4-H dance

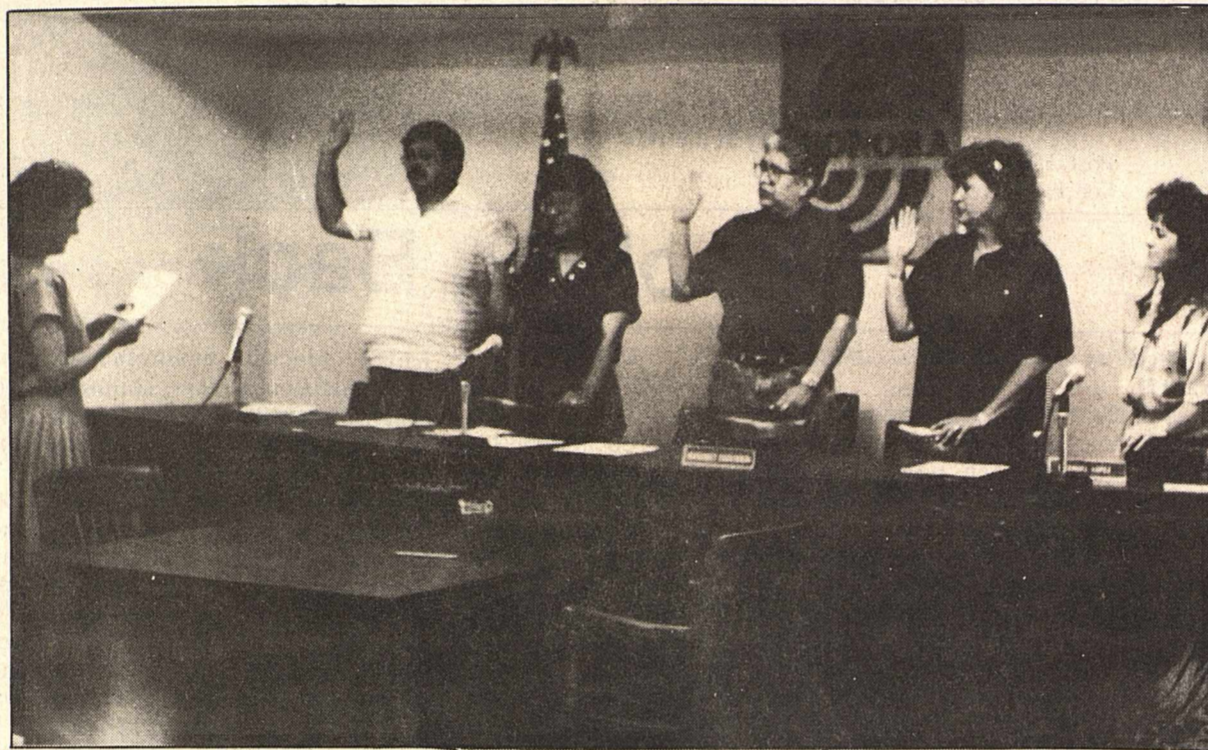

Lopez takes office as mayor of Sonora

Sonora's new mayor along with two new council members were sworn in earlier this week.

Lemuel Lopez, longtime council member and first Hispanic mayor of Sonora, took the reins from outgoing mayor Bill Gosney. Lopez, who ran unopposed in the mayoral race, is the owner of the Commercial Restaurant and has served on the city council for a total of 17 years.

Fred Perez and Maria Barrera, newly elected members to the city

council, along with incumbents Margaret Cascadden and Jaye Harlene "Butch" Campbell" also took the oath of office last Tuesday morning. Of the four members of the council, two (one from each ward) will come up for reelection each year.

Council members will serve two consecutive years each time elected with the exception of this year. With the recent redistricting, the city has gone from an at-large election to electing two council members from each of two new wards. Due to this, two of the new council members will only hold office for one year and at that time may run again for a two year term.

