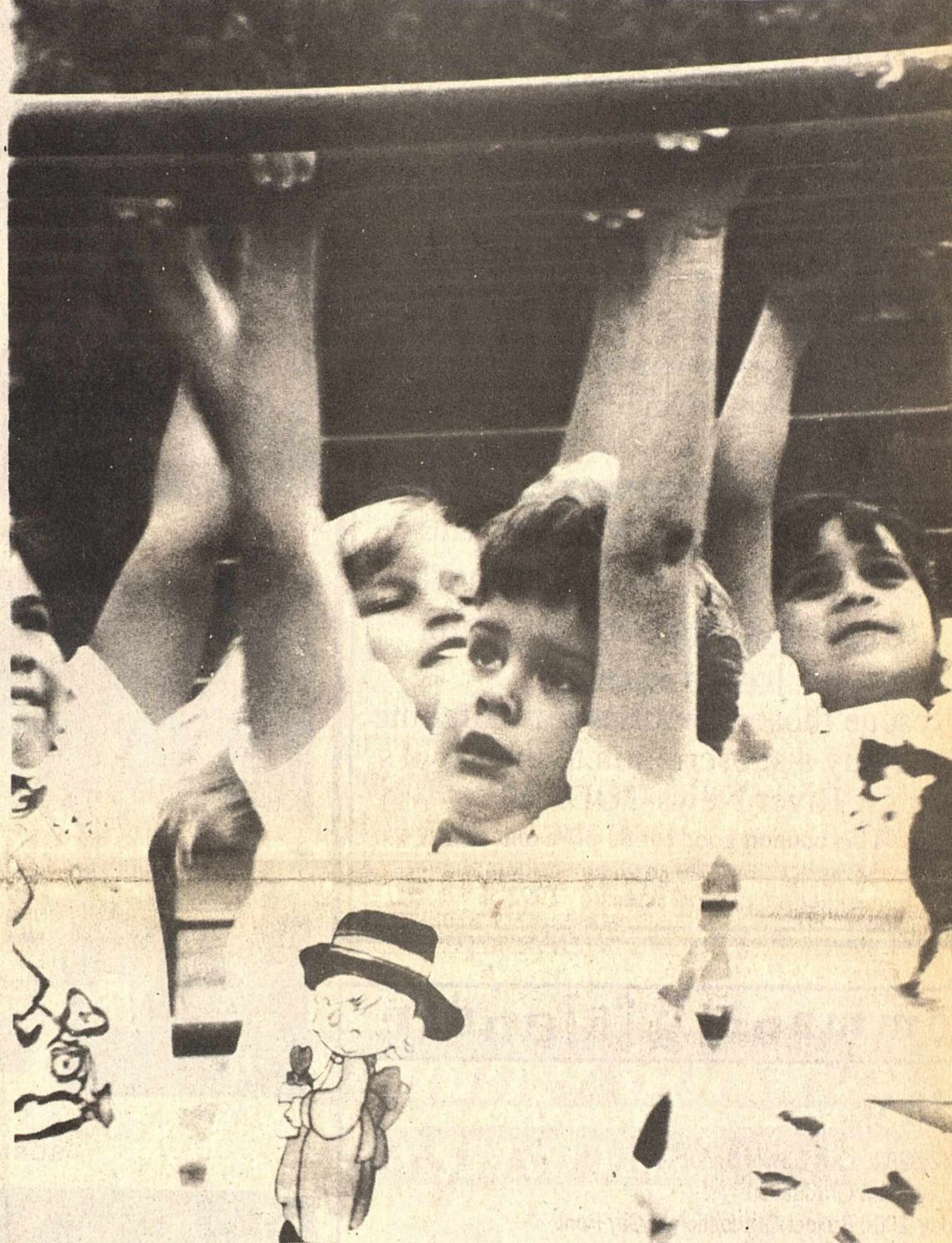
Recognized for their consistent

Gates to remain locked at county park

Tuesday, May 26th the County Commissioners listened to complaints about locked park gates during the baseball games. Some citizens feared the ambulance could not get thru the gates. The EMS Emergency Management Coordinator, Lenora Pool replied that all ambulances have a key to the gates. The concession stand will also have a key at all times.

