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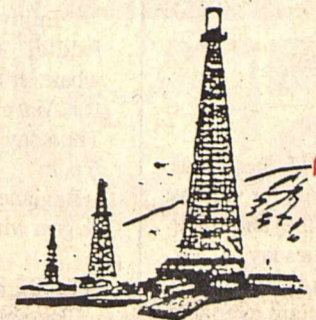

The vacant Sonora City Manager's office will soon be filled if the efforts of the newly seated city council pay off. The office has been vacant since the April 1 resignation of former city manager, Pete Gildon. City Secretary, Becky Covington, has been serving as interim city manager since that time.

Applications were read during a council meeting Monday and of the twenty-seven received, nine were chosen as the most likely candidates for the position.

WORKING LONGER CAN ADD TO SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS

If you continue to work full-time past age 65, you may increase your basic Social Security retirement benefit in two ways. First, for each month that you do not receive a benefit - until the month in which you reach age 70 - your benefit amount will automatically increase.

Second, you will be adding years of high earnings to your Social Security record, and these earnings may result in higher benefits.

Under the delayed retirement credit provisions, if you will be 65 this year or in 1993 and you continue to work, your benefit amount will increase 4 percent per year. By age 70, your Social Security benefit will be 20 percent higher than it would have been if you began receiving monthly benefits at age 65.

If you're like many people who continue to work after age 65, your most recent earnings are your highest earnings and continuing to work adds them to your Social Security record. Because benefits are based on earnings averaged over most of your working career, higher lifetime earnings result in higher benefits.

One important point to remember is that if you decide to delay retirement, you should be sure to sign up for Medicare at age 65. You need to contact Social Security about 3 months before your 65th birthday to sign up for Medicare hospital insurance (Part A).

And, you also need to let Social Security know if you want to apply for medical insurance (Part B). Medical insurance may cost more if you delay applying for it. If you or your spouse are covered under an employer health plan, check with Social Security to discuss your options for Medicare enrollment. You do not need to be retired to enroll for either part of Medicare, but you do need to let Social Security know if you want to enroll.

 Three more Sonorans are in training camp, Pascal Odom, Juan F. Yariez and Jessie Kring, Jr.

Reverend Frederic Brasier will hold his last service in St. John's Episcopal Church Sunday, May 10, pending his retirement from active rectorship of the Kerrville and Sonora churches. The native of England has been Rector here for the past 13 years.

As more drastic tin conservation measures become necessary, canners have been requested by the WPB to give thought to other forms of food and preservation. Recommended for study are forms of freezing, dehydrating and packaging in materials less critical than tin.

Saving of 100,000 tons of iron and steel, 2,000 tons of copper, 3,000 tons of zinc, and huge quantities of other vital war materials for war production will result in the recent WPB order banning use of prohibited materials in toys. Toy manufacturers are substituting wood, paper, ceramics and noncritical plastics for the prohibited materials.

If you wish to buy a new tube of tooth paste or shaving cream, you must turn in a used tin, tin-coated or tin-alloy tube of any kind, for each new tube bought. This is necessary to conserve this country's supply of tin.