To determine who would be holding one or two year terms one member from each Ward was allowed to choose which length of term they wanted by means of a coin toss. In Ward I, Cascadden chose the one year term and Campbell will be serving for two years. In Ward II, Barrera won the coin toss and chose the two year term with Perez serving for one year.

The newly elected offices will become official Friday, with the next council meeting being slated for next Monday.



Sonora Sensation set for May 15-17

An Invitational Calf Roping will begin at 1 p. m. on Saturday with \$500 added and a saddle being given to the average winner.

Also featured during the afternoons activities is an eight-head match roping between James Zant and Jim Fuller.

James Zant, calf roper from Harper, Texas, competed in the National Finals Rodeo in 1987-88 and 1990, and was ranked 19th in calf roping in 1991. Zant was 1983 Roping Rookie of the Year, 1983 Texas Circuit Calf Roping Champ and 1982 and 1991 NIRA Calf Roping Champ.

Jim Fuller, calf roper from Waco, Texas, competed in the National Finals Rodeo in 1988 and 1991 and was ranked 10th in calf roping in

1991. Fuller was named 1973 NIRA Southwest SW Champ and 1971 AJRA Roping Champ.

Saturday evening begins to heat up as the "No Guts, No Glory" tour comes to town with the Bad Company "Sensational" Bull Riding. Don't miss the action beginning at 8 p. m., as the best Bull Riders in the world face off in the "Super Toro" Bull Riding Series. As always, Expect the Unexpected.

Boyd Polhamus will be announcing the bull riding Saturday night. Polhamus, just 26 years old in 1991, was the youngest announcer in the history of the National Finals Rodeo. He has twice announced the Texas Circuit

Students honor bus driver for dedication S.I.S.D. bus driver brings students home safely after near disaster

A disastrous situation was narrowly averted last weekend with the actions of a quick thinking school bus driver.

Many times over the last four years Carlos Gallegos has driven Sonora's students to various out of town activities without a problem. However, last Saturday was a day Gallegos along with many junior high students won't soon forget.

As the group returned from an academic meet in Kermit the left front tire on the school bus blew out on 1-10 near Fort Stockton. The bus veered to the left across the median and oncoming lane of traffic, and came to rest in the bar ditch on the opposite side of the highway. The bus was traveling at approximately 55 miles per hour.

The \$400 Michelin tire was reportedly in good condition and school officials are unsure what caused the tire to blow out.

All of S.I.S.D.'s drivers are required to take an extensive course to train them for such emergencies. Gallegos, remembering this training, stayed off the brakes and held on to the bus bringing it to rest safely.

Jr. High Student Council President, Levi Pool, presented a plaque to Gallegos on behalf of the student body for dedicated service during the UIL Academic Awards ceremony held Monday morning.

Appropriately inscribed on the award was a short but meaningful phrase, "We trust you with our lives."

Dear Editor:

Recent articles concerning the scandal in the House of Representatives Post Office have left the impression that this postmaster and employees work for the U. S. Postal Service. That is not true. The postmaster and employees were employed by the House, working as a private contractor to sell postal products. Oversight for their operation was with the House.

When problems with the House Post Office first surfaced, the U. S. Capitol police were called in to investigate. Only later, after the House determined that more expertise was needed, was the Postal Inspection Service asked to help with the investigation. The investigation revealed evidence of abuse and misappropriation of funds in the House Post Office.

The U. S. Postal Service has not lost any money over this incident. No U. S. Postal Service employee has been involved in this scandal. Thank you for helping clarify this issue.