Commissioners reported that several players and coaches disliked having to carry heavy baseball equipment further distances because of the locked gate. Judge Garner suggested that a key be given to the

baseball president for coaches equipment only.

Commissioners agreed that the gate would stay locked. Bill Keel replied that "if it saved one life it would be worth it." Commissioners also stressed that anyone breaking these locks would have to pay to replace them.

A request to use the baseball area and lights Sunday evenings was made and granted but all use must be scheduled with Joyce Chalk.

The commissioners sided with lawn specialist to keep heavy vehicles and machinery off the tender grass at the court house. Due to this decision no vehicles will be allowed on the lawn during Sutton County Days.

Judge Carla Garner suggested that Sutton County join S.P.E.C. which lobbys for rural and smaller community waste dump management needs on the state and federal level.

High speed chase ends with arrest of teenager

A high speed chase ended Friday evening with the arrest of 17 year old Daniel Davies. Davies travelled at a high rate of speed from Junction to Sonora with the Texas Highway Patrol in pursuit.

THP Trooper Donald Van Zandt fired three shots at the vehicle after the driver sped through a roadblock east of Sonora.

Davies was taken into custody

after he lost control of the reportedly stolen Mazda RX7 he was driving.

Members of the local Police Department, Sheriff's Department and Texas Highway Patrol joined together in apprehending the subject.

Neither Davies nor the officers involved were injured in the pursuit.

Social Security Administration warns of misleading advertising

The Social Security Administration is increasing its efforts to alert the public to misleading advertisers who use Social Security as a "come on" for profitmaking and fundraising ventures.

That's the message from Trish Butler, Social Security's Associate Commissioner for Public Affairs, who pointed out that "These misleading ads are often a part of direct marketing campaigns that are designed to capture the public's attention and money."

"Social Security is actively working to protect the public from this fraud and deceit."

Ms. Butler explained that the ads offer Social Security services for a fee, but that these same services and information are available free of charge from the Social Security Administration.

For example, some advertisers offer to obtain Social Security numbers for newborns, to notify Social Security of name changes for brides, or to obtain an earnings and benefit statement for fees ranging from \$10 to \$50 or more. But, all of these services can be obtained for free by calling Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. any business day.

Ms. Butler noted that "of particular significance to the public should be an increased awareness of what unscrupulous marketers could do with the confidential information they solicit in the form of an SS-5 (Application for a Social Security Card).

"It's hard for me to believe that consumers would send the personal information needed for a Social Security number or a replacement card to an anonymous post office box. The information on a completed form is sufficient to establish credit, apply for a loan, buy a car, and conduct many other financial transactions."

Other advertisers deceive the public by suggesting that the future of Social Security is in jeopardy. Their direct marketing efforts mislead people, especially senior citizens, into thinking that they must respond with a donation or membership fee to avoid losing their Social Security benefits or Medicare coverage.

"We are also seeing increased problems with direct mail campaigns from insurance vendors," Ms. Butler continued. "They're using the Social Security as a 'come-on' to encourage people to respond. Naturally, when people do follow up, they find that they're being sold insurance."

Anyone who receives misleading information about a "Social Security" service from a private organization seeking payment for the service should send the entire solicitation (including the envelope) to the Social Security Administration, Office of Public Affairs, Misleading Advertising, Box 17740, Baltimore, MD, 21235.

Krueger fights amendment to National Energy Bill

WASHINGTON, D.C. MAY 20-Texas Railroad Commissioner Bob Krueger met in Washington today with the Texas Democratic House Delegation to urge their opposition to an amendment by Congressmen Scheuer (N.Y.) and Ed Markey (Mass.) that would restrict state authority to regulate natural gas production.

Krueger said the Scheuer-Markey amendment to the National Energy Bill would require Texas and other producing states to regulate natural gas production in an entirely different manner from that which has been used for the past 60 years. "We do not need Washington's guidance in this matter," Krueger said.

"I have indicated for several months my concern that Congress might seek to intervene in our regulatory activities," Krueger said. "While I am firmly opposed to any attempts to constrict statewide gas production in order to raise prices, the amendment presumes that any attempt to match supply with demand would constitute price

fixing, and this is untrue."