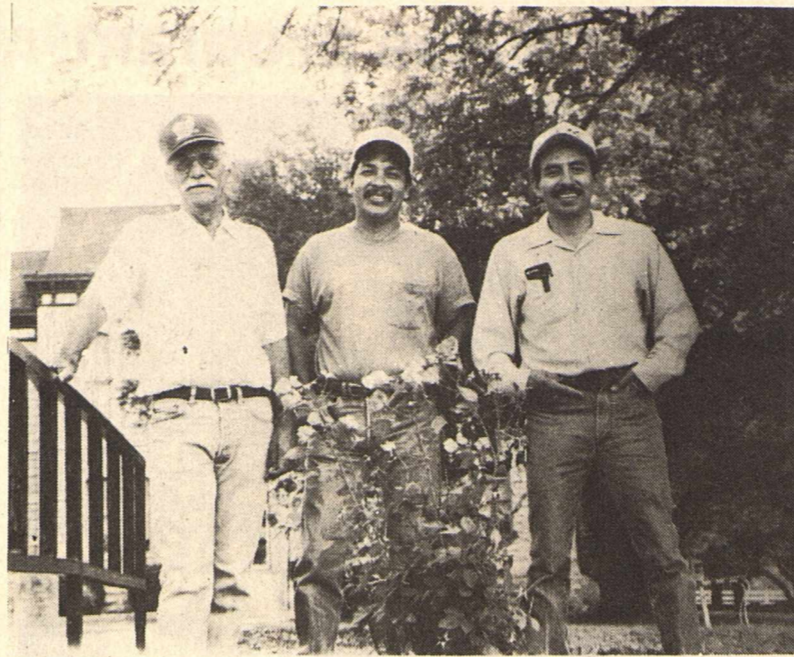
Choir has successful fund raiser

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According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$60.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

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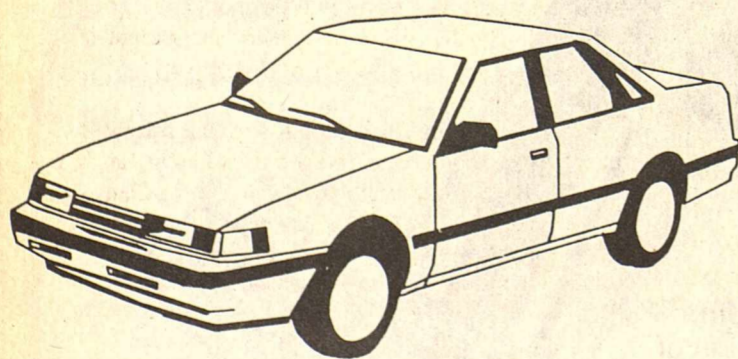
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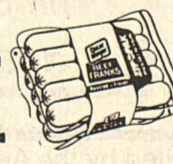
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Texas ASCS leads the way in environment

The Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) is the principal and most widely used program through which the federal government assists farmers and ranchers in carrying out needed conservation practices. The ACP, administered by the Sutton County Office of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), was the first conservation program involving the federal government in every agricultural county in the country. The ACP is a joint effort between agricultural producers, Federal and State agencies, and other conservation groups to restore and protect the Nation's land and water resources and to preserve the environment. This public/private partnership leads the way in government programs by making efficient use of government funds so that everyone benefits.

Donnie G. Bowman, State Executive Director of the Texas ASCS, stated, "The ACP is a public/private partnership designed to protect the environment by reducing soil erosion and improving

water quality. All Americans benefit from the wise use of public funds to protect the environment."

Bowman further stated, "The program in Texas has been very successful. For every \$1.00 spent by the government, farmers spend an average \$1.06 of their funds to carry out conservation practices and agreed to maintain the practice from five to ten years."

During 1991 the ASCS cost-shared \$15,798,306 under the annual ACP and under special long term agreements on almost 10,000 separate farms in 237 Texas counties. The practices were carried out to solve severe erosion, water quality, and water conservation problems that affected farmland and ranchland across the state.

According to Bowman, ACP practices applied in Texas during 1991 resulted in an annual soil savings of 4,286,676 tons at an average cost of \$.48 per ton of soil saved. This soil would have polluted Texas rivers and lakes or blown into Texas skies and destroyed the productivity of the

land. ACP CONSERVATION SIGN UP -- In Sutton County, under the "Continuing" sign up provision, producers may apply for cost sharing to do conservation work at any time throughout the year. The Committee will review eligible applications several times a year. Practices available to county producers include brush control, livestock water wells, pipelines, water storage tanks, and cross fencing. Applications may be made by coming to the ASCS office.