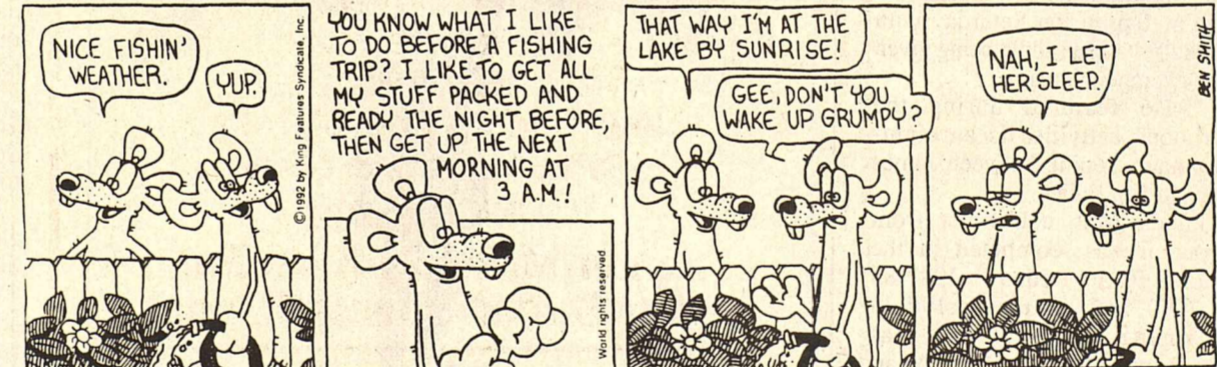

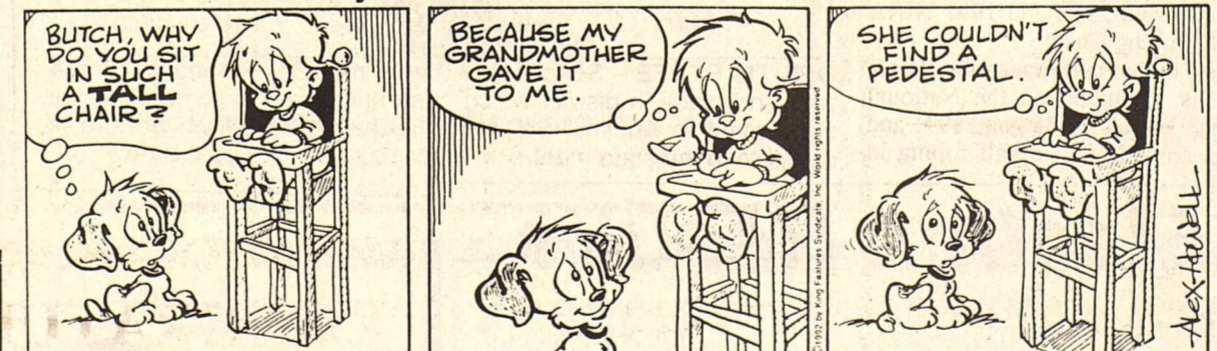

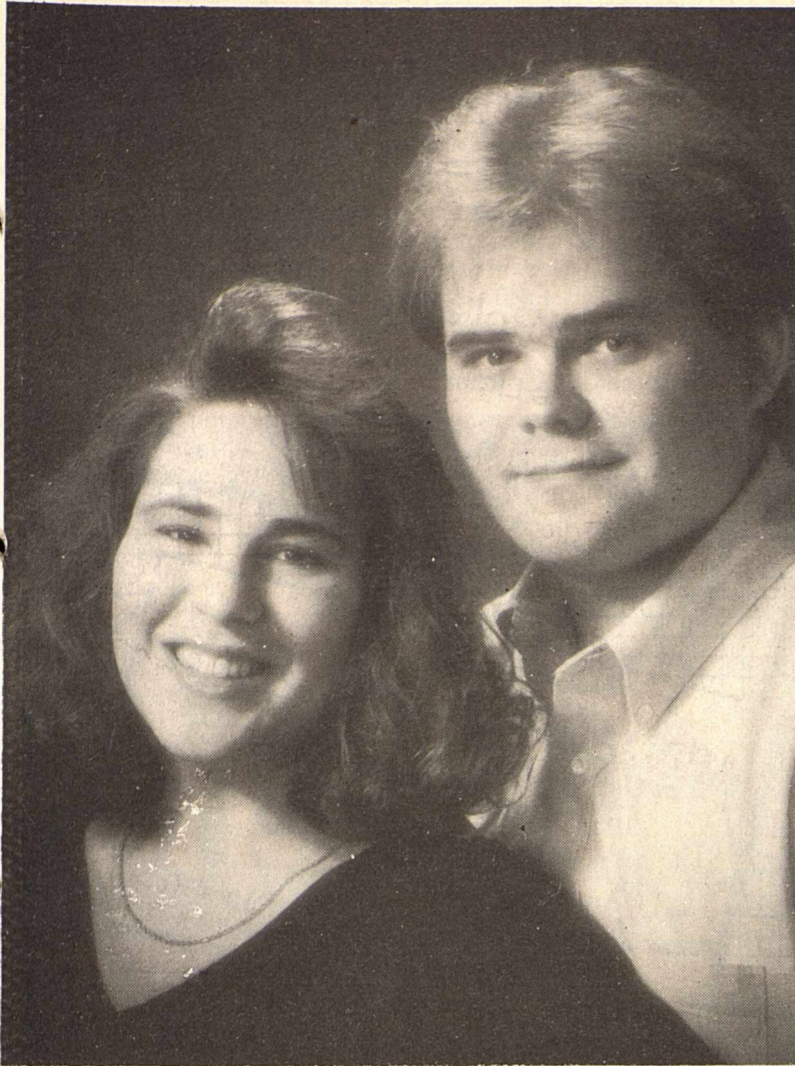
The weekends activities wind down with an Invitational Steer Roping which begins at 1:30 p. m.

Social Security

Income eligibility guidelines are higher this year for the Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB) program. "If your income was too high to qualify last year, you may want to reapply because the income eligibility guidelines were raised to conform with the new national poverty guidelines," a Social Security official explained.

The QMB program is run by the Health Care Financing Administration, the federal agency that runs Medicare, and Texas Department of Human Services. Under QMB, state Medicaid programs are required to pay Medicare medical insurance (Part B) premiums, deductibles and copayments for certain elderly and disabled persons with low incomes and very limited assets.

Generally, to qualify for the QMB program in 1992, you must be entitled to Medicare hospital insurance (Part A); have an annual income at or below the national poverty level; not have resources such as bank accounts, stocks and bonds in excess of \$4,000 (\$6,000 for a couple). The national poverty levels for 1992 are \$6,810 for an individual and \$9,190 for a family of two.

If you think you qualify for assistance under this program, you should file an application at the Texas Department of Human Services. If you think you might qualify for assistance but do not have Medicare Part A, contact a