Krueger met separately with Congressman Scheuer and Markey in attempts to persuade them to withdraw their amendment. Their response, however, was that the present energy bill was "the only energy train leaving the station for the next two years," and they had to take some action to protect New England gas users against unwarranted price increases resulting from unfair regulatory constraints.

"I think there has been considerable confusion, both in Texas and in the Congress, regarding the very technical issue of natural gas proration. I am afraid that the Scheuer-Markey amendment would only complicate policies regarding this important but difficult question. For over a half a century, we at the Railroad Commission have regulated the natural gas industry without unfairness to consumers either in Texas or in New England. I would prefer that authority to regulate remain in Texas' hands."

Early Childhood Education

Last fall the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills was administered to students across the state. It was the results of this test that prompted the Sonora Independent School District to propose special programs aimed at addressing the significant discrepancy between Anglo and Hispanic students.

The school district recognizes that if it is to impact a child's learning it must start in the child's formative years. Presently, the school district is seeking to offer a comprehensive program for eligible three and four year old children who are limited English proficient and come from a low socio-economic status. This program would offer many children the opportunity to gain the skills and language necessary for future formal learning.

The focus of this program is to provide a developmentally appropriate program for children.

In addition it would offer parents the opportunity to develop the necessary skills and knowledge that would empower them to become active and involved partners in their child's education.

The Texas Education Agency and the Department of Human Services have recently requested that school districts make every effort to collaborate with Head Start when considering programs for three and four year olds. The district has met with Head Start representatives several times and has recently presented a program proposal that would provide services to eligible children of Sutton County.

The administration, staff, and Board of Trustees firmly believe that there is a need for such a program and acknowledges that together with Head Start such a program would be of great benefit to our children.



Lindsay Wentworth Wentworth receives scholarship

Lindsay Wentworth, a senior at Sonora High School in Sonora, has been awarded a Carr Academic Scholarship at Angelo State University for 1992-93.

Over 400 Carr Academic Scholarships for 1992-93 have been awarded to qualified high school seniors. During the current year over 900 students from throughout Texas and the nation, as well as numerous foreign countries are attending Angelo State University on Carr Academic Scholarships.

As a general rule, students must be in the top 15 percent of their high school class, have a high school grade average of 90 or above, and present a combined math and verbal score of 1000 or higher on the SAT or a composite score of 25 higher on the Enhanced ACT Assessment.

Supported by a growing multi-million dollar trust established by the late Robert G. and Nona K. Carr of San Angelo, the undergraduate scholarships may be renewed annually by the University for students who maintain the required academic record.