The Sutton County Committee has established application review dates for ACP-annual practices. Applications will be reviewed at least three times a year; in March, July and September of each calendar year. Applications received by June 15 will be reviewed at the July County ASCS Committee Meeting.

The Sutton County ASCS Office will be closed in observance of Memorial Day on May 25, 1992 and July 3, 1992 for National Independence Day.

Beef producers saddened by indictment

Texas beef producers are saddened by the wrongful indictment of their entire industry made by ABC's Prime Time Live in its report on USDA's Streamlined Inspection System for cattle (SIS).

They also are disappointed that ABC denied requests to allow an industry spokesman to appear on its program.

The real contention over SIS involved USDA and the meat inspectors union. ABC chose not to focus on the union's concern that SIS technology and technical innovations would replace member's jobs. Instead, the

network impugned the safety of the nation's and Texas' beef supply with its slanted look at a pilot program that operates in just five of 6,500 federal inspected packing plants.

Beef remains the most intensively regulated food in the United States, according to USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service. Ninety-seven percent of all foodborne illnesses result from mishandling prior to cooking and are not attributable to production or processing.

Texas beef producers join their colleagues across the nation in

assuring consumers that beef is safe. A recent study by Colorado State University released this month shows beef producers and packers invest more than \$1 billion annually to ensure beef safety and wholesomeness. That's in addition to the \$500 million spent by USDA and other federal agencies.

All U. S. beef producers are committed to producing a safe, wholesome product for consumers. The industry is outraged that ABC chose to question beef's wholesomeness because of a labor dispute and not because of bona-fide scientific research.

Breast cancer detection mobile to be in Sonora May 14

Breast cancer cannot be prevented, but early detection can save many lives. Breast cancer will strike one in nine American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 44,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. Experts estimate that if every woman had regular mammograms according to guidelines established by the American Cancer Society, nearly a third of the women who die of breast cancer would survive.

The guidelines are: a) begin mammography by age 40, b) age 40-49 mammogram every 1-2 years; c) over age 50 annual mammogram; d) monthly breast self-examination; e) regular breast exams by a physician.

Mammography is the best means for early detection of breast cancer.

Transamerican Diagnostic Services has been accredited by the American College of Radiology since 1989. The American College of Radiology program is voluntary and designed to insure women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The accreditation is done through evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, (technologist, radiologist, and physicist), equipment, quality control, quality assurance, image quality and breast dose. Transamerican Diagnostic Services is also approved by the Texas Department of Health to accept self referred patients and is

approved by Medicare as a provider to the Medicare mammography program.

Transamerican Diagnostic Services, recently has been contracted by the Texas Department of Health to be an official provider for low income women.

Transamerican Diagnostic Services will have a mobile breast cancer detection unit available to local women on Thursday, May 14th.

The unit will be parked Hudspeth Memorial Hospital, Sonora, Texas. Appointments may be made by calling 387-2521.

The members present were pleased to see how their tax dollars are spent in regard to teaching these students about agriculture. Many will be involved in this field as their life work.

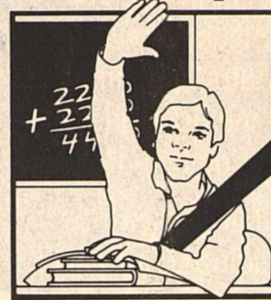

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 300 East Oak St.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