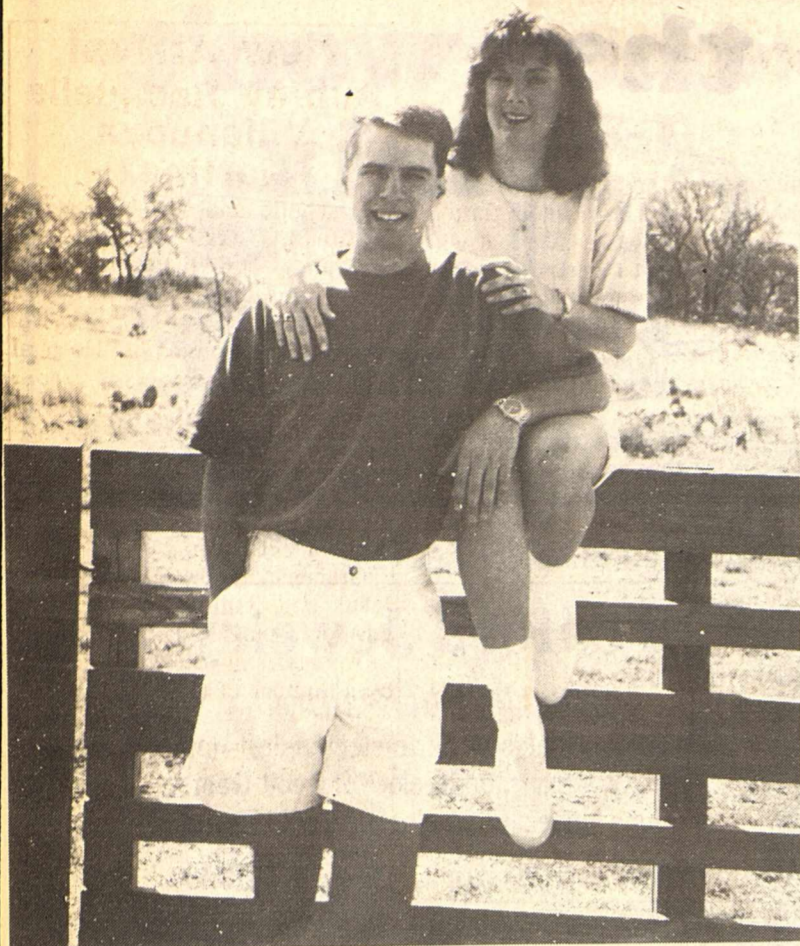

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PE classes participate in fitness program

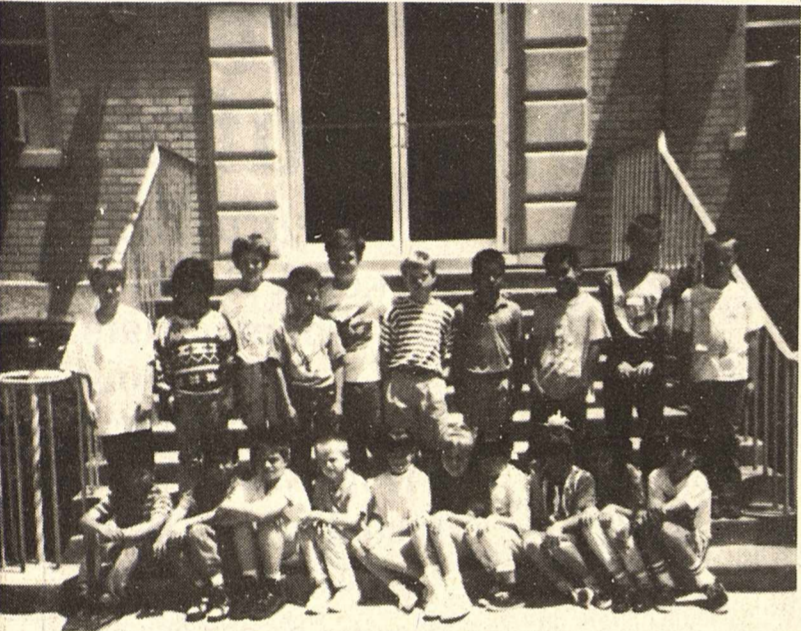
In conjunction with the President's Council on Physical Fitness for the month of May, Sonora Elementary and Intermediate physical education students have started an aerobic fitness program.

