## If you were to give kids a choice between eating ice cream or spinach at every meal, chances are they at every meal, chances are they would choose the ice cream $99 \%$ of <br> nutritionally, but they are not as productive or palatable as

 the time. Eventually, you are left with a lot of spinach and very little ice cream. Animals are the same as people when it comes to choosing what they want to eat. Wheneve desirable plants and leaving the secondary plants or "spinach." The continual grazing of these primary or desirable plants leads to poor vigor and eventual removal from the plant community. As theseplants diminish, they are replaced with secondary and/or noxious plants. Secondary plants may or

Periodic deferment of pastures from grazing is essential fo
enhancing rangeland improvements Deferment, especially during the growing season, allows for these ice cream plants to regain vigor, produce seed and replenish their root include maintaining a forage include maintaining a forage
reserve, improvement of plant cover, and the reduction of soil erosion. Under most conditions, it takes $90-128$ days for our native plants to achieve the above goals. cont'd page 7

Along with the application for utility service, the applicant may be in an amount equal to the charges for an average two-month period; such service increases to a point where such deposit is not equal to the charges for an average two month period; the required deposit may be increased to conform thereof.
Any applicant who is age sixty
five (65) or older, may be allowed waiver of the required deposit for said applicant's residential use only.