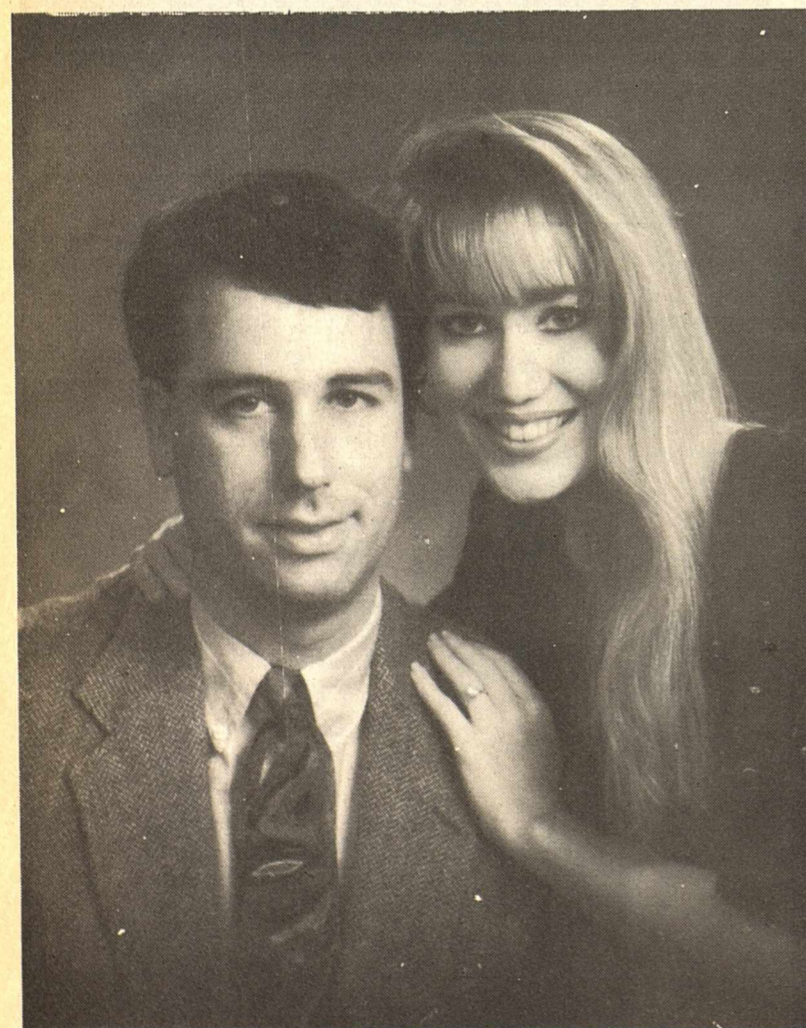

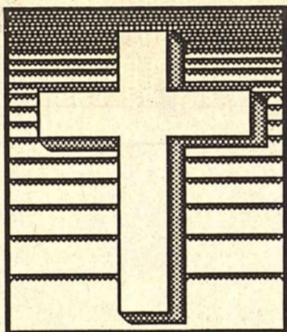

ASU registration to begin June 1

Registration for the first term of the 1992 Summer Session at Angelo State University will be Monday, June 1, in the Robert and Wona Carr Education-Fine Arts Building.

Preregistered students will register from 8 a.m. through 11 a.m. and non-preregistered students will register from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. Evening school students may register from 6 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. in the Registrar's Office in the Administration-Journalism Building.

Students will register in order of the last two digits of their Social Security numbers. The order for registration Monday, June 1, for preregistered students is as follows: Graduate students and seniors, 00-2, 8 a.m.; 33-66, 8:30 a.m.; and 57-99, 9 a.m. Juniors and sophomores, 00-32, 9:30 a.m.; 33-66, 10 a.m.; and 67-99, 10:30 a.m. Freshman, 00-99, 11 a.m.

The order for non-preregistered students is as follows: Graduates

and seniors, 00-49, 2 p.m.; 50-99, 2:30 p.m. Juniors, 00-99, 3 p.m. Sophomores, 00-99, 3:30 p.m., Freshmen, 00-99, 4 p.m.

Preregistered students can pick up their registration packets in the Band Hall of the Education-Fine Arts Building at their assigned times. Non-preregistered students must pick up their registration packets in the Registrar's Office before reporting to the registration area. Graduate students can pick up forms in the Office of the Graduate Dean, located in the Nursing-Physical Science Building, Room 164.

The first summer term at Angelo State runs through Friday, July 7. Registration for the second summer term at ASU is Thursday, July 9, and classes begin Friday, July 10 and run through Friday, Aug. 14. Summer commencement is scheduled for Friday, Aug. 14.

The schedule of summer term classes is available through the Registrar's Office.

ASU Continuing Ed. registration

Registration for classes in Angelo State University's Adult and Continuing Education Program's Summer Session begins Tuesday, May 26 and runs through Thursday June 4 at the ACE Office in the Houston Harte University Center.

The registration office is open from 8 a.m. through 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, May 26-29, and from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Thursday, June 1-4. Classes in the Summer Session begin Monday, June 8.

Texas Farm Bureau states position on Edwards Aquifer

On April 15, 1992, The Texas Water Commission ruled that the Edwards Aquifer is an underground river, therefore subject to state regulation and control. This action, if allowed to stand, will work a severe hardship on Texas farmers that depend on the aquifer for irrigation water.

It will also reverse decades of Texas law that grants subsurface water rights to the surface landowner. This is a concept that has been endorsed by the courts and the legislature many times.

Texas Farm Bureau members have many concerns about this issue. First of all, it seems clear the Texas Water Commission has exceeded its authority. An appointed board has assumed authority that is reserved for the elected legislature or at the very least, the courts.

Though Chairman John Hall says this action only applies to the Edwards Aquifer, the precedent established here, if allowed to stand, could be applied elsewhere. It amounts to erosion of private property rights. With water rights uncertain, farmers will have difficulty getting financing or making long range plans for their operations.