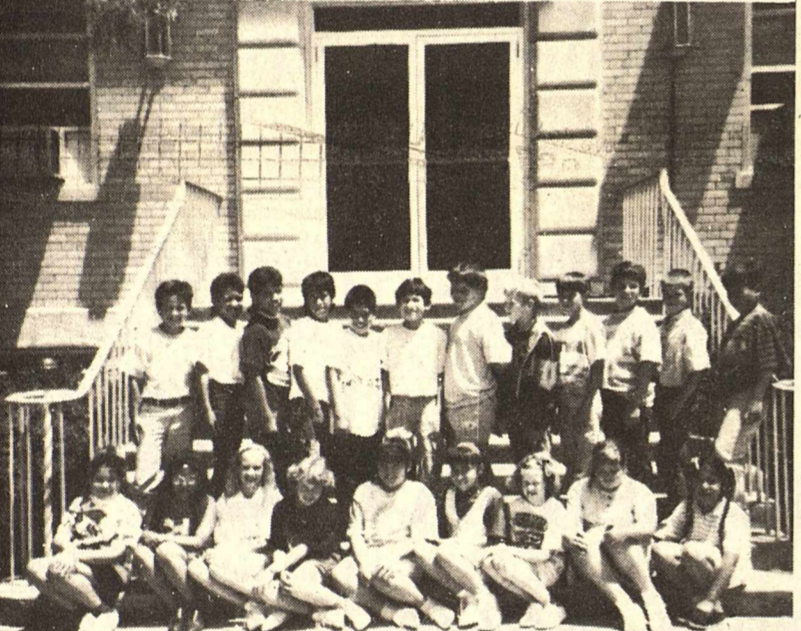

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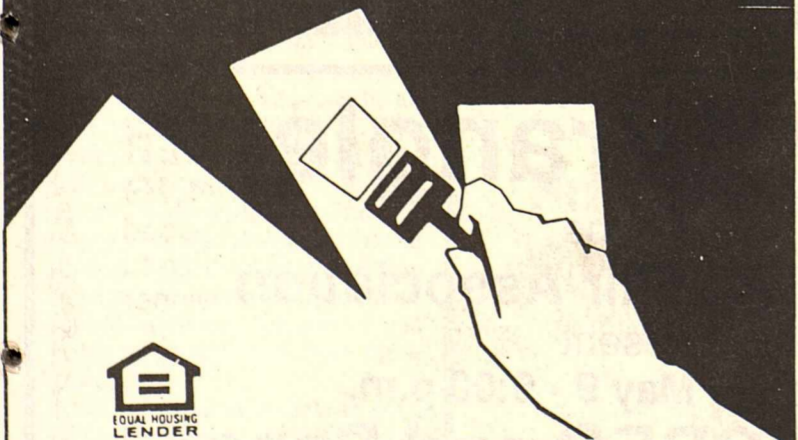

Kirk Macon, Director of Journalism at Sonora High School, has been chosen to serve as a judge for the University Interscholastic League State Meet journalism contests this weekend.

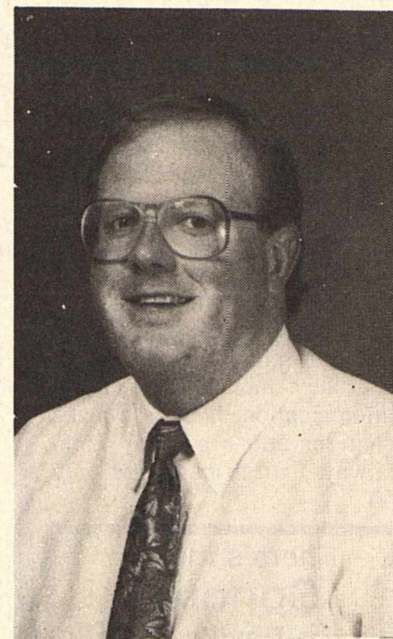
Macon will judge newswriting and editorial writing for all conferences at the State Meet. He was chosen by UIL Director of Journalism Bobby Hawthorne last week.

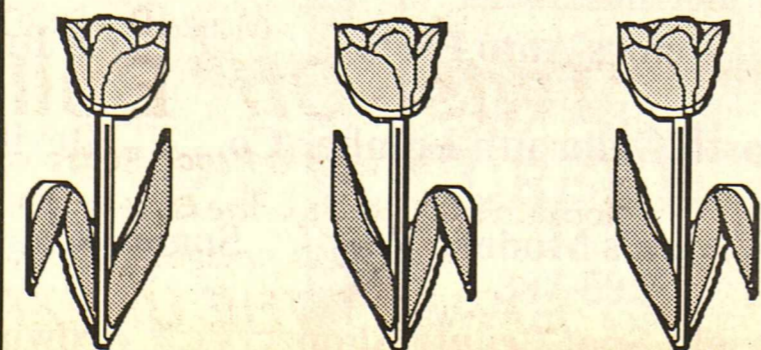
