

This year, renowned cowboy poets will gather in the cowboy camp to entertain visitors on Saturday night.

A Sunday-morning cowboy breakfast and an outdoor church service, complete with hay-bale pews and congregational singing of favorite hymns, attracts the hungry and the faithful. A nightly drama on the parade ground tells the history of the fort and the area as well as about life of the frontier.

The history of late-1800 forts in Texas will come to life Dec. 6, 7 and 8 this year during Christmas at Old Fort Concho in San Angelo. Admission to the fort grounds is \$3.00-per-day and \$6.00 for the weekend. There is no charge for children under 12.

For an ice cream cake akin to those fancy versions from your local ice cream shop, nestle a layer of softened peppermint ice cream between two layers of pound cake. Frost with sweetened whipped cream and decorate with crushed peppermint candies.

Predator management training to be Dec. 2

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Agriculture will conduct a Predator Management Training Program on Monday, December 2, at the 4-H Barn in Sonora. Registration will begin at 8:30 a. m., and the training session will be held from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. The program will include identifying causes of predation, alternative methods of predator control, M-44 sodium cyanide application, and Livestock Protection Collar training and testing. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is assisting TDA in conducting this training session.

The program is designed for individuals interested in using M-44 sodium cyanide to control coyotes, feral dogs, and foxes that prey on livestock. To continue using M-44 sodium cyanide, all M-44 applicators certified prior to April 18, 1988, must take this course and be recertified. The training for M-44 sodium cyanide certification is free and will be completed by noon. Individuals who would like certification for the use of Livestock Protection Collars for taking coyotes that prey on sheep or goats must attend the entire training session and score 70 or above on the Livestock Protection collar category test.

Proper certification to use M-44 sodium cyanide or Livestock Protection Collars also requires possession of a private applicator certification or license, a noncommercial applicator license or a commercial applicator license to purchase restricted-use and state-limited-use pesticides. Information on how these types of licenses may be obtained will be covered at the training session.

Also, a private applicator training and testing session will be held on Tuesday, December 3, at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, 7887 North Highway 87, San Angelo. Registration will begin at 8:30 a. m. and training at 9:00 a. m. The three-hour training program will be followed by administration of the TDA private applicator exam.

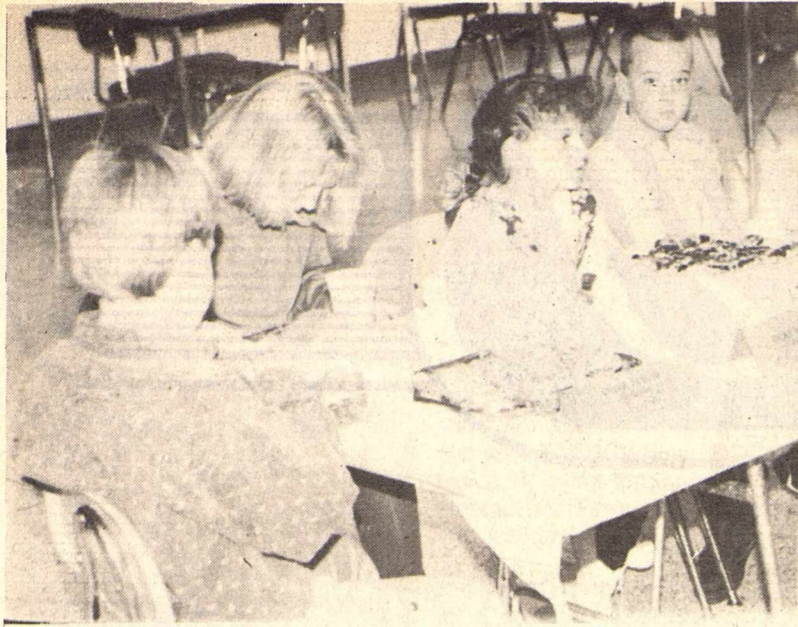

Sonora Caverns receives cleaning

On Saturday, November 16, 1991 approximately 60 cavers from all over Texas, and as far away as Colorado, joined forces in removing rubble from the Caverns of Sonora.

When the Caverns were opened to the public, thirty-one years ago, there was not enough time or man power to remove the rubble from the cavern. It was set aside filling passages and corridors which are now being re-surveyed and charted as part of a hydrogeological study by George Veni of San Antonio, Texas. This is the first preservation and conservation project attempted by the Caverns of

Sonora in thirty years. The volunteers removed 18 1/2 tons of rubble (hauled out by hand) from 700 foot in the Cavern. We hope to continue this project annually and continue to work on returning the Cavern to its original beauty.