Some say this action was taken to prevent the federal government from stepping in to enforce the Endangered Species Act. It is claimed that the aquifer is habitat for some endangered species. However, in court documents recently filed, the U.S. Justice department states that the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service does not have the authority to regulate groundwater.

The Texas Farm Bureau proposed legislation in 1991 that would create a management plan for the aquifer. It involved the creation of underground water conservation districts. Such districts have worked very well in many parts of Texas. This plan would have the advantage of management by local people directly affected by any actions taken, and more familiar with the problems and potential solutions.

The Guadalupe Blanco River Authority, downstream from the aquifer, is one of the leading groups in opposition to agricultural interests, and is involved in the controversy because that entity sells water. Every additional acre foot of water that flows down the river amounts to additional income for that organization.

The Texas Farm Bureau and other parties are now involved in a lawsuit that will decide the future of the aquifer. The resolution of this issue will have profound affects of the future of Texas agriculture and other water dependent industries.

LCRA to work with cities to solve waste mgmt. problems

AUSTIN-Responding to requests from customers and local elected officials, the Lower Colorado River Authority has agreed to work with cities and counties in its service area to develop regional solutions to their solid-waste problems.

At its meeting on Thursday, May 21, the LCRA Board of Directors approved a resolution authorizing the staff to explore options for managing municipal solid wastes on a regional basis. Plans call for the LCRA to serve as coordinator, bringing communities with common interests together to solve their solid waste problems, while protecting water quality.

The LCRA has authority to be involved in solid waste disposal under the state law that created the LCRA and under the Clean Rivers Act enacted in 1991.

Some communities are facing waste crisis because they are running out of landfill space. Some may be forced to close their landfills in response to federal environmental regulations.

The LCRA is in an ideal position to address solid waste issues because it is an existing regional entity that has been working closely with cities and counties in its service area for five decades, said General Manager Mark Rose. The LCRA supplies electricity and water to more than 50 Central Texas counties.

The board resolution calls for the staff to work with electric customers, citizens, regional planning councils and government entities in developing solutions. The staff also is authorized to seek

state grants and other funding to defray costs.

The resolution specifies that any regional program in which the LCRA participates will emphasize ways to minimize the creation of waste. The resolution also emphasizes that the solid-waste activities contemplated by the LCRA will not subject the authority or its electrical assets to uninsured risks or liabilities.

Managing solid wastes is a logical extension of the LCRA's role in protecting water quality and the environment, Rose said.

"Disposal of solid wastes has become a major problem in Texas and throughout the nation, both from an economic and environmental standpoint," Rose said. "By working closely with our customers, we are confident we can help them find solutions that are economically and environmentally sound."

The LCRA will not duplicate existing studies and plans, nor will it get into the trash-hauling business, Rose emphasized.

"In many areas the data collection and planning have already been done," Rose said. "Our goal is to take the information that has been developed and begin to get solutions on the ground."

In December 1991, mayors and county officials from throughout LCRA's service area asked LCRA to become involved in finding solutions to local solid waste problems. The Board held two briefing sessions to look into the issue before Thursday's action.

Handbook explains rights & responsibilities of adulthood

AUSTIN- Turning 18 means becoming an adult, which means taking on a whole new set of responsibilities. *Now You Are 18* is a handbook that may help, produced as a law-related education project of the Texas Lawyers Auxiliary (TLA), a support group to the State Bar of Texas. The booklet explains the rights, responsibilities and privileges of adults in Texas.

Now You Are 18 is written in a question and answer format and addresses issues such as voting, jury duty, contracts, credit, marriage, employment, military service, criminal charges and apartment leases. It does not cover all aspects of the law, but provides a basic summary of an adult's legal responsibilities and privileges in Texas.

Handbooks are provided to high school seniors throughout the state, free of charge and they are meant to be presented and studied in a class or discussion group. The handbooks are distributed through various venues including schools, authorized human resource groups, local bar associations, law firms and individual attorneys.

The booklet is available in large print, braille and cassette form for sight-impaired person. In August 1991, the TLA received the J.C. Penney Co. "Advocacy for the Disabled Award" for these versions

of the handbook. Since it was published in 1987, more than 400,000 copies of *Now You Are 18* have been printed and distributed across the state. TLA's goal is to distribute the book to every 18-year old in the state.