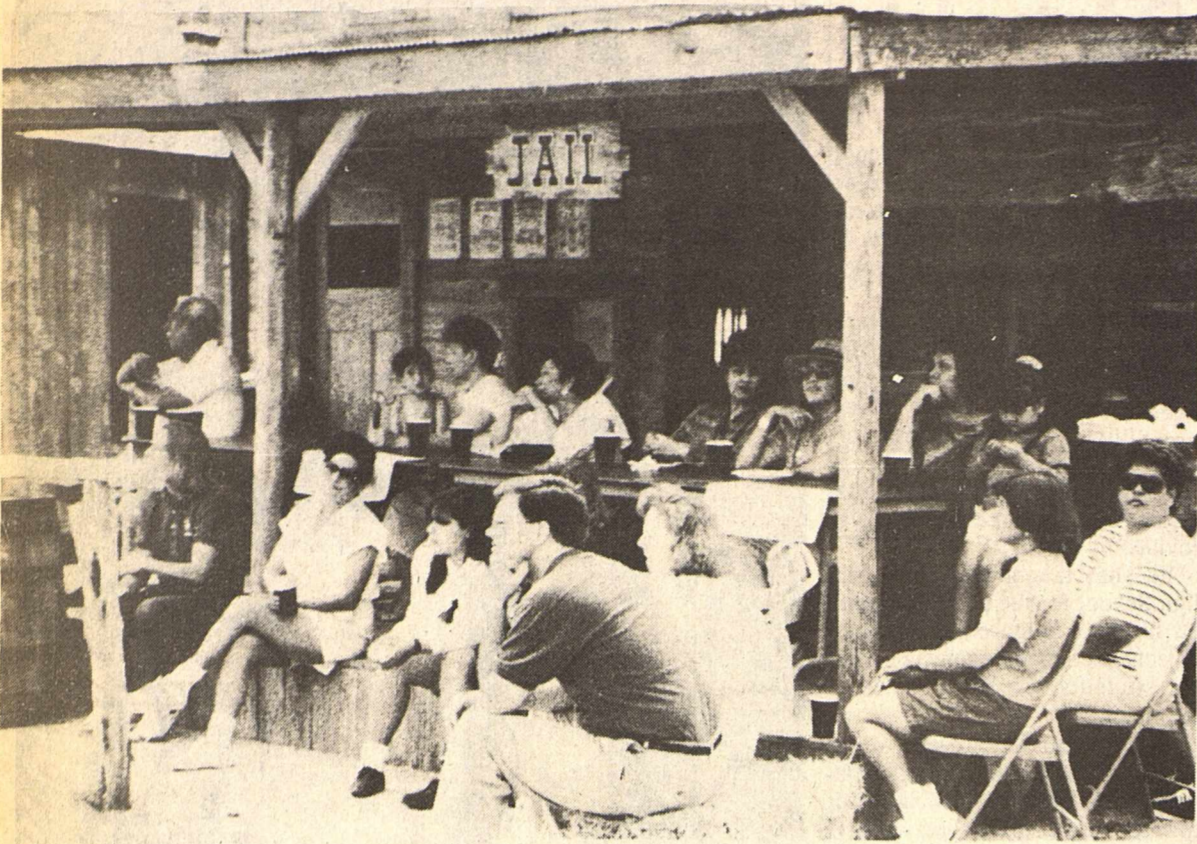
Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

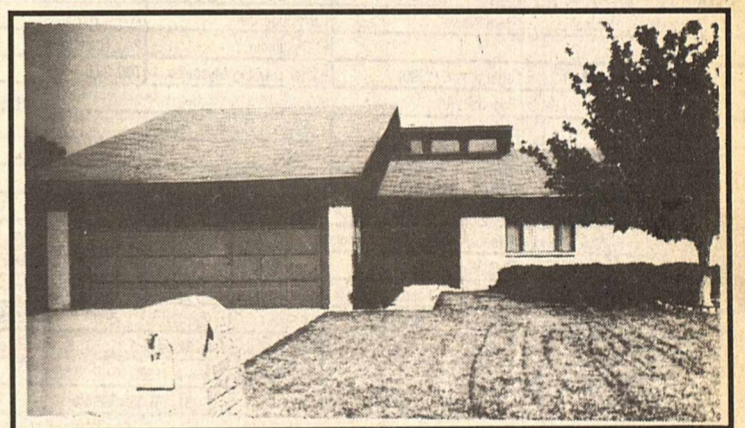