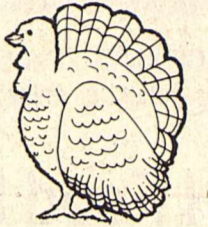

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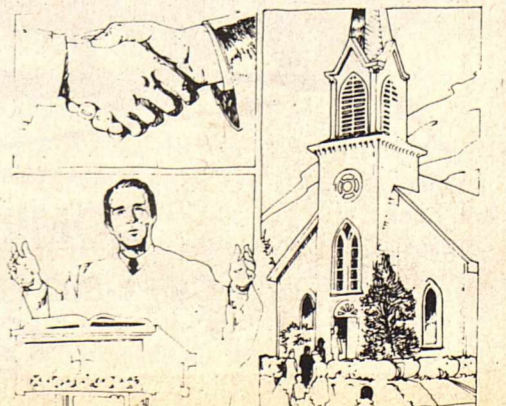

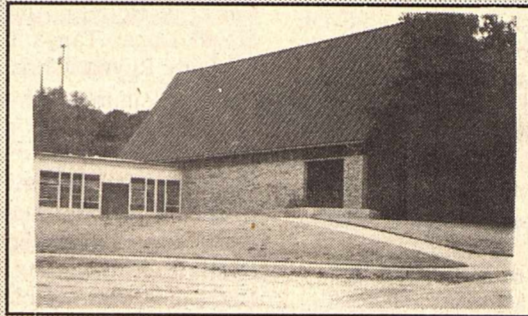

What were the people doing in Sutton county in November 100 years ago?

We have on file two newspapers for November 1891. The November 7th and November 21st editions of the Devil's River News.

November 7, 1891: A. F. and A. M. Deora Lodge, No. U. D., meets at Wentworth the second Saturday of each month. Officers: F. M. Drake, W. M.; J. W. Odom, S. W.; D. H. Covington, J. W.; R. J. Bean, Sec'y; W. H. Sowell, Treas; S. H. Stokes, S. D.; E. M. Ford, J. D.; C. T. Covington, Tyler.

W. H. Cusenbary has posted a notice that from here on all sales will be strictly cash at his drug store.

J. S. Hogg, Governor of Texas has a proclamation giving \$150 reward for the person or persons who cut the wire fences of W. J. & D. B. Fields.

James Scudder, aged four years, died in Sonora on Friday, November 6, 1891.

J. W. Joiner has a madstone for sale, he can be found at Alexander Bros.

E. H. Holloway was trying to get a telegraph line from San Angelo to Sonora via McKavett.

An oyster supper was being held at the Sonora House on Tuesday night, in aid of the building fund of the Baptist Church. Everybody is invited.

C. T. Covington, the fine sheep raiser from Wentworth, was in Sonora complaining bitterly of the drifters. There was a call for a meeting of the sheepmen of Sutton County to take action on the drifter question.

Mrs. A. J. Winkler and Miss Bessie Wyatt were in town Thursday shopping.

W. B. Rountree the well driller completed a well on South Buckley for O. T. Word at a depth of 334 feet.

An advertisement states that the business lot next to the Maud S. Saloon, 30 feet on Main Street, can be bought for \$225 cash.

T. C. Adams came up before Judge Dunagan for preliminary hearing on the charge of murdering Mr. Wilson. He entered a plea of not guilty and was committed to jail without bail to await the action of the grand jury.

November 21, 1891: The president of the Citizens water works company, F. M. Wyatt, says his company is now prepared to furnish water at the following monthly rates: Families \$1.50, business houses \$1.00 and stock 10 cents a head.

A. F. and A. M. Deora Lodge, U. D. will now meet at Sonora the second Saturday in each month. (The building was moved from Wentworth to Sonora this month.)

Wilkins Bros., bought 780 head of wethers from J. Q. Adams & Sons at 42 a head.

Wentworth is a thing of the past. Only five houses remain to tell where the town stood so short a time ago.

R. F. Halbert the sheepman was in town Monday and reports having contracted to furnish water and grass for cattle for from 12 1/2 to 17 cents a head.

At a meeting of Commissioners Court J. M. Brotherton was given \$13 for burying a pauper. The following were paid bounty for scalps: William Kind, \$49; R. F. Halbert, \$6; E. L. Huffman, \$10 and S. L. Holland, \$2.

Officers of the court were: J. J. Dunagan, County Judge; R. W. Callahan, J. M. Taylor and J. H. Wood, Commissioners, J. P. McConnell, Sheriff, and W. B. Silliman, Clerk.

Sheriff was allowed 50 cents a day for supplying water for the jail.

E. Mazinke while working on the courthouse Friday, had the misfortune to let a heavy stone fall on the first finger of his left hand. The weight was so great that it cut off the first joint.

(1) Any plan should have four precincts of substantially equal population;

(2) Any plan should not act to dilute the voting strength of racial or language minority citizens;

(3) Any plan should avoid fragmenting or packing minority communities;

(4) Any plan should be based on 1990 census data;

(5) Any precincts should be composed of territory that is contiguous and reasonably compact; and

(6) Any plan, to the extent consistent with legal requirements, should preserve historic boundaries, should recognize clearly identifiable economic or community interests, should preserve constituency-representative relations

RESOLVED, that public notice shall be provided of the aforementioned public hearing.
